Assessment of Repair and Maintenance Needs

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Executive Summary

The ultimate purpose of Hawaii's war memorials is to honor those who made the supreme sacrifice in defense of our country's freedom. The goal of the Hawaii State- County Veterans' Cemetery system is to provide a final resting place for veterans and their eligible family members. The report includes ratings for each of the eight State veteran cemeteries, eleven State memorial sites honoring our veterans and one veterans' home. Seven of the above-mentioned sites are located on Oahu, seven on Hawaii, one each on the islands of Maui, Molokai and Lanai and three on Kauai.

Act 63 passed by the Eighteenth Legislature, 1995, State of Hawaii and amended in 1997, tasks the Office of Veterans Services to: "Inspect every three years all state war memorials and veterans' cemeteries for repair and maintenance deficiencies, and report all repair and maintenance problems at these memorials and cemeteries to the adjutant general, comptroller, and the legislature prior to the start of the next regular session." The purpose of these inspections is to ensure that these war memorials and cemeteries are in good repair and worthy of the honor and respect due the memories of those they represent.

Inspection teams, using the Inspection Checklist, went to each of the twenty sites and performed a thorough evaluation. Each site was deemed to be either: excellent, good, or fair. An excellent site had no discrepancies and was clean and well maintained. A good site had minor discrepancies; however, it too was clean and fairly well maintained. A fair site required repair or maintenance. This may be ground maintenance, structural repair, replacement of the memorial or general cleaning and upkeep. In this report, one memorial was rated "poor" by the inspector.

This report concentrated only on State war memorials and cemeteries within the Hawaii State- County Veterans' Cemetery system. The National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific or Punchbowl as it is known, is a federally funded cemetery located on Oahu and was not included in this report.

Introduction

The State's war memorials are intended to remind future generations of Hawaii's residents of our values and freedoms for which so many of our sons and daughters sacrificed their lives for. The Hawaii State-County Veterans Cemetery system is the final resting place of our country's fallen heroes, comrades in arms, and their immediate family members. The ultimate goal of both the cemeteries and monuments is to honor the men and women who have served honorably in the armed forces of the United States.

Hawaii's State war memorials and veterans' cemeteries are our promise to veterans that their deeds, service, names will not be forgotten. In 1976, the legislature declared that the historical heritage of the state is among one of our most important assets. This sentiment was codified in section 6E-1 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

It is the State's policy to provide leadership in preserving, restoring, and maintaining historic property, and to engage in programs at all levels of Government that promote education, inspiration, pleasure, and enrichment for its citizens. These programs ensure the preservation and enhancement of historic property such as our memorials, veterans' cemeteries and veterans' homes for future generations.

Purpose of the Study

The purpose of this study as specified in Act 63, as amended: is to "Inspect every three years, all state war memorials and veterans cemeteries for repair and maintenance deficiencies, and report all repair and maintenance problems at these memorials and cemeteries to the adjutant general, comptroller, and the legislature prior to the start of the next regular session." This will ensure that potential problems are detected and scheduled for repair as expeditiously as possible.

As required by the Act, this report is provided to the Adjutant General, the State of Hawaii Comptroller and the Legislature.

Scope of Assessment

In total, twenty locations were assessed. Included in the assessment were all war memorials, one freeway maintained by the State of Hawaii and eight veteran's cemeteries comprising the Hawaii State-County Veterans' Cemetery system. The numbers and location of war memorials including freeway and veterans' cemeteries are shown in Table 1.

Methodology

Office of Veterans Services (OVS) staff, members of the Advisory Board on Veterans Services or selected experts were asked to inspect each site using an inspection checklist. The checklist contained fourteen items used to identify any maintenance, repair, American with Disabilities Act **(ADA)** requirements and an overall rating of the condition of the site. The individual categories listed on the inspection checklist were: grounds, roads, burial sites, headstones, plaques and features, structures or buildings, safety, room, bed, pool, drainage, utilities, ADA, and other. These items were rated as satisfactory or unsatisfactory with remarks as necessary to explain the rating. The overall condition of the site was rated as excellent, good, or fair. An excellent site had no discrepancies and was clean and well maintained. A good site had minor discrepancies; however, it too was fairly clean and well maintained. A fair site required repair or maintenance. This may be ground maintenance, structural repair, replacement of the memorial or general cleaning and upkeep.

Repair and Maintenance Findings

The assessment teams evaluated twenty sites. Three cemeteries were rated excellent which was the West Hawaii Cemetery, Makawao Veterans Cemetery, and Lanai Veterans Cemetery. The Kauai Veterans Memorial Hospital and Waimea War Memorial Swimming Pool on Kauai were rated in excellent condition. The Interstate H-2 Veterans Memorial Highway on Oahu was rated in excellent condition Lastly, the Yukio Okutsu Veterans Long Term Care Home and the Keaukaha Military Reservation (KMR) Armory Plaque both in Hilo were rated in excellent condition. A total of <u>eight</u> State Memorials were rated overall in <u>excellent</u> condition.

Nine sites were rated overall in **good** condition in need of a few repairs. That would include four cemeteries; the Hawaii State Veterans Cemetery in Kaneohe, Hilo Veterans Cemetery No. 1, and Hilo Veterans Cemetery No. 2 and Hoolehua Veterans Cemetery on Molokai. The Armed Forces Eternal Flame, Korean and Vietnam War Memorials and the 29th Infantry Vietnam Veteran Memorial on Oahu were rated in good condition. Lastly, two memorial monuments were rated in good overall condition which includes the General Lyman Airport Memorial and Pahala Memorial.

<u>**Two</u>** sites were rated in <u>fair</u> condition and in need of major repairs. The Kauai Veterans Cemetery and Varsity Victory Volunteers Sculpture on Oahu were rated fair.</u>

Finally, only <u>one</u> site was rated in <u>poor</u> condition and in need of major repairs. The World War II Monument on Oahu. The following locations were rated as follows: Table 2. State Memorial and Veterans Cemeteries by "Condition".

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

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

The need to improve turf trimming height and alignment of the grave site markers in the burial areas (as part of the Island of Hawaii EHVC No. 1 and No. 2 Gravesites Restoration projects presented by the DOD HIENG's engineering report and the compliance review of both Cemeteries on May 11, 12, and 13, 2016, by the National Cemetery Administration, NCA, compliance review team indicated that markers are not installed to proper height or alignment. Proper height and alignment of makers is a significant contribution to overall cemetery appearance and a key driver of customer satisfactor per the compliance team's report.) The appearance/maintenance of the cemeteries were satisfactory. □ The Makawao Veterans Cemetery is a 10-acre site located in Upcountry Maui. Entry into the cemetery is from Baldwin Avenue. The cemetery was established in January 29, 1951 to accommodate Maui veterans. Upgrades and renovations include a columbarium, restrooms, and a committal shelter. The AJA Veterans Club, Maui Chapter dedicated 18 inches by 24 inches bronze plaque mounted on most rock veneer located adjacent to the committal shelter and 5 feet by 4 feet granite headstone mounted in concrete to honor the MIA from WWII and the Korean War Veterans. This cemetery is owned and maintained by the County of Maui, Department of Public Works.

□ The cemetery is about a one-acre burial site with restroom facilities. A low rock wall fronts the property. A chain link fence encloses the remaining three sides of the cemetery. The cemetery was opened in August 1950. It is owned and maintained by the County of Maui, Department of Public Works.
