SHUTTLE REMEMBRANCE

As you may have noticed, the U.S. Flag is flying at half staff today. As you should know by now, it is in memory of the Space Shuttle Challenger and its crew.

Hawaii's Ellison Onizuka and six fellow crewmembers perished when the shuttle exploded Monday, Jan. 27, 1986.

The flag was ordered lowered to half staff from Jan. 29 through Feb. 3, by Presidential proclamation.

Our deepest condolences from the staff of the KUKAILIMOKU to the family and friends of the Challenger crew.

"THE SURVIVAL GAME"

Remember those childhood days, when you and your friends played army in the backyard or playground, pointing a finger or a stick at each other, pretending it was a gun or rifle and you all hid in tall grass or behind the trees, pretending to be snipers? Or when you watched the old war movies on TV, wondering what it was like to charge a hill with heavy enemy gunfire all around you? Or come face to face with a sniper who was hiding in the thick groundcover?

Well, the curious, adventurous and the crazy can now experience their wildest war dreams and fantasies with one of the hottest games to reach Hawaii. The game is played at the Kualoa Ranch and called "THE SURVIVAL GAME." For \$17, you get one CO2 splat pistol, a CO2 powerlet bottle, 20 rounds of paint pellets, a protective face shield, a large field, and 2 game officials.

CAM Sq members from Flightline, Engine Shop and Aerospace Systems got together to form two 12-man teams. These "soldiers" gathered at 0800 hrs to experience for the first time their wildest dreams of fighting in combat. After 4 hours of "fighting", both teams, all totally exhausted and hungry, called off the "war" and retreated to Kualoa Beach Park and treated themselves to lunch and exchange the traditional "war stories".

One of the funnier stories of the "war" was when Bobby "Rambo" Furtado got shot by Grant "Deadeye" Suzuki in the seat of his pants as he was backing out of some California grass. Another incident involved Mark "Quick Feet" Coulbourne, who infiltrated enemy lines and within 15 minutes captured their flag. As he hightailed it back to friendly lines, he got splattered in the back by Irvin "The Snake" Yoshino.

The best stories were the war tales that was told by the two individuals who happened to be the deciding factors in the best of 3 war games played that day. One of the quiet but effective soldiers of fortune was Elvin "The Shadow" Kaneshiro who, during the first game captured and returned to safety carrying the enemy's flag. The other Sunday matinee hero was Terry "The Ninja" Masuda who snared the enemy flag and was escorted to safety by his buddies David Leong and Bill Beck. Bill was wounded when he took a slug, which was meant for Terry, from sharpshooter Lorin Sardinha. As spokesman for the winners, I accept, as soon as our tired feet and sore muscles heal, a challenge for a rematch from Ron Mirafior's Raiders.

SAFETY NOTES

TAKE TIME TO BE SAFE.....

People feel differently about time. Some live by the clock. They try to make every second count. Others couldn't care less what time it is. They feel no pressure. They never look at a clock.

Whatever their overall time orientation, some personnel use time as an excuse for skipping safety. They say "I haven't got time for that", or "It takes too long", or "I can't take the time".

But how long does it take to put on eye protection? Two seconds? How long to insert an ear plug? And it doesn't take any longer to put on a bump cap than it does a regular hat.

Now consider something else... how long does it take to recover from a serious eye injury? A few days, a week, a month, the rest of your life? How long to come back after a head injury?

Trying to save the seconds it takes to observe a safety practice is gambling hours, weeks, months or maybe a lifetime of recovery.

Give that a few seconds thought!

FLYING SAFETY

"The USAF just completed the safest year of flying in its history," said Gen. Charles A. Gabriel, Air Force Chief of Staff, "The 1985 record-setting rate of 1.49 major flight mishaps per 100,000 flying hours is 14 percent lower than the previous record established in 1983, 1.73, with 1984's rate of 1.77, the Air Force completes the third consecutive year with rates below 2.0."

Gen. Gabriel attributes this year's record to exceptional accomplishments in virtually every facet of the flying operation. Notable among these were the all-time low number of logistics-related mishaps, the zero-mishap rate for the bomber force, and for the sixth consecutive year a record-setting low fighter/attack aircraft accident rate. Pacific Air Forces led the way with no air-craft losses. TAC and USAF also ended the year with all-time low rates of air-craft mishaps while compiling the 1985 record, the Air Force flew more hours of realistic training than any previous year, yielding

higher levels of combat readiness, significantly, this record occurred while flying nearly 3.5 million hours.

For purposes of comparison, in 1978 the major flight mishap rate was 3.16. Had that rate continued, an additional 230 air crafts would have been lost over the last 7 years at a cost of over \$1.3 billion, not to mention the major implications in terms of loss of life, decreased combat capability and impaired national security.

According to Gen. Gabriel, "The Air Force is performing its mission more safely than ever before and is achieving greater combat readiness."

INCENTIVE PROGRAM - STUDENT LOAN (SLRP)

Besides enlistment/reenlistment cash bonus', eligible members who enlist/reenlist into a critical career field may also be authorized the Student Loan Repayment Program. This program is in addition to any other program. The following eligibility criteria apply:

- a. enlist/reenlist in a vacancy in an AFSC established as bonus eligible;
- b. Armed Forces Quotient Test (AFQT) must be in mental category I, II, III;
- c. is a graduate of a secondary school (high school);
- d. is not enlisting or reenlisting to qualify for a full-time civilian position where membership in the ANG is a condition of employment;
- e. initial enlistment as a NPS member must be for a 6year period and Ready Reserve obligation must not be less than 8 yrs;
- f. has or will have any student loan made insured or guaranteed under Part B of the Higher Education Act of 1965 or any loan made under Part E of such act. after 1 Oct 75.

If found eligible under the SLRP, the ANG will pay 15% of all student loans plus interest, or \$500.00 which ever is greater, for each satisfactory year of service in the ANG. Each year completed in the ANG allows an additional payment of 15% of remaining loans and interest or \$500.00.

As most of you know the Hawaii State Legislature is seriously considering raising the legal drinking age to 21. On Thursday the 30th of January 1986 the Senate Transportation Committee approved a bill which raises Hawaii's drinking age from 18 to 21. This bill will have to be approved by the State House and signed by the Governor before it becomes part of Hawaii law. This process will take some time but you can believe it is going to happen; and when it does the military and the Guard will most likely decide to comply with the State law.

Many of you as Air National Guard members realize that there are some inconsistencies within this law. You are adult enough to make a decision to join the Guard. You are adult enough to perform critical and life saving jobs. You are adult enough to obtain credit, buy a car, a house, a boat. You can, in most cases at the age of 18, get married and start a family-but you will not be allowed to drink legally before the age of 21.

The problem is not with you as an individual. No, the sad fact is that younger people are involved in a disproportionate number of drunken driving auto accidents.

The primary intent of the bill to raise the legal drinking age to 21 is to reduce youth's accident involvement and to therefore save lives. As military members we know about the word "sacrifice". We became part of the military for many various and diverse reasons. As we became more involved with our mission we realized that the goal of the military is to insure peace and thereby save lives. Although this battle field is the highways and roads of Hawaii, the goal nevertheless is the same - to save lives. We in Social Actions hope the Guard members who are 18, 19, and 20 accept this sacrifice and do their collective part to

save lives. You have an opportunity to lead by example when the bill to raise the legal drinking age to 21 becomes the law.

To assist in this identification, the Air National Guard will implement a drug testing program beginning April 1.

Commanders having knowledge that an individual is using drugs will place the individual into duties that will not affect the safety and welfare of personnel and and base assets.

Personnel apprehended and proven to be a drug abuser will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis and will be meted punishment commensuratory with the severity of the offense. Punishment could include administrative separation.
