COMMANDER'S CORNER

On the 16th of January, the Air National Guard fighter, attack and recce forces were directed by MG Killey, Director of the ANG to cease flying due to an unacceptably high aircraft accident rate. The stand-down occurred after the third fighter Class A mishap in five days, and the eighth for the fiscal year. Six lives had been lost. Commanders were called to a meeting in Washington on the 22nd and 23rd of January to review and discuss the ANG fighter operations and formulate a conservative return to fly program and a modified training program. That was done, and on the 28th of January, the 199th TFS resumed F-15 flying, with some restrictions. Within the ANG, is a top to bottom review of fighter training programs to include operational plans, directives, combat taskings and so forth. The outcome, hopefully, will be a program that realistically addresses combat needs, preserves and allows for increases in combat capability; and helps to achieve a "zero" mishap rate for the balance of the year, and well into the future.

All fighter unit deployments have been canceled through the 31st of March. The fighter orientation/incentive ride program has been canceled until further notice.

Though the primary focus is on operations, the consequences of the unacceptably high accident rate affects us all; and rightfully so, because every member of the Air National Guard is involved, and has an obligation to ensure mishap-free flying. We in the 154th COMPG can be proud of the excellent flying, ground and weapons safety records we've established. What we must not lose sight of is the fact that no unit is immune from accidents. Those records we've achieved through constant vigilance, excellent leadership and supervision. Satisfaction comes from not only doing the job right, but doing it as best we can. The challenges ahead of us in 1992 will require continual assessment and minimization of the risks associated with being the premier F-15 unit in the Air National Guard. I need your help to insure we do that.

Suggestions for Gender

Neutral Writing

The VocEquity, published by the Office of the State Director for Vocational Education, October 1991, presented information gleaned from the New Webster's College Dictionary and Random House's 1990 "Guide to Non-Sexist Language", that offers some helpful suggestions regarding degendering pronouns. Below are their suggestions:

- a. Use plural, third person plural pronouns, For example: they, theirs or them.
- b. Use third person one: When a reporter covering controversial, one has responsibility...
- c. Use the passive voice: When controversial stories are covered, there is a responsibility...
- d. Rephrase sentences to avoid any pronouns: When covering controversial stories, a reporter has the responsibility...
- e. Use nouns like person, individual or a synonym appropriate to the context instead of pronouns: Reporters often cover controversial stories. In such cases the journalist has responsibility...
- f. Use relative clauses: A reporter who covers a controversial story has a responsibility...

Try to incorporate these suggestions into your writing style. It will be difficult at first, however, once assimilated, your writing will be gender free.

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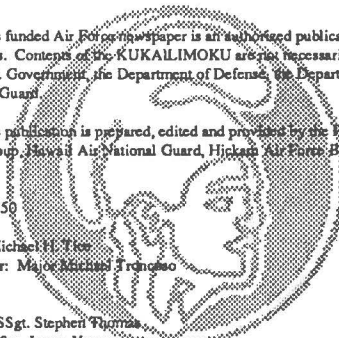
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CBPO Connection

Healthful Hint: Did you know that over 63 million Americans have some type of heart or blood vessel disease? The following are risk factors that may lead to heart disease. Smoking, high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol levels, heredity, gender (male), race (Black American), age, obesity, lack of exercise and stress. The more risk factors you have, the greater the chance you will develop heart disease.

How can you tell if someone is having a heart attack? Complaints of uncomfortable pressure or squeezing pain in the center of their chest, cold, pale and sweaty skin, dizziness, fainting, nausea, and shortness of breath. They may even deny they are having a heart attack.

What to do? Recognize the signals, have victim stop all activity and lie or sit down, and call 911 and be prepared to do CPR.

Dental Note - Gum Disease Warning Signs:

- 1) Swollen/red gums
- 2) Gums that bleed when you brush or floss your teeth
- 3) Tender or painful gums
- 4) Gums separated from teeth
- 5) Permanent teeth that feel loose or that have spread out
- 6) Bad breath or taste in your mouth

If you have any of these problems see your dentist...or you can ignore your teeth, and they'll go away!

Be Smart !

Legally speaking, it pays to be smart. Being smart means planning ahead—planning for the future. To be legally smart, you should be planning ahead, that is, asking yourself questions such as:

1. Do I need a will to dispose of my property after death?

2. If I have a will, is it up to date and current? (It should be reviewed annually.)

3. Do I need a power of attorney (general, special, limited, medical, etc.), to allow someone to act on my behalf in case I am deployed?

4. Are my finances arranged to take care of my loved ones if I am deployed? (Joint checking and savings accounts)

5. Do my loved ones and next of kin know where my important papers are—birth certificates, insurance policies, wills, deeds, trust documents, personal papers, car titles, car registrations, automobile insurance policies, etc.?

Municipal solid waste (MSW) is waste generated by you and me. It can be categorized as paper, glass, plastics, garbage, refuse, and so forth. As population grows, so does the waste.

Everyone is responsible for the disposition of municipal solid waste. However, the primary responsibility for MSW management rests with state and local governments. The federal government could help with the ideas of waste management and better materials management. On the prevention side, reducing toxicity of products could make management methods safer. For example, reducing the amounts of toxic chemicals in landfills would mean less air pollution and less toxic leaks. On the better material management side, manufacturers should produce items that can be recyclable or biodegradable.

The general problem of managing MSW is being done on such a small scale with little support from the federal government. State by state, MSW policy development is hampered by limited resources. This results in inconsistent MSW programs and regulations. With federal government involvement, such activities as incentives for recycling, finalizing regulations for landfilling and incineration facilities, undertaking research and development, and establishing packaging and product regulations to reduce waste and toxicity could be achieved.

New HIANG Softball Tournament Format

The Hawaii National Guard (HING) Special Service Board (SSB) met on February 6, 1992 and made several changes to the HING sports program.

To foster more inter-play between army and air units, each neighbor island will conduct their own island HING Softball Tournament. Each island champion will then participate in the 12 team HING State Softball Tournament. Oahu Air Guard units will continue to play in the HIANG Central Tournament with the top four Central teams qualifying for the HING State Softball Tournament. Both the HIANG Central and HING State Tournaments are scheduled for June 13-14 and August 29-30 respectively at the Earhart Field, Hickam AFB. With the new adopted tournament play format, there is no longer a need for a Air Guard State Softball Tournament.

Another change adopted by the HING SSB is the creation of a "Masters" (40+ years) division. This division affords older players to participate and compete with others in the same age group. The 40+ team(s) is a composite team, i.e., the unit integrity requirement is waived.

The creation of the 40+ division may have an impact on existing HIANG teams participating in the "Open" division. Team managers are requested to conduct a survey of their respective unit as to how many are interested in the 40+ division and what impact, if any, this action would have in fielding a unit team in the "Open" division.
