Top Scope 96

Members from the 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron provided the first ever Air Nation Guard Team (Team Hawaii) and which also represented the Hawaii Air National Guard in the Top Scope competition. This competition is the "Top Gun" for Air Defense. It is a multiregion Air Defense competition for Weapons Controllers. Weapons Technicians, Identification Technicians, and Tracking Technicians working together as a team. The competition is broken down into three phases: 1) Academic testing; 2) Peacetime to Wartime buildup exercise; and 3) Wartime Operations exercise.


To select the team members, the 169th held their own "Top Scope" competition among the full-time and traditional Guardsmen. After submitting themselves to this difficult evaluation, the team was chosen: Capt. Peter W. Ching, Weapons Director; SMSgt. Deogracias Agbayani Jr., Weapons Technician; SSqt. Selwyn Valenciano. Identification Technician; SSqt. Obed Sniffen, Tracking Technician; Capt. Jeffrey Waechter, Team Captain; and Capt. Kevin Abe, Top Scope Judge.

The HIANG team placed sixth overall, with only 800 points separating them from the first place team. Individual winners from the Hawaii team included SSgt. Obed Sniffen, first place Target Tracker; Capt. Jeffrey Waechter, tied for first place in academic testing for the WAO position; Capt. Peter Ching was identified by the judges as having the best tactical positioning during Phase II screnario.

Hughes Achievement Award

The 199th Fighter Squadron (199 FS) has been nominated for the 1995 Hughes Achievement Award. This award is annually awarded to a unit that has demonstrated superior Air Superiority and Air Defense.

Wing Safety Tips

The Rights and Responsibilities of Air Force Employees in Occupational Safety, Fire Protection and Health

Take part in the Air Force Occupational Safety and Health (AFOSH) program without fear of coercion, discrimination, or reprisal.

Request inspections of unsafe or unhealthful working conditions or report those conditions to the supervisor, safety manager, fire protection specialist, or bioenvironmental engineer, including Occupa-

tional Safety and Health (OSH) officials.

Have access to applicable OSHA and AFOSH standards, installation injury and illness statistics, safety, fire protection, and health program procedures, and their own exposure and medical records.

Decline to perform an assigned task because of a reasonable belief that the task poses an imminent risk of death or serious bodily harm. The person and local management may request an assessment by installation safety, fire protection, or health professionals before proceeding.

Use official on-duty time to take part in AFOSH program activities.

Comply with OSH guidance.

Promptly report safety, fire, and health hazards and deficiencies.

Promptly report injuries and illnesses to the supervisor.

Comply with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) requirements that apply to the work situation, including its use, inspection, and care.

New and Improved Battery Disposal

You can now easily and properly dispose of most hazardous batteries through the HAZMART 90-day accumulation site. Spent magnesium, mercury, nickel-cadmium (nicad), silver, thermal and lithium batteries, generated at Hickam, may be turned in at the HAZMART. Customers need only drop off these batteries and sign the container log—no additional paperwork is necessary! Call 449-3246 to drop them off.

Disposal of batteries not listed above depends on their type. Lead-acid batteries should be exchanged when purchasing new batteries in accordance with Hawaii State law. Spent alkaline and carbonzinc batteries are considered non-hazardous wastes and may be disposed of as regular trash. If you have a question about a specific battery, please call me at 449-5711.

This new turn-in procedure should allow users at photo-lab, avionics, life-support, portable radio, survival equipment, computer repair and combat com, to close their satellite accumulation points for batteries. However, since the batteries are still hazardous waste, they must be taken promptly to the HAZMART once they are no longer usable. This change is an attempt to make it

easier for everyone to comply with the complex and changing environmental regulations.

The entitlements could change, or additional entitlements may exist under other circumstances, such as over 30-day tours, overseas or school tours, etc. UTAs are paid at one day of base pay per four-hour period performed.

Computer-Generated Eye Problems

Question: Are there bright lights in the worker's peripheral vision?

Bright lights in our peripheral vision create glare discomfort. Solutions are turning off selected luminaries; reducing the light levels; installing blinds, shades or drapes on windows; putting parabolic louvers on fluorescent fixtures; changing the orientation of the workstation; eliminating auxiliary lighting around workstations; changing to a light background display; or installing an indirect lighting system. Wearing visors may help; if the boss says okay.

Question: Where is the computer screen located?

Working at the computer is a visually intensive task; our bodies will do what is necessary to get the eyes in the most comfortable position—even if it causes poor posture, which can lead to musculoskeletal discomfort. Three considerations should be taken concerning the location of the computer screen:

a. How high is the monitor? The center of the screen should be four to nine inches lower than the eyes, thus preventing neck, shoulder and back pain.

b. Is the monitor directly in front of the worker? Whatever the worker looks at most frequently, the monitor or the reference material, it should be located directly in front of him.

c. How far is the monitor from the eyes? Most computer jobs are best performed at a distance of 20 to 28 inches from the eyes.

What to do ... Head Colds

In the first three or four days of a cold, nasal spray decongestants can help you feel better because you won't have to breathe through your mouth.

Nasal sprays shrink the blood vessels in the nose, which temporarily opens the nasal passages. (Don't use them longer than four days, or they'll *increase* nasal congestion.)

Read labels on over-thecounter medications before buying them. (People with high blood pressure or other medical problems should be especially careful.)

Drink eight cups of fluids a day. This will keep your respiratory tract moist, and replace the fluids lost through an elevated body temperature.

Hot liquids can help open up your nasal passages.

Take ibuprofen or acetaminophen for muscle aches and pains. Aspirin is OK to take for colds and flu if you're over 18 years old.

Gargle with warm salt water (1 teaspoon of salt to 1 quart of warm water).

If your cold symptoms get worse and last more than five days; if you have a fever over 103 F that lasts for two days; if you develop an earache; severe chest or had pain; or if the color of your sputum changes from clear to yellow or brown, and stays that way for several days, call your doctor.

Your viral cold may have turned into a *bacterial* infection, which can be treated with an antibiotic.

Commissary Privileges

WASHINGTON — On the theory that half a loaf is better than none, Pentagon officials are cooking up a new, limited plan for expanding reservists' commissary shopping privileges.

Amid heavy lobbying from the grocery industry, a House-Senate conference committee killed a Pentagon proposal to lift the 12-visit annual limit on commissary shopping for reservists. Commercial grocers opposed the change because they believe it would cost them business, especially in military towns.

To overcome that perception, the Pentagon wants to run a pilot program in 1997 in which some reservists would get unlimited commissary privileges. Their spending patterns could then be compared with their existing commissary habits. The pilot program already has won tentative support from the services, but setting it up could prove to be difficult, officials said.

Under one proposal, actively drilling reservists who earn more than 50 points a year toward retirement would be able to shop whenever they wanted.

Reservists routinely start with 15 points each year for being assigned to a component. Then they earn one point for every drill or four points for a weekend of drills. They also earn one point for every day they serve on active duty.

Most reservists do not earn 50 points until late in the fiscal year, and they typically do their active duty training in the summer. If they are prohibited from fully using the commissaries until they earn 50 points, the benefit would last only a few months a year. But if they were granted access on the assumption that they would earn 50 points in the coming year, they might end up falling short of eligibility by participating in too few drills. "I haven't heard anything to suggest that 50 points is a valid standard," said one official involved in crafting of the 1997 personnel initiatives.

NEW ID CARD?

Aside from deciding who should get access, officials also have to determine how to differentiate between reservists with full commissary privileges and their peers. "One of the tricky things is, what do you show at the door?," the official said.

Drilling reservists are issued a Commissary Privilege card regardless of how many points they accrue each year. To get into commissaries, they have to present this card that is punched for each visit. After 12 visits, they can no longer get into the commissary.

Issuing new cards to identify reservists who could shop anytime would add to the expense and hassle of the test. Despite the pitfalls in designing the test, officials expect to send a formal proposal to Congress next spring. They noted that each year full commissary rights for reservists seem closer to approval. In 1993, for

example, the House agreed to lift the 12-visit cap, but the Senate shot down the proposal.
