

HIANG Organization (Spaces)




Total End Strength: 92.5% 2,537 Airmen Authorized 2,333 Airmen Assigned

Snapshot:

- 105,000 airmen; 90 Wings: 50 states, Guam, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, and District of Columbia
- 1,080 aircraft: 52% of USAF tanker/airlift capability; 48% of USAF fighter/attack capability; 94% of Homeland Air Defense; 37% AF Combat Power across all mission sets for 10% of the budget!

- Force Structure



HIANG Milestones



Infrastructure Upgrades

Execute infrastucture and facility priorities to cover shortfalls due to funding constraints during the original F-22 beddown plan such as munitions storage and inspection/maintenance, adequate intelligence space, egress and aerospace ground equipment maintenance facilities. The HIANG will continue to execute beddown requirements for its two assigned Electromagnetic Warfare Squadrons.

102% End-Strength

Retain 92% of eligible members, and gain 432 annual accessions to realize 102% organizational strength during FY2025.

HIANG Association Plans

Codify support agreements throughout the enterprise, enabling seamless Total Force Integration and optimizing operational capabilities.

Space Force Integration

Develop a force structure plan to support existing and proposed units and plan for future space missions in support of USINDOPACOM and broaderstrategic initiatives.

Electromagnetic Warfare Squadrons IOC

Secure required personnel and equipment to train, maintain readiness and support deployed UTC requirements.



Dissimilar Air Combat Training

Facilitate long-term solutions for the procurement and sustainment of Adversary Air for Hawaiian Raptor training requirements.

Air Defense Modernization

Field modern air defense sensors, communications, and mission systems to defend the homeland. Optimize the Advanced Battle Management System and Air Force Joint All Domain Command and Control.

C4ISR-Targeting Squadron

Establish Classic Associate Targeting Squadron in support of AF NEXUS project; enabling a secure, robust, survivable digital environment supporting a fully integrated Command, Control, Communications, and Computers (C4), with Intelligence, Surveillance, Reconnaissance (ISR), and a targeting capability for Joint U.S. and coalition operations.

Consolidated Tanker Maintenance Complex

Design a Consolidated Tanker Maintenance and Operations Complex to provide an adaptable and enduring campus with safe, reliable, and sustainable facilities empowering rapid response to bridge the Indo-Pacific.

Cyberspace Operations

Establish a cyberspace operations squadron to conduct offense, defense, command &control/cyber capabilities supporting AF and USINDOPACOM mission requirements.



Next Generation Air Dominance

Secure Sixth-generation Air Dominance fighter as a follow-on aircraft to replace the F-22A.

KC-46 /NGAS Acquisition/Association

Pursue advanced aerial refueling aircraft to replace the KC-135R. Develop long-term plans to ensure 154 WG is postured to receive the Next Generation Air-Refueling System (NGAS) in line with USAF modernization plans.

297 ATCS Training Area - Kalaeloa

Develop an Air Traffic Control and Landing System complex to facilitate Mobile Radar System operations, conduct real world air traffic control, and provide critical training to fulfill mission requirements.


