
Major General Alexis T. Lum Retires

Major General Alexis T. Lum will be honored today with a parade at Diamond Head Crater to mark the end of his successful military career. General Lum has retired after nine years as the Adjutant General of the Hawaii National Guard.

Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG) commander Brigadier General Edward V. Richardson has succeeded General Lum as the new Adjutant General. General Richardson will also be recommended for promotion to Major General.

General Richardson's military career began in February 1956, when he enlisted in the HIANG. He completed the United States Air Force Aviation Cadet Pilot Training Program in October 1957 and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant.

During his career, General Richardson flew the F-86E, F-86L, T-33, F102A, and F-4 aircraft, and served in numerous key positions in the 199th Tactical Fighter Squadron, 154th Composite Group, and Headquarters Hawaii Air National Guard. Since February 1982, General Richardson served as the Assistant Adjutant General (Air) and Commander, Hawaii Air National Guard.

LES no longer / required for entry into MWR facilities

Good news for all National Guard members! Your DD Form 2AF (Reserve) (Red) can be used to authorize access to all Category C Morale Welfare and Recreation facilities. This includes Base Exchanges, golf courses and other revenue generating facilities operated by Non -appropriated Fund Activities of the Department of Defense for Morale, Welfare and Recreation. Leave and Earning Statements (LES) will no longer be required.

AF Form 447 or other service specific family member ID cards will be used for your family members. A commissary privilege card is still needed to enter the Commissary.

If there are any problems with MWR personnel who haven't received the news, ask to see the manager and try to resolve the situation with him or her. If there are still problems, contact Headquarters HIANG.





BEELINE

The hazardous warning label is often your first source of information about the chemical and its hazard. The label must include the name of the chemical as it is on the Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS), Hazardous Chemical Inventory, and all appropriate hazard warnings. Warning labels must be affixed to bags, containers, bottles, etc.

Pipes carrying chemicals do not have to be labeled, but the workers must be informed about the hazards running through the pipes.

Items exempt from the Occupational Safety Health Act labeling requirement because labeling is required by other federal laws are: pesticides (MSDS must be available); food, food additives, color additives, drugs, cosmetics and ingredients in these products covered by the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act: distilled spirits, wine, or malt beverages not intended for industrial use, covered by the Federal Alcohol Administration Act (MSDS must be available if the use of these products results in worker exposures significantly greater than those of consumers); and consumer products and hazardous substances covered by the Consumer Product Safety and Federal Hazardous Substance Acts (MSDS must be available if the use of these products results worker exposures significantly greater than those of consumers).

AIR FORCE UNIFORM BOARD (AFUB)

As a result of IMC 90-1 to AFR 35-10, April 1, 1989, the following changes are effective immediately. The white undershirt is no longer authorized with fatigues (battle dress uniform) or the olive green fatigues (OG-507). The lightweight blue jacket (cotton/polyester poplin) shades 1157, 3356, and 1600 will be phased out on March 31, 1991. As a reminder, other uniform items to be phased out this year include the olive green fatigue (OG-507). They will no longer be authorized for wear after September 30, 1991. TROA Announces Scholarship Loan Program

(Alexandria, VA) - The Retired Officers Association scholarship loan program provides \$1,500 annual, no interest loans to unmarried undergraduate students, under the age of 24, who are dependent children of active, reserve, and retired service personnel. The loans are awarded for up to five years of undergraduate study.

This current school year, 680 students were awarded loans, totaling over one million dollars. From this group, based upon their academic records, participation in extracurricular and community activities, 106 students received special \$500 grants in addition to the loans. All those who apply for the loans are automatically considered for the grants.

Since this program was initiated, over 3,700 students have received interest-free loans, totaling more than \$8 million.
