As we all come together to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG), we honor an organization that has grown into one of the largest and most diverse units in the Air National Guard. We have undergone numerous changes in weapon systems, personnel, and structure - much more than anyone could have imagined 60 years ago.

In just the past 10 years, we have undergone substantial change. We were selected to stand up one of only five Eagle Vision mobile satellite imagery downlink units in the nation. We bid farewell to the C-130 Hercules and accepted eight brand new C-17 Globemaster aircraft, giving us more strategic airlift, tactical airlift, and airdrop capability than ever before. This C-17 unit has successfully integrated with the Active Duty Air Force becoming the first Air National Guard Associate unit and an example for others to follow. We proudly promoted our first female general officer, Brigadier General Kathleen Berg. We have been chosen to receive additional KC-135 tankers and are the only Air National Guard unit currently named to receive America's newest frontline fighter, the F-22 Raptor.

Today's Hawaii Air National Guard owes its success to the people before us who set a benchmark of excellence as well as those who now carry this legacy forward. Our units have participated in every Air Force contingency operation for the past ten years. Today our men and women are serving honorably and courageously in Afghanistan and Iraq. They stand ready to fulfill our many responsibilities to the state and the nation – in the Pacific and throughout the world.

Ten years have passed since our celebration of the Hawaii Air National Guard's 50th Anniversary and in that time each of you have continued to shape and mold the HIANG into what it is today. Be proud of what you have all contributed to the HIANG. The past, the present and the future starts and ends with each and every one of you: our retirees, our members, our families, and our friends of the HIANG – our Ohana.

HQ HIANG

Headquarters Hawaii Air National Guard: The Hawaii Air National Guard has state and federal missions. The coordination for both of these missions is supported by the Headquarters Hawaii Air National Guard located at Fort Ruger, near Diamond Head. In performing its state mission, the HIANG provides organized, trained units to protect Hawaii's citizens and property, preserve peace and ensure public safety in response to natural or human-caused disasters. Its federal mission is to provide operationally-ready combat units, combat support units and qualified personnel for active duty in the U.S. Air Force in time of war, national emergency, or operational contingency. During the past ten years, HQs HIANG has worked the beddown of Eagle Vision V and the first ANG C-17 Associate Unit, and has positioned the HIANG for future warfighting headquarters, robusted KC-135 and F-22 missions.






199th Weather Flight: Provides meteorological support for the Hawaii National Guard, Alaska National Guard and the United States Army Pacific. When deployed, services include continuous 24-hour staff weather services, forecasting, observation and climatological support. Recently the 199th Weather Flight moved from Wheeler Army Airfield to Hickam Air Force Base. They have deployed members to Bosnia, Italy, the Western Area Defense Sector, Kadena and Louisiana. Three members of the 199 WF were mobilized in 2001 to support the 17th Operational Weather Squadron for one year. In 2005 four members returned from a 90-day deployment to Kadena Air Base supporting the 18 SFS.

Command Section: Provides assistance in information management and command support staff activities for the Wing and Vice Commanders.

154th Operations Group



HQ 154th Operations Group: Collectively, the organization is capable of employing dedicated air defense, air superiority, air refueling, and theater airlift forces around the globe with minimum notification. The 154 OG possesses composite, integrated air defense, fighter, tanker and transport assets under one organizational roof, making it unique in the Air National Guard.

203rd Air Refueling Squadron: The squadron has KC-135 tankers that provide in theater air-to-air refueling resources for the Pacific Air Force, and enhances worldwide deployment to augment other theaters of operations.

204th Airlift Squadron: The squadron has C-17 Globemasters that are capable of performing airlift support and tactical airdrops. The squadron is an associate unit with the 15th Airlift Wing's 535th Airlift Squadron.

199th Fighter Squadron: The squadron is equipped with F-15 A/B Eagle jetfighters which serve to provide interceptor capability for the state's air defense system. The 199th also augments the active duty U.S. Air Force during war or other contingencies.

169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron: Detects and identifies aircraft entering the Hawaiian airspace, provides intercept information to fighters scrambled for identification of unknown aircraft. Utilizes a radar at Mt. Kaala that links to the Hawaii Region Air Operations Center where they perform 24-hour air surveillance of the Hawaiian Island chain is provided.

150th Aircraft Control and Warning Flight: Utilizes a radar at Kokee Air Force Station, Kauai that is linked to the Hawaii Region Air Operations Center (HIRAOC), where 24-hour air surveillance of the Hawaiian Island chain is provided.

154th Air Control Squadron: Provides a mobile, self-sustainable, combat ready, forward extension and control element equipped to meet the Air Force ground theater air control systems worldwide.

154th Operations Support Flight: Supports all elements of flying operations. Knowledgeable in the areas of weapons and tactics, intelligence, plans, ground command and control systems and current operation, to facilitate the fulfillment of all prescribed flying missions.

The last ten years...

- First ANG unit to convert to F-100-220 engines for the F-15 weapon system (2004-2006)...trained and authored syllabus for conversion for entire ANG Eagle fleet
- Lead unit during March-April 1999 Operation Deliberate Forge with seven KC-135s (four HIANG, two AMC, one AFRC); changed into Operation Allied Force with some of the first combat refueling operations over Macedonia and Kosovo
- Led ANG F-15 A/B fleet in 2005 with highest cumulative mission capable rate, 79.4 percent
- Beddown of eight C-17s; established C-17 maintenance ANG associate model that began October 2005, first of its kind, AD/ANG integrated maintenance organization
- Live ordinance firing July 16, 2006... first HIANG F-15 live missile shoot in Hawaiian airspace in 40 years
- 154th Maintenance Standardization and Evaluation Team Visit (Feb. 7-13, 2006); with over 60 inspectors; resulted in highest MSEP compliance rate (97.0 percent) of any ANG maintenance unit
- Controlled Humidity Test Project (August 2006); corrosion control structures and equipment set up for F-15, KC-135, AGE, and AIS; first of its kind in the ANG
- AEFs to Iceland, Turkey, Southwest Asia, Europe; several in the Pacific theater
- Departure of five C-130H aircraft; garnered ANG Flying Safety Award for over 19,000 hours of mishap free flying
- FY2006, over 6596 flying hours and over \$58 million in the flying hour program

154th Mission Support Group

Ensures that subordinate units are trained and equipped for thier wartime missions and that they are ready to deploy if required in support of federal or state call-up.

154th Logistics Readiness Squadron

Provides quality logistics support at home and deployed. Personnel are trained in supply, transportation, fuels, individual equipment issue, vehicle operations and maintenance, and logistics plans. Encompass....Integrate....Sustain.

154th Civil Engineering Squadron

Primary mission is "PRIME BEEF," providing a wide range of base rapid repair and construction services to a forward operating base. Also programs, plans, and executes the maintenance of all HIANG facilities.

154th Security Forces Squadron

All 154th Security Forces members are in mobility positions and deployable, providing base security, resource protection, and combat arms training worldwide.

154th Communications Flight

The 154th Communications Flight manages, maintains fixed communications assets in the HIANG, including secure and unclassified computer networks, telephone and public address systems, base station and land mobile radios. The Audio Visual section provides still and video production services to document deployments and provide training tools to assigned units.

154th Mission Support Flight

The MSF puts the right people with the right skills in the right place at the right time, peace time or war time, world wide. They help size, sustain, and develop the force by providing manpower and organization services; civilian and military personnel services; off duty education and training; professional military education and family support programs.


154th Services Flight

The last ten years...

- LRS moved from MXG to MSG bringing our strength to 400 members; the LRS, the largest supply organization in the ANG routinely produces zero MICAP for parts for F-15, C-130 and KC-135 weapons systems for days or weeks in a row
- All Mission Support units have deployed members in support of OEF, ONE and OIF
- Virtually all 154 SFS members have deployed at least once since 9/11, most have deployed six months per year since 2003
- LRS drivers deployed for six months in 2004 in support of the most dangerous missions in OIF, convoy escort; they were under attack or hit by IEDs
- Services members deployed to CENTCOM; support Operation Deep Freeze in Antarctica, in addition to "Silver Flag" training deployments
- Engineers deployed to Iraq and Operation Jump Start (South West U.S.) and "Silver Flag" training
- The CF also had members deployed to the CENTCOM AOR
- Student Flight was formalized in 2005; produced record Distinguished and Honor graduates from BMT and AFTech Schools
- Family Readiness belongs to the MSG and has become increasingly critical with so many deployments affecting so many families
- The MSG, like the Medical Group, provide a multitude of services to all 2500 members of the HIANG, on all islands, and we do it with the lowest full time manning ratio



154th Medical Group




154th Medical Group

Provides the Hawaii Air National Guard with fixed and deployable medical and dental resources. This includes SUPER-MASH medical support for the geographically separated units.

The 154 MDG also supports the Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and High-Yield Explosive Enhanced Response Force Package mission. Although the CERF-P mission is a joint mission, the majority of members are currently Hawaii Air National Guard members from the 154 MDG.

The 154th Medical Group has participated in the Global War on Terror by providing forces for the Central Command Area of Responsibility. Members of the Group have deployed to nearly every base in the theater while continuing to provide for the in garrison support of the Hawaiian Islands.

The 154 MDG has also provided teams of trained professionals which have deployed to the Philippines in support of the Hawaii State Partnership for Peace Program. Medical Group members continue to support the Youth Challenge Academy as well as other community outreach programs.




The last ten years...

- The 154th Medical Squadron, initially established in 1960 became the 154th Medical Group in 2003
- Designated the lead unit in support of the Joint WMD response capability (CERFP) Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and High-Yield Explosive Enhanced Response Force Package mission in 2003, designed to serve as a first responder team for Homeland Defense
- Deployed for AEF operations in Balad,
 Diego Garcia, Kyrgyztan, and Iraq
- In Joint Operations with the AZANG, CANG and city of Scottsdale during the FEMA Region IX Coyote Crisis Exercise MDG deployed CERFP capability as a Medical All-Hazards Response Team, air lifted for the first time an entire CERFP assemblage using a C-17
- In support of the State Partnership program and Humanitarian Assistance Missions, deployed personnel worldwide to Indonesia, Bosnia, and Philippines
- 2003 recieved excellent rating in HSI, one of the highest rating ever provided to a unit; received highest evaluation of any CERFP during its proof of concept evaluation
- Lt. Col. Stan Sato receiving the award for Optometrist of the Year for the Air National Guard in 2004; state wide recognition of it's dentist as Field Grade Officer of the year 2005; Winning team award 2003; and Outstanding unit award 2003

HQ 201st Combat Communications Group

The 201st Combat Communications Group is one of eight Air National Guard Combat Communications Groups within the United States. Its mission is to command, organize, equip, train, and deploy tactical forces, including assigned combat communications, and air traffic control units supporting Air Expeditionary Forces, Joint Task Forces, and USAF requirements for Major Commands, Numbered Air Forces, and Flying Wings as directed by command authorities. Additionally, the Group headquarters is tasked to augment and integrate into the 13th Air Force during contingencies.

Combat Communication Squadrons

The 291st, 292nd, 293rd, and 206th Combat Communications Squadrons provide a broad range of command and control communications capability (long-haul satellite connectivity, radio relays, and intra-base LMR, voice, data, and network services.) They are capable of providing initial communications for small expeditionary teams and robust their services to meet base-level requirements. In addition, combat communications units can be relied upon for sustained communication services at airbases utilizing either tactical or fixed communications equipment. The 293 CBCS has the Eagle Vision (EV) system that receives and processes image data from commercial remote sensing satellites. It can provide time critical (hours old) imagery without having to compete with other priorities of national or commercial imagery customers. EV's all weather, day or night panchromatic imaging capabilities make it an effective tool for homeland defense, humanitarian relief, and non-combatant evacuation operations.

Air Traffic Services

The 297 Air Traffic Control Squadron is tasked to control air traffic at Kalaeloa Air Field, HI, while maintaining a combat-readiness to respond to contingency operations worldwide. During wartime the 297 ATCS may be tasked to deploy, operate and maintain air traffic control and landing systems at any Forward Operating Base requiring its services.

Royal Guard

The Royal Guard of old was in charge of protecting Hawaii's Monarchy and the grounds of Iolani Palace.

Jan. 17, 1893, the Royal Guard was disbanded after the overthrow of Queen Lili'uokalani. Nov. 16, 1963, they were reactivated by Col. Walter Judd of the Hawaii Air National Guard.

The Royal Guard, all volunteers and members of the Hawaii Air National Guard, was restored and formed in front of Iolani Barracks and in introduced to the governor of Hawaii and to the public.

The Royal Guard's purpose is to express pride in Hawaiian heritage and to preserve and perpetuate the tradition of the

Monarchy's Hawaiian militia. Its primary function is to provide an honor/ceremonial and color guard unit, uniformed and equipped in a similar manner of the Royal Guard of Old. Their commands are given in the Hawaiian language.

The koa, or soldier, in charge of the Royal Guard is


its Kapena Moku (captain). Past Kapena Mokus include the late Master Sgt. Herbert Panoki, the late Chief Master Sgt. Theodore Hussey, the late Chief Master Sgt. Harry Awana, retired Master Sgt. Ronald Kozo, the late Master Sgt. Valentine Wong, and retired Senior Master Sgt. Randall Lum. Presently, the current Kapena Moku is Master Sgt. James Pahukula.

The Royal Guard carry's State of Hawaii colors for official functions as desired by the commander in chief of the Hawaii National Guard, the governor of

Hawaii, The adjutant general of Hawaii (HITAG) and the commander of the Hawaii Air National Guard. Nov. 16, 2006, will mark the Royal Guard's 43rd Anniversary since its reactivation.

Honor Guard

"On behalf of the President of the United States of America, the Department of the Air Force, the men and women of the Hawaii Air National Guard and a

grateful Nation, we offer our nation's flag for the faithful and honorable service of your loved one," is the message the Honor Guard delivers to the next-of-kin whose loved one has dedicated his or her life protecting Ame-rica's freedom.

Each Honor Guard member

hones his or her skills by practicing and performing various disciplines that encompass the Military Honor's Funeral ceremony.

New Ceremonial Guardsmen attain certification through training phases that take them from basic movements to the ability to perform the Color Team movements, the six-man flag fold, pall bearing duties, firing party duties and the ability to coordinate the minimum three-man veteran detail. The certification training takes place over the course of five eight hour practice days equaling 40 hours, after which a certifi-

cation is awarded.

The Honor Guard consists of four flights, with one flight each on Oahu, Kauai, Maui and the Big Island. The state program has a membership of approximately 75 members, with the bulk of its members on Oahu.

Every member who bears the Honor Guard patch on their BDU's has gone through extensive training to possess it. It, in


itself, represents the pride, discipline and sacrifice by which the individual lives.




