The following Enlisted position vacancy in the Hawaii Army National Guard is announced. This vacancy is to be filled under the provisions of Title 32, USC 502(f) and Section 502 Public Law 98-94. This is a three-year fulltime National Guard duty tour in Active Guard/Reserve (AGR) status. This vacancy is to be filled through a competitive selection panel process with approval by the Chain of Command. Final selection will be based upon qualifications, suitability, and available manpower resources.

POSITION AND LOCATION: Readiness NCO, E7, 15T40, Company B (- Det 1 2 & 3), 777th Aviation Support Battalion, Wheeler Army Airfield, Hawaii Army National Guard, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. Applicants who have applied for a previous Job Vacancy Announcement, **NEED TO RE-APPLY.**

CLOSING TIME/DATE: Applications must be received by the Hawaii Human Resources Office (HIHRO), **NLT COB 18 November 2017.** The list of eligible will be based upon the APPOINTMENT REQUIREMENTS and AREA OF CONSIDERATION applicable to the specific vacancy.

POSITION DESCRIPTION: See attached general description of Duties and Responsibilities.

AREA OF CONSIDERATION: Open to **Present, Enlisted** service members belonging to the Hawaii Army National Guard in the grade of E6 – E7. Applicants applying for initial entry into the AGR program in the grade of E7 **MUST** be qualified in the MOS 15T. SSG/E6 MOSQ in CMF 15 may apply and must be able to become DMOSQ 15T within 12 months of accession into the AGR program. Current AGR Soldiers (excluding Soldiers within the first 18 months of a new duty position) may apply. **NOTE: If selected, E6/SSG, NON-DMOSQ will require an approved NGB level waiver prior to accession.** Waivers for disqualifications must be waivable IAW AR 135-18 and per NGR 600-5 table 2-1 and table 2-2. No other waivers authorized.

SALARY: Military Pay and Allowances.

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EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY: All applicants will receive equal consideration for appointment without regards to race, religion, color, national origin, public affiliation, or any other non-merit factor(s).

APPOINTMENT REQUIREMENTS: **Enlisted** personnel, in the grade of E6 – E7, who are currently on suspension of favorable actions, will **NOT** be considered. Upon selection, the selectee will be medically evaluated for clearance to enter the AGR Program by the Office of the State Surgeon (POC: Deputy State Surgeon). If the selected individual is an IDT Soldier, he/she must have a favorable Periodic Health Assessment (PHA) in accordance with (IAW) AR 40-501, Chapter 3, conducted within 12 months prior to initial entry in the AGR program. Soldiers with a favorable enlistment or appointment physical examination (IAW AR 40-501, Chapter 2) or flight physical examination (IAW AR 40-501, Chapter 4) conducted within 12 months prior to initial entry in the AGR program are not required to complete an additional PHA for entry in the AGR Program. Individual must also have a Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) test within the last 24 months prior to entry in the AGR program IAW AR 600-110 and meet body composition standards prescribed in AR 600-9. If PULHES numerical indicator has a P3 or P4, then the requirements of AR 600-60 must be met prior to accessioning into the AGR Program. There are no medical waivers for initial appointment in the AGR Program if the Soldier does not meet the physical and medical requirements IAW AR 40-501. AGR personnel are required to participate in IDT, AT, Special Projects, or other activities requiring their presence. **Selected individual MUST meet Professional Education Center (PEC) Training Courses prescribed for position vacancy within one (1) year from start date. AGR Soldiers on an initial tour for less than 18 months are ineligible to apply.** Persons entitled to Permanent Change of Station (PCS) allowances/benefits may be eligible for consideration contingent upon availability of PCS funds from NGB. (See item #5 Notes to Applicant).

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA: Hawaii Army National Guard Soldiers (excluding AGR Soldiers within the first 18 months of an initial tour), within the grades specified above are eligible to apply for this position. If not currently in an AGR status, to qualify for appointment, individuals **MUST MEET ALL** initial eligibility qualifications of AR 135-18 and NGR 600-5. **(Note: Individual certifies that he/she meets all eligibility criteria by signing in Section VI of NGB Form 34-1).**

APPLICATION PROCEDURES: Individuals may apply by submitting the following required documents to the HIHRO. Resumes may be included, but are not required. Please include a memo to explain any missing documentation that is required.

Errors, omissions of information, application completed in pencil or unsigned, and those that are late due to the mail system will be returned without action.**
- (2) Medical Protection System (MEDPROS) printout of Individual Medical Readiness (IMR) dated within the last 12 months. **NOTE: Must meet PULHES for MOS 15T**
- (3) Last five (5) Noncommissioned Officer Evaluation Reports (NCOERs)
- (4) Certified ERB with current ASVAB test scores.
- (5) NGB Form 23B (Army National Guard Retirement Points History Statement).
- (6) DD Form(s) 214 and/or DD Form(s) 220. (All periods of active duty.)
- (7) DA photo taken within the last 24 months.
- (8) Proof of highest level of Civilian Education acquired.

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- (9) Proof of Security Clearance, Verification Memorandum (Contact HIARNG Security Manager). **MUST have a VALID SECRET** Clearance or higher to apply for position.
- (10) Copy of DA Form 705 reflecting passing APFT and passing height/weight data (must meet standards IAW AR 600-9), both taken within six (6) months from JVA closing date. **Also include three additional previous APFTs.**
- (11) DD Form 2807/2808 **and** DD Form 2992 Upslip verifying completion of a Class III Flight Physical within 12 months.
- (12) Memo explaining any missing required documentation (APFT, NCOER, DA Photo, etc.)
- (13) Knowledge, Skills, and Abilities (KSAs). Below are listed the KSAs for this position. Each applicant **must address each KSA individually in paragraph format** by explaining any civilian and military work experience(s) (with dates) that provided the KSA. These comments must be addressed in the order they appear below and attached (separate sheet) to the application when applying for the position. **Failure to include the attachment for the KSA statement will result in your application NOT being considered for employment.**
 - (a) Knowledge of the position.
 - (b) Knowledge in the techniques of organization, direction, coordination, and control.
 - (c) Ability to develop, plan, and coordinate complex work assignments.
 - (d) Ability to give specific guidance relative to the position.
 - (e) Skills you possess to assist in the improvement of the position or program.
 - (f) Skills in oral and written communications.

NOTES TO APPLICANTS:

1. Each applicant is personally responsible for submitting his or her application package to the HIHRO on or before the closing date stated on this JVA. Applications postmarked (U.S. Postal Service) on or before the closing date of this JVA will be accepted. Postmarks by private letter carriers (Federal Express, UPS) and applications submitted by fax will **NOT** be accepted. **Federal law prohibits the use of government envelopes, postage, or facsimile to submit the application. 2. Sending application/other supporting forms by email is not allowed. However, personnel who meet eligibility requirements and are currently performing duty outside of CONUS/State of Hawaii are allowed to do so. The applicant can send email with attachments to the fulltime support personnel of their unit of assignment. The fulltime support personnel may print, and then provide documents to the HIHRO-A office, at 3949 Diamond Head Road, Honolulu, HI 96816-4495, Bldg. 306, Rm 214.
3. Each applicant will ensure that supporting documents, to include diplomas, orders, etc. are submitted with the application as evidence of meeting the APPOINTMENT REQUIREMENTS. **Failure to do so may result in a finding of ineligibility and may cause the applicant to lose consideration for this position.**
4. Request for exceptions to, or waivers of APPOINTMENT REQUIREMENTS as specified herein will **NOT** be accepted.
5. Permanent Change of Station (PCS) expenses may be authorized for this position. Authorization for payment of PCS expenses will be granted **only after** a determination is

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made that PCS is in the best interest of the Hawaii Army National Guard and upon availability of funds from the National Guard Bureau.

**ARMY NATIONAL GUARD ACTIVE GUARD/RESERVE PROGRAM
QUALIFICATIONS CRITERIA
(ENLISTED PERSONNEL)**

1. BASIC INITIAL ENTRY QUALIFICATIONS:

A. Membership.

Must be in a Ready Reserve status and –

1. Be a member of the Reserve Component of the Army of which the application for entry in the AGR program is made.
2. When applying for an AGR position on Full-Time National Guard Duty (FTNGD) under state control, must be a federally recognized ARNGUS Soldier.

B. Age.

Must be 18 years of age and not reached his or her 55th birthday.

C. Physical and Medical.

1. Prior to entry on AD in the AGR program, must be medically certified as Drug Free and be tested negative for Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), per AR 40-501 and AR 600-110.
2. Must meet the Body Composition standards prescribed in AR 600-9.
3. Must meet the medical fitness standards for retention per AR 40-501, chapter 3. When appropriate, the officer must also meet the medical fitness standards for flying duty per AR 40-501, chapter 4 retention flight physical within 18 months preceding initial entry.

D. Military Education.

An enlisted Soldier must have completed Initial Entry Training (IET).

E. Years of Service.

Must be able to complete a three (3) years initial tour of AD or FTNGD prior to:

1. Completing 18 years of Active Service (AS).
2. The date of mandatory removal from an active status based on age, or service (without any extensions), under any provisions of law or regulation, as prescribed by current directives.

F. Grade and Specialty.

Staff Sergeant (E-6) or higher, must possess the required MOS authorized for the AGR duty position.

G. Reenlistment or Extension

Must be eligible for reenlistment or extension, per NGR 600-200.

H. Security Clearance.

Must possess a valid security clearance required for the grade, MOS / AOC, and AGR duty position.

I. Additional Eligibility Requirements.

1. AGR Soldiers, who were voluntarily released from the AGR program for two (2) or more days, and one (1) year has not elapsed since the date of the release are eligible for a subsequent reentry into the AGR program with a waiver IAW AR 135-18, Table 2-2 D. If selected the Soldier must meet all Initial Entry Requirements to qualify for a subsequent reentry.

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2. Soldiers are disqualified from re-entry into the AGR program if they were not selected for continuation by a board, were processed for involuntarily release from AD or FTNGD, or for separation because of one of the following:
 - a. For cause, to include unsuitability or unfitness (other than temporary medical disability) for military service.
 - b. As a result of resignation in lieu of adverse personnel action.
This requirement is nonwaivable IAW AR 135-18, Table 2-6, I and K.
3. All AGR Soldiers will sign a Certificate of Agreement and Understanding prior to being ordered to FTNGD in the AGR program.
4. Must have at least three (3) years remaining on current enlistment on first day on initial AGR tour. Applicants must reenlist or extend their current enlistment in order to meet this requirement.
5. Must not be a candidate for an elective office, holding a Civil Office (full-time or part-time), or engaged in partisan political activities, as defined in AR 600-20.
6. Must not be under current suspension of favorable personnel actions. Additionally, applicants, who are required by AR 600-31 to be under a suspension of favorable personnel actions, as determined by CNGB, are ineligible even if no suspension of favorable personnel actions had been imposed.
7. Applicants must not be entitled to receive Federal Military Retired, Retainer Pay, or receiving Federal Civil Service annuities, or to be eligible for immediate Federal Civil Service annuities.
8. Enlisted applicants, who meet the following dependency criteria(s) are eligible:
 - a. An applicant with no spouse or other dependents.
 - b. An applicant with a spouse and 2 or fewer additional dependents, E4 and below.
 - c. An applicant with a spouse and 3 or more additional dependents, who is in pay grade E5 or above.
 - d. An applicant whose spouse is a member of Regular or Reserve Component of any U.S. Armed Force, whose dependent(s) are under 18 years of age, and have been placed in the custody of an adult (other than the spouse) by court order or approved by State law (if spouse is a member of the Retired Reserve, this custodial restriction does not apply).
 - e. An applicant without a spouse, who has dependents under 18 years of age that have been placed in the custody of the other parent, or another adult by court order, or as provided by State law and is not required to provide child support, or is required by court order to provide child support for 2 or fewer dependents.

2. BASIC SUBSEQUENT DUTY QUALIFICATIONS:

- A. Subsequent Duty Definition.
Soldiers on AGR orders beyond the initial 3 year tour of their AGR career.
- B. Membership.
Must be serving on duty in the AGR program and –
 1. Be a member of the Reserve Component of the Army in which the AGR duty is performed.
 2. If in FTNGD status, must be a federally recognized ARNGUS Soldier.
- C. Age.
Must be less than 60 years of age.
- D. Physical and Medical.
 1. Must meet the body composition standards prescribed in AR 600-9.

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2. Must meet the medical fitness standards for retention per AR 40-501.
 3. Must meet, when appropriate for AGR duty, the medical fitness standards for flying duty per AR 40-501 or the medical fitness standards for miscellaneous purposes per AR 40-501.
- E. Military Education.
Must not have academically failed the United States Army Sergeants Major Course (USASMC) or must not have been released from the United States Army Sergeants Major Academy (USASMA) for other than hardship approved by Commandant, USASMA.
- F. Years of Service.
Will be released from AD/FTNGD upon achieving 20 years AS unless retained by the appropriate ARNGUS AD/FTNGD tour continuation board. Retained ARNGUS enlisted Soldiers will be placed on incremental (two-year) orders which will not exceed the retention control points in NGR 600-5 or 600-10 established under the authority of paragraph 1-4(d) of AR 135-18.
- G. Grade and Specialty.
1. Staff Sergeant or above, must possess the grade and MOS required for the AGR duty position.
 2. Sergeant or below, must possess the grade equal to, or below, that authorized for the AGR duty position and must possess the MOS required for the AGR duty position. This is a nonwaivable requirement IAW AR 135-18, Table 2-6 E.
 3. Excludes Soldiers within the first 18 months of an initial tour.
- H. Reenlistment or Extension.
Must be eligible for reenlistment or extension per NGR 600-200.

READINESS NCO, E7 **DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

1. **Introduction:** This position is located in detachment size units of the Army National Guard.
2. **Purpose:** Provide supervisory manpower to enhance the readiness status of units. Readiness encompasses training, mobilization, planning, supply, maintenance, pay, and personnel functions relating to the welfare of the Soldiers and mission capability. The Detachment NCO will be involved in the day-to-day conduct and supervision of these functions and act as the commander's representative and spokesperson in the daily operation of the unit to ensure the highest readiness status of the unit as well serving the unit as the Senior NCO.
3. **Duties and responsibilities:** Responsible for supervising the successful accomplishment of the commander's mobilization readiness objectives; anticipates and recommends solutions for needs of the unit in all aspects of mobilization readiness, to include:
 - a. Advises the commander on training, logistics, personnel and unit mobilization readiness requirements and ensures that the unit develop, update, and maintain comprehensive mobilization plans including preparation of unit COMPASS and AVEL requests, preparation of the annual post mobilization training activities list and ensuring that the unit is POM/POR qualified; reviews and implements mobilization

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directives and regulations; obtains all required data for the unit status report and assists the commander in preparing readiness for the unit status report and assists the commander in preparing readiness reports as prescribed by AR 220-1; monitors the equipment-on-hand (EOH) and the equipment readiness (ER) status of the unit and keeps the commander informed on these issues; responsible for maintaining property accountability ensuring all required equipment is on hand or on valid requisition, on required inventories, audits and reconciliation, and the maintenance of combat parts load (CPL), if retained at unit level; coordinates maintenance support required from supporting CSMS or other installation maintenance support activities, and the integration of maintenance training with the supporting CSMS shop chief; recommends to the commander courses of action to correct deficiencies in achieving maintenance standards and ensures the accountability and adequacy of CPL's, if maintained at CSMS level; must be proficient in unit level logistics procedures and policies.

- b. Supervises the drafting of training schedules for approval which comply with command guidance and directives and the publications of higher headquarters; supervises the maintenance of the unit training library, unit training extension course (TEC) tapes, and TEC center, and related training equipment and aids; establishes a direct line of communication with training and mobilization personnel at higher headquarters; supervises the development and monitoring of a comprehensive MOS sustainment training program; advises and assists the unit NCO's in the implementation and conduct of supervised on-the-job training (SOJT) programs; advises officer personnel on military education requirements and prepares applications for Army service schools and extension centers; supervises the maintenance of records for the above personnel, and ensures that qualification information is provided to the personnel section for personnel records updating.
- c. Attends all unit training assemblies, additional training assemblies, and annual training periods; provides assistance and guidance in the preparation for and execution of unit training and other mobilization readiness relation activities; ensures that preparatory visits are conducted as necessary to training sites to ensure availability of such sites and to procure training areas, ranges, training equipment, and other facilities required by the unit; responsible for supervising the implementation and accomplishment of the individual training and evaluation program (ITEP, to include SDT) as prescribed in the AR 350-10, and of the battalion training management system (BTMS) at company/detachment level; responsible for supervising the control of materials, publications, and Soldier's manuals; responsible for monitoring individual training records and keeping the commander informed on the individual training status of the unit personnel; supervises the overall operation of the unit; responsible for ensuring that the commander's concept of operations is executed and for advising the commander and supervisory personnel on the status and efficiency of the personnel; works directly with the commander in monitoring the recruiting and retention activities of the unit; is directly involved in the maintenance of strength and personnel readiness issues of the unit to include employer support and family programs; responsible for the overall supervision of all pay, logistical, personnel and administrative activities in caring for the welfare of unit Soldiers; establishes procedures to be followed in the resolution of all personnel related matters and supervises those procedures until eventual solution; establishes a direct line of communication with pay, administrative,

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and supply action personnel in higher headquarters; establishes and maintains personnel proficiency in all supply, financial, and personnel procedures.

d. Performs other duties as assigned.

4. Supervisory controls: Works under the general supervision of the unit commander; receives technical guidance from supervisory personnel at higher headquarters; accomplishes daily requirements independently in accordance with established policies and procedures. Performance is evaluated on accomplishment of established objectives.
5. Qualifications:
 - a. Must be qualified for initial entry into or continued service in the AGR program IAW NGR 600-5.
 - b. Required to be or to become fully qualified in an MOS in the predominant career management field authorized in the MTOE of the unit, excluding MOS 92G.
 - c. Must have or be able to obtain the level of security clearance required by applicable regulations and directives not lower than SECRET.
 - d. Must possess state and military operator's licenses and be qualified to operate those vehicles organic to the unit.
 - e. To the maximum extent possible, will possess a secondary MOS in either the supply and/or personnel career management fields.
6. Military assignment and maximum grade. Readiness NCO's must occupy a position in the predominant career management field of the unit. They will not be assigned to an MTOE/TDA position related to food service operations. To the maximum extent possible, they shall be senior to all other fulltime personnel in the unit. Military grade shall not exceed E6 for in-state detachments of split units and E7 for company/battery/troop size units and out-of-state detachments of split units. E7's are authorized in separate units and detachments with a UIC ending in "AA" providing an appropriate MTOE/TDA position exists.

15T MOS REQUIREMENTS

1. UH-60 Helicopter Repairer must possess the following qualifications:

- (a) A physical demands rating of Significant (Gray).
- (b) A physical profile of 222211.
- (c) Normal color vision.
- (d) Qualifying scores.
 1. A minimum score of 105 in aptitude area MM in Armed Services Vocational aptitude Battery (ASVAB) tests administered prior to 2 January 2002.
 2. A minimum score of 102 in aptitude area MM on ASVAB tests administered on and after 2 January 2002 and prior to 1 July 2004.
 3. A minimum score of 104 in aptitude area MM on ASVAB tests administered on and after 1 July 2004.
 4. A Minimum OPAT score of Standing Long Jump (LJ) -0140 cm, Seated Power Throw (PT) - 0400 cm, Strength Deadlift (SD) - 0140 lbs., and Interval Aerobic Run (IR) - 0040 shuttles in Physical Demands Category "Significant" (Gray).

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(e) Formal training (completion of a resident MOS 15T course conducted under the auspices of The United States Army Aviation Center of Excellence (USAACE) or meet the ACASP criteria per paragraph 9-5b (5)(b) of DA PAM 611-21.

(f) ACASP qualification criteria. Must have 2 years' experience, or combination of formal training, and experience totaling 2 years in the repair of Sikorsky Model S-70 and S-76 helicopters.

(g) Reclassification: Must meet the above qualifications and all prerequisites IAW AR 614-200 Chapter 3-19 and AR 40-501 Chapter 3. Must meet the above qualifications and all prerequisites IAW AR 614-200 Chapter 3-19 and AR 40-501 Chapter 3. Must be in the grade of SPC (non-promotable) or below unless they have held an aviation maintenance/component repairer CMF 15 MOS for a minimum of 12 months at skill level 1 or 2, 18 months at skill level 3 or 24 months at skill level 4

2. National Guard Soldiers that do not meet the above qualifications must submit a determination packet through National Guard Bureau, ATTN: NGB-ARNG-AV, 111 South George Mason Drive, Arlington, VA 22204-1382,

(http://www.rucker.army.mil/usaace/directorates/cdid/opfd/iw_enlisted.html).

3. Alcohol and drug abuse as defined below will disqualify any Soldier or potential enlistee from this MOS. This disqualification will not be waived, even though the Soldier/potential enlistee satisfactorily completes the Army Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) or a civilian equivalent, except as specified below:

- (a) A medically diagnosed history of alcohol abuse as defined in the substance use disorder section of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual, 4th Edition, 2000 "text revision" (DSM-IV) <http://www.psych.org/MainMenu/Research/DSMIV.aspx> is disqualifying. Cdr, HRC may waive this disqualification after a Soldier in this MOS successfully completes the Army ASAP Education, out-patient or inpatient programs or its civilian equivalent, based on the recommendations of the chain of command and the Cdr, USA Aeromedical Center. A Soldier who completes any aspect of ASAP and is involved in an additional offense involving alcohol or alcohol abuse will be immediately reclassified or denied enlistment in this MOS as a high risk.
- (b) Except as provided in (e) below, a wrongful or improper use of narcotic or other controlled substance or dangerous drug as defined by Title 21 United States Code (USC) Controlled Substances Act, Section 801, et seq, (<http://www.deadiversion.usdoj.gov/21cfr/21usc/801.htm>) is disqualifying.
- (c) A positive result of urine test administered per AR 600-85. The Army Substance Abuse Program, that leads to medical evaluation and a finding of "no diagnosis apparent, improper use" is disqualifying.
- (d) Except as provided in (e) below, a documented instance of the use, sale, transfer, possession, or manufacture of any narcotic or other controlled substance or dangerous drug as defined by 21 USC 801, et seq, is disqualifying. A documented instance includes conviction by any courts martial or any civilian court. Convictions include juvenile adjudication, non-judicial punishment under Article 15, UCMJ, or voluntary confession after proper rights warning according to Article 31(b), UCMJ.
- (e) A Soldier or potential enlistee will not be disqualified for teenage civilian experimentation with marijuana or other cannabinoids disclosed in voluntary confessions of drug experimentation documented solely by information obtained from DD Form (SF) 2808 Report of Medical Examination or DD Form (SF) 2807-2 Medical Prescreen of Medical History Report. (Experimentation is defined as one time use or casual use over a short period of time resulting from peer pressure.) The use disclosed must have occurred prior to the individual's 18th birthday, and prior to enlistment in any armed force.
