

Pacific Air Forces hosts Korean War Symposium in Hawaii

HICKAM AIR FORCE BASE, Hawaii - To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Korean War and honor those who served, Pacific Air Forces will host a Korean War Air Power Symposium June 25-29 at the Hilton Hawaiian Village, Honolulu.

The symposium will feature panels that will cover virtually every aspect of the air war, including air-to-air, air-to-ground, aerial support, bomber operations, and the people aspect, including nurses, spouses, civilians and more. Speakers and panelists will include veterans who fought in the war and noted historians.

"Our goal for this symposium is to provide an opportunity for a multi-dimensional discussion of the air war in Korea in one comprehensive package," said Dr. Timothy Keck, PACAF command historian. "We believe it will be an event like no other that has been done on the Korean War."

Other activities planned for the symposium include a Korean War-era hangar party, a golf tournament and a historical tour.

The Symposium registration fee is \$110 plus \$55 per dependent/guest. The fee includes an icebreaker at the Hilton, an evening party with heavy hors d' oeuvres at Hangar 7, and two luncheons with speakers at the Hilton.

Congratulations Chief Uhrig on your retirement.



BAH Re-certification

The following guidance is provided for your information concerning BAH recertifications:

Every year re-certifications are required for single members, divorced members claiming dependents, or members married to members who have no additional dependents. For members whose civilian spouse is their primary dependent and for single AGR's re-certification is every three years.

Each quarter a list is made available for each units POC on the FM Web page. The POC should notify the individuals that they are due to re-certify. If the member is unavailable to re-certify the POC should inform FM. Failure to re-certify by the designated date will cause the members BAH to be terminated. A new AF Form 594 with all appropriate documents must be submitted to restart. There is no retroactive payment, the entitlement will start the day we receive the documents properly filled out.

Members can only claim command sponsored dependents. Simply supporting someone does not qualify them as a dependent. It is the member's responsibility to notify us of any status changes, including when a dependent child reaches the age of 21.

AGR's: Your LES shows the number of dependents you have for COLA. You must verify that this number reflects the correct number that you are entitled to even if you have already notified 15CPTS.

Proper Ribbon Wear

Air Force Overseas Ribbon (Short Tour)

In appreciation of National Guard members volunteering to support non-mandatory TDYs, and to give incentive for continued support, last September the National Guard Bureau, announced new criteria for qualifying for the Air Force Overseas Ribbon (Short Tour).

To qualify for this ribbon, you must have been TDY or deployed overseas for more than 90 days, consecutive or accumulative, within ANY three year period beginning Jan 1, 1995. A member may qualify only once in any three year period. A member may be awarded this prior to the end of a three-year period. Additional awards will be on a rolling three-year period.

Overseas in this case means, TDY outside the US and its Territories. An example would be; you went TDY for a total of 90 days or more in 1996 and 1997 (no TDY in 1995), you may get the award in 1997 and not wait until the end of 1998. The next 'rolling window' 'SEEMS TO BE' TDYs in 1999, 2000 and 2001, thus, in this example, any TDY in 1998 would not count towards your next ribbon (although why couldn't one count the no-TDY year of 1995 as part of the three year window?). The difficult part is that it is the responsibility of the individual member to keep track of their TDYs (with orders) and submit it to MPF for award. I is not MPF's, your supervisor, nor anyone else's responsibility to keep track of your TDYs and orders — or submit them to MPF for award.



BANKRUPTCY: FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (Continued from May edition)

WHAT IS PERSONAL BANKRUPTCY?

Bankruptcy is the filing of a petition with the bankruptcy court to obtain protection from the collection efforts of one's creditors. At the end of bankruptcy, some or all of the individual's debts will be cancelled. The court weighs the individual's obligations against those of his creditors rights.

IS THERE MORE THAN ONE KIND OF BANKRUPTCY?

Yes. The two most common types are chapter 7 and chapter 13.

Chapter 7 – The one most frequently used by individuals. Under this arrangement, a court-appointed trustee collects your assets, sells them for cash, and makes distribution to creditors. You can keep assets that are exempt under federal law and the law of your home state. You can file once every 6 years.

Chapter 13 - This chapter is designed for persons who have a regular income and stable job. The debtor pays debts off over a 3 to 5 year period and keeps the property.

CAN I GET IN TROUBLE WITH THE GUARD?

Federal law prevents employers, private or otherwise, from discriminating against persons filing. That is a member cannot be discharged or disciplined for declaring bankruptcy. A member may however be discharged for not paying just debts. Your military charge card for instance. Child support for another. At the same time however, commanders are not bill collectors.

ARE THERE ALTERNATIVES TO BANKRUPTCY?

- Contact your creditors. Try working out different payment options. After explaining the situation, ask credit card creditors to temporarily reduce your monthly payments, waive late fees, extend the payment period at no interest.

- Turn to Consumer Credit Counseling Service, a nationwide non-profit organization that will work with you and your creditors to devise a more manageable repayment plan

- Sell any assets you might have that have a re-sale value and apply proceeds to your debt

- If you can, consolidate debts into a single loan like a home equity loan

And of course, the best alternative, throw those credit card offers away without even opening them!
