# REPORT ON SR 173

The six members of the Senate Committee on Military and Civil Defense recently signed a favorable report recommending adoption of Senate Resolution 173 requesting benefits for Hawaii National Guardsmen.

The resolution was amended to include such benefits for all members of reserve forces nationwide and copies of the resolution would be sent to the Governor, the Secretary of Defense of the United States, and the members of the Hawaii delegation to the United States Congress.

# 199TH FIS, CONT'D-C FLIGHT

Continuing with the series on the pilots of the 199th FIS, here are the boys who make up C Flight:

Maj. David Yueng Fah Lung, called Dave, or "Dyfl" for his initials, is a Kaimuki boy born Friday the 13th in October, 1933.

After graduating from Roosevelt in 1951, he went to Cal Poly where he majored in Electrical Engineering and Math. In '54 he went into the Air Force Aviation Cadet program and received his wings in '55.

Upgrading to the F-86D, he served two years at Yuma, Arizona, as assistant to the Liaison Officer of the 1750 Air Defense Squadron. Later he flew RT-33 reconnaissance support in Southeast Asia and was an instructor pilot(T-37) at Williams AFB in Arizona. After getting out and returning to Hawaii, he joined Hawaiian Airlines in 1965, HANG in 166.

Capt. Rexford F. Hitchcock was born in Honolulu and reared in Manoa. A 1954 Punahou grad, he went on to Oregon State U. and got his wings through the Cadet Program, spending time at Hondo and Green-ville before going on to Perrin and the F-86L. In '59 he returned to Hawaii and the Pad as an alert pro.

He flew the deuce in the Palace Alert program in SE Asia in '67, receiving an Air Medal. He and his wife Sally and Rex Jr., 6, and Puffie, 4, live in Kailua. His hobbies include water skiing, diving, and tap dancing at The Cove.

Capt George E. "Dusty" Kuroda has been a Kaimuki resident all his life but graduated from Farrington in 1953 followed by two years at the UH in engineering. He joined the Guard in '56 and went through the Cadet Program at Lackland Returning, he went to work for the FAA in their Honolulu Air Route Traffic Control Center. Resigning to go back for F-102 training, he spent two years as an Alert Pad pro. In '64 he joined Aloha Airlines and has remained with them since. An avid motorcyclist, sailor and volleyball player, his first love is skiing and he has traveled widely to pursue it. He has the distinction of having gone down the runway at Dillingham faster than any other man. in his XKE Jaguar.

Capt. Arnold "Hal" Schatz joined the Guard in 1968 after a hitch in the AF as a C-12h driver. He was born in North Dakota in June 1939 and describes his early years as those of a "regular old farmer." Hal graduated from ND State and got his commission through the ROTC program.

After pilot training at Webb and Vance Hal checked out in "Old Shakey" at Tinker AFB in Oklahoma. He was then assigned to the 50th ATS at Hickam till March of 1967, when he got out and went to work for Aloha Airlines.

Hal and his wife Joyce, also a North Dakota transplant, and their three children reside in Kailua. His interests include diving, deep sea fishing, and Hawaiian music.

Capt Daniel Quill Kumuhone Stone, Jr., called "Dan" was born in Honolulu in 1961. Oldest of three children, he attended St. Louis and graduated in 1959. Took electrical engineering at Cal Poly for two years, then worked for Haw'n Electric Stores Division until commissioned in HANG in Dec. '62. Returned in Dec. '64 after F-102 qualification and started flying with Hawaiian Airlines in March of 1965. Married in May of '66 to Paulette Lau, they have two child-
