HIANG Command Chief selected for NGB post

There she was putting the final touches on the Hometown Heroes event, making sure every last detail was in place, seeking and getting advice from her fellow Airman all in an effort to make sure those who have been deployed are recognized for their service; thus, like the final chord of a symphony, Command Chief Jelinski Hall ends her tenure with the Hawaii Air National Guard with a resounding harmonic conclusion that punctuates her tenure with the HIANG.

During the Joint Senior Leadership Conference held outside Washington D.C., Nov. 19, Gen. Craig R. McKinley, chief of the National Guard tapped Hawaii's Senior Enlisted Advisor to be his top advisor on enlisted matters. Command Chief Master Sgt. Jelinski-Hall is the first Air Guardsman and the first woman to be selected for the National Guard Senior Enlisted Advisor post.

"We are very proud of Chief Jelinski-Hall's selection as the senior enlisted leader for the National Guard Bureau," said Maj. Gen. Robert Lee,

the adjutant general of the Hawaii National Guard. "She has accomplished many things in her 25-year career, and she will continue to excel at the national level," Maj. Gen Lee added.

Command Chief Master Sgt. Jelinski-Hall is set to take the reigns as advisor on the enlisted affairs of the 457,000 Soldiers and Airmen of the Army and Air National Guard in February.

"I see my role as advising Gen. McKinley on all matters affecting the

During the intense three day workshop, each participant was taken out of their comfort zone to reshape their learned thoughts and behaviors. The participants were challenged to 'raise the bar' with



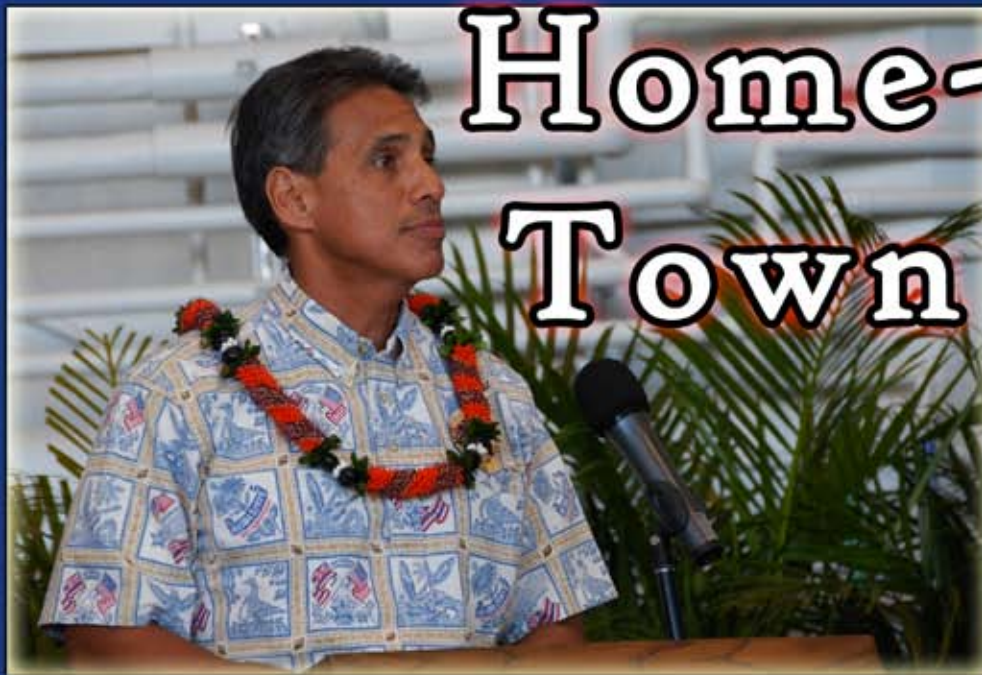

New physical fitness standards arrive in 2010

WASHINGTON— Maintaining peak combat readiness begins and ends with healthy, motivated and well-trained Airmen.

On Nov. 19, the Air Force's deputy chief of staff for manpower and personnel announced the new Air Force fitness standards will officially begin July 1, 2010.

Lt. Gen. Richard Y. Newton III said the services top leaders sought feedback from commanders and senior NCO leaders throughout the Air Force when deciding to execute the updated program that will test Airmen twice during calendar year 2010 -- once under the current program and once under the new program.

"Based on feedback from the field, we are implementing the July start date so Airmen have the opportunity to excel," General Newton said. "This implementation strategy will allow for a smoother transition of the new Air Force Instruction and afford commanders adequate time to establish installation fitness assessment cells to include adequate manning for the FACs."

According to General Newton, a new AFI detailing the new fitness standards is due out within the next few weeks. This fitness AFI is the first to cover the total force of active duty, Guard and Reserve.

The general added that the July start date will provide commanders and Airmen plenty of time to be prepared and in compliance with the new AFI.

"We want to do this right," General Newton said. "It's about readiness and our continued commitment to ensure we have a Fit Force, ready to perform its global mission."

Col. Joan H. Garbutt, chief of military force management for Air Staff Manpower and Personnel, said the new start date for the new fitness standards will "set our Airmen up for success." She believes Airmen will excel with the new standards.

"Every time you raise the bar, our Airmen reach higher to meet the standards," Colonel Garbutt said.

Biannual physical fitness testing will begin Jan. 1 using current fitness standards. Units with FACs will use them to conduct the assessments. Units without FACs will continue to use their physical training leaders, or PTLs, to assess Airmen. Enlisted and officer performance reports will reflect fitness training scores based upon their reports close out dates, General

Newton added.

According to the change, during the Jan. 1 to June 30 testing phase, unit PTLs will provide two scores -- one for the current system and one for the new standard so Airmen can gauge their performance. Starting July 1, Airmen will officially test under new requirements with the new scoring. Scores will be annotated on EPRs and OPRs accordingly.

Under the new standards, the aerobic run will count for 60 percent of the test. Body composition will count for 20 percent. Under the current standard, they count for 50 and 30 percent, respectively. The sit-up and push-ups remain at 10 percent each. The new standards have differently valued waist measurements and 15 seconds, rather than 30, separating run scores.

Passing the test will require a composite score of 75 while also meeting a minimum level for each component. The new physical fitness test will place Airmen in one of five age groups: less than 30, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59 and 60-plus. Results will fall into one of three categories: 90 and above, excellent; 75-90, satisfactory; and under 75, unsatisfactory.

ter Sgt. Denise Jelinski-Hall. “It’s about service, about commitment and making a difference ... for America - adding value,” she added.

While at the 154th Wing and HIANG headquarters, Command Chief Jelinski-Hall has had her hand in a number of initiatives to include but not limited to: reinvigorating the awards and decorations process, jump starting the Enlisted Performance Feedback program, re-establishing and maintaining standards of dress and appearance in the HIANG, and developing mentoring programs.

The Hometown Heroes event, like the many events that have transpired since she sewed on the “star,” would not have taken place without her.

“My desire is to be visible and accessible, to show the Airmen and Soldiers that their hard work is appreciated,” said Command Chief Master Sgt. Jelinski-Hall.

Visible and accessible she is. “She has been with me on every single trip

I’ve made to Iraq, Kuwait, Afghanistan and the Philippines, visiting our National Guard troops in the field,” said Maj. Gen. Robert G.F. Lee, state adjutant general.

“She will represent our Soldiers and Airmen extremely well,” he added.

“My goal is to take that visibility and accessibility to the national level,” said Command Chief Master Sgt. Jelinski-Hall. I hope to take the standards and accountability with me, she added. “I want to hold leaders accountable, and I look forward to representing all Airmen and Soldiers,” she added.

With the first ever Hometown Heroes Ceremony behind her, she hopes this will become a yearly tradition. As she has said time and time again, it’s about saying, “Thank you for answering the call to serve our country.”

As the Command Chief puts her final touches on the HIANG, she reminds Airmen about the importance of growing and mentoring one another.

“It is critically important to change and grow as a leader; seek leadership opportunities,” she said. “Don’t

stay stagnant, seek opportunities to develop and make yourself a better leader; prepare for opportunity,” said Command Chief Master Sgt. Jelinski-Hall. “Keep the level of professional standards high; expect the best of one another,” she added.

Although Jelinski-Hall has spent the last 19 years with the Hawaii Air National Guard, she has worked in a number of places and held a number of jobs. Her Air Force career began in 1984 as an air traffic control operator at Offutt Air Force, Neb., followed by a transfer to the communications field and the California National Guard. She joined the Hawaii Guard in 1990 and became the command chief master sergeant for the 154th Wing in 2004. She went on to become the senior enlisted leader for the Hawaii Guard.

So, after a 19-year tenure in the Guard, Jelinski-Hall leaves her stamp on the HIANG: high standards, visibility and accessibility.

“It has been an honor to be a part of the HIANG and serve with my brothers and sisters; I will miss them dearly. I will take the Aloha Spirit with me and spread it across the country.

Safety belts and air bags save lives

Judging from the picture, my sport utility vehicle is a total loss; however, I am able to write this article today because I was wearing my seatbelt.

Nov. 5, started out like any other Thursday. However, all that changed when I was taking my dog to a veterinarian appointment. At the corner of Stetson Hills and Tutt, sitting at a red-light, my vehicle was struck by another when a driver lost control of his vehicle after allegedly having a seizure. He uncontrollably floored the accelerator and slammed into me head-on. The force of the impact was so great that my SUV was lifted-up over a small lane-division island, spinning me around 180 degrees, only to be hit again from behind.

Immediately, bystanders came to our aid to ensure everyone was stable until the emergency teams arrived.

Although I was transported to the hospital, I was

able to return home that very evening shaken from the incident but not seriously injured.

All that said, there is no doubt in my mind, or those who witnessed the accident, that my seatbelt and airbag ensured the injuries weren't more severe.

I have always been a huge proponent of wearing seatbelts—mostly because of the impression left by individuals who have had the opportunity to share their “close calls.” Now I have my own personal testimony to pass on.

We speak so often of driving safety; we forget that sometimes accidents happen when we are parked. My vehicle was totaled, and I wasn't even moving.

We don't know when an accident will take place, so it's important to take preventative measures sooner rather than waiting for the situation to be risky.

There are many who simply aren't able to share their story of survival because they

chose not to protect themselves by wearing their seatbelts. Don't be one of them.
