## FISCAL YEAR 1970 BUDGET CUTS

In accordance with DOD directives, the ANG is required to identify program reductions equating
to \$16 million in the Operation
and Maintenance Appropriation and
\$6 million in the Personnel area.

In general terms, the following program reductions will be in itiated(with brief comment follow ing on how the cut might affect HANG):

a. Flying hour program reduced 5%. Probably won't affect HANG due to the nature of our mission.

b. Air technician program will be reduced by 397 man-years and 3. 2 end strength positions. Affect HANG some but not too much as attrition will take care of most of this.

c. Major Repair and Minor Con struction program reduced by \$300 000. Likely won't affect HANG

greatly.

d. Approximately 10% of total BA in supply and equipment are as will be withdrawn. Probably will be felt in HANG most of all cuts. You are urged to start cutting use of expendable items wherever possible, from paper clips to pen cils. This is where each member can contribute.

e. Depot maintenance reduced by \$5.5 million. Again, due to our specialized mission probably ill not affect us too much.

f. BMT program reduced 3800 spaces. Will definitely be felt.

g. School training program reduced 8%. Will also be feltbut not too significant.

h. Special training man-days reduced by 18%. Not too significant.

## 23RD LEAD GOES DOWN IN FLAME'S

### HANG ADDS NEW SQUADRON

Effective yesterday HANG had a new squadron--the 154th Civil En-

gineering Flight.

The 154th CEF was formerly the Facilities Flight and a part of 154th Combat Support Squadron, under LtCol Herbert Isonaga. It is now commanded by 1st Lt. Hiram Pang, who of course has been the flight commander all along.

Yesterday morning Pang's boys underwent a federal recognition inspection conducted by LtCol Griffin, IG, Maj Cooper, records, and MSgt Evans, who assisted Griffin. Griffin and his staff were very impressed and will recommend federal recognition for the unit.

"This enables us to have much more freedom in operation," says Pang. "We now have only to coordinate with the Group Commander, Base Engineers and squadron com-

manders.

"Also it will enable us to expand and operate with our own UMD instead of within CSS. We can now add a position when necessary without taking away from someone

else in the squadron."

Pang now has 23 in his flight but needs 36, which he expects to reach within three years. The mission of his unit is to provide maintenance and repair of all Group activities at Hickam and all FOBs.

# CLIMATOLOGICAL OUTLOOK

OCTOBER--is the first month of the winter season and is dominated by a semipermanent high pressure system some 1350 miles NE of the Hawaiian Islands. Cold fronts begin to show their presence and pass Oahu on the average of 0.9 times during this month. During the winter months to follow, trade winds will prevail 65-80% of the time compared to the 95% of summer. The average maximum temperature is 81 F and minimum is 67 F. The temperature extremes are 91 F maximum and 60 F. minimum. October experiences 16 days of precipitation which averages out to 4.0 inches

for the month. Maximum and minimum amounts have been 15.7" and 0. 5" respectively. The prevailing winds are from the NE at 5-10 knots from 0600-2000 hours becoming NW at 4 knots from 2100-0500 hours. Skies are partly cloudy during the morning, partly cloudy to cloudy in the afternoons, fair to partly cloudy in the evening, and fair at Showers become more common during the afternoon hours than at night with a few still occurring in the morning. Showers also occur any time of the day with a frontal passage. VFR flying weat-her occurs 99.4% of the time. Average altimeter setting is 30.03 in ches of mercury.

## AIR GUARD REURGANIZED

Modifications have been made in earlier announced plans for a reorganization of the Air National Guard.

Aircraft authorized tactical fighter squadrons will be reduced by one to 24 in January. This will also mean a small reduction in personnel strength and equipment for units affected.

Indiana's 181st Tactical Fighter Group which was scheduled to convert from F-84F aircraft to U-3s in July has instead retained its F-84Fs. Under the previous plan the 181st would have become a tactical air support group.

Texas' 149th Fighter Group, which would have received Indianas aircraft, will receive F-84Fs from other Air Guard resources.

Plans to assign 31 aircraft to Arizona's 162nd Combat Crew Training Squadron remain unchanged. The squadron will train F-100 pilots for all ANG units. First class is scheduled to enter school in January, with an eventual goal of 66 combat-ready pilots trained per year.
