To My Feathered Friends

For you and I, flying is exciting, stimulating and extraordinary. It has an unsurpassed allure and unequaled exhilaration. Every time we take to the air we are operating in an alien environment. We are by nature risk takers. It's just part of the allure and excitement. And in all it's fun it can also be devastatingly cruel to the point of being fatal when performed without discipline and control. The bottom line for each of us who wears the aviator's badge is that we determine our own survival. In my analysis, survival in this business means mature judgement. The idea is based on the assumption that flying is a rational business which is done by people that have a strong desire to survive.

Mature judgement is developed by an individual's disciplined intergration of the following factors: training, supervision, skill, intelligence and experience. When the intergration process breaks down our accident potential intensifies. If the process deteriorates far enough, control is lost and an accident will usually result. The intergration process is obviously a continuing one. Discipline is the cement of the process. Discipline is also the knowledge of our own limitations and the strength to operate within the parameters of our limitations. If the intergration process operates effectively our capability parameters increase, or putting it in another way, we gain more combat capability.

1979 has shown that you have it. Your accomplishments were exceptional. You trained to fight-and won.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS EDUCATION PROGRAM

General Knowledge - Part I

DID YOU KNOW

- 1) The purpose of the USAF Disaster Prepare ness Program is to maintain the Unit's capabilities in providing protection and restoration of mission capabilities, and also to fulfill the humanitarian disaste relief responsibilities of commanders?
- 2) The guidance for Disaster Preparedness actions in the event of an enemy attack, major accidents, or natural disasters is provided in Base OPlan 355-1?
- 3) A 3-5 minute wavering tone on the siren means to take immediate cover, then proceed to the nearest available shelter?
- 4) One of the actions to take upon hearing a 3-5 minute steady tone on the siren is to tune-in to a radio or TV and listen for important emergency announcements?
- 5) If you are away from base and a general war occurs, you are required to report back to your unit or nearest installa tion of the same branch of service, if possible?
- 6) A YELLOW smoke indicates that weapons ar engulfed in flames during a major accident exercise?
- A WHITE smoke indicates simulated fires to mark the accident site or simulated fires during an attack response exercise
- 8) Individuals and supervisors are responsible for evacuating from an accident site?

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
Still "hanging in there"...

HE WHO PLAYS WITH FIRE JUST MAY GET BURNT--HANDLE WITH CARE!


Two men died from accidents involving plastic butane lighters, officials at the Air Force Inspection and Safety Center reported.

The two civilians, not employed by the Air Force, were working flammable materials at the time. In one instance a welder was killed instantly when a slag spark that fell into his shirt pocket burned through a plastic butane lighter and caused it to explode.

In the other instance, flammable material burned through the victim's pants pocket causing the lighter to explode. The man's leg was amputated, but he died three days later.

"Many Air Force people on and off duty are exposed to similar situations," a safety official said. "Whatever you're doing, whether it's in the home or anywhere, if you get near a heat source, or flame, you may have a bomb in your pocket," he said.

A mechanic with a small cut on his finger washed some parts in cleaning fluid. Then, holding the parts in his hand, he blew ther dry with an air hose. Shortly thereafter, great pain, he staggered to his boss, complaining that his body and head felt as if they were going to explode.

At the hospital, his ailment was diagnose as air bubbles in the blood-stream caused the air-jet striking the wound. He recover but he could have been a fatality.

Compressed air is no joke. It is a necessary tool in our everyday work. However, we must realize that it can be dangerous, ever fatal. It is a known fact that a blast of air at 40 psi can rupture an ear drum at a distance of 4 inches. Worse, it can cause fatal brain hemorrhage. Use of compressed air to blow dust or dirt from body or clothing is dangerous.

The National Guard is looking for qualified atheletes to compete in a NATO Military skills competition. The CIOR competition includes a running and swimming obstacle course; rifle, pistol and submachinegun marksmanship; and orienteering. The U.S. will send a 24-man competitive delegation (Off & EM) to the CIOR congress to compete against Reserve teams from 12 of the 15 NATO Nations.


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TO USE:

Calculate miles per gallon between fillups. Start with a full tank and record mileage. At time of next fillup, record gallons used and miles driven since the previous fillup.

Using any straight edge, line up the gallons used (left scale) with the miles driven (center scale) to figure the miles per gallon obtained (right scale).

Example (dotted line) shows 10 gallons were used to drive 140 miles, or 14 miles per gallon.

iran, much in the unknown to most mem-bers of the Armed Forces. Since it is in the news, the following background information on the country and its religion is presented for our readers.



Islam, the world's second largest faith, with over 750 million adherents, is a universal, not an ethnic or Arab, faith.

Islam is more than just a religion.

It is an all-encompassing way of life.
The two major branches of the Islam faith are the Sunni and the Shiite, a division which dates from shortly after the death of Muhammad, the religion's founder, in 632 A.D.

Shiite, the smaller branch, holds that a spiritual leader is required to guide the faithful. These leaders are called imams and are considered to be the successors of Muhammad. The first Imam was Ali, son-in-law of Muhammad

Sunni, the larger branch (90 percent of all Moslems), consider themselves to be the orthodox branch and reject the claim of All's line. They believe that the "community of the faithful is the guardian and the guarantor" of the sacred law grounded in the will of God as given in the Koran, Islam's holy book.

Both branches have religious leaders whom they consider to be teachers and leaders of prayer rather than ordained clergy in the Western sense. Leadership within this "clergy" is obtained by virtue of one's learning and ability to develop a following. Since separation of church and state is not a recognized principle, these religious leaders are important to the politics of Muslim countries.

Within the Shiite branch, a Mullah is a religious leader. A group of select mullahs is gathered together as a Mujtahid which has legal jurisdiction under the Sharia, Muslim law.

The most learned and revered individual in each Mujtahid group is given the title Ayatollah.

In general, Muslim spiritual duties are outlined in the "Five Pillars of Faith" namely-

- confession of the faith daily,
- prayer made five times daily while facing Mecca,
- charitable giving.
- · fasting during the daylight hours of the Islamic holy month of Ramadan, and
- · making the hail or pilgrimage to Mecca at least once during the person's lifetime



Economy: At one time Iran was the 4th largest exporter of petroleum in the world. Production has fallen dramatically since the revolution. In November 1979 President Jimmy Carter banned direct purchase by the U.S. of any Iranian oil after the takeover of the American Embassy by Iranian students, in which 62 Americans working there were taken hostage.



Facts And Figures

Geography: Area of 636,000 square miles, slightly larger than Alaska. Capital is Tehran with a population of 4.7 million. Qom, present headquarters for Ayatollah Khomeni, is one of the nation's centers of Islamic traditionalism

Government: In January 1979 Shah Mohammad Pahlavi was forced to flee the country. It is now ruled by committees under the Ayaltollah Khomeni, a religious leader who had been exiled for nearly 20 years.

People: Estimated 37 million population. Over 90 percent are members of the Shi'a sect of Islam; 5 percent belong to the Sunni sect.
