IN THE GROOVE

In its first attempt to hurl a globe-girdling scientific satellite into outer space, the Army launched the earth's highest flying moon from the AF Missile Test Center at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Fired at an angle of 35° to the equator, the 4-stage Jupiter C rocket was a modified Army Redstone liquid-propellant ballistic missile--length: 68 ft, weight: about 32 tons before takeoff. Scientists believe the Explorer may remain aloft indefinitely if it maintains its present path.

The first stage of the Redstone, with a thrust of 83,000 pounds, pushed the satellite to 6800 mph

and an altitude of 53 miles, where it was blown away by means of explosive bolts.

The second stage, a cluster of 11 solid-propellant rockets designed to fire simultaneously, was rotated at 5 to 570 rpms by electric motors mounted in the nose of the main stage to minimize the unbalancing effect of failure. This stage was fired by a radio signal from the test station after it reached a 212-mile altitude by its momentum.

The third stage fired automatically as the second burned out. The Explorer, weighing 30.8 pounds and carrying a payload of 11

pounds of scientific instruments, was pushed up to 18,000 mph and into orbit by the fourth stage, a bullet-shaped cylinder 80 inches long and six inches in diameter.

The satellite and final stage rocket are designed to remain together and circle the earth as one unit to relay data gathered by delicate instruments to ground stations by means of two radio transmitters powered by 1.5-pound chemical batteries. (AFPS)

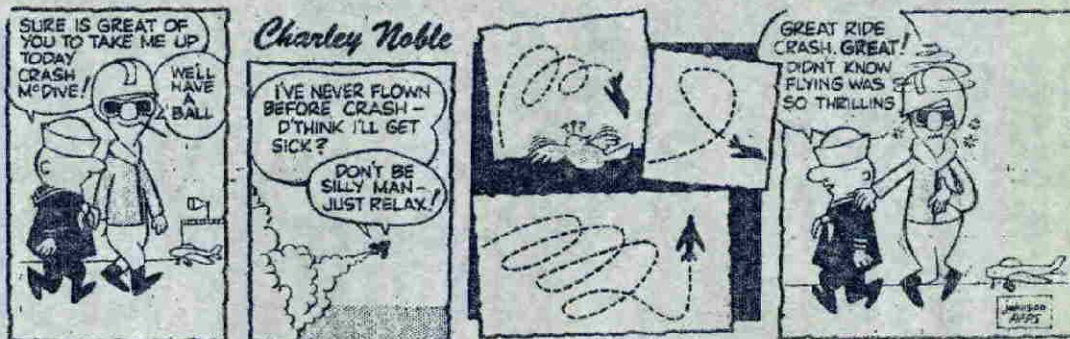
