150TH AC&W SQ NEWS



Twenty six years ago on October 21. 1961, federal recognition was received and the unit at Kokee AFS, HI was official redesignated from Det #1, 109 ACW Sq to its present unit designation. However, the unit was officially in full operation on March 15, 1961. Today, we silently celebrate a bit of nostalgia of the days gone by. Over eighty original 109 ACW Sq members from the Kahuku Air Station (12 officers and 77 airmen) departed the Punamano facility for Kokee AFS on the Garden Isle. Members of the Oahu based unit were met at Lihue Airport by Capt John English, now retired. At exactly 8:00 a.m. on March 15, 1961, the antenna of the FPS-20 at Kokee began rotating to assume the 24-hours round-the-clock air defense operations for the state of Hawaii. Of the original 89 members, we recognize the few remaining "die-hards" who still lead the unit in its on-going mission and they are: Lt Col Reginald Doi, Lt Col George J. Koga, CMSgt Charles H. Tanaka, SMSgt Richard Y.F. Farm, SMSgt Francis T. Hosaka, SMSgt William M. Tabe, MSgt Harry T. Beppu, and MSgt Herbert Y. Takeya. (Would you believe that Ricky Farm is still unmarried !)

LEGAL BRIEF

The scene is Point Panic parking lot (a popular body surfing/body boarding spot) about 6 pm on Friday night. A car with 4 guys ages 18 and 19 pulls up and parks. They've just gotten off work, made a quick stop to pick up some cold beer and some aku poki.

Surfs up so they plan to "Hook a Few Bruises" and watch the surf as the sun sets. Unfortunately, drinking in public is a criminal offense in Hawaii and even more unfortunately, Point Panic is a favorite place in Honolulu for plain clothes police officers to arrest people for it (the other favored spots are Kaisers behind the Ilikai and Diamond Head lookout).

Our 4 guys were arrested and charged; ironically they are all good citizens who have never been in trouble before. Though the fine for drinking in public is usually only \$25 dollars, the major concern is maintaining a clean record.

Hawaii's legislature has seen fit to allow persons with generally clean records like our guys, a way to maintain their good standing by way of the DIFFERED AC-CEPTANCE OF GUILTY PLEA (DAG PLEA). Recognizing that an otherwise, law abiding citizen may have a "bad day" and not wishing to ban such a person for life with a police record, the law provides that the person may enter a plea of guilty then ask the judge for the DAG. The judge may then grant the motion which means a conviction never occurs and further that after a certain period of time, the person may have all police mug shots and fingerprint records destroyed.

A DAG does not apply to the more serious offenses like assault.

SAFETY TIPS

What it?...noise any unwan ted sound. ear pollution!...a little noise may be no harm at all -- BUT DID YOU KNOW excessive noise is a leading cause of hearing loss. But much noise is excessive? Continued exposure to noises over dB during the average workday may eventually harm hearing. Hearing is one of precious possessions thats for:

- LEARNING--much of our information is gained from listening.
- 2. COMMUNICATION—the most important way of getting along with others is by spoken words.
 3. SAFETY—many warning systems

depend on hearing.

It is common sense and logical to protect your hearing from loss by using some form of personal protection. Physically Ear plugs/muffs. function much like sunglasses do—they filter out the "glare" of loud noise.

Here at 154 COMPG and the areas ajacent to the F-15s on the flight line, we're exposed to a high pitched engine noise which can be very irritating and could harm your hearing if exposed for length of time. For your sake wear your ear protectors. you don't have them, see the HOSP or have your supervisor order them. Also if you have visitors are in that the area, afford them the same protection.

Note: There is no cure for hearing loss, but you can prevent it by using ear protection.
