

SENTRY TIGRE '87



Six A-7's from the 162nd Tactical Fighter Group, Tucson International Airport, Arizona, arrived yesterday afternoon. The Arizona aircraft, aircrews, and support personnel are here once again to participate in Sentry Tigre '87. The DACT (Dissimilar Air Combat Tactics) exercise will run through January 18. The A-7's will simulate adversaries in wartime scenarios and engage our F-4C's in "dog fights" and aerial maneuvers. The 154th Composite Group has scheduled 54 training sorties.

Sentry Tigre exercises first started in 1980 and has provided excellent training for our aircrews. This year will be the last time that the 154th Composite Group and the 199th Tactical Fighter Squadron will employ the Phantom jets as the ongoing conversion will bring the F-15 Eagles later this year.

BUSY BEGINNING

The new year starts off as a busy beginning with several exercises scheduled. In addition to Sentry Tigre 87, Patriot Palm will see twelve F-16 A's from the 419th Tactical Fighter Wing (Air Force Reserve), Hill AFB, Utah, here from January 24 to February 21. The 154th Composite Group will have the opportunity to conduct dissimilar air combat tactics training against the F-16's. Ten F-4D's of the 507th Tactical Fighter Group (Air Force Reserve) from Tinker AFB, Florida, will be at Barbers Point January 10-24. The Group anticipates conducting force protection, escort and air combat training with them. Finally, Varsity Scrimmage, a U.S. Navy task force exercise, will take place January 11-14. The Group will conduct air combat training and defensive/offensive counter air operations against task force carrier aircraft.

GOVERNORS' RIGHTS AND THE NATIONAL GUARD


In an unprecedented move, Congress has voted to limit the authority of state governors to block overseas training for National Guard units.

Congress supported an amendment to the 1987 Defense Authorization Act that permits governors to keep their Guard units at home only if there is a legitimate state emergency.

The legislation centers around the actions of more than 20 state governments to keep their National Guard troops from training in Central America.

It is a New Year and we expect more exciting challenges for 87 such as the F-15 on our ramp in March. We have started our conversion as visibly seen with added warehouse material in our people going to schools, and numerous planning meetings to anticipate major event. Our first aircrews will go to Tyndall, Florida for an 11 week conversion training beginning in February. NEW CINCPACAF

General Jack I. Gregory is the new Commander in Chief, Pacific Air Forces, replacing General Robert W. Bazley, as change of command ceremonies were held on December 16, 1986 at Hickam AFB.

His early career saw assignments to Korea, Japan, Oregon, Arizona, Germany, Thailand, Washington D.C., and Florida.


In July 1975 he became vice commander of the 347th Tactical Fighter Wing at Moody Air Force Base, Ga., and was named wing commander in August 1976. During this period, General Gregory led the conversion of that Air Training Command base to a Tactical Air Command asset. Three new F-4E tactical fighter squadrons were activated and brought to combat-ready status.

In October 1978 he was selected to command what is now the 831st Air Division at George Air Force Base, CA, where he was responsible for the Wild Weasel Defense Suppression Forces flying F-4C's, F-4E's, F-105G's and F-4G's. He became assistant deputy chief of staff for operations at Tactical Air Command Headquarters, Langley Air Force Base, Va., in March 1980 and also served as director of operations for the Air Force of the Rapid Deployment Force.

In June 1981 General Gregory moved to Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., as Commander of the U.S. Air Force Air Demonstration Team, the Thunderbirds, to F-16s. He was also reponsible for the USAF Fighter Weapons School, the Aggressors, Red Flag exercises, fighter testing and tactics development programs and the operations of A-10s, F-15s, F-16s, F-4s, F-111s, F-5s, A-7s and T-38s.

General Gregory was named commander of the 12th Air Force located at Bergstrom Air Force Base, Texas, in June 1983. In that position he was responsible for 13 tactical wings made up of 50,000 personnel and 1,100 aircraft including F-4E/G's, F-15A/B's F-16A/B/C/D's, F-5B/D/E's, RF-4C's, A-10's, F-111A/D's, EF-111s, T-38s, OA-37s and OV-10s. He also held advisory, evaluation and inspection responsibilities for Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve TAC-gained units, which included an additional 25,000 personnel and 550 aircraft.

In June 1985, General Gregory transferred to Yongsan Army Installation, Seoul Republic of Korea, as deputy commander in chief, United Nations Command; chief of staff, Republic of Korea and United States

More on Sexual Harrassment

All things change except change. As an issue, sexual harrassment, is new. Many of the ways men and women interact developed over years of tradition and history. Roles, views of the opposite sex and ways of dealing with each other have changed little for centuries. The customs, attitudes, and perceptions have not kept up with the changes in our world. The result is that now, some of our male/female interactions have become harrassment.

Our programming, learning, of sexual roles is done so well that we participate as males and females, in attitude and actions, before we participate according to our individual personalities. It's only within the past 20-30 years that we've become aware of the inequity, destruction, and limits of the programming. If we still lived as people lived before industrialization, our programming would fit. As our world is now, the programming does not fit. Customs, which worked before industrialization, don't work anymore. Attitudes, which were acceptable to our parents and grandparents, aren't acceptable anymore. Views of male/female roles do not match reality. We are a generation of rapid change and we need to develop new attitudes, customs, perceptions, and actions that will work within the changes.

In future articles, I will explore the issue of sexual harrassment, the history and the current situation. Before each of us can make informed choices in our interaction, we need to have the background.

In September 1986, he assumed command of the newly activated 7th Air Force, Osan Air Base, Republic of Korea, while continuing to serve as deputy commander of U.S. Forces Korea and as deputy commander in chief, United Nations Command.

The general is a command pilot and his military decorations and awards include the Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, Air Medal with 13 oak leaf clusters and Air Force Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster.

He was promoted to general December 16, 1986, with date of rank January 1, 1987.

General Gregory married the former Jane Cummins, also of Somerset, Ky. They have three sons: Jack Jr., an Air Force tactical fighter pilot, William and Robert.

EDDIE" ANDERSON

The Hawaii Air National Guard has lost a close friend with the passing of Edward H. Anderson, Jr.

"Eddie" Anderson served with the Hawaii Army National Guard as a information specialist from November 1950 to April 1960. He was appointed as a Captain in the Hawaii Air National Guard in April 1966 and performed duty as the Information Officer with the 154 Combat Support Squadron and Headquarters Hawaii Air National Guard until he retired in December 1978 with the rank of Major.

"Eddie" Anderson was employed fulltime as the Public Affairs Officer for the State Department of Defense from May 1957 to July 1967. During this period, he was honored by the State House of Representatives when they presented a resolution dated March 15, 1966 citing his achievements and contributions to the community. Among them was his instituting "Operations Clean-up" on Oahu and Kauai in 1962, 1963, and 1964, and by initiating a blood bank for Hawaii's indigents with the blood being donated by the Hawaii Air National Guardsmen. In 1967, he joined First Insurance as full-time public relations director and later became an assistant vice president.

Graveside services will be held at 4 p.m. Jan. 18 at Oahu Cemetery, at Judd Street and Nuuanu Avenue, Adjacent to the chapel.

urged Congress to reconsider a law that requires a governor's consent before his state's National Guard may be mobilized for federal service. He said this requirement has been used by certain governors and special interest groups to affect U.S. foreign policy at the expense of important National Guard training.

The new legislation clarifies the sometimes conflicting messages sent to National Guardsmen, who have served both as state militiamen and federal reservists under legislation for more than 50 years.

BUMPAH STIKA

This has been very confusing. The latest word is that the Air Force no longer requires changing your bumper decal to the windshield until the expiration date. However, this is not true for the other services and you may encounter problems at Pearl Harbor, Schofield, or Kaneohe.
