My congratulations also go to the Outstanding Performers named by the IG Team. Again, each group had members recognized for contributions that were far above expectation. Our Outstanding Performers are SrA Kristen Higgins (154CF, Base Multimedia Manager), SrA Colyn Funakowski (154 MSF, Customer service Representative), TSgt Dominador Molina (154AGS, F-15 Inspection Dock Chief), SMSgt Brian Oshiro, MSgt Alan Umeda, TSgt Jon Amorin, TSgt Paul Tadaki, SSgt Galen Higa (154MXS AMMO Section), and Capt. Christopher "Frenchy" Faurot (199FS, Tactics and Weapons Officer)

Again, I want to thank every one of you for all your hard work and extra effort this past year in preparing for the UCI. While our UCI results were disappointing in some areas, every single area in this Wing demonstrated marked improvement since our observation last year. Every area still has some things to clean up, some a few more than others; but we have a firm foundation to stand on and we DO NOT have a black cloud over our head any more. I don't know if you all realize just how far down we were, and how far we have come. To have accomplished what we did, while continuing AEFs and being heavily tasked for Noble Eagle is just outstanding. You all make me proud.

I want you to take time this UTA to do several important things. First, look at your areas for improvement. Help develop a plan that will correct these things not only now but will maintain them for the future. Next, look at the processes and programs you put in place as you readied your areas for inspection. Make plans to keep these going. Commander's Call

It's the holiday season, but it hardly seems possible that it is December already. We've been on such a fast paced course for several months and the ride isn't nearly over. The UCI is barely finished, findings and areas for improvement need correction, our Noble Eagle tasking continues and it appears our KC-135s will now be participating in Enduring Freedom.

As our participation in real world events broadens, I spend a lot of time dealing with the question of volunteerism versus mobilization. Since September 11th you have volunteered to step up to our missions without missing a beat. I am very proud of the job you have been doing.

I want you all to know that the easiest solution to cover our expanding missions is to mobilize. While it is the easiest, I don't believe it is the right solution. The Guard is based on volunteerism. We come when our country calls. If we can meet mission requirements with volunteers, then that is exactly what we will do. Involuntary mobilization removes flexibility. Mobilization is for a minimum of one year and can be extended for a second year. Volunteer tours can run from one day up to 270 days in any given fiscal year. Consequently, mobilization can have severe financial impacts on our members and certainly has severe impact on our local employers. Volunteerism allows you to look at the mission requirements and volunteer to help during the times that are best for you, your family, your employer and this organization. I will only use involuntary mobilization as a last resort when there are no volunteers to accomplish the mission. So I ask you all to check with your units. If your skills are needed, please volunteer as often and for as much time as you can.

Keep in mind that in our new world of Noble Eagle and Enduring Freedom your military status is everything. Aircrews flying these missions must be in Title 10 status. Maintainers and support people can be Title 32 technicians, AGRs and traditional members. However, traditional members volunteering to help with these missions outside of UTAs and annual training are on Title 10 status MPA Noble Eagle or Enduring Freedom days.

In the laws given to us by Congress, Title 10 and Title 32 people are in separate organizations. Everyone on Title 10 status is a member of the National Guard of the United States rather than the Hawaii Air National Guard. They are assigned to the National Guard Bureau for administrative purposes - think discipline and personnel programs. Operationally they work for other Title 10 members, either active duty members or Guard members serving on Title 10 status. Title 32 Guardsmen and Title 10 Guardsmen work together though within the 154th Wing to accomplish our many missions.

Since we expect to continue our participation in Noble Eagle and Enduring Freedom for the foreseeable future, we're formalizing these command arrangements. LtCol Mike "Inch" Compton has volunteered to be the Title 10 DETCO for all Wing members supporting PACAF Noble Eagle taskings. LtCol Kurt Lajala has volunteered to be the DETCO for members supporting AMCs Enduring Freedom taskings. They are on Title 10 duty and will be the on scene commander for administrative control of Wing members serving in Title 10 status. These commanders will handle leave requests, promotions, Line of Duty Determinations, members who are ill and unable to report to duty, and disciplinary issues.

2001 has been a very, very productive and busy year for the 154th Wing. You have risen to each and every challenge. You can be extremely proud of your accomplishments. I know I am. As we take time this holiday season to appreciate our accomplishments, let us give thanks for the many blessings we have - - family, friends, co-workers, our freedom, our country and our ability to serve. I would also ask each of you to give special consideration this year to help those people less fortunate than we are. Our Hawaii food banks and charities need our kokua.

Susan and I wish you and your family a holiday season that fills your spirit and heart with the things that really matter in life. Hau'oli Makahiki Huo

SGLI Spousal 'Opt-Out' Deadline Extended to December 31

The American Forces Press Service reports that troops who don't want spousal coverage in the Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance program now have until December 31 to cancel at no charge. This is a one-month extension on the initial November 30 opt-out deadline widely reported in October. The automatic coverage began Nov. 1, and affected those members who carried more than \$100,000 of personal coverage. Troops who don't want spousal SGLI coverage need to visit their military personnel office to fill out and submit an "8286A" form. The forms are also available on the VA Web site at www.insurance.va.gov/sglivgli/sglifam.htm. Those who cancel in time will be reimbursed for any premiums inadvertently withheld from their pay.

A REVIEW OF OUR ENLISTED FORCE STRUCTURE

The purpose of the enlisted force structure is to define specific responsibilities for each enlisted rank, relationships between ranks, how each rank fits into the organization, and career progression through the enlisted ranks. The enlisted force consists of distinct and separate grades, each correlating to levels of training, technical competence, leadership and management responsibilities. Specific tiers of the enlisted force structure and responsibilities of each grade within each tier are as follows:

SENIOR NCO TIER

The supervisor-manager NCOs are CMSgt, SMSgt, and MSgt and are considered senior NCOs. Although thoroughly trained in the technical aspects of their specialties, they are leaders and managers with supervisory responsibilities, NOT SUPER GRADE TECHNICIANS. Senior NCOs must take the lead in achieving, maintaining, and enforcing Air Force standards as will as the standards relating to order and discipline.

NCO TIER

The Technical-supervisor NCOs are TSgt and SSgt. They perform complex technical duties in addition to providing responsible supervision. They are responsible for developing enlisted personnel under their supervision. These NCO grades must continuously strive to broaden and perfect their professional expertise and supervisory techniques, as they are first line supervisors.

AIRMAN TIER

The Trainee-Apprentices are Senior Airmen (SrA) Airmen First Class (AIC), Airmen (AMN), and Airmen Basic (AB) who are primarily in a training status. SrA normally are skilled workers transitioning into NCO status. Airmen must devote their efforts to master the skills required in their career field. In addition, airmen must conform to Air Force standards and correct those members who violate them.



School Self-Help Projects

Volunteers from the Hawaii Army and Air National Guard partnered with Hawaii's public schools and local vendors to complete \$12,000 of self-help projects in FY 2001. The

money, available through the efforts of Senator Daniel Inouye, is administered by the Joint Venture Education Forum, a coalition of State Department of Education, military personnel, and institutions with a stake in public education. Up to \$20,000 may be available to Hawaii National Guard volunteers in FY 2002.

The self-help projects covered the gamut of repair and maintenance projects in fourteen public schools on Oahu. Air

conditioning installed at Waianae HS. Nanakuli and Kalaheo HS Junior ROTC classrooms refurbished with floor tiles. A concrete platform for the JROTC rifle range was constructed at Kailua HS, and another similar project is ongoing at Kahuku HS. Ground cover purchased and planted at Webling Elementary. Classrooms painted at Ewa Beach Elementary. Campbell HS received materials to repaint their JROTC Classroom. Historical exhibit and traditions wall completed at McKinley HS. Junior ROTC rifle ranges improved at Farrington HS, and an outdoor exercise station constructed at Castle HS.

Volunteers came from across the guard. Over the year members from 154 CES, 154 MXS, 154 AGS, 29th BDE and 103rd Troop Command freely gave of their time. CPT Buddy Francisco, 12th PSD, coordinated the effort, and is now looking for a few good projects in 2002.

In the coming year General Correa would like to expand our efforts to schools on neighboring islands. JVEF priorities in FY02 are in the areas of information technology, playgrounds, and health and safety issues. They will avoid funding projects for painting and landscaping. Project lead and coordination should rest with the school. The Guard augments the labor force and provides monetary assistance.

If you know of a school with a project that could use a few extra hands and a few extra bucks, please contact either CPT Buddy Francisco via RCAS email (onesimo.francisco@hi. ngb.army.mil) or LTC Fred Fogel at 733-4248. They will need the name of the school, the project coordinator, and a rough estimate of how much you want to spend on what. "Needy" schools receive first consideration. But one thing is for sure, if you don't surface the project, the Guard can't help.

12 Graduate from First Live Communications-Electronics Career Advancement Course

Formal resident Course E6ADL2EX7X 000, Communications-Electronics Career Advancement, was conducted at 297 ATCS, Kalaeloa, 15 - 26 Oct 01. This was the first live Communications-Electronics Career Advancement satellite distance learning (DL) class ever conducted within HIANG.

This course was previously conducted at Keesler AFB, MS, until shut down 30 September, 2001. As of 1 October, 2001 the course is only conducted via satellite live DL for Air National Guard and Air Force Reserves.

The class was broadcasted to registered worldwide satellite downlink sites from Keesler AFB. Air Force's satellite link is contracted to Convergent Media Systems. Our interactive audio bridging is coordinated and connected to Keesler AFB broadcast studio through Air Technology Network (ATN), Wright-Patterson AFB, OH.

Special recognition and thanks to 297 ATCS, Kalaeloa (formerly NAS Barbers Point) who graciously allowed us to use their facility and Warrior Network satellite downlink capability to complete the training. A total of twelve students graduated on 29 Oct 01.
