
Hawaii's 13 delegates and 8 conferees departed HAFB, HI, at 6:30 AM on September 18 to attend the 16th Annual EANGUS Conference in Louisville, Kentucky. Air transportation to the site was provided by the 134th AREFG Tennessee Air National Guard and the Tennessee Army National Guard (helicopters).

Area caucuses started the first day off at 8:00 AM. Guidelines and nominations for Area Director candidates were held in these sessions. We also planned the Area Hospitality event at this meeting. Hawaii contributed \$90.00 and pineapples to this affair.

The first business session started at 9:20 AM with several distinguished guests from Kentucky welcoming the conferees and their guests. A rousing display of enthusiasm for our States roll call got us off to a great start. Executive Director CMSgt. Alan Overmiller (RET) presented his report with mixed emotions. His concerns echoed our EANGUS (national) president's since we were low in membership strength, even though we had acquired two major benefits for the membership, the GI Bill and the (14 day eligibility) Commissary Privilege. Maj Gen Herbert Temple, Chief NGB, provided an inside look at the concerns and activities of the Army National Guard. Lt. Gen. L. Weber, representative of NGAUS, could not attend, so past president, Command Sgt. Maj James Garritson delivered his speech.

Several committee reports started day #2 of the conference. Auxiliary President Mrs. Nancy McDowell-Ohio, briefed the national body of their organizational plans for the future; Hawaii will start our own State Auxiliary in the future.

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Since the arrival of the F-15 Eagle, the Composite Group continues to be the center of attention. Numerous distinguished visitors and community groups have visited the Group facilities. Normally, these visitors are provided with a briefing, tour of various shops, and static display of the new aircraft.

Distinguished visitors included members of the State legislature in March, foreign dignitaries and the Japan Air Self Defense Force in May, Foreign Training Observers and the Utah Employer Support of the Guard/Reserve Committee in August, the commander of Republic of Singapore Air Force and the Honolulu Rotary Club in September.

Interspersed amongst the dignitaries were various community organizations ranging from schools, ROTC groups, science study programs, scouts and explorers.

Our own adjutant general, Maj Gen Alexis T. Lum, visited the Group last Saturday UTA. He was greeted by Col John Lee, our commander, and provided a firsthand look at our operation with the F-15 Eagles.

This has been a very busy year and will continue to be so. The Group and its outstanding people know that we are showing the best because we are the best.

Not only were we able to maintain two fighter aircraft inventories, hands on training for our personnel received the added benefit of observing how other units work such as Alaska, New Orleans. Washington, Tyndal, Dobbins and Luke. We are still working on terminating the supply line for the F-4 aircraft as we get smarter in the F-15.

I've been quite impressed that CAMRON has been able to produce our added F-15 sorties which has contributed to our accelerated training of our returning pilots. Air Force assistance is surely paying off for both our CAMRON members and to the delight of our fighter squadron.

Recently the RMS and TAC Hospital units hosted a family day during their Sunday UTA. We will be looking at more of these unit sponsored activities in the near future.

#### UNIFORM TIPS (Ref. AFR 35-10)

Appearance in Uniform:

Uniforms must be clean, neat, correct in design and specification, fitted properly, pressed, and in good condition (that is, not frayed, worn out, torn, faded, patched, and so forth). Uniform items are kept zippered, snapped, or buttoned, including pockets. Shoes are shined and in good repair. Ribbons are clean and not frayed. Badges, insignia, belt buckles, and other metallic devices are kept clean and free of scratches and corro-

sion. Badges and U.S. insignia may be hopolished to a chrome-like finish. EXCEPTA Grade insignia for majors and lieutenan colonels must be satin finish. They are not highly polished to a chrome-like finish. EXCEPTION: Grade insignia for first lieutenants, captains, colonels, and general officers are highly polished. Chrome-like buckles and belt tips are authorized for optional wear. (CBPO, Personal Affairs Section, 449-5669)

#### BACKPACKS

Air Force guidelines are very clear, backpack wear is allowed in uniform only while operating or riding as passengers on two-wheeled vehicles — such as motorcycles or bicycles. After dismounting the vehicle, backpacks must be removed. Backpacks must be conservative in nature — free of emblems, letterings, or other ornamentation. The international orange color is recommended.

#### DEPENDENT ID CARDS

The issuance of dependent ID cards began in September. The spouse of a member, unmarried dependent children (between the ages of 10 and 21 years old) are eligible for the cards. The member must take the following items when he or she goes to CBPO to obtain the application, AF Form 446, (Application for Air Reserve Forces Dependent Identification Card). These items will help to verify dependency.

- 1. a copy of your marriage certificate.
- 2. court decree
- 3. birth certificate

Expiration of the dependent card is 4 years from issue date, expiration of term of service, or 21st birthday for children, whichever is earlier.

After the member has the AF Form 446 verified he or she must take it to the 15th Security Police Pass and ID section (Hickam) Monday through Friday during normal duty hours or the 154th Security Police Pass and ID section during the UTA weekends, Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., and Sunday UTA from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

A few years ago, financial magnate and billionaire recluse, Howard Hughes passed away after living a shadowy and mysterious existence in his final years. It was told how he had not left his Las Vegas penthouse apartment for years; his fingernails and hair had grown to extraordinary length; how he did nothing during his waking hours except to lay in the dark and watch the late 60's movie "Ice Station Zebra" over and over.

When he finally did die, the nation was intrigued by the fact that this enormously wealthy man, who had owned an airline company, a helicopter manufacturing company, a tool and equipment company and was a defense weapons contractor died "intestate", i.e. without a will. She said she took money and jewelry from the house to support her use of cocaine. She said it just took over her life and made her do things. Well Dad called the rest of us and we all talked with her. We told her to stop using crack, but she could not. We tried everything except locking her up in some institution, but nothing really helped. That's not really true, everything helped for awhile then, she went back to using the crack. Now she's moved out of the house and is living with this dealer. I just feel sick. I want to go over there and just bust up the guy.


I put my hand on his shoulder, and looked into the sunset. There is help out there I said softly. Try to get her into Narcotics Anonymous, or another drug addiction

Jerry turned to me, that's not a bad idea. There are some people who she's still close to people who may get her to seek help - anyway she is my sister and I can't just give up.

Funny; individuals always think the other guy or girl will get hooked, never them. There's always family members who try to help and some who just give up. This whole drug stuff is so easy to avoid but - its hard telling a friend "no". Sometimes there comes a time when just saying "no" is the best thing to do.

Washington (AFNS) -- The Air Force of the 21st century may have different tools for defense, but it will be founded on the same principles it has had for the last 40 years -- the principles of duty, honor and integrity.

This is part of the vision and prophecy for the Air Force of the future cited by Secretary of the Air Force Edward Aldridge Jr. During the recent Air Force association convention here.

He said that the total force team will continue those principles, adding, "I am certain that active-duty, guard and reserve members, along with their civilian counterparts, will continue to perform the Air Force mission magnificently."

In recognition of "their special contribution," Mr. Aldridge said he hopes that the quality of life, pay and compensation for Air Force team members will reflect the high value this nation places on their service.

Addressing future weapon systems, Mr. Aldridge said strategic systems such as the advanced technology bomber and B-1B bomber, and tactical systems such as the advanced tactical fighter and upgraded F-16 and F-15E aircraft, will be the backbone of the Air Force of the 21st century, which he hopes will then comprise 44 tactical fighter wings, instead of the current 37.

Secretary Aldridge said the development and deployment of newer, smarter weapons and systems such as the advanced medium-range air-to-air missile and the low-altitude navigational and targeting infrared system for night should increase the effectiveness and survivability of tactical forces in high-threat and adverse weather conditions.

He predicts that special operations forces will have "markedly improved capability" and that airlift forces will have

surpassed the current goal of 66 million ton-miles per day.

Also, by the 21st century, he said, the Air Force should be fully exploiting the newest area for national defense: space.

"Using a robust mix of launch vehicles, including the space shuttle and expendable

launch vehicles in every lift class, I hope America will enjoy an assured access to space for our high-priority payloads which will be critical to national security."

Mr. Aldridge said those same systems also should serve the commercial and scientific requirements of a world that depends on its space systems for weather, navigation and communications.

"And I hope that America will be flying a prototype of the national aerospace plane which may revolutionize our space transportation systems," he added.

"The coninuing development of more capable and survivable satellites should increasingly enhance the capabilities of our terrestrial forces and should play the key role in assuring the security of our nation well into the future."

Mr Aldridge cautioned, however, that major events may alter his prophecies. A National decision on reductions in defense spending could "change the course and ability of the Air Force of tomorrow to counter the increasing threat we face in this troubled world," he said.

Arms control agreements may change the size and shape of military forces. In addition, said the secretary, "The strategic defense initiative may enable us to find a solution to offensive nuclear forces and end the threat to all mankind of a massive nuclear exchange."

He cautioned that "Throughout this uncertain course which lies before us, we must remember one essential truth -- we must maintain the strategic and tactical power to deter any adversary."

He said that many Americans say they want peace and freedom. "Peace is free," he said. "All we have to do is give up our liberty." Freedom, however, costs, he said. "It costs the people who pledge their lives to maintain that freedom. It costs the people of America who must spend what it takes to defend our freedom today and what it will take to keep our freedom in the 21st century."
