If or when the time comes, be aware, prepared and ready!

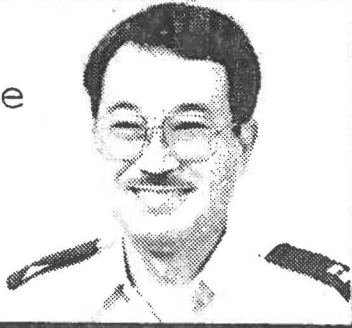


'J.R.' Eick gets Lt. Col. Jerry 'Fang' Aoki up to speed in the new F-15 simulator.

Pastor's Perspective

Doesn't time seem to move so quickly? Just yesterday, it seems, we were at October's drill. And if we're not on top of things, the fast approaching holiday season will take us by surprise...and before you we know it, 1989 will be history.

Time somehow appears to speed up as we get older. There is a reason for this. Someone once explained that for a person that's 6 years old, one year is one sixth of his/her whole life; while on the other hand, for a person age sixty, one year is only one sixtieth of his/her life. An hour glass illustrates this same principle. The sand in the hour glass appears to move more rapidly in the final seconds than when the glass is first turned over.

Last month I wrote part one on time management. This month I'd like to present the following ideas that might help us be more efficient time managers.

Assign priority to the things that are important. After compiling our list of things to do, we must realize that some things are more critical than others. If history repeats itself, we might never have time enough to do the "1001" things we want to do. So, concentrate on the essentials.

"Limiting the problem" will save time. If under time pressures, go with answers to problems that are simple and attainable, rather than solutions that are complicated and require too much time, effort and coordination.

Know when to stop working on a project and finish it. The "law of diminishing returns" is applicable here. If you're a perfectionist, you may need to gage yourself from spending too much time perfecting

things that don't require perfection. For example, a person may polish his/her car so many times during a short span of time that one more polishing will not help much more.

If you're overwhelmed with all that needs to be done, focus on one problem at a time. Remember, we can't be at seven different places at one time (even if we think we can). Eliminate all distractions and remain focused until you've solved that one problem. Then, with forward progress, move on to the next task.

Timing, occasionally, may be key. There are time critical factors to some "mission impossible" tasks. For instance, the ideal time to get a college education may be limited to certain windows of a person's life. So, execute in a timely fashion.

Procrastination sometimes is an all too familiar friend. Why wait until later to do something you can do today? The issue probably won't go away. In fact, things probably will get worse. So if you have the opportunity, do something positive. It may turn out to be a blessing in disguise. Seize the initiative today! today!

Finally, allow time for unexpected hurdles and roadblocks. May God be gracious to give you enough time to do the things that count.

RETIREMENT: BENEFITS TO LOOK FORWARD TO

Do you know about the benefits you will receive when you retire from the Guard? Many of us talk about retirement, but we may not be aware of all the benefits we will be entitled to.

If we invest 20 "good" years into the Guard and live to age 60, we will retire with many good benefits. And if you are married and/or have dependents at that time, they also will be eligible to some of those benefits. On or after your 60th birthday, you may obtain a blue identification card to set you on your way to your retirement years.

The following are some of the benefits available at retirement...

The primary benefit is a financial one. Everyone's monthly check theoretically will look different. A person's check will be determined by the number of points he/she acquired and the rank he/she held.

The commissary and base exchange will be a big plus, because it will be available for unlimited use.

You will be able to receive medical and dental care on a space available basis at a military hospital. Presently, there is no charge for outpatient care or for prescriptions. If you need to be hospitalized, there will be a small fee for officers and their dependents but no charge for enlisted members. Also, if you elect to take civilian medical care, you may use CIVILIAN HEALTH AND MEDICAL PROGRAM OF THE UNIFORMED SERVICES (commonly known as CHAMPUS). When CHAMPUS is used, your outpatient care expenses will be reduced to 25 percent after the yearly deductible amount of \$50 per person or \$100 per family. With CHAMPUS your inpatient care expenses will not exceed 25 percent of the total allowable charges. One draw back, though, is that you and your spouse will lose eligibility to use CHAMPUS at age 65. But at 65, you may qualify to use Social Security Medicare (Part A).

These are just some of the

benefits you will receive. I hope you have found the above information helpful. If your spouse or family member care to join me in helping families, he/she can sign up to be in a family support group with your squadron. Call me, Chaplain Robert Nagamine, at phone 449-9153, 955-3431 or 947-5008.

CBPO CONNECTION UNIFORM TIPS (AFR 35-10)

OUTERGARMENTS

Outergarments are items worn outdoors and removed in an office environment. The following uniform items are outergarments:

- a. Mens/Womens Cotton/Polyester Poplin and Polyester/Wool Gabardine Lightweight Blue Jacket.
- b. Mens/Womens All-Weather Coat
- c. All Weather Double-Breasted Coat (Men and Women)
- d. Mens/Womens Raincoat
- e. Mens Overcoat (Blue shade 1549, wool and polyester serge)
- f. Mens Overcoat (Blue shade 1605, polyester/wool gabardine)
- g. Womens Overcoat

PULLOVER SWEATER (MEN AND WOMEN)

May be worn under all authorized outergarments, except the Cotton/Polyester Poplin Lightweight Blue Jacket. It may be worn with any light blue long- or short-sleeved shirt or blouse with epaulets with tie/necktab. Collar must be worn inside the sweater.

EMERGENCY DATA UPDATE

Members are required to ensure that their DD Form 93, Record of Emergency Data, is kept up to date. The importance of this form cannot be overemphasized. The form is used to contact your next of kin if you are involved in an accident or become a casualty. You must also update the form when there is a change in marital status, spouse's address, parents' address, location or the number of dependents and military status of spouse. Stop by the CBPO Customer Assistance Section or see your Personnel Technician (GSUs) as soon as possible for any of these changes.

Congratulations to all in the HIANG! We are now at 50 % completion after the first month of flu immunizations. Considering all the areas deployed, having special training and different UTA dates, that's impressive. Please keep up the great work and encourage all your fellow members to get their flu shot now, when it will be the most beneficial to them. Thanks.

Healthful Hint:

With the holidays approaching, we will all be invited to parties, and also be giving parties. Enjoy the good times, but be careful about how much you drink. A study of 1000 guests at 8 parties where alcohol was served was done. The researchers wanted to see if making small changes in the way alcohol is served at a party can keep people from drinking too much.

Their finding: 1) People drank significantly fewer cocktails at "fix your own" bars than they did at bars which had a bartender on duty. 2) People drank more beer when "serve yourself" pitchers were available and drank less when a bartender was on duty. 3) If low-alcohol beer was available, guests drank the same amount as they would with regular beer. And lastly 4) People drank less alcohol at formal parties; and parties that involved a theme or costume; and drank more at crowded casual parties. So remember, if you drink, don't drive and increase the odds you will be with us in the New Year.

Dental Note:

Do you know the Tools & Techniques of cleaning teeth? First, you need a BRUSH. Select one that a) has soft and rounded bristles, b) is small enough to reach all the teeth in your mouth. Replace it about every 2 months, or sooner if worn out. Next, you need the right MOTION. A recommended method is with short, back-and-forth strokes using a gentle scrubbing motion. Also, use the right CLEANSER. Use a toothpaste that bears the American Dental Association seal of

acceptance. Lastly, use FLOSS. You cannot brush the hidden areas between teeth. Use floss to help remove plaque.

WOMEN IN THE MILITARY

This article was written by Paula Lee Potts (Military Lifestyle, October 1989), "Women and the Military: Nine Decades of Change".

Today, 10.7% of the total U.S. military is made up of women.

1901: Congress established Army Nurse Corps (women did not hold rank, nor were they eligible for benefits).

1942: Women's Army Auxillary Corps (WAAC) established.

1944: Military women were given full military status to serve the duration of the war plus six months. More than 350,000 women served in World War II.

1948: Women's Armed Services Act gives regular and reserve status to military women but confines their role by restricting the number of women to 2% of the total force, by limiting each service to one female line colonel, and by preventing women from being eligible for promotion to general or admiral. Most restrictive of all is a combat exclusion provision which prevents Air Force and Navy women from being permanently assigned to aircraft or ships designated for potential combat missions. The Secretary of the Army was to decide Army policy and a female combat exclusion policy was adopted.

1951: Congress temporarily lifts the 2% limit due to Korean War.

1955: Women make up less than 1% of the military.

1967: The 2% cap is removed and ranks above O-5 are opened to women.

1969: Women are allowed to enroll in Air Force ROTC programs.

1970: The first women to reach the

rank of brigadier general: Anna Mae Hay, chief Army Nurse Corps, and Elizabeth P. Hosington, director, Women's Army Corps.

1971: First Air Force woman is promoted to brigadier general: Jeanne Holm, director, Women in the Air Force. Husbands of female military members are authorized unlimited exchange privileges.

1972: First Female Navy rear admiral, Arlene B. Duerk, receives a star.

1973: In Froniero vs. Richardson, the Supreme Court rules that dependents of military women are eligible for the same benefits as military men. Women are allowed to enroll in Army and Navy ROTC programs. First woman receives 2 stars: Air Force Maj.Gen. Jeanne Holm. End of Male draft and beginning of the all volunteer force. Navy women become naval aviators.

1974: Marine Corps opens the fleet Marine forces to women. Army women enter flight training.

1978: In Owens vs. Brown the D.C. Distric Court ruling forces the Navy to let women serve on vessels other than hospital ships.

1980: Draft registration resumes for men, but not women.

1981: In Goldberg vs Rostker Supreme Court rules that Congress has the Constitutional authority to exclude women from military draft.

1986: New stardards for assessing combat risk are set, opening 24,000 new jobs to women.

As military lifestyle changes in response to modified institutional and societal standards, the role of military women will continue to evolve. Progress toward full utilization and acceptance is being made daily. With every new step forward, women in the armed forces are proving their ability to contribute to the Nation's defense.

In closing, women comprise 10.7% of the HIANG. Enlisted women 11% (216), and women officers 7.2% (15). Statistics as of October 4, 1989.
