Another outstanding mission was completed as the 125 Fighter Interceptor Group from the Florida Air National Guard ended their six days of Dissimilar Air Combat Training with the 199 Tactical Fighter Squadron.

The FANG's six F-16s arrived at Hickam Air Force Base on July 7 ready to participate in the Sentry Aloha Exercises which included the HIANG's F-15s, along with F-18s from VMFA-232, KMCAS and A-4s from VC-1 Barbers Point.

The training involved basic 1v1 fights, advanced 2v2 and 4v4 fights, and complex multi-aircraft scenarios. With these rigorous exercises, the pilots, GCI controllers and maintenance people become better skilled in serving the Hawaii Air National Guard and its mission.

VIETNAM ACE FLIES WITH HIANG !

Vietnam Flying "Ace" Colonel Steve Ritchie took to the air in a Hawaii Air National Guard F-15 Eagle, July 25, 1989 at Hickam Air Force Base.

Ritchie, a Colonel in the Air Force Reserve, flew 339 missions totaling over 800 hours of combat and is the only American pilot in history to down five MIG-21s. A 1964 graduate of the Air Force Academy, Colonel Ritchie graduated at the top of his pilot training class and later became one of the most highly decorated officers in U.S. military history. He is the winner of the Air Force Cross, Four Silver Stars, 10 Distinguished Flying Crosses and 25 Air Medals.

Colonel Ritchie has since become an accomplished speaker and business consultant. Colonel Ritchie flew with the Hawaii Air National Guard in one of the most versatile and formidable fighter aircraft in the Air Force inventory, the F-15 Eagle.

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LBPO CONNECTION

Effective October 1, 1989, BDUs will become the mandatory utility uniform. Fatigues may be worn as optional uniforms through September 30, 1990. The exception to this policy will be the field jacket. This item will continue to be worn until fiscal year 1993 at which time they will be replaced by BDU field jackets through attrition.

As a reminder, mandatory clothing items are those uniform items which each member must maintain. Optional items are uniform items approved for wear by all Air Force personnel.

CLASS VI (PACKAGE STORE) USAGE:

Military Installation Class VI patrons may now charge their purchases on Mastercard, VISA, and Discover credit cards at all stores. Prior to this change, not all Class VI stores accepted Mastercard or VISA and none accepted Discover. In the interest of convenience, the stock assortment in Class VI stores will be expanded to include snacks, party supplies, and similar items.

UNIFORM TIPS (Ref. AFR 35-10) UNAUTHORIZED WEAR OF UNIFORMS AND IN-SIGNIA:

Air Force members will not wear the uniform or any part of the uniform at a meeting of or sponsored by, an organization, association, movement, or group that: The attorney General of the United States has named as totalitarian, fascist, communist, or subversive; advocates or approves acts of force or violence to deny others their rights under the Constitution of the United States; or seeks to change the United States government by unconstitutional means; when participating in activities such as public speeches, interviews, picket lines, marches, or rallies; or in any public demonstration not approved by the Air Force. Wearing the uniform may imply sanction of the cause for which the demonstration or activity is conducted; when furthering private employment or commercial interests, if official sponsorship might be inferred; when engaged in off-duty civilian employment; or when it would discredit the Armed Forces.


Any person within the jurisdiction of the United States who, without authority, wears a uniform or distinctive part of a uniform of the Armed Services in an attempt to pose as a military member is subject to penalties (Title 1 U.S.C. 702).



SAVE MONEY WHEN TRAVELLING

When planning a trip to the Mainland, have you ever considered flying space available (space-A) from Hickam's MAC Terminal or Barbers Point NAS?

My guess is that most of you at least once gave it some thought but then chose the commercial route instead. The commercial route is indeed more convenient, but also more expensive. Let me give you information about space-A travel because it may help you (and consequently your family) save some money.

Space-A travel is a benefit available to you as a National Guard member. All you need to do is bring your military ID and DD Form 1853 to the Hickam MAC Terminal or Barbers Point NAS and sign your name on the waiting list. DD Form 1853 is a simple form that can be acquired from your unit, and it must be signed by your commander. Also, when you fly out you must be in uniform. If you can afford some time to wait for a flight out, you will be able to save some money.

Last week a representative at the Hickam MAC Terminal shared with me the following information...A Guard member doesn't need to be on active duty to take advantage of this benefit. There are about 3-4 US flights departing from Hickam per day. There are quite a number of Guard members currently using it, but mostly officers. Perhaps, the enlisted members don't know much about it. The wait isn't always long, but during June, July and August one can expect a good wait. (However, while I was there last week, a C-5 was preparing to leave for Travis AFB with only 8 space-A passengers out of a possible 73 seats available.) A person doesn't need to physically wait at the terminal until his/her turn comes up. If it takes longer than a day, all one needs to do is call in every day to see where he/she is on the waiting list. And, rank doesn't give anyone priority on the list. For more information, call 449-6833 or 2807.

. For the majority of you, your dependents won't be able to qualify to fly space-A, so they will need to make commercial arrangements. Also, if you are on a tight schedule coming back to Hawaii, consider the possibility of flying back commercial as an alternative plan.

If you have any questions, don't hesitate to find the answers. Inter-island space-A travel is also available through our 154 Composite Group's C-130 aircraft. If you are interested, go to C-130 office and get the flight schedule.

SOCIAL ACTIONS


Military people are significantly less likely than civilians to abuse any type of drug. According to the study, only 8.4% of service members age 18 to 55 reported using drugs within the past month as compared with 24.1% of civilians in the same age group. FINDING: Women service members are significantly more likely than their civilian counterparts to smoke one or more packs of cigaretts per day. Male service members are more likely to use smokeless or chewing tobacco.

FINDING: Military personnel under the age to 26 are significantly more likely to drink and drink heavily, when compared with their civilian age group.

FINDING: Military personnel are more likely than civilians to have negative experiences associated with alcohol. These negative experiences include staying drunk for more that one day at a time, being drunk on the job or mission work because of a hangover. More than half (56%) of service members included in the study reported having negative experiences with alcohol while only 41% of civilians report having this type of experience.

WHAT DOES IT ALL MEAN? The "Military/Civilian Comparison of Alcohol, Drug and Tobacco Use" Report commissioned by the Department of Defense concluded that these findings suggest that military conditions may foster alcohol abuse. To further substantiate this conclusion they state that nearly one third (30%) of service members feel that "drinking is part of being in the military." An even larger percentage (35%) say that they feel that drinking is encouraged at parties and/or social functions.

Based upon these findings the Department of Defense believes it will have to intensify its efforts to combat alcohol abuse. For members in the HIANG, we must be aware that some of the conditions which support alcohol abuse by military members is also present in our cilivian jobs. Based upon the DOD study about 2 of every 3 civilian workers have been drunk on the job and/or missed work because they had a hangover. Using alcohol in moderation and at the proper times is the key.
