COL JUDD GETS 20 YR PIN

1st Lt Col Walter F. Judd, 199th Support Squadron Commander, was awarded the twenty year Service Bar to the Hawaii National Guard Service Medal at today's formation. The colonel was cited for twenty years of honorable and faithful service in the Hawaii National Guard.

WANTED-PILOTS

Anyone who is interested in becoming a fighter pilot with the Air Guard is asked to contact MSgt George Oshiro, Training Section, at Squadron Headquarters, phone 44121; Ext. 415140, 416240, or 46271.

Minimum requirements are: 19½ to 20½ years old; high school graduate, must have prior active Air Force service or at least one year ANG service; draft classification: 1D, 3A, 4A, or 5A.

You must also pass an eight hour written examination and a flying physical.

If you have 60 or more college credits, you may receive a direct commission as a 2nd Lt prior to your entry into pilot training. Those with no college experience but meet the minimum requirements would go to six months Officer Candidate School as a SSgt.

A Feature: THE PARACHUTE SHOP

Located at the mauka end of the hangar area is the 199th's Parachute Shop. The name of the shop would indicate that all they do is pack chutes. That's just one of four major jobs that they do.

Headed by SSgt Stanley Loo, a ten year veteran with the Air Guard, the shop is responsible for maintaining and repairing each pilot's personal equipment, such as helmets, oxygen masks, flight suits, and other similar equipment. Survival classes and training

Col Judd began his military career as an enlisted man with the 299th Infantry Regiment, Hawaii National Guard, from August 1940 to 1942. He was commissioned in November 1942 and saw service during World War II. He later joined the Air Guard in December 1946 and has been with the Air Guard since that time.

are given to pilots, for which the annual ditching exercises at Keehi Lagoon play an important part. Loo also said that fabric and leather repair is done, as well as sewing damaged portions of the canopy covers for the L's and all other types of ground equipment covering. Finally, maintenance and repair of all personal equipment and drag chutes are carried out. Loo said that personal chutes are re-packed every 60 days, and a visible check is made every ten days. Chutes are also inspected prior to each flight. It takes about two hours to pack a chute. Drag chutes require a half hour to pack.

Good features of the new chutes are that they reduce the opening shock and are lighter in weight.

A testimonial to Loo's thoroughness in packing these chutes is the fact that he has seen only five bailouts in his 10 years with the Guard and all five pilots are alive to prove it!

Other men in the Section are SSgt Howard Hironaka, A/1c Raymond Loo, and Vicente Aragon, A/2c Ronald Tan and Myron Choy, and A/3c Stanley Wada.
