Farewell

It is indeed with saddened hearts that we mourn the death of Major John I. Oshiro, Comptroller, Hawaii Air National Guard. Major Oshiro passed away on June 10, 1981 at the Kuakini Medical Center. A gentleman, an officer, a former enlisted man and friend; we shall all miss the dedication and determination that Major Oshiro displayed.

Major Oshiro, born on September 30, 1934 attended Farrington High School, graduating in 1952 and then entered the University of Hawaii as an undergraduate in the College of Business Administration. He was also a member of the AFROTC program for two years while attending the University of Hawaii. In this same year, he joined the Hawaii Air National Guard at Ft. Kam being assigned as an AC&W operator. In 1956 he became an Air Technician with the Alert Augmentation Detachment providing dawn to dusk, and later 24-hour, radar surveillance at the Punamano Air Station, Oahu. While working for the 109th AC&W Sq. as an air technician, he completed his last two years at the University of Hawaii, receiving a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in January of 1958. In 1961 he was reassigned to Kokee AFS, Kauai, as an intercept control technician. Later that same year he received an appointment as a Reserve Officer of the Air Force and the Hawaii Air National Guard. His career as an officer began and flourished with the professionalism for which Major Oshiro came to be known.

After an 8 year tour on Kauai, he returned to Hickam AFB and the 154th Fighter Group in 1969 to become the Equipment Management Officer, later becoming the Management and Procedures Officer. On February 23, 1972 he was awarded the Hawaii National Guard Commendation Medal for Meritorious and Outstanding service to the Hawaii National Guard. On August 23, 1973, then Captain Oshiro, was promoted to Major. Three years later in 1976 he assumed the position of Comptroller for the Hawaii Air National Guard until his passing.

Memorial services were held on June 14, 1981. Maj. Melvin Asai coordinated the pallbearers, made up of members from the Comptroller's Office. Lt. Col. Robert Konishi gave the eulogy.

We all share in the loss of Major John Oshiro and to his family we extend our deepest sympathies.

Air Force phone bill rises

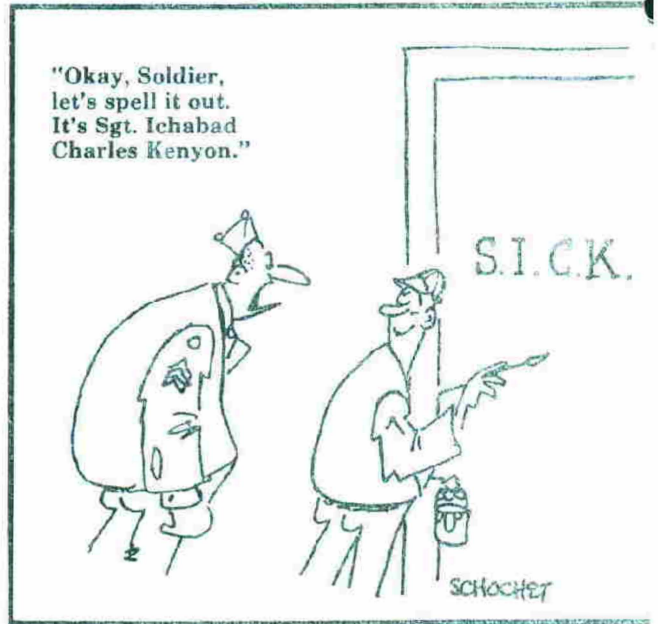
SCOTT AFB, Ill. (AFNS) -- Air Force telephone bills are expected to increase dramatically, as a result of new rates for long-haul circuits.

On May 7, American Telephone and Telegraph terminated the special low rates it charged large customers, Air Force Communications Command officials announced.

The special rates, called TELPAK, applied to AT&T's leased long-haul circuits. The Air Force used these circuits in command and control systems, as well as Autovon and Autodin. The costs to Air Force for the circuits will increase about \$25 million annually because of the loss of TELPAK. Similar increases will also affect other Department of Defense and federal agencies.

Loss of TELPAK comes at a bad time for the Air Force, say officials, because other rate increases are also taking effect. The Federal Communications Commission allowed AT&T to increase the rates on all interstate private-line services, including most Air Force circuits, by 6 percent effective May 14. And the FCC is considering a request for an additional 16 percent, across-the-board increase in July.

The Air Force is working with the Defense Communications Agency to find ways to reduce the impact of rate increases; but it is clear, say officials, that the Air Force telephone bill is going up sharply.

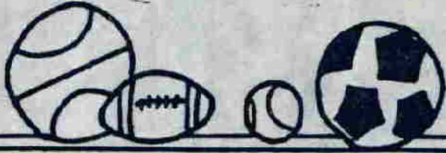

Declaration of Independence

Momentous News Protected

Although Thomas Jefferson's final draft of the Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776, the Congressional delegates did not put their signatures on the final version of the Declaration until August 2 and later.

At noon on July 8, 1776, after copies were printed, the Declaration was first read in public. Only a small crowd of Philadelphians gathered. That night, however, the document was read again to a much larger group as bells pealed and bonfires lit Center Square.

The celebrations gradually spread throughout the colonies as post riders, coach packets, and coastal vessels carried the momentous news. It took more than a month for the word to reach many cities and hamlets.

In New York, an express rider delivered copies to General George Washington on July 9, at six that evening some 15,000 troops lined up in hollow-square formation to hear the announcement in sight of the enemy fleet.

Charleston, S.C., recovering from a British assault by sea, staged a grand independence day on August 5. Savannah, Ga., southernmost town of the original 13 States, took the news with mixed solemnity and joy.

The Declaration's words signalled perilous times, and the document itself led a precarious life. Throughout the Revolutionary War and during the War of 1812, it

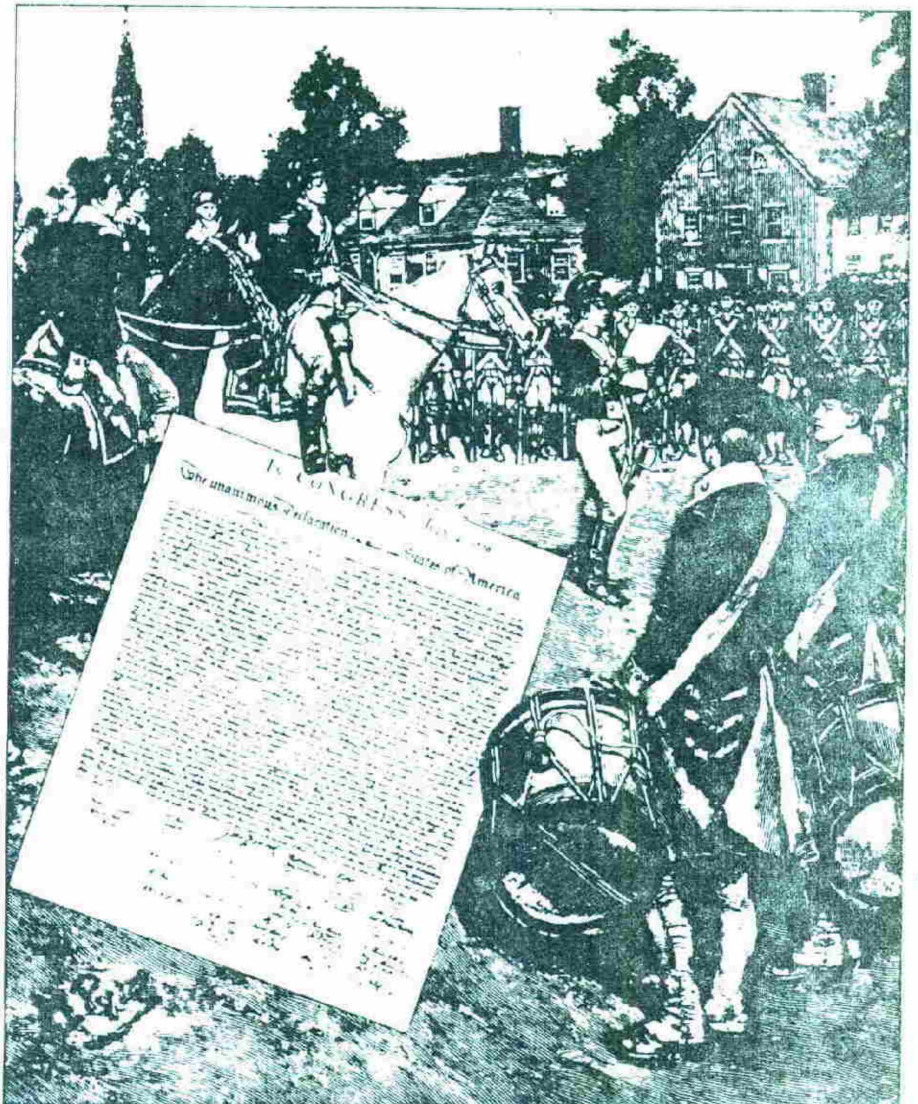
was secreted away to various hiding places.

But the Nation's birth certificate apparently suffered less in war than in peace. Much of the loss of ink from the original document is blamed on a project to duplicate it by an engraving process in the early 1820s.

Today, safe from further deterioration, the Declaration of Independence is on view in

a special case in the Exhibition Hall at the National Archives in Washington, D.C., along with the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

Closely guarded through the day, the documents normally disappear each evening at the flick of a switch, to be shielded by tons of steel and thick walls in an unseen vault below the building.

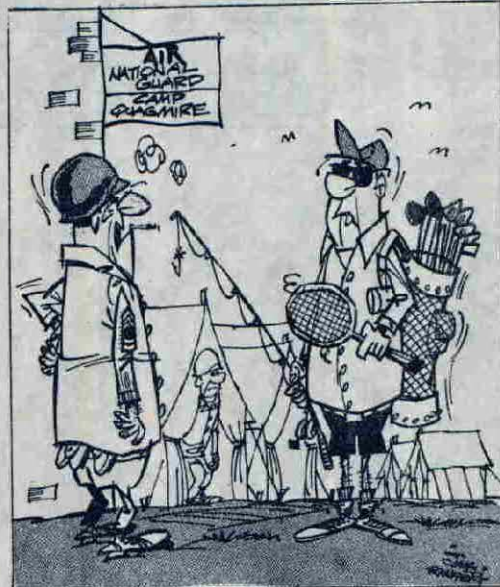

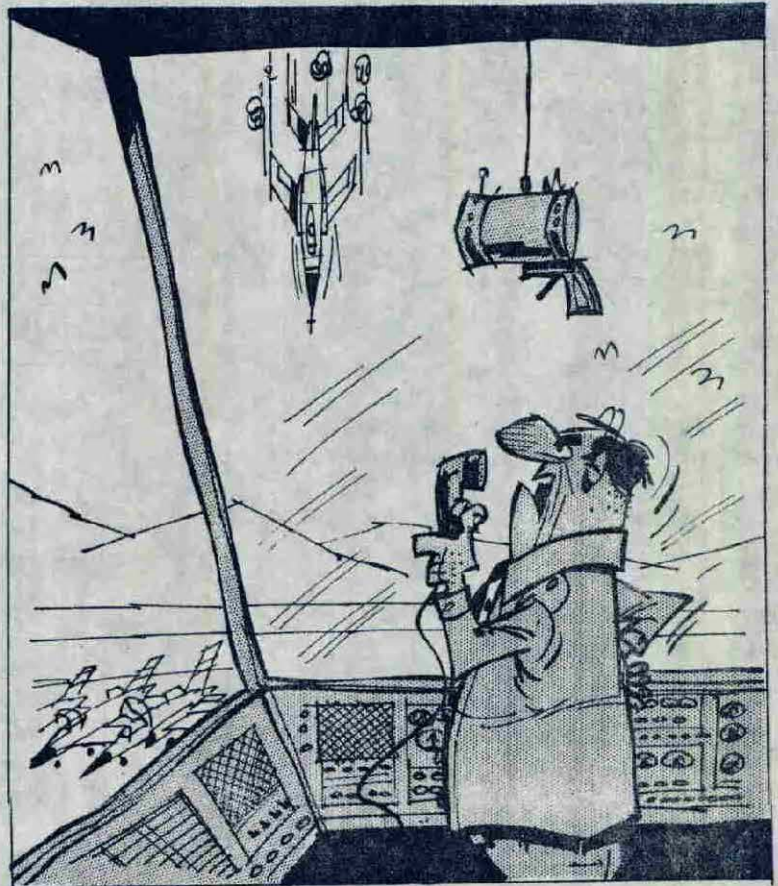

Air Force develops chemical agent detectors

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AFB, Ohio (AFNS) -- All-weather chemical agent detectors for advance warning of airborne toxic chemicals are being developed, Aeronautical Systems Division Officials announced here.

Present systems are portable and detect chemical agents only in the immediate area. The new system would provide advance warning in any weather and have a 1-mile detection radius.

Capt. John Wert, program manager, said the Air Force wants systems that will use standard base power and which will be "fix-mounted" or installed in permanent positions.

ASD officials expect the new system to be in use by the mid-1980s.
