• New 40-Year Pay Chart Affects Selected 'Gray-Area' Reservists. The Department of Defense's new 40-year pay chart took effect April 1, 2007. The pay chart will provide new, higher basic pay levels for selected 'Gray-Area' service members who have served more than 30 years, 34 years and 38. The selected 'Gray-Area' service members affected are: E-8s, E-9s, W-4s, W-5s, and O-6s thru O-10s.

Retired pay for 'Gray-Area' reservists is based on provisions of 10 U.S. Code, Sec. 1406(b) (2) which states: "In the case of a person who is entitled to retired pay under section 12731 of this title, the retired pay base is the monthly basic pay determined at the rates applicable on the date when retired pay is granted."

Given this provision of the Code, the date that retired pay is granted is the controlling factor, a reserve component member in the 'Gray-Area' who reaches age 60 after March 31, 2007, would have his or her retired pay based on the extended pay table.

• VA HANDBOOK 2007. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has released a new edition of the Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents handbook. It updates the rates for certain federal payments and outlines a variety of programs and benefits for American veterans. Most of the nation's 25 million veterans qualify for some VA benefits, which range from health care to burial in a national cemetery. In addition to health-care and burial benefits, veterans may be eligible for programs providing home loan guaranties, educational assistance, training and vocational rehabilitation, income assistance pensions, life insurance, and compensation for service-connected illnesses or disabilities. In some cases, survivors of veterans may also be entitled to benefits. The handbook describes programs for veterans with specific service experiences, such as prisoners of war or those concerned about environmental exposures in Vietnam or in the Gulf War, as well as special benefits for veterans with severe disabilities. In

addition to describing benefits provided by VA, the 2007 edition of the 160-page booklet provides an overview of programs and services for veterans provided by other federal agencies. It also includes resources to help veterans access their benefits, with a listing of toll-free phone numbers, Internet addresses, and a directory of VA facilities throughout the country. - If you still have a Thrift Saving Account. Alert Issued on Thrift Savings Plans. Military members, their family members, and Federal civilians using their home computers to access Thrift Savings Plan accounts online are vulnerable to identity theft. TSP officials have identified customers who are victims of a computer crime known as "keylogging" or "keystroke logging." Keylogging is a diagnostic tool used in software development that captures a user's keystrokes. The technique can capture a computer user's TSP personal identification number or other personal account information such as a Social Security number. • Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). CPR is a series of chest compressions and mouth-to-mouth rescue breaths given to cardiac-arrest victims. The process is designed to circulate blood and prolong life until medics arrive or an automated external defibrillator can be located. For years, CPR students were taught to alternate 15 chest compressions and 2 deep rescue breaths on adults, or 5 compressions and 1 breath on children and infants. Students were also taught to check for a pulse and to not give chest compressions to a victim who had a pulse. The new method, established by the American Heart Association in 2005, phased in by the Red Cross last year and made standard procedure this year, calls for alternating 30 chest compressions and two normal (not deep) breath for all victims, regardless of age. It also eliminates the need to check for a pulse, since many lay-responders are not skilled enough to correctly detect one. Following is a summary of the change:

Rescue breaths:

- Old method Deep breath into a person's lungs for two seconds
- New method Normal breath for one second, until the person's chest rises Chest compression-to-rescue breath ratio:
 - Old method 15:2 for adults; 5:1 for children and infants

- New method — 30:2 for all

Chest compression rate:

- Old method 100 per minute, adults and children; 120 per minute for infants
- New method 100 per minute for all

Chest compression landmarking method for placement of hands:

- Old method Trace up the ribs for adults and children; one finger below the nipple line at the center of chest for infants
- New method Center of chest for adults and children; just below nipple line at center of chest for infants
