RECALL

...generally good

HANG Reg 45-19 states in part...

"Upon declaration 'to mobilize' all HANG personnel will report to assigned duty stations as soon as practicable...HANG's reporting strength standard for H + 2 hours is established at 55% of the unit's authorized strength."

Yesterday morning at 0430 Colonel Lee got the call "to mobilize". That started the long and complicated chain of events that go into a recall. More calls were made rousing sleepers from their dreams. Recall books came out of desks and Hawaiian Tel saw more lines in use than usual for a quiet Saturday morning.

Showers were turned on to wash the weariness away, closets were opened and fresh uniforms quickly taken out and donned. A run to the car, itself resting in the early morning darkness. Then a drive, quicker than usual, a slight curse at the seeming snail's pace of 25 mph. Park and sign in!

Had there been a war, we would have been there to do our jobs.

The first to make the 55% manning requirement was the 169th ACW at 0550. Then came the 169th at 0611. The first Hickam based group to make it was the 154 CAMRON at 0615.

Within the two hour time limit 72.9% of us were on station.

For comparison purposes, our last recall

on April 7, 1979 generated an 83.4% attendance within two hours. It doesn't take a math major to see a drop of almost 11% this year.

Col Lee generally was pleased with the results of the recall, but commented, "There are problem areas to be worked on, especially in Ops, but we might as well find out about them now."

Inspectors from HANG HQ were on hand to monitor the recall and will of course report their findings

A more detailed report on all phases of the recall, not just personnel, should be available next month.

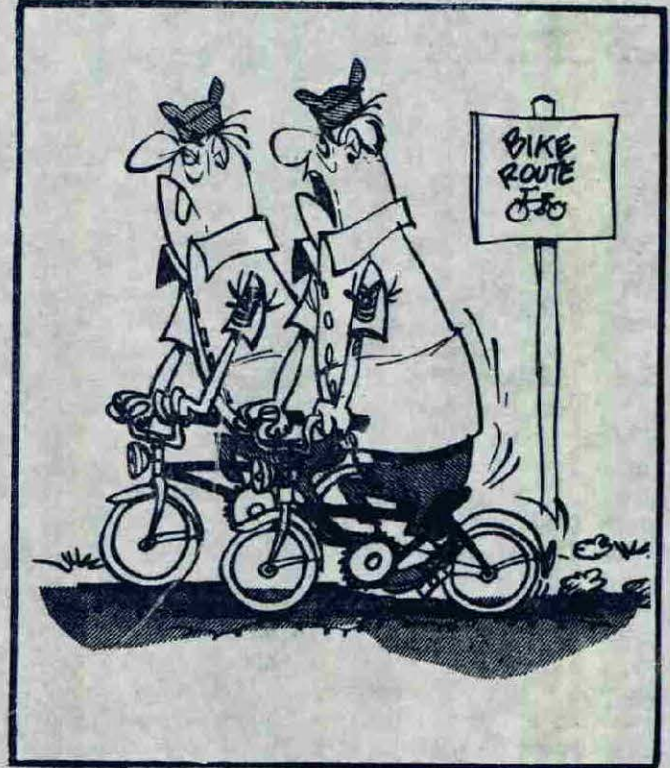

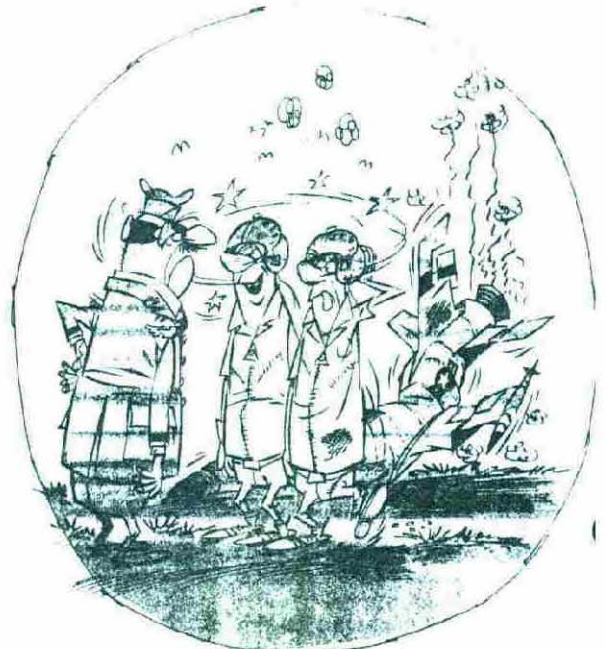

SALT II And American Security

One of the questions most frequently asked about the SALT II process is, how can Americans be sure that the Russians will live up to the agreement?

In SALT we do not rely on trust or Soviet good faith.

The 1972 SALT I agreements established the principle that both nations would use their diverse and

strategic balance would be discovered in time to make a response which would offset any advantage the Soviets could hope to derive from such an action.

The SALT I agreements prohibited an interference

key element. SALT II will contain detailed provisions to increase our confidence that we can determine whether the Soviets are, in fact, complying with the agreement. Precise definitions and counting rules have been incorporated. One counting rule, for example, stipulates that any missile of a type ever tested with MIRVs must be counted as a MIRVed missile, whether it actually carries MIRVs or just one warhead.

The SALT I agreements also provided for the establishment of a joint Standing Consultative Commission, a forum in which the United States and the U.S.S.R. address questions about matters relating to implementation of the agreements, including questions of compliance.

sophisticated intelligence capabilities—known as "National Technical Means"—to monitor compliance.

National Technical Means of verification, such as satellite photography, are very effective.

Through them we are able to monitor the number of strategic nuclear delivery systems the Soviets have, their basic characteristics, and when, where, and how they are tested.

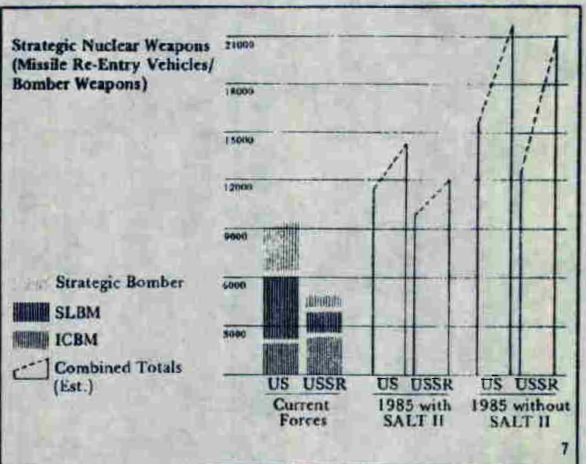
We are confident that any cheating on a scale large enough to pose a military risk or affect the

with National Technical Means of verification and any deliberate concealment measures which could impede verification of compliance with the provisions of those agreements.

SALT II will keep these prohibitions in force.

It should be noted that without a SALT agreement containing such prohibitions, the Soviets would be free to use any and all methods of concealment, making our overall monitoring task far more difficult.

SALT II has been negotiated with verifiability as a
