ORI/MEI Continues

The PACAF/IG yesterday initiated hase two of Exercise Beverly Bearcat, he Operational Readiness Inspection of the 326th Air Division and the 154th mposite Group. The Management Effectiveas Inspection of the 154th COMPG was also initiated yesterday.

Inspection liability dates for the 154th and the 150th AC&WS will be Dec. 4-5 and because additional time will be required to complete the exercise, the dates will also include Dec. 7-10 for the 154th and Dec. 7-8 for the 150th. Inspection dates for the 169th AC&WS will be Dec. 8-10. No inspection activity will be conducted tomorrow because of Inauguration Day.


The impact of Hurricane Iwa was especially devastating to our 150th AC&W site on Kauai sitting at the 4,200 ft. level with winds clocked at over 100 mph. With most of Kauai without power, communications and potable water, posthurricane measures by the National Guard did much to expedite and secure a rapid recovery for the island. Of particular importance to Kauai was the effort of our sister unit located across the street, the 201st Combat Communications unit, which set up a command post and meticulously implemented support to the Kauai Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Two of our several dedicated personnel who put in long hours at the EOC were Lt. Col. Ray Moriguchi, Commander of the 150th and his Operations Officer, Lt. Col. Owen Ota.

One particular side of the many problems we faced on Kauai involved establishing contact with the 150th site at Kokee which was isolated due to roadblocks from fallen trees and power lines. We sent our C-7 from Honolulu to Barking Sands, Kauai with C-rations, chain saws and other survival paraphernalia. The Army National Guard and Navy at Barking Sands assisted us by rotating our personnel into and out of the stranded site by helicopter utilizing the Kokee Lodge area (about a 40-minute walk from the site Extensive damage at our Kokee site resulted from the precarious positioning of the giant poles of our antenna farm. Our dormitory and Security

Police hutments lost their roof and communications were a shambles. Down at Barking Sands, all of our live-in hutments were demolished.

The 150th Security Police is still on duty in Nawiliwili, Kauai, augmenting the law enforcement division on that island to deter looting at the damaged sites. 201st personnel continue to service the emergency generators needed by the community to return to normalcy.

Here at Hickam, we were fortunate to have taken effective preventative measures to secure our aircraft and buildings. Although the winds were reported to be only 85 mph here at Hickam, we did lose one telephone pole with our scramble horn on it. Clean-up actions were well supervised and implemented, given our leadership by the Civil Engineering Flight...We are now ready to proceed with business and our scheduled ORI and MEI this weekend.

As of Jan. 1, 1983, the service coat (blazer style) and slacks will become a mandatory clothing item for enlisted women. The semibox style coat may still be worn until a phase-out date is announced.

The National Safety Council has issued a warning that tinted or reflective windows on all types of motor vehicles pose serious safety hazards. Hawaii law requires that tinting must allow a minimum 70% of light through. It has also been noted that all factory-tinted windows with additional tinting do not pass this requirement. Honolulu Police officials have stated that they will begin to crack down on enforcement of this law soon and no vehicles will be exempt - even if it means replacing the windows on your car.

In case you still have not gotten completely into the habit of wearing seat belts, you'd better get in the habit quick. The wearing of seatbelts is mandatory on all government installations in all vehicles. Failure to wear belts on base could reap a stiff penalty. For example:

First Offense: Suspension of driving privileges for seven days.

Second Offense: Suspension of driving privileges for 30 days.

Third Offense: Suspension of driving privileges for six months.

This goes for passengers as well as drivers. Seat belt use in Hawaii is estimated at only 11% and over 90 % of the motor vehicle fatalities involved the non-use of safety restraints. 154th COMPG Commander, Col. John S. W. Lee says he and his staff will be making spot checks to insure compliance.

The penalties are stiff...but the consequences of not wearing seat belts could be stiffer.

Clinic Schedule

This information sheet was produced to notify units of the clinic's schedule of medical services and of each individual's preparatory requirements before reporting to the clinic.

If an individual has any question(s) or problem(s), the individual should first call the clinic (449-2461/6934). Some situations can be resolved over the telephone.

If a unit or section is sending a group of people to the clinic at one time, a telephone call should be made before sending them to the clinic. Information to convey to the clinic is the number of people being sent, types of requirements to be accomplished, and the time they are expected to report.

Aircrew members are reminded of the 24 hours grounding requirement after receiving immunizations, except for Smallpox and Polio.

Special Purpose Citnical Test (Blood Test) Time: 0800 - 0900 Sunday UTA only.

Preparation: Call the clinic NLT one day before the test day.
Individual MUST fast (not eat or drink) for 12 hours before

Weight Control Frogram (WCF-overweight individuals only) Time: 0800 - 0830 Saturday

Preparation: MCP individuals need to call for an appointment if a medical evaluation is required.
