COURTESY AND DISCIPLINE

Correct and willing observances of military customs and courtesies denotes a person who has pride in himself or herself, his job, her job and the Air National Guard: on the interest of discipline, esprit de corps, and mission accomplishment, we at the 154TFG must settle for nothing less.

Some general rules are as follows:

The Salute - The act of recognition extended to a comrade in the profession of arms. Salutes are exchanged between officers and between officers and airmen when passing within a distance in which mutual recognition is easy, usually not exceeding 30 paces. A head-on meeting is not necessary. To avoid a salute by turning the back or head is a gross breach of courtesy. Juniors (including airmen) seated out-of-doors but not under cover will rise and render the appropriate salute upon recognition of a senior (officer). Outdoors, when a group of juniors are casually gathered but not under cover, the first to recognize an approaching senior calls the group to attention and all salute. If a conversation takes place, salutes are also exchanged upon departure. Occupants of cars bearing star plates are always saluted. Salutes will be rendered when appropriate whether on or off base.

Indoors, conduct must be governed by the circumstances. Normally, when a commander, general officer, or inspecting party enters a work area, the first individual to notice them calls all military personnel in the area to attention. The senior visiting officer will then give the order "As you were" or "Carry on." The individuals then return to their work. If an officer approaches a junior to talk with him, the junior normally rises and comes to attention. However, in places of public business or when officers frequent the area and work would be unduly interrupted, the practice of calling the military personnel to attention is usually dispensed with. Similarly, where a junior works at a desk and has frequent contacts with seniors at his work area, the practice of standing when approached and spoken to is usually dispensed with except for very senior officers.

When two or more personnel are walking together, the senior walks on the right.

WHY WE HAVE AN AIR FORCE

Gen. F. Michael Rogers, Commander, Air Force Logistics Command, said recently in an address to a meeting of the American Defense Preparedness Association in Washington, D.C.: "As our bicentenary year draws to a close, let me remind you why we have an Air Force. Before there was a United States of America -- on the sixth of July, in 1775 -- the Continental Congress adopted the 'Declaration of the Causes and Necessity of Taking up Arms.' That document gave birth to the progenitor of today's Department of Defense. I should like to read a portion of it: 'In our own native land, in defense of the freedom that is our birthright...for the protection of our property acquired solely by the honest industry of our forefathers and ourselves, against violence actually offered, we have taken up arms. We shall lay them down when hostilities shall cease on the part of the aggressors, and all danger of their being renewed shall be removed, and not before....'"

"Ladies and gentlemen, 'all danger' has not been removed."

'STRECHED' C-141 ROLLED OUT

A "stretched" C-141 Starlifter aircraft has been rolled out at the Lockheed-Georgia plant near Dobbins AFB, Ga. The prototype is 23 1/3 feet longer than the standard C-141, has increased cargo capacity, can refuel in the air and has improved wing lift and drag characteristics. The expansion provides an additional 253 square feet of cargo floor space and increases the standard C-141 payload by more than 13,000 pounds. The refueling receptacle is compatible with the Air Force's KC-135 tanker and can accept approximately 900 gallons of fuel per minute.

CALL THEM CHIEF

Effective last year and in accordance with AFR 39-6, Chapter 4, E-9s in the Air Force will be addressed as Chief Master Sergeant or Chief. They will no longer be referred to as Sergeant or by that time honored expression, "Sarge." Even among some of our Chief Master Sergeants there are mixed feelings about the new form of address; however, it is official and will be used by everyone. With a little effort there should be no problem since it seems almost natural to call a CMSgt "Chief."

Homebuying Made Easy

As a National Guardsperson you may qualify for a low downpayment Veterans FHA Loan.

Guardsmen/women who have performed 90 days of continuous active duty, including active duty for training qualify. (Basic training and advanced individual training are creditable.)

The Veterans FHA Loan in comparison to the regular FHA Loan offers a lower down payment. The loan can be 100% of the first \$25,000 of the appraised value (the Guardsperson must make a minimum payment of \$200 to cover prepaid items), 90% on the next \$10,000 of appraised value and 85% on the remaining balance up to \$45,000.

When making application for a home loan your drill pay and annual training pay should be listed as additional income. In many instances, Guard pay has made the difference when an applicant might not otherwise have qualified financially.
