



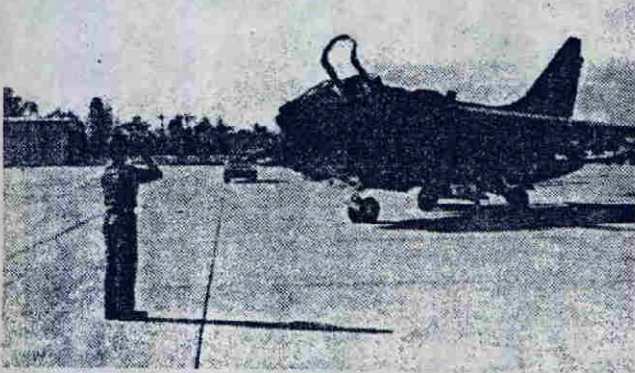

Today, we bid a fond aloha to the deployed 162 TFG forces from Tucson International Airport, Arizona. Over the past week, numerous air battles with the Arizona A-7's provided our aircrews training in dissimilar air combat tactics (DACT). The six deployed A-7's created a multi-bogey environment and maximized total forces field training. This year the total war also involved marine F-4's and Hickam T-33's.

The success of DACT can be attributed to the efforts of all those involved. Capt Ed Pickering, 199 TFS, provided the necessary leadership in meeting the primary objectives. All the guard forces, 150 AC&W, 169 AC&W, 154 CSS, CAMRON and FAA worked together and provided superior support.

played significant roles in directing and controlling the air war. FAA support facilitated take offs and landings and extended the usual Hawaiian hospitality to our visiting airmen. At Hickam, Lt Colonel Settsu insured proper coordination with 15 ABW for housing, feeding and protocol matters. Resources supported transportation needs supply coordination and refueling requirements. CAMRON assured the success of the visiting maintenance crews through their usual thorough and professional interface with the wrench-turning populace.

From the flying standpoint, the exercise provided the 199 TFS the opportunity to employ their aircraft in four ship tactics instead of the usual two ship training. It provided the aircrews with another look at how the "enemy" would fight us in the air. The camaraderie shared with the A-7 aircrews reinforced the sacred bond and trust held among "fighter jocks".

We now look with anticipation upon our upcoming deployment to Guam from 24 January to 2 February under the command of Colonel Ritchie Kunichika. Based upon pre-planning effort, this deployment should achieve our stated training goals.

## PADRE'S PATTER

Something I always thought to be true really is! I just finished a two day workshop for priests learning more about this dynamics of communication. A Jesuit Priest/Psychiatrist headed the team which led us through several hours of lecture, discussion, and role playing. Although several insights surfaced I will illustrate only one point.

Communication is difficult. Last semester I conducted a series of one day youth retreats at Damien in which we experienced this through exercises of speaking, reading and demonstration we learned how easy it is to hear, read, and observe what we expected, or more importantly, what we wanted.

Another way of putting this would be to point out that any leader, be he commander, NCOIC, foreman, parent, or teacher is translated in as many different ways as he has in his hearing (every preacher finds this each time he leaves the pulpit.)

Each person has his own expectations and needs the leader is presumed to be able and willing to deal with. Most of these expectations and needs are deeply rooted in the unconscious or subconscious. We may not be aware of them at all.

One person may resent a leader because his father was tyrannical toward him as a boy. Another person, however, may have the need for a leader who is strong, thereby providing certainty and security. A third person may see a leader as someone who always solves my problems for me, someone I can complain to who will make everything okay again. A politician might fit this need, or a person may feel a leader should intervene only if there is a crisis developing. Perhaps a police officer might fulfill this expectation

Whatever the expectations of the person, the leader is supposed to fulfill these differing needs of different people. Since they are often contradictory, no leader is able to please everyone. Therefore whenever we find ourselves leading we should take heart. Realize that often criticism is not aimed at us personally, but rises out of frustration of an unmet need or expectation on a level below the conscious.

We should not be too surprised or hurt then when unwarranted criticism comes our way when we truly are doing our best

On this day the first live intercept control of aircraft was accomplished utilizing the automated equipment at the HIROCC. Directly involved in this mission were Capt Jerry Bona - Weapons Director (Controller), MSgt Seiichi Tsutsui - Weapons Director Technician, LtCol Waichi Kikuta - Senior Director, and SMSgt Joseph Tibayan - HIROCC Core Cadre Adviser. Two T-33s from the 15ABW at Hickam AFB alternated as target and interceptor during the mission. This event signifies another step towards the final objective of bringing the HIROCC to fully operational status. The HIROCC is currently undergoing On Site Verification (OSV) to insure that the newly installed automated equipment is functioning properly. OSV involves numerous aircraft air defense evaluation missions, gathering of data, analyzing this data and many, many briefings and debriefings to resolve any problem areas.

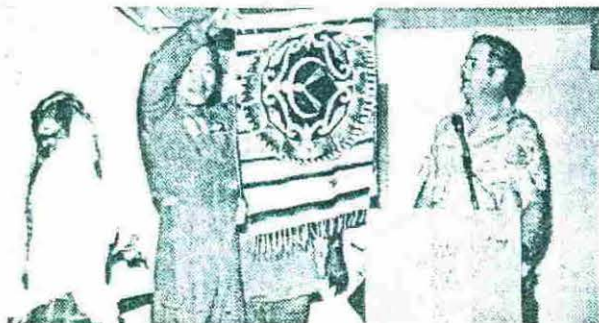


Flight Surgeons, Maj Barry Miller and Capt Wesley Young, ready for check-ups.

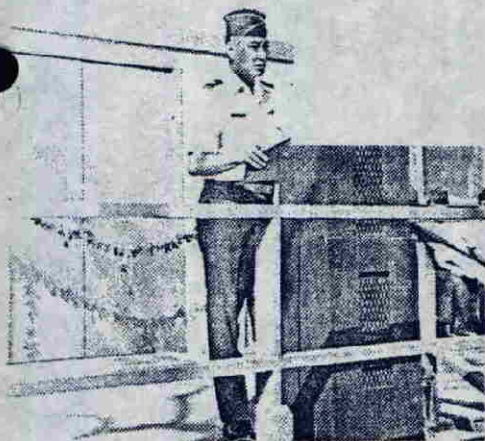

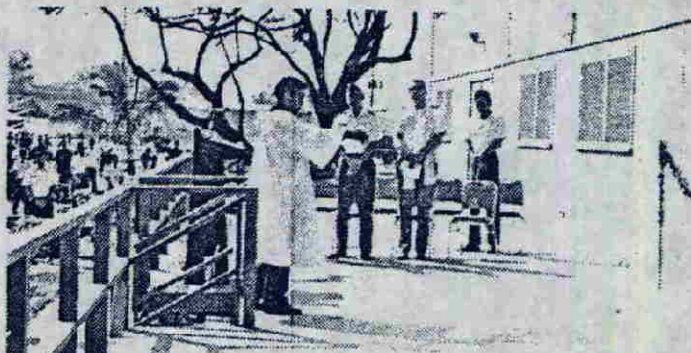

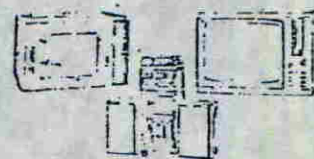
