A power point briefing about professional relationships has been made available to all commanders to share with their personnel. The following is a listing of some of the basic policies.

-The uniqueness of military life requires absolute confidence in command

-The authority of superiors is degraded when a perception of favoritism or undue familiarity with subordinates

exists

-Unprofessional relationships can exist between males, females, males and females

-Though all members have a responsibility to avoid unprofessional relationships, officers bear the greater responsibility

-Unprofessional relationships can exist between enlisted members

The following is a list of specific officer prohibitions found in AFI 36-2909:

-no gambling with enlisted members -do not borrow money from enlisted

members -do not have sex with enlisted mem-

bers

-do not date enlisted members

-do not share living accommodations with enlisted members

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154th Medical Group Completes Annual Mass Casualty Exercise

The 154th Medical Group (MDG) held their annual mass casualty exercise on Tuesday, May 20, 2003 at Hickam Air Force Base. The scenario tasked the 154 MDG to support a large International Air Show.

Within the first hour of the exercise, Lt Col Brett Wyrick, 154 MDG Commander and members, had the tent up and crew split into two teams. Shortly after setting up, a large explosion occurred resulting in 19 conventional patients with a variety of injuries.

The mission of the exercise was to ensure medical personnel are capable of performing assigned wartime missions. Medical personnel worked with a great sense of urgency





and teamwork to treat and transport patients effectively and timely.

"I think the Medical Group proved that we are definitely capable of per-

> forming our wartime mission," Senior Health Systems Technician, CMSgt Mark Bailey said.

> Members from the 154th Wing, mostly Self Aid Buddy Care Monitors, volunteered to act as patients for the exercise. With great make-up and Grammy Award winning actors and actresses the volunteers were able to give the



tent at Honeymoon Beach, responded to the scene. Medical Group personnel were able to practice their wartime tasks by treating and transporting patients. Each patient was given a card that listed his or her simulated injury and condition. The cards were used to determine where to send the patients and how to treat them. Patients were triaged as minimal, immediate, delayed and expectant, depending on the seriousness of injury and chances of survival.

"I learned that communication is key," Medical Administration Technician, SrA Kerrie Lau, said. "To ensure timely transport and treatment of patients, effective communication avenues must be available for all stages Medical Group a realistic view of the scenario.

Lincoln Marathon 2003

Dawn, Sunday morning, May 4th, despite heavy rain, the occasional lightning, and a mere 50 degrees on the ther-

mometer, five runners from the Hawaii National Guard reluctantly trudged through the freezing puddles to the start line of the 20th Annual National Guard Marathon in Lincoln, Nebraska. What started as a "survival" challenge became a victory celebration after all Hawaii runners crossed the finish line with the most successful Hawaii showing ever.

finished 3rd overall, and was the 2nd overall National Guard finisher. He completed the 26.2-mile course in just 2 hours, 35 minutes. SSgt Kauwale, with a time of 2 hours, 52 minutes, placed 2nd in the men's masters division (40 & over). Four of the five-team members set new PRs (personal records) despite the wintry conditions. The combined effort of all team members contributed to Hawaii's third place finish in the 50 states and 4 territories participating in the marathon. Only Oregon and Indiana had better com-

In addition, SSgt Larson, SSG Kauwale and Lt Col Kimsey were selected for the National Guard's elite "All Guard Team." Each year members of the All Guard Team represent the National Guard at the Air Force Marathon, the Marine Corp Marathon, and the Navy Marathon.

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The official finishing times for the Hawaii runners were: SSgt Chris Larson (169 ACWS) 2:35:51; SSG Jay Kauwale (Btry A, 1-487 FA) 2:52:43; Lt

Col Scott Kimsey (204 AS) 3:17:59; Lt Col Mike Compton (HQ 154 WG) 3:21:35; SFC Ron Yi (HHC, 29 Spt Bn) 3:32:14

This was the best overall finish by any Hawaii Guard team. Hawaii is becoming recognized as one of the top running states in the country. The team needs at least one new runner to enter each year. If you would like to join a winning team, participate in at least one marathon and wait for the call around March next year.

all along the route, as our team raced through the rain. It is great to be a winning team, and it certainly helps to look like one.


