154 WG members train for possible WMD attack

Since 9-11 you have been hearing that numerous Hawaii Air National Guard men and women are being deployed all over the world to fight the war on terrorism; it shouldn't surprise you to hear that the guardsmen who are not deployed are playing their part to fight this same war.

Donned in chemical suits, gas masks, rubber boots and gloves, Airmen from the 154th Wing Hawaii Air National Guard performed a rehearsal of their mobile decontamination and initial medical care response team September 22, 2 p.m. at the 93rd Civil Support Team facility, inside Diamond Head Crater.

The Airmen, all volunteers, have been training to become certified as a National Guard Chemical Biological Radiological Nuclear and High-yield Explosive Enhanced Response Force Package (NGCERFP).

Training by the 5th Army took place Sept. 21 through Sept. 25. This was the first of many training sessions needed to keep the team prepared to respond to a weapon of mass destruction attack.

This is something new for the Guard and new for the state, said Lt. Col. David C. Snakenberg, F-15 Maintenance officer in charge.

The NGCERFP will assist local, state and federal agencies with triage, decontamination and initial medical care in the event of a weapon of mass destruction incident.

"We will have to take the show on the road," said Col. Brett Wyrick, 154WG Medical Group commander referring to the team's requirement to respond to incidents on any of the islands. "It will take constant training. The goal is to be able to decontaminate and stabilize 100 casualties per hour."

Wyrick said that it's a good start but will need more volunteers to provide round-the-clock coverage to last a few days in case of a WMD attack. Currently, the team consists of 32 Airmen from the 154th Medical Group, 154th Maintenance Group and 154th Support Group.

Family planning ensures family's well-being during deployment

Family Care Planning is the advanced process of planning for the care of family members during a military members absence.

All Air Force members with families will have a plan that covers all practical situations both long and short-term.

Air Force Form 357 must be completed by single parents, dual military couples with families, military members with civilian spouses who cannot care for dependent children and members with unique family situations.

A good plan will provide arrangements for the legal, medical, logistical, educational, financial and religious care of family members. The First Sergeant ensures workability of the family care plan.

The family care program is intended to ensure that at the time of mobilization our force is ready to deploy with minimal distractions and delays.

Although AFI 36-2908 only requires members with families develop a plan, all members should ensure that they are deployable and that personal matters, which could affect their deployability or performance, are dealt with prior to activation and not at the time of activation.
