FIRST WINTER CAMP ENDS

The first "winter camp" in Guard history ends today and tomorrow, as more than 1,500 men end the first week of YRFT.

Inclement weather made it one of the toughest camps on record, but provided excellent situation problems for HANG's F-102s as 199th FIS pilots flew 134 sorties coordinated by the 150th and 169th AC&W Squadrons.

A scheduled firing of live radar-guided missiles, however, figured to be a highlight of the camp, had to be postponed when the range 100 miles north of Oahu became heavily socked in by bad weather.

The fliers had been looking forward to the exercise in which they were to fire for the first time at a Delmar target, a black bomb-like device fabricated from papier mache and towed 5,000 feet behind another F-102.

Eight F-102s were based at Dillingham and six at Bonham.

Although plenty of advance notice had been circulated on the closing of Dillingham to private aircraft, Maj. Ross England's boys were frequently harassed by civilian pilots who approached the strip figuring to land.

On one hair-raising occasion, a wahine flier in a bright yellow and white Cessna 150 actually came in and made a touch-and-go, just one

and one-half minutes ahead of an F-102 making a pass from the opposite direction.

Parties are the order of the day as camp adjourns until the next session, slated for June 8-13.

KUDOS FOR TOSHI

Kudos are in order for TSgt Toshiyuki Watabayashi of the 154th Dispensary.

Toshi will spend two weeks on active duty in Washington, D.C. beginning March 23 at the Pentagon at the special invitation of Col. Henry Graham, Surgeon General of the Air National Guard.
