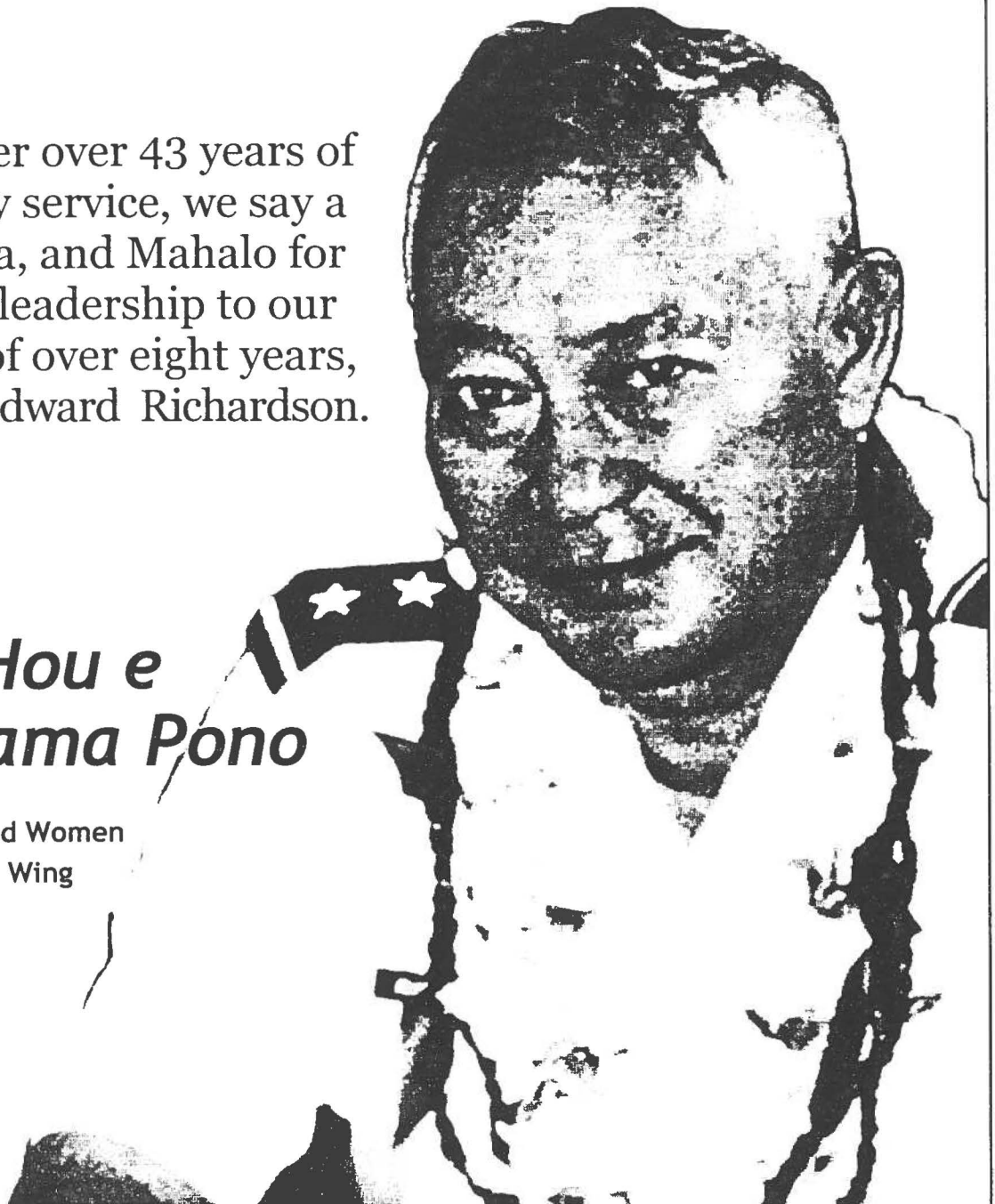

Tice leading the F-15 Council through the introduction of the Aerospace Expeditionary Force and what it meant to our deployment schedule. The 203rd Air

Refueling Squadron engaged in combat operations during Allied Force over Kosovo, the first ones in the airspace while running KC-135 tanker operations from Istres, France and Aviano AB, Italy. Retirement Ceremony & Review for Major General Edward V. Richardson

The Adjutant General of Hawaii, Commander of the Hawaii National Guard, Director of State Civil Defense

General Richardson was born on Sept. 17, 1934, in Puunene, Maui. He graduated from Kamehameha School for Boys in June 1952, and attended the University of Hawaii from 1952 to 1955. He began his military career when he joined the Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG) in February 1956. He then entered the U.S. Air Force Aviation Cadet Pilot Training Program and was commissioned a second lieutenant in October 1957. In the years following, he was assigned to the 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron and held staff and command positions in the 154th Fighter Group. He was HIANG commander in February 1982 and was promoted to brigadier general. General Richardson served as HIANG commander until Feb. 7, 1991, at which time he assumed his present position. He was promoted to major general on April 8, 1992.

As the adjutant general, Richardson has implemented joint Army and Air National Guard and State Civil Defense planning, training and emergency response readiness exercises. He also directed and managed the entire disaster relief efforts following the devastation of Hurricane Iniki in September 1992 on Kauai and elsewhere in the State totaling over \$2.2 billion, and at that time, the third costliest natural disaster in U.S. history.

General Richardson is a command pilot with over 3,600 flying hours in the T-33, F-86E, F-86L, F-102A, and F-4C aircraft. He is married to the former Cecilia Yang. They have a son and daughter, Nelson Travis and Rhanda Kuuipo.

Brigadier General Edward L. Correa, Jr. was appointed by Gov. Cayetano to be the new State Adjutant General, Commander of the Hawaii National Guard, and Director of State Civil Defense, effective January 1, 2000. Correa was the former commander of the Hawaii Army Guard.

Do's and Don'ts of Workplace Computer Use

Unacceptable use of E-mail Systems

Now that we have migrated to a new E-mail system, we need to review some of the dos and don'ts of our new system. One thing to remember we are on an active duty base that has the ability to monitor our network. Additionally our new system provides us with much better tools for monitoring the network for improper use of e-mail and Internet access. Please read the following excerpts which are from the AFIs that we use to determine appropriate use of our system. If you have any questions, please e-mail the helpdesk and we will get you an answer.

- National Guard forbids the access of free Internet e-mail systems. This means that accessing free web based e-mail systems, such as Hotmail, from our network is banned.
- Attaching to e-mail or otherwise distributing copyrighted materials by e-mail without first getting the consent of the copyright owner. Failure to maintain consent may violate federal copyright infringement laws that could subject the individual to civil liability or criminal prosecution.
- Sending or receiving e-mail for commercial or personal financial gain using Air Force systems.
- Intentionally or unlawfully misrepresenting your identity or affiliation in e-mail communications
- Sending harassing, intimidating, abusive, or offensive material to or about others that violates Air Force standards of behavior. This includes, but is not limited to, humor considered in poor taste or offensive, political or religious lobbying, and pornographic material.
- Using someone else's identity (user ID) and password without proper authority
- Causing congestion on the network by such things as the propagation of chain letters, broadcasting inappropriate messages to lists or individuals, or excessive use of the data storage space on the e-mail post server

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

HIANG members receiving VA educational benefits at three-quarter or full-time rate are eligible for the VA work study program. Students participating in the program will be at established work study sites and receive non-taxed benefits for up to 30 days before the start of a term and until the last day of a term. The pay rate is minimum wage (\$5.25 in Hawaii) and contracts are normally for 25 hours per week. For more info, contact the VA rep at your campus or the Work Study Coordinator, Mr. Keith Suzuki at 433-0515.

VA HOME LOAN GUARANTIES

The Veterans Home Loan Program Amendments of 1992 extended eligibility for VA guaranteed home loans to the following:

HIANG members who have completed at least six satisfactory years of service.

Former HIANG members who were retired, discharged or transferred with an honorable service characterization after completing at least six years of service.

HIANG members who were discharged before completing 6 years of service because of a service connected disability.

Qualifying HIANG members are eligible for VA-guaranteed home loans during this period beginning 28 October 1992 and ending 30 September 2003. For further info, please stop by the 154 MPF Customer Service Desk at 448-7434 to initiate an eligibility letter.

We have been asked by the Terre Haute, Indiana ALS to reprint this in our Newsletter. While they are looking for applicants for their ALS, this article does provide some good general information about ALS policy; procedures, and curriculum.

ATTENTION SENIOR AIRMAN

The 181st FW in Terre Haute, IN, scheduled their Airman Leadership School (ALS) to be held on the campus of Indiana State University from 15 May 2000 through 16 June 2000. The purpose or goal of the ALS is to prepare selected senior airman for supervisory and official duties in the world's best aerospace fighting force. The 24 academic day course consists of 186 classroom contact hours. Students attending ALS study three areas of curriculum; Profession of Arms, Quality Leadership and Communicative Skills. Upon successful completion students receive eight semester hours through the Community College of the Air Force.

ALS is the first professional military education that an airman will encounter. The course is designed to provide senior airman the information, skills, confidence and abilities to assist them in becoming success-

ful leaders and supervisors. **The eligibility requirements to attend ALS is to be a senior airman with 48 months time-in-service.**

Students will be housed in the Lincoln Quad dormitories on campus. Classes will also be held on campus in the new John T. Myers Technology Building. If you're an ALS student you will be able to use all the recreational facilities on campus. There is a computer room in the dormitory that is open 24 hours a day and a coin operated laundry facility is located right inside the dormitory. The campus library is also available for research writing and briefings.

Funds and days will be provided by the National Guard Bureau. This Professional Military Education doesn't cost your unit anything! If you would like to attend the ALS in Terre Haute, IN, please contact your Unit Training Manager and complete your school application to forward to your Base Education Office. For additional information concerning the ALS program contact your Base Education and Training Office at either 448-7428/7429/or 7435.

Waiting Period for Non-Participant PME (Correspondence) Enrollments

Most of you have probably heard from your Unit Education and Training Managers by now that there will be a 1 year waiting period imposed on PME by correspondence re-enrollment for folks who became disenrolled through non-participation (i.e. allowing the course to expire). The change was scheduled to take effect on 1 Jan 00, but we have been given a slight reprieve. The new effective date has not been established yet, but when we are notified, we will let you know. The re-enrollment penalty period for folks who get disenrolled as a result of course failure will remain at 6 months. In the meantime, if you have been disenrolled for any reason for at least 6 months, and you want to be enrolled again, let your Unit Education and Training Manager know ASAP, before the policy changes.

Changes to the January UTA Schedule:

As a result of the TAG's Retirement Ceremonies, our scheduled January UTA activities (SAVs and BETM meeting) will need to be rescheduled. The 154th Air Control Squadron organizational emblem official description: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The Hawaiian warrior represents the squadron and its location. The warrior grasps a lightning bolt indicating the 154th ACS's

ability to communicate with tactical flying units, which are designated by four flight symbols with arching contrails. The four stars indicate the sky as a navigation source and reflect the unit's vigilance in air control. The globe stands for worldwide mobility. The emblem was approved 19 May 1994.
