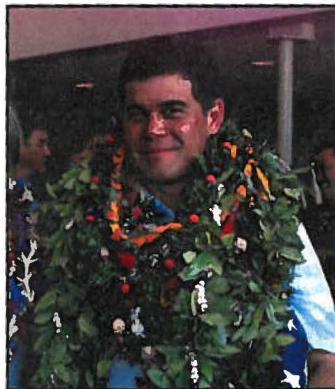


Command News

SNCO Conference Questions

The following are Brig. General Tice's responses to questions asked of him at the recent SNCO conference. This is only the beginning in a series that will run over the next few months.

Q: "What is the current situation on the aircraft wash rack? Is it still going to happen?"

A: I'm assuming you're referring to the big airplane wash rack. We know there is maintenance required on the facility and currently the dialog is between the 15th ABW, which owns the facility, and the Logistics Group. If your question concerns the proposed clear water rinse facilities, we're moving ahead with design. One will be on "Mike" for the fighters, the other on the Hickam ramp for the "heavies". Our hope is to see the construction money added congressionally as a part of the 2001 budget.

Q: "Is there any new information on future aircraft transitions? (for example KC-135's going to KC-10's)"

A: There are no plans I'm aware of for the AF or ANG to acquire additional KC-10's or transfer any to the Guard. The next generation tanker is forecast to be procured by the AF beginning in the 2013 time frame. We're watching that with interest and will naturally lobby to convert when the time is right. The C-17 initiative continues to be worked. Bed-down of these aircraft in Hawaii and Alaska has the support of Senators Inouye and Stevens. Much work still needs to be done to include determining ownership and the organizational structure. We will be sending a team off to observe a C-17 SATAF in Mississippi shortly.

Q: "Can UTAs be scheduled other than Pro Bowl Weekend?"

A: A number of things get factored into determining UTA weekends. Traditionally, they will be early in the month with consideration given to holidays and three-day weekends. Deconflicting with sports events, particularly during the football season, is not one of the top scheduling priorities.

Q: "Weapons of Mass Destruction. Will there be Air Guard positions? If so how many?"

A: JVA's for the WMD civil support team are out and available through HRO, or you can find a listing of AGR vacancies in the Public Folders section of "Outlook". I believe most are either Army or Air Guard, with the intent being to hire the best qualified.

Q: "Currently enlisted full-time AGR personnel **do not** have to retire after 20 years of Total Active Federal Military Service. Is this policy about to be changed?"

A: There are no plans that I am aware of to make changes to this policy.

Wing Safety Announcements

Human Factors

It should not come as a surprise that a predominant factor associated with aircraft accidents today is the human factor. The human element has always overshadowed all other elements; but we are just now beginning to focus our energy in this direction. As a result, we are seeing some changes, although not to the extent where we can show significance. There are many things that make the business of understanding human behavior difficult at best.

In general people are unwilling to admit that they have any deficiencies. If they did, it might encourage the risk of criticism and cause outsiders to wonder why they are allowed to continue being airmen. This results in little or no information about why someone did what they did, or failed to do what they should have done. This is a great dilemma for all aviation.

Here are a few suggestions that may help us all to improve. **First**, we must feel free to discuss our weakness without fear of punishment or retribution. **Second**, we must improve our understanding of human behavior through human factor training programs. **Third**, we need better human factor information to improve airman performance.

We should seriously consider utilizing human performance data from all available sources. The more we know about past airman performance, the better we will be able to anticipate future airman performance.

Of course, these ideas are oversimplified. However, they are actually quite easy to accomplish. Naturally, getting them done involves change, and change is often an uphill battle. But wouldn't improving the level of safety be well worth that battle?

Health Watch

FOOD POISONING

Food poisoning is caused by bacteria called Salmonella. Poisoning can be avoided by not using cracked eggs and by making sure poultry and meat are prepared properly. A clean work area is also necessary. Pets such as chickens, ducks, and turtles, as well as many other domestic pets, are also sources of infection. Be sure to wash your hands thoroughly after contact with such animals.

Symptoms usually develop within 48 hours. They include headache, abdominal pain, fever, and diarrhea that may contain blood or mucus. The infection may localize and cause tissue damage, which can affect other organs.

Hydration is the foundation of treatment. Water and electrolytes (found in sport drinks like Gatorade) are the common treatment. If diarrhea becomes severe, hospitalization may be necessary.

MGIB Kicker AFSC's for Fiscal Year 2000

To be eligible for the MGIB Kicker program you have to extend your enlistment to get 6 years retainability or reenlist for 6 years in a Kicker eligible AFSC. If you go to school full-time you will receive an additional \$350.00 per month in addition to the MGIB you are currently eligible for (Active Duty or Guard MGIB). 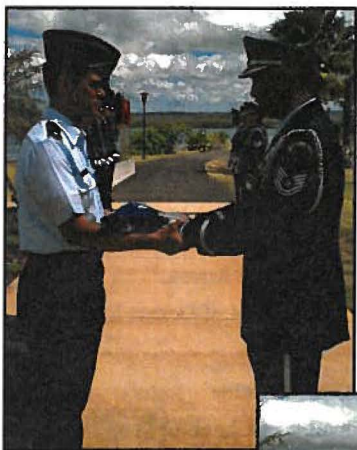

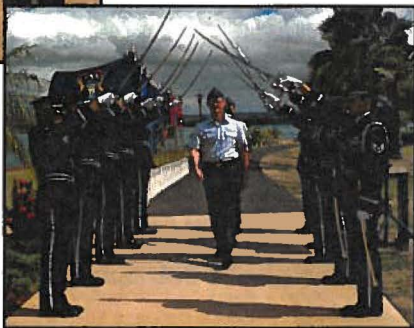
