Sounds throughout the evening.



SENTRY ROAD RUNNER 88

Welcome back "TACO's" of the New Mexico ANG. They deployed here from Kirtland A.F.B., NM with six A7s for some fun but intense dissimilar air combat tactics, DACT (pronounced deaseté). They'll be here for a week challenging our Eagle tactics and trying to exploit any weaknesses that we may have to prepare us for the ORI.

Major "ACE" Ellinwood has prepared a scenario which will task the 199 TFS "MYTAIS" as the sole protectors of a specific area, which we call Point Area Defense. Basically our job will be to deter any unknowns from coming too close to friendlies (allies) we're protecting, by

engaging them and blowing them out of the skies. It's a tough job requiring accurate communication among ourselves and our GCI(Ground Controllers) in prioritizing the immediate threat and making sure no one leaks through our defense to attack the friendlies.

The "TACO's" job will be to plan and lead a large strike force. They will use their expertise in air to ground tactics with support of F4s and A4s as their escorts to protect them from air threats. An ECM (Electronic Counter Measure) Lear Jet will also be used to help them reduce the effectiveness of our radars.

With both sides trying to meet their objectives, one can clearly see that there's going to be alot of jets in the air at the same time. We're looking at six Eagles versus 8-12 Bandits (Bad Guys), a possible total of 18 aircraft, giving us valuable training with dissimilar aircraft in a Multi-Bogey (unknown, possible bad buy) environment.

These are very demanding missions requiring the utmost concentration on flying, employing your weapons and as mentioned before, communication. Communication among ourselves and GCI in a concise and brief manner will contribute in developing the big, mental picture prior to getting to the merge which we call, Situation Awareness (SA). With six Eagles and possibly ten adversaries from the strike force converging at each other with over 1,000 miles per hour of closure, high SA is It could sure ruin a priority. your day flying into a flight with low SA which increases your chances of getting shot down and also the potential for mid air crashes.

Although demanding both mentally and physically, the training is extremely necessary. You ask any fighter pilot how he feels about DACT in a Multi-Bogey environment and I can guarantee you his reply will be, "It's Sierra Hotel" meaning, "It's Da Best, BRAH!"

BOYS HURT TOO

Sex bias hurts boys just as much as it hurts girls. Here are some of the effects the continuing bias has on boys.

-Boys are more likely to be identified as having learning and reading disabilities. They also recieve lower grades, are more likely to be grade repeaters, and are less likely to complete high school.

-Boys are more likely to be identified having emotional problems, and statistics indicate a higher male suicide rate.

-Boys are taught stereotyped behaviors rlier and more harshly than girls; there is a 20% greater probability that the behaviors will stay with them for life.

-Males who score high on sexappropreate behaviors tests also score highest on anxiety tests.

-Males are less lkely than females to be close friends with one another.

-Males are more likely to succumb to serious disease and to be victims of accidents or violence.

-The average life expectancy of men is eight years shorter than women.

-Many boys build career expectations that are higher than their abilities. This results in later compromise, disappointment, and frustration.

-Both at home and at school, boys are taught to hide or suppress their emotions; as men they often find it difficult or impossible to show feelings towards their family or friends.

-Boys are actively discouraged from paying with dolls. Many men fail to learn parenting skils. As a result, men often come 'trans-parents' instead of parents, pending less than 15 minutes with their children per day.

The effects of bias are carried with each of us into adulthood. Take a moment to consider how these examples become translated in adult men's lives. Sex equity issues are not for women only. (Information from Sex equity Handbook for schools, Sadker, Myra P. and David M.)

RETENTION CHALLENGE

There are many factors which influence our people to stay in the Air Guard. Some tangible reasons are - retirement, pay, and the numerous benefits/priveledges that play an important part. Surveys, interviews and questionnaires, however, show that there is much more. Intangible factors such as job satisfaction, challenging work, family involvement, patriotism, etc ..., are strong motivators to remain in the Guard. Retention is not just a dollar issue. Although compensation is important retention, decisions are based on much more than money. Here lies a challenge for all HIANG leaders. Our words and actions can influence our people's decisions motivate their creativity. Take the time to bring out and find the positive and good in people. Our positive leadership, integrity, willingness to sacrifice and most importantly, our genuine concern for the welfare of our people, significantly influence their decisions to remain in the Guard. UNIFORM TIP

Officers can wear either the black subdued pin-on grade insignia (Army style) or the cloth subdued insignia on the battle dress uniform. Placement will be the same as presently prescribed for the cloth insignia. Officer grade insignia for the clive green fatique uniform remains unchanged; officers must wear cloth subdued rank. HIV & DRUG TESTING MAINTAIN A READY FORCE

In order to ensure a mission ready force, the Air National Guard now requires two special types of biological testing of its members. Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) testing and urinalysis drug testing.

HIV testing consists of a blood test designed to identify individuals who have HIV antibodies in their systems. presence of HIV antibodies, even in an otherwise healthy person, indicates the initial stage of the Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) disease. A confirmed positive HIV test requires discharge of the individual from the Guard, a suitable non-deployable Guard position can be found in which to place the individual. In combat units such as the HIANG, however, non-deployable positions HIV positive extremely rare. individuals may request voluntary discharge for their own convenience and such requests will be granted. Regardless of whether the particular discharge is voluntary or not. characterization of all HIV separations will be "Honorable."

Urinalysis drug testing consists of testing an individual's urine for the presence of drug metabolites that indicate ingestion of an illegal drug or abuse of a legal drug. A positive urinalysis test for an illegal or abused drug will result in initiation of discharge action against the individual concerned.

Drug testing can either be commander directed, probable cause, or random. Commander directed is simply where commander decides for whatever reason (even mere suspicion) to order a urinalysis test of an individual. Probable cause is where sufficient grounds exist for a search warrant authorizing the test. A random drug test is where a computer (or other random process) selects the individuals to be tested. Random testing is conducted at each drill, with individuals being notified at Sunday morning drill of their selection. A positive random or probable cause test can result in a dishonorable discharge and Failure to obey an order to confinement. submit to any category of drug testing is punitive discharge and grounds for confinement.

Fortunately, the numbers of positive HIV and drug tests at HIANG have been extremely small, with credit going to our AIDS and drug awareness programs. However,

testing will continue, because it is 'only through constant vigilance against all threats that we are able to successfully fulfill our mission responsibilities.

W-2 Mailing Address: Members need to insure their check mailing address is accurate so that their end-of-year W-2s are sent to the correct address. Check with your unit administration section or with military pay to obtain the mailing address change forms.

Collision Insurance for Rental Cars While TDY: When commercially rented vehicles are authorized during a temporary duty, ANG members are often asked by car rental companies to purchase extra collision insurance. Many ANG have purchased the insurance believing it was needed and they would be reimbursed. Actually the government is self-insured. In either military or technician status, if a traveler is involved in an accident while acting within the scope of his or her duties, the traveler may be reimbursed for personal funds paid to the rental car agency for damage to the rental vehicle. If any accident occurs while an ANG traveler is using the rental FOR PERSONNEL REASONS, the Government may not be liable for any resulting damages, and the ANG traveler's private insurance may become involve. Whether you purchase the extra insurance is your personal choice and expense. Travelers need to be aware that the government will not reimburse you for this extra cost.

Immunizations: What You Should Know!

1) Certain immunizations cannot be given together. If you are due more than one shot, the Tac Hospital immunization personnel can advise you on which to take first.

2) You may need special considerations if you are pregnant, sick on certain medication, or have ever had and allergic reaction to a vaccine. Please check with the immunization personnel BEFORE receiving the shot.

3) There is always a mandatory 20 minute waiting time after receiving a shot. This is for your safety. The possibility of a serious reaction is rare, but we would like to make sure you can be taken care of promptly if it should occur.

4) Unfortunately, there are some uncomfortable side effects to some vaccines. (ie: Pain or swelling at injection site, eaver, malaise, and muscle aches) If these

b occur, take aspirin/acetaminophen for relief. If symptoms persist, or appear severe notify the Tac Hospital ASAP so it can be documented properly on your medical record.

5) If you are due an immunization, you can also receive it during the week at the 15 Medical Group if you are not able to get one on the UTA weekend. You will need to call first to verify times, and availability, and he sure to bring your PHS 731 (shot record).

6) On occasion errors are made. After you receive a shot, he sure it was documented on your shot record. If you notice an error, take it to the immunization personnel ASAP. If you have received a shot, and it is documented on your record and it is still listed on the computer sheet, he sure to check with the immunization people. It will continue to show as overdue until our records are corrected. Immunizations will not be given if you do not have your PHS 731 (shot record).


7) Last of all, if you are due immunizations take care of them promptly. Every month each commander is notified of hose individuals overdue. A similar report is sent to the Group Commander. It is important for each unit to have minimal overdue personnel. It makes your commander look good if all his people are ready for mobilization.

HEALTHFUL HINTS: Being fit helps prevent Cancer! Most of us associate cardiovascular disease with sedentary lifestyle habits. But researchers at an American Cancer Society conference reported that overweight and inactivity are both associated with increased risks of cancer. (Hope Newsletter)

UNIFORM TIPS REF. AFR 35-10

With the coming of the UEI and ORI next month, we would like to address a few of the 35-10 discrepancies most often seen. WE DO WANT TO LOOK SHARP FOR THE INSPEC-TION

HAIR, OVERALL STANDARD

Must be clean, well groomed and neat. If dyed, the hair must still have a natural appearance. Hair must not be worn in an extreme or fad style or violate safety requirements. Hair must not touch eyebrows or protrude below the front band of properly worn headgear. EXCEPTION: Hair will be visible in front of women's beret, and may be visible in front of women's flight cap.

HAIR STYLES (M)

Hair must have a tapered (conform to the shape of individual's head) appearance on both sides and back. Only closely cut or shaved hair on the back of the neck may touch the collar. Hair must not touch the ears and exceed 11 inch in bulk. Visible foreign items may not be attached.

BEARDS -Permitted only when authorized by the commander on the advice of a medical officer.

SIDEBURNS-Neatly trimmed and tapered in the same manner as the haircut, must not extend below the lowest part of the exterior ear opening.

HAIR STYLES (W)

Must be styled to present a feminine appearance. Hair may not extend in length below the bottom edge of the shirt collar. Hair must not exceed 3 inches in bulk or prevent prope: wear of headgear. Plain and conservative pins, combs, and barrettes similar to the individual's hair color may be worn to keep hair in place. Ornamentations (ribbons, jeweled pins, etc...) may not be worn.

EYEGLASSES AND OTHER ORNAMENTS:

Ornaments on the head, visible ornaments around the neck (ex: gold chains), and ornamentation on eyeglass lenses or frames are prohibited while on duty or in uniform. Conservative eyeglass frames may be worn as needed and when not prohibited by safety

regulations.

a. Wear Indoors-Conservative, clear slightly tinted, or photosensitive leses which are practically clear under normalight, may be worn indoors.

b. Wear Outdoors-Conservative sun glasses and photosevsitive-type eyeglasse may be worn while outdoors. A "fadis' style sunglass lense, to include mirrore lens, is not appropriate.

c. Wear in Military Formation— Onl conservative, clear, slightly tinted o photosensitive lenses (which are not extr mely dark outdoors) may be worn in military formation.

A. Wear of optional black/off-black nylor for women in service uniforms.

B. Wear of bright/non-subdued grade insignia by officers on BDU caps while in Garrison.

C. Wear of 3 or 4 inch chevrons for women on Service Dress Coats and utility uniforms.

D. Introduction of new London Fog belted double breasted all weather coat int clothing bag to replace current issuall weather coat.

HIANG SR ENLISTED ADVISOR

off power to reduce the potential for electrocution. Attempt to identify the hazards you have observed and communicate them to the 15 ABW Disaster Response Team. The initial On-Scene Commander is the 15 ABW Fire Chief. Once fire/rescue personnel are at the scene our job is to stay out of the way and assist as required.

Evacuate all non-essential personnel 300 FEET upwind for any NON-EXPLOSIVE/TOXIC Evacuation distance for potentially EXPLOSIVE/TOXIC mishap is 2,000 FEET upwind. Any aircraft or vehicle fire (regardless of munitions involvement) can result in an explosion. Plan your escape accordingly! As you evacuate your office, have a plan and a known location to regroup. Take a headcount to everyone is safe. DON'T SMOKE UNLESS AUTHORIZED BY THE ON-SCENE COMMANDER -explosive fumes could be present even though you can't see or smell them. - 5. Keep in mind the three S's: Shoes (good ones), Surface (one that "gives"), and Stretching (when the muscles are warm).


