Colonel Mahrt will leave this month and will assume his new assignment responsibilities at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada. Needless to say Colonel Mahrt provided the needed guidance and leadership to the Composite Group to insure that our readiness was maintained at its most challenging level. We will miss a most dedicated and sincere friend of HANG.

PAY NOTES

AFR 36-93, Official Photographs, was revised in March 1982 and gives the officer the responsibility for his own photo. Photos are now required only upon promotion to the grades of 1st Lieutenant through Lieutenant Colonel, or when your MAJCOM, AFMPC or ARPC directs a new one. You may request a new photo whenever your current one is at least a year old, or any time that you are within one year of selection board. You can submit a commercially taken photo whenever you wish, but it must meet the standards of AFR 36-93. Review your picture carefully to ensure that it presents the image you want board members to receive. The photo can make a difference.
