GUNFIRE



The gunfire deployment concluded on the 16th of August as personnel and equipment returned from the Pacific Missile Range Facility, Barking Sands, Kauai. The deployment employed approximately 100 personnel, six F-4C aircrafts, and two C-130 aircrafts for daily logistic support.

Major Mel Matsui, the Camp Commander, Lt. David Snakenberg, the Maintenance Officer, and CMSgt. David Pontes, the Maintenance Chief, maintained open lines of communication with the airfield personnel and insured safety and proper operation within the airport area.

The deployed unit was basically self supporting and housed'in tents. In addition, the food service section (7 HANG & 4 Air Base Wing) set up a field kitchen and provided three full meals each day. According to Maj. Mel Asai, "A field kitchen has not been used since the old Kahuku days and that's over ten years ago."

Check yourself with this quiz from the "American Medical Association Family Medical Guide"

1. Are you within desirable weight limits for your height?

2. When walking briskly with people of your own age group, can you match their pace and carry on casual conversation without becoming short of breath?

3. Can you walk up three flights of stairs (each including about 15 to 20 steps) without having to pause for breath?

4. Do you exercise vigorously enough to make you breathless and sweaty at least three times a week?

5. Do you ordinarily sleep soundly and wake up feeling energetic and ready for the day ahead?

6. At the end of a working day do you usually feel energetic enough to go out and enjoy a social evening?

Do you drink, on average, less than two bottles of beer (or two cocktails, or two glasses of wine) a day?

8. Are you, and have you been for at least the last 15 years, a non-smoker?

9. Are you happy with your life, and do you generally have a positive outlook?

10. Do you drive defensively and always wear seat belts?

MORE MONEY

Major General John E. Long, Commander, Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES). has announced a change in the dollar amount a check may be written over the total purchase at cash registers. The new policy effective immediately, affects only checks cashed at the point of sale, i.e., the cash register in facilities where AAFES accepts checks.

General Long explained, "We have decided to increase the amount from \$10 to \$20 over the amount of purchase. Customers will no longer be inconvenienced to stand in a line at check cashing windows and again at the register when they want a few dollars cash to spare at the checkout."

The new policy will allow customers to make any purchase and still write a check for \$20 above the total purchase amount. This doubles the previous limitation. This change does not affect the \$100 daily limit for writing personal checks at AAFES check cashing windows. The increase to \$20 is in response to customer requests and remains a free service provided by AAFES.

RETIREMENT SYSTEM - Open Lett

In the past few months there has been considerable speculation about potential changes to the military retirement system. The speculation often well intentioned but ill informed, has been based on criticism from both the public and private sectors about the perceived generosity of the system

The Joint Chiefs of Staff and I have steadfastly maintained that any recommendation for change must take account of first, the unique, dangerous, and vital contribution to the safety of all of us that is made by our service men and women and the effect on combat readiness of tampering with the retiment system. Concurrently we must honor the absolute commitments that have been made to retirees and those currently serving. We remain committed to these principles.

Notwithstanding our opposition, the Co gress in its recent action on the pending defense authorization bill has mandated a reduction of \$2.9 billion to the military retirement system for future entrants to achieve this mandated recuction.

Nonetheless, we will continue to insis that whatever changes the Congress finally makes must not adversely affect the combat readiness of our forces, or violate our fir pledges.

I want to emphasize to you again. In the strongest terms, that the dedicated men and women now serving and those who have re tired before them, will be fully protected in any options we are required to submit to the Congress.

Our proposals will affect future entra only. You can be assured that our efforts this issue will not falter.















ANG SOFTBALL
