HIANG members from the 154th Maintenance Squadron and the 204th Airlift Squadron participated in "Balikitan 2002". A month-long JCS joint and combined exercise with U.S. and Republic of the Philippines military forces during April and May. Interoperability seminars for the Philippines Air Force (PAF) were held on Clark Field (formerly, Clark Air Base) by our C-130 maintainers and aircrew to their counterparts from the 220th Air Wing, PAF. We also delivered and distributed much needed school supplies to the children at Cavite School.

As we mingled, renewing friendships and expanding upon all of our wartime exploits from 30+ years ago, I was struck by a special realization. We were surrounded by ordinary people who had done extraordinary things. These men rose to heights of heroism, dedication and perseverance on a daily basis as again and again they flew against the most heavily defended targets—Hanoi and Haiphong. On Memorial Day, at Punchbowl and the Hawaii State Veterans cemeteries, I was again surrounded by ordinary people who did extraordinary things. Row upon row of men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice. Surviving veterans from World War II, Korea, and Vietnam, many stooped and shuffling, carried themselves with pride, dignity, and confidence because of their performance when their country had called.

You too, have done extraordinary things in the past nine months. You have carried on the proud tradition of the American Militia—laying down your implements of ordinary life to perform extraordinary tasks. As we slowly return to a redefined normalcy, "Mahalo Nui Loa" from me, your State and your Country.


