REEMPLOYMENT RIGHTS

The National Guard Bureau reminds all guardsand Reservists that the selective service act of 1967 makes no distinction between individuals serving voluntarily or involuntarily. An employer may not withhold persission from an individual to take part in training, even if he participates voluntarily. Employers may not deny him his job after he completes training, if it is within prescribed time limits. Also, the employee cannot be penalized in anyway for his Guard or Reserve activity.

REORGANIZATION/RELOCATION OF HANG MOBILE COMMUNICATIONS UNITS

Headquarters USAF and the National Guard Bureau have approved, in principle, a proposal to reorganize the existing 201 MCS and four separate flights into a mobile communications group with the addition of a mobile communications group headquarters of approximately 43 military positions. In addition, approval has been received to plan the relocation of four of the five units currently located at Hickam AFB, Oahu, to three of our neighbor islands.

PURPOSE FOR RELOCATION. To provide a more realistic training environment whereby equipment can be operated under more realistic conditions, to eliminate the overcrowded conditions at Hickam AFB where the five mobile communications units are sharing facilities, and to broaden the recruiting base for HANG mobile communications units to include the neighbor islands. In addition, the reorganization and relocation of units to separate geographical locations is anticipated to result in an increase of approximately 32 fulltime positions and should contribute significantly to the economic growth of our neighbor islands through annual payrolls of drill status and fulltime technicians, expenditure of federal funds for goods and services, and the opportunity for our young people on the neighbor islands to receive vocational training at USAF training centers in a myriad of highly technical skill areas.

LOCATIONS.

1. Oahu. The new group headquarters (43 men) and the 202 MCF (123 men) will remain at the existing facility on Hickam AFB. A maximum of 20 fulltime positions is projected for these units (8 for Gp

Hq and 12 for the Flight).

2. Kauai. The 202 ATCF (59 men) will relocate to PMRF Barking Sands, Kauai. A \$200,000 facility will be constructed during FY 76. In the interim, the Kekaha Armory, presently occupied by the Administrative section of the 150th ACW Sq, will be utilized. A maximum of ten fulltime positions is projected for this unit. Relocation actions are planned to begin in late FY 4/76.

3. Maui. The 201 MCF (123 men) will be relocated to Kahului, Maui. An \$800,000 facility will be constructed during FY // Interim facilities have not been located to date and efforts are continuing. A maximum of 11 fulltime positions is projected for this unit. Relocation actions must be deferred until interim facilities can located, but should begin by FY 1/76.

4. Kona, Hawaii. The 201 ATCF (59 men) will be constructed during FY 76. Interim facilities have not been located to date and efforts are continuing. A maximum of ten fulltime positions is projected for this uni Relocation actions must be deferred until interim facilities can be located, but

should begin by FY 1/76.

5. Hite, Hawaii. The 201 MCS (183 men) will relocate to Keaukaha Military Camp (presently occupied by HARNG) which is located adjacent to General Lyman Field. A \$1,000,000 facility will be constructed during FY 77. In the interim, existing facilities on Keaukaha Military Camp will be utilized. A maximum of 200 fulltime positions is projected for this unit. Relocation actions are planned to begin in

late FY 4/76.

Oahu-based drill status personnel assigned to units designated for relocation to neighbor islands will perform UTAs at Hickam AFB. Within economic and airlift support capabilities, these personnel will be scheduled to perform training with their assigned units on a quarterly basis and during annual field training. It is project that attrition of Oahu-based personnel and recruiting efforts on the neighbor islands over the next four to six years will result in neighbor island units being fully supported by local personnel.

\$AVE - TIME\$

In April, 1975 Army Times and Air Force will publish a special advertising supplement announcing a worldwide sale for certain items in Army and Air Force exchanges. The sale will be in effect throughout the month of April. The promotion is titled \$AV-TIME and all exchanges will identify the participating products with a \$AV-TIME\$ logo and show the actual discounted price, which will be 20% to 26% less than the regular low exchange price. On May 1, 1975 - the cost of items reverts to their original prices.

AVAILABILITY OF QUARTERS

All single Hawaii Air National Guard members on active duty training at Hickam AFB between 1 April 75 and 30 April 75 will not receive BAQ due to availability of government quarters. ALMOST 400,000 GUARDSMEN CALLED FOR CIVIL DUTY DURING TENSE 10 YEARS

WASHINGTON, D.C. (NGAUS) --State callups of about 17,800 National Guardsmen during 1974 brought the total number of Guardsmen on duty for civil disturbances during the past 10 years to almost 400,000 people, according to statistics released recently from the Pentagon.

The call-ups to help State law enforcement authorities maintain law and order in 1974 placed the highest number of Guardsmen on duty for that purpose since 1970 during the last of the street and campus riots that plagued the nation during the late 1960s.

Another 18,400 Guardsmen were called on 171 separate occasions in 1974 to cope with natural disasters, such as floods and storms, and other

emergencies in communities across the nation. It was the highest number of disaster episodes in recent years, but 11,000 fewer Guardsmen were needed in the 1974 call-ups than the all-time high of 30,559 called to duty in 1973.

The largest single call-up involved 2,450 Puerto Rico National Guardsmen during the 16-day city employee strikes that paralyzed the Carribean island. Another 17 of the 21 civil disturbance call-ups were for strike duty, elever for truckers' strikes early in 1974. Guardsmen called up for strikes totaled 17,244.
