FACT SHEET

The National Guard Association, the Air Force Association, the Association of the U.S. Army, the Marine Corps Officers Reserve Association, the Navy League, the Naval Reserve Association, and the Reserve Officers Association have combined forces to develop and strongly support a Guard and Reserve recruiting and retention package for early consideration by the Congress. The package is composed of two parts, one part being a draft bill to provide educational assistance to non-prior service personnel, and the other part to provide re-enlistment bonuses for prior service personnel.

The criticality of the current Guard and Reserve strength situation makes it essential that effective action be taken immediately to find solutions to that problem. The Army National Guard strength dropped about 30,000 men in 1975 and 1976. The Air National Guard dropped about 2,000 in that same period.

The Selective Re-enlistment Bonus Bill

The Selective Re-enlistment Bonus Bill is designed to pay a bonus to Guardsmen and Reservists (or former active members) with a designated skill who re-enlist in designated units. The selectivity of the bonus program is determined by the designation of skills and units in which bonuses will be paid. The selective bonus provides for \$300 per year total payment to personnel with less than 12 years service. Payment will be front loaded, one-half upon enlistment and the balance in yearly installments. The three year enlistee would get \$450 on re-enlistment and \$150 a year for three years afterward, for a total of \$900. The six-year re-enlistee would get \$900 down and \$150 per year for the following six years, for a total of \$1800. Guard and Reserve personnel would have to re-enlist during the final 90 days of service on their current enlistment. The former regular, whose active service and training may make him a desirable accession, would be allowed to enlist for a bonus in a Reserve Component at any time during the six months following his honorable discharge from active duty.

The Educational Assistance Bill

While trying to stem the flow of qualified personnel from units with a selective re-enlistment bonus, the Associations also proposed an incentive which would attract desirable young men and women without prior service to enlist in the Guard and Reserve. The Association proposal for educational assistance would provide Federal payment of up to one-half of the costs of tuition, books and fees (not to exceed \$500 per year or \$2,000 for a full four year baccalaureate degree or its equivalent).

The educational assistance is not only available to college students, but would also apply to those who wanted to enter technical or vocational schools. Requirements for entry into the program are applicable to non-prior service entrants only and high school graduates (or those within 180 days of graduation).

Enlistees must apply for the program at the time they enlist in a Selected Reserve unit, and must agree to automatically extend their enlistment two more years, for a total of eight years. It is open only to those who enlist after the first day of the month following the date that the bill is accepted for consideration in the Congress.


NEW CHALLENGES AHEAD FOR FIRST FEMALE IN HANG'S 154th CAM SQUADRON ENGINE SHOP
