These words should be prominently displayed on your telephone. But they are merely words until translated into action.

Alexander Graham Bell would be proud of how his invention has been put to use--both as a convenience and as one of the most important links of communication in the world today. He would be disturbed, however, that man uses the telephone to perpetrate malicious acts such as "crank" calls.

He would thrill to the fact that technology has advanced to the point that data and even photographic facsimiles can be transmitted over telephone lines.

But chances are he would not be too impressed with persons who give vital military information to enemies of the United States because they spoke without thinking.

According to PACAF officials who deal with transmission security, the two most common causes of security violations are failure to use a secured telephone circuit and just plain carelessness.

Many personnel fail to understand that casual references to classified subjects over an extended period of time can form a complete picture to anyone listening in on telephone circuits. There are secure telephone lines designed specifically for classified conversations and transmissions. These--and no others--are to be used to discuss classified material.

Phone circuits in PACAF are monitored around the clock. Open your mouth at the wrong time about the wrong subject and you are apt to receive a visit from higher authority seeking an explanation for your security violation. It could result in a court martial and even dishonorable discharge.

An Air Force Times release out of Denver reminds all AF personnel to carefully watch their paychecks to avoid overpayment.

Individuals can backstop their finance shops and avoid being hit with overpayment bills by careful ly watching their own pay, the AF Accounting & Finance Center says.

While accounting and finance offices are not supposed to make mistakes, they some times do, officials acknowledge. Since it's the serviceman who "pays" for the goof in the long run by refunding the overpayment, the center has named areas to be watched to avoid being overpaid.

Four areas are most frequently overpaid -- basic pay, subsistence allowance, basic allowance for quarters and accrued leave.

Not all of these apply regularly to Guardsmen but some do. It is also suggested that men keep track of casual payments to see if regular deductions are being made. If you receive a monthly earning statement, as we do, you are in the best position to check out your pay.

PUSITION UPGRADED

The position of National Guard Bureau Chief will be upgraded to Lt Gen if a bill of the House Armed Services Committee is passed. "By any yardstick," the Commi-

ttee argues, "the level of operations, duties and responsibilities of the position" has "too long been ignored" and "by way of contrast in military grade, the CON-ARC Commanders serving in threestar grade are responsible for a much smaller geographical area and far less number of troops and units."
