154TH COMPOSITE GROUP RECEIVES 6 AWARDS AT NATIONAL GUARD ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE

To afford maximum national visibility to award recipients by their National Guard peers, the National Guard Association awards were presented at the Presidents' Recognition Awards luncheon held in Louisville, Kentucky. The 154 Composite Group was awarded the Distinguished Flying Unit plaque which recognizes five of the highest rated Air National Guard flying units after the Spatz trophy winner (142nd FIG, Oregon ANG). We were selected as one of the five winners based upon an overall combat readiness during the reporting year and our performance with respect to all other 91 Air Guard flying units. Specific factors considered in the evaluation included: flying safety, aircraft operational readiness, weapons firing, units alert, unit manning, skill level qualification, drill attendance, operational readiness inspections, outstanding accomplishments and special missions and exercises.

In addition to the Distinguished Flying Unit plaque, Colonel Lee accepted the Mission Support plaque authorized for the five highest rated Air National Guard non-flying units. The 169 ACW Squadron stationed at Wheeler AFB earned this award through their exceptional conversion progression from a manual to an automated radar facility as readily demonstrated during the ORI/MEI. The 169 ACW Squadron is commanded by Lt Colonel O'Day and represents one of the two ACW Squadrons in the Composite Group.

Besides these two awards, the 154 Composite Group received four safety awards:

- -National Safety Council Award of Honor
- -National Safety Council Noteworthy Awards:
 - 169th ACW Squadron
- * 150th ACW Squadron
 With the 201st units garnering five awards, the Hawaii Air National Guard dominated the awards recognition ceremony.

Commanders Corner

The 1985 National Guard Association conference theme was "Total Force: The Partnership That is Working." While the theme acknowledges the harmonious relationship between active and reserve units in a working environment, I would like to comment on a similar successful relationship between the HARNG and HANG personnel as evidenced during the Hawaii National Guard conference deployment to Louisville from 21 Sep - 27 Sep.

Working on conference resolution matters usually dominate the business sessions of the NGAUS conference; on this trip, the Hawaii contingent had prepared itself to win the 1991 conference hosting honors. Two other States, Maryland and Georgia were also trying for the same honor and stiff competition was anticipated. Hawaii last hosted the NGAUS conference in 1971. Under the aggressive leadership of Lt Colonel Jerry Aoki and Major Dick Tsuchiva, the conference bid centered on a luau for 275 selected guests, a comprehensive presentation package featuring Hawaii's accommodations, numerous scheduled Hawaiian musical shows and staffing a display room as well as a hospitality room. Jerry and Dick organized the HANG and HARNG officers to meet the challenging taskings; they also coordinated the skills of the United Airlines entertainers, Honolulu Visitors Bureau and local travel industry representatives, along with Kentucky hosting officials and hotel officials to fully optimize the Hawaii image. As Guardsmen we were directly contributing toward improving the economic and cultural impact of the Hawaiian people. There was a lot of wark to do and the Hawaii contingent was not afraid of rolling up their sleeves to get to it. In the end...we won 11 awards for accomplishments in CYB4; Maj Gen Lum was elected to head the Area VI NGAUS Executive Council and Hawaii won the '91 NGAUS conference hosting privilege.

HAWAII'S SAFETY BELT LAWS

MANDATORY USE OF SEAT BELTS

HRS Chapter 291-

Drivers & Front Seat Passengers

- Drivers must use seat belts when operating motor vehicles.
- Drivers must see to it that front seat passengers under 15 are properly restrained by seat belts
- Passengers fifteen years of age and older in the front seat of a motor vehicle are required and responsible for being restrained in their seat belts. Penalty:

\$15 fine for each violation.

Exemptions: EFFECTIVE 12/16/85

Passengers in emergency commercial, for hire, mass transit vehicles and Type 1 school buses

Persons shall not be guilty if

- They are in a motor verticle that is not required to have seat belts.
- They are not in a seat best because there are more persons than there are seat bests and all the belts are being used
- They have medically certified physical disabilities which prevents them from being restrained.



CHILD PASSENGER RESTRAINT LAW

HRS Chapter 291-11.5

Children up to 4 years old

Drivers must see to it that

- Children under 3 years old, riding in a motor vehicle, are in federally approved child safety seats.
- Children 3 to 4 years old, riding in a motor vehicle, are either in federally approved child safety seats or secured by the vehicle's seat belts.
- If there are more people riding in the motor vehicle than there are seat belts and all belts are being used, the children without safety seats or seat belts must ride in the back seat.

Exemptions

Operators of emergency vehicles, commercial vehicles, vehicles for hire imase transitivehicles and Type 1 school buses.


Penalties:

1st offense - up to \$100

2nd offense - up to \$200 within one year of

1st offense

3 or more - up to \$500 within one year of 1st offense

DRUG & ALCOHOL ABUSE SURVEY

What, you say, does Hickam AFB, Hawaii, have in common with Osan AB, Korea; Clark AB, Philippines; Elmendorf AFB, Alaska; Loring AFB, Maine; Blythefille AFB, Arkansas; Bitburg AB, West Germany; Lowry AFB, Colorado; Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio; Reese FB, Texas; MacDill AFB, Florida; Kadena AB, Okinawa; Davis-Monthan AFB, Arizona; upreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe; and the Pentagon?

Sure, they are all distant places, and yes, they are all places where Air Force personnel are stationed, but what else?

These are the sixteen bases selected to participate in the scheduled October survey to determine the level of drug use and alcohol abuse in the military. Hickam AFB will provide approximately 400 of the estimated 20,000 military members who will be interviewed. Those who are selected will be asked if they use various drugs and/ or if they use alcohol, how much of each they use, and how often they use drugs and/ or alcohol. The participants' responses will remain anonymous, however, all responses will be aggregated, and used to produce a report on drug and alcohol use.

The survey results will be compiled by a North Carolina-based private research organization named the Research Triangle Institute. This 1985 survey is the third in series that has been performed by The Intitute. The previous two surveys which measured the levels of drug use and alcohol abuse in the military were conducted in 1980 and 1982.

The Air Force will use the RTI's findings to evaluate the drug and alcohol prevention programs and to determine the directions for and the emphasis of future prevention programs. The Air Force Drug and Alcohol Prevention officials in Washington, D.C. report that they expect preliminary survey results in November, and final results in the Spring.

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Let's hope Hawaii is not No Ka Oi in

this survey!
