# PAY RAISE

A pay raise for military and Federal civilian personnel went into effect on the first of this month. The average increase for military personnel is 6.9 percent in basic pay.

The increases are the second of three boosts provided in the Uniformed Services Pay Act of 1967. A third stage raise will take effect on July 1, 1969.

A basic airman gets a \$6.60 increase under this latest raise. That's per month, and we're not sure just how the increase effects those of us on weekend drill. You will just have to see how much your paycheck goes up. #### TWO HANG PILOTS AT CLARK

The first two pilots from the 199th FIS to volunteer for active duty under the "Palace Alert" program left Hawaii this past Thursday. Before they left, Majors Jon Parrish and Gerald Sada were given a sendoff by the air techs and by HANG Commander Brig. Gen. Valentime Sieferman. Both men received leis, and the best wishes of the officers and men of the 154th.

Major Sada and Major Parrish are now at Clark AFB in the Philippines, undergoing survival training. After that, they could be rotated into South Vietnam, to fly Air Defense missions. Their tours of active duty will last 90 days, and the entire Palace Alert program, which was the brainchild of PACAF and the Hawaii Air National Guard, is expected to last two years or more.

## THE "JUG" SEARCH

As many of you may be aware, the 154th Fighter Group wants to obtain a P-47 for inclusion in our museum of aircraft flown by the Hawaii Air Guard. Captain Eddie Anderson, Group PAO, is the project officer for this effort.

A few months ago, this office placed stories in several national and worldwide publications, asking for help from anyone who might know where we could find a "Jug". Most important, of course, was to locate one that we would be able to obtain, preferably for nothing.

Well, the response was quite unexpected. We now have leads on Jugs everywhere from an air field in Turkey to the Air Forces of several Latin American countries.

Soldiers in Thailand and South Vietnam wrote to tell us where they had seen Jugs, Retired military personnel wrote about Jugs they had known of ten or more years ago. One individual told us about a P-47 he knows is still lying in about 50 feet of water just off an island in the South Pacific where it crashed 28 years ago!

By far the most mentioned plane was one which stands outside the American Legion building in the little town of Manchester, New York. To date, we have nearly 25 letters telling us about that old relic, and all of the letters seem to think the owners, the Legion Post, would part with the plane to someone who'll give it a good home.

Captain Anderson visited New York last month, and he's now working on obtaining that P-47, serial number 489425, for our museum. We'll keep you posted on the progress.
