### SENTRY TIGRE '88

The Arizona ANG is back for another exciting and action packed Sentre Tigre. They not only brought their now-familiar A-7 'Sluff' with them but they also brought the newest addition to the Arizona ANG, the F-16 'Viper'. Our fellow Arizona Air Guard members from the 162nd Tactical Fighter group arrived here yesterday after non-stop from Tucson, Arizona and will be flying their ten jet fighters with us for approximately a week.

During the week, the Tucson Air Guard members will be providing the HANG with valuable training acting as current Soviet threat aircraft and flying similiar Soviet style threat tactics for our pilots to sharpen their skills in aerial combat. This flying will chock up alot of firsts for both the HANG and the Arizona ANG. First, Sentre Tigre will mark the first occasion that our pilots have had to measure their flying skills against A-7 and F-16 aircraft since our unit's conversion to the F-15 Eagle. Also, this will be the first opportunity for our pilots to operate in an advanced and complex multi-aircraft enviroment, testing both the pilot and aircraft abilities. Additionally, this also marks the first occasion for the 162nd TFC to deploy with their new F-16's to Hawaii for the annual Sentre Tigre. The HANG pilots are anxiously awaiting to apply their mastery of the F-15 Eagle in simulated combat scenarios developed especially for Sentre Tigre by our own 199 TFS Weapons and Tactics shop. The training will also maximize the total force field training for all units involved. So to our Arizona pilot Caliente's, we say "Check six, three, nine, and twelve!.....the AEKO (Eagle) is here!".

### ★ LONESTAR '88 - 1

On the 26th of February a familiar sight and sound will once again permeate the air (and maybe bring a tear to some) as the 147th Fighter Interceptor Group (FIG) of the Texas Air Guard fame bring five of their F-4 'Rhino' aircraft to Hawaii. During their stay, from the 26th of February to the 12th of March, the folks from the Lone Star state will be providing the HANG with valuable training in aerial combat flying in simulated combat scenarios in our local airspaces to the north and south of the islands. This will be the first opportunity for our Eagle pilots to hone their skills against a specific Soviet style threat, as the Houston Air Guard's F-4 'Armadillo' aircraft surprisingly performs very similar to the Soviet MiG-23 'Flogger' aircraft. Additional A-4 and F-4 aircraft from local Navy and Marine units will also participate in what is guaranteed to be an exciting and complex simulated combat scenario. Again the HANG pilots are confidently awaiting to exploit their prowess in employing their F-15 Eagles in simulated combat against our friends from down Houston way. This marks the first time that the people from the 147 FIG have deployed to Hawaii with their aircraft, but as a side note some of these folks traveled to Hawaii earlier to receive some of their F-4 training from us. During their visit, the 147th FIG aircraft will be parking on our ramp and their people working side by side with us. Between the flying and the integration of forces, this will maximize the total force field training concept for all units involved. So to our Texican aircrew and their Armadillo road show, we AEKO (Eagle) pilots say "You can run but you can't hide!!!

### SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The following is a reprint of a letter sent to units on Hickam Air Force Base by Col William Kennedy, Commander.

Drunk driving persists as a serious concern on Hickam Air Force Base as well as the rest of the Air Force. Continued Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) arrests reflect the conscientiousness of our law enforcement personnel, but also highlight an apparent disregard for USAF's responsible drinking policy, a possible lack of strong positive examples, and a neglect for personal and public safety.

Intoxicated drivers, and too often their supervisors and friends, suggest reasons or causes intended to explain the occurrence of a DWI, perhaps in an effort to minimize the consequences. This is indeed unfortunate, as there are no acceptable reasons for a DWI. Additionally, the results of a DWI apprehension and conviction are increasingly severe.

For convicted DWI offenders, driving privileges on Hickam AFB will be suspended for one year. This includes the military driver's license in most cases. All military DWI offenders are subject to urinalysis. If the required urine test reveals the offender to be a user of illicit drugs, then he or she will be treated as a drug abuser. Administrative actions such as an Article 15 or letter of reprimand will be taken against an offender even if the DWI occurred off base. In all cases of DWI, on or off base, the squadron commander will refer the individual to Social Actions in compliance with established regulations.

These measures necessarily reflect the seriousness of a DWI. The potential for damage to lives, careers, and futures must be recognized and respected. Drinking and driving is one behavior you will not profit by and one that I will not tolerate your participating in.

I close with another caution. If we host or attend an activity where alcohol is consumed, we should be on the lookout for those who may over indulge, whether or not the individual is under our supervision,

and insist on their safety. Doing less is apathetic. Failure to take responsible action implies a lack of concern for people, the law, and the possible consequences.

We in Social Actions suggest the following precautions if you are attending a function where alcohol is being consumed:

- \* Select a designated driver
- \* Call someone to arrange for transportation home (taxi, friend, family member)
- \* Stay where you are until the next day

These steps could save your life or the life of another. Let's take care of one another while partying.

## CBPO CONNECTION

### SPACE-A PASSENGERS

Recent changes to the space-available regulation, Department of Defense 4515.13R, will enhance future travel to and from Hawaii for passengers.

The first change made allows all category "4" passengers to remain on the space-available register for 45 days or when their travel authorizations expire without revalidation every 15 days.

Category 4 passengers include: retired military members and authorized dependents who are issued DD Form 2, Armed Forces Identification Cards, and eligible to receive retired or retainer pay, and all Reserve and Air National Guard members who are issued DD Form 2 (red) and DD Form 1853, Authorization for Reserve Travel.

All other travelers, categories 1 to 3, may remain on the space available register for a maximum of 30 days or until their leave authorization/orders expire, whichever occurs first. Revalidation is no longer required either.

Another change involves dependents traveling space-available on DOD-owned or controlled aircraft to the continental United States. Before, all dependents to and from an overseas location were allowed to travel to the first CONUS stop.

Effective immediately, all individuals, including dependents, eligible for space-available transportation, can travel to and from an overseas location when a CONUS leg segment (enroute stop) is involved.

The key is — the mission number must remain the same as the passenger must be manifested to the end destination without any delays enroute. For more information, call 449-1515, 24 hours a day.

### (DDP) DELTA PROVIDER LISTING

We have received the regularly scheduled update of the DDP\*Delta Provider Microfiche Listing of participating and non-participating dentists. AGRs whose dependents are currently enrolled in the Dependent Dental Plan should contact the Customer Assistance Section (449-5669) for whom or what group of providers dental care may be obtained.

You may visit the dentist of your choice. However, receiving treatment from a Delta participating dentist may save you money and reduce paperwork for you.

Please be advised that it is the obligation of the beneficiaries to verify partici-

pating status of the dentist at the time dental services are provided.

### UNIFORM TIP (AFR35-10)

Wear of Awards and Decorations by Retirees and Honorably Discharged Veterans.

Honorably discharged and retired Air Force members are authorized to wear full-size or miniature medals on civilian suits on appropriate occasions such as Memorial Day and Armed Forces Day. Women members are also authorized to wear full-size or miniature medals on equivalent dress.

Conditions for Wear of Uniform. The Air Force uniform is worn according to this regulation. Members must conform with military customs, practices, and conduct expected of members of the active Air Force. Retired, separated, Air Force Reserve Forces, and ANG members must keep the same standards of appearance when in uniform as prescribed for active duty members. Wear of the uniform does not, in itself, entitle members to service benefits.

**LEGAL BRIEF**

This month, I'm mustering every last ounce of courage I have as I venture into the murky surrealistic world of the "1986 Tax Reform Act". Courage because I am not a tax lawyer. (I used H & R Block last year). The very best tax advice I can give you is "don't ask me!"

Notwithstanding, here are some of the more significant changes:

Items repealed and no longer available (List not complete):

- Income Averaging
- Deduction for State and local sales taxes
- Deduction for married couples when both work
- Credit for political contributions.

New items (List not complete):

- Exemption amount is increased to \$1,900
- Charitable deduction is no longer available to non-itemizers
- Moving expenses can only be deducted by itemizers
- Miscellaneous deductions can only be subtracted by itemizers to the extent that the amount exceeds 20% of adjusted gross income
- For rental income placed in service in 1986, the recovery period has been extended to 27.5 years
- Medical and dental expenses can only be deducted to the extent that they exceed 7.5% of adjusted gross income.
- Personal interest (car loans, credit cards, etc) can only be deducted up to 65% of the total
- IRA's have lost most of their deductible nature
- The mortgage interest deduction, as a sacred American cow, is still fully deductible. If you took out a loan using your home's equity however, the deductible amount must be figured through use of a very complex formula.

Other important things to note:

- The tax rates have been lowered generally.
- The IRS has for this year decided to hold off on its threat to penalize citizens who unwittingly take too many exemptions on their W-4 withholding statement. This in response to public outcry at the complexity of new tax
