Exchange Opens Doors

The Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) has announced a change in guardsmen shopping privileges. Congress has recently authorized family members of reserve component personnel to shop in exchange facilities when not accompanied by the reservist. Identification is required to gain entry to the exchange, such as a driver's license or solial security card, along with the sponsor's current leave and earnings statement.

A letter of authorization is required in lieu of the leave and earnings statement for those reservists performing inactive duty training for points rather than pay.

Those guardsmen who have a family member shop should remember that this will reduce their shopping entitlement by one day for each such visit. This is just one more way in which Congress has teamed with AAFES and the National Guard to make shopping at the exchange easier for the total force. These new privileges also apply at the Navy exchange. The changes have been in effect since September 1.

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Jumping Jova

Tropical storm Jova (formerly hurricane Jova with 75 knot winds) turned towards Oahu Friday. The storm should only have 25 knot winds when it passes over us, but it is expected to carry heavy rainfall over the island. There is a possibility of flooding here at Hickam because of the rains. Other Air Force installations, especially Bellows AFS, can also expect to be affected by the storm. To insure everyone is prepared for the storm the Hickam Command Post sent out a weather advisory over the "TACNET" which is used to alert all host and tenant units of significant events. The advisory directed all units to review Annex D, Natural Disaster, to Hickam AFB OPLAN 355-1 as well as unit checklists in support of the plan.

Of all the locations manned by people assigned to the 154 COMPG the Hickam units are most vunerable to flooding. Kokee AFS, Mt Kaala and Wheeler AFB all have the advantage of their elevation to enhance runoff. At Hickam that natural protection doesn't exist. In fact, the 154 COMPG area is as near to the water as one can get without being in a boat! Two drainage canals run through the area. One is Diamond Head of the F-4 packing camp and the other immediately Ewa of Base Supply. With enough rain, especially near high tide, we could have a good bit of water in the area.

Now is a good time to look at your resposibilities during tropical storms or hurricanes. You have tasks to help protect Air Force resources and reduce possible damage or mission degradation. You also have the responsibility to insure your dependents are aware of the hazards involved with these storms and know what actions to take. Remember, even in our island paradise we are subject to disastrous storms. It is not a matter of "if" its just a matter of "when". Fortunately tropical storm Jova is not the "when" but its still a good time to brush up on natural disaster procedures.

News briefs

Low priced gas

"Gasoline will be two cents cheaper per gallon, but only cash or checks will be accepted," is the latest announcement by Headquarters Army and Air Force Exchange Service officials in Honolulu, concerning prices at the exchange operated service stations on military installations.

Sources stated that HQ AAFES opted to renegotiate contracts for unbranded gasoline, in order to bring the sell price down at the pump.

The last day for use of Shell credit cards in Hawaii Area Exchange service stations will be 29 September 1981. Officials added that only 21 percent of gasoling sales have been made with credit cards in the past.

Gi Bill benifits expire

Time is running out for some 900,00 veterans to use educational benefits of the GI Bill, now in its 37th year.

About one-fifth of 4.3 million eligible veterans will lose their eligibility for benefits this year, according to the Veterans Administration. The law permits a veteran to use the education benefits within 10 years following discharge from service, or by Dec. 31, 1989, whichever is earlier.

From June 22, 1944, when the first measure was signed by President Franklin Roosevelt, through June 30, 1981, 18 million veterans had received assistance under the GI Bill. About 35 percent of all trainees have been Vietnam Era veterans. This year the GI Bill will assist the education of more than 800,000 Vietnam Era veterans.

More than 7.8 million World War II veterans were trained under the original measure, about one-half of all those eligible. Another 2.4 million, or 43.4 percent of those eligible, studied under the Korean plan, and nearly 7.8 million Vietnam Era and post-Korea veterans have used the current program. Some 65 percent of eligible Vietnam Era veterans have received training.

A new program, which requires financial participation by service personnel, is available for those who entered the military after Dec. 31, 1976.

Veterans who need information on GI Bill eligibility should contact the nearest VA regional office.
