• Recommendation to introduce a cost sharing "option" for TRICARE for Life (TFL). The following is a download from the National Guard Association of the United States website - LEGISLATIVE ALERT #09-04, February 27, 2009. This and other cost-sharing proposals from the Congressional Budget Office DIRECTLY affect YOUR retirement benefits! Read on....

<u>The Issue</u>: Congressional Budget Office (CBO) Recommendation for Congress to Introduce Out-of-Pocket Requirements for TRICARE for Life (TFL) Beneficiaries

<u>Action Required</u>: Contact your Senators and Representative and urge them to oppose any legislative effort to introduce out-of-pocket requirements for TRICARE for Life beneficiaries

As a possible means of reducing Department of Defense (DOD) expenditures, the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has recommended a cost sharing "option" for TRICARE for Life (TFL) beneficiaries.

TFL was introduced in 2002 to supplement Medicare for military retirees and their family members eligible for Medicare. Currently, TFL covers nearly all medical costs not covered by Medicare with very few out-of-pocket fees. The option proposed by CBO would have TFL beneficiaries responsible for the first \$525 of calendar year expenses beginning in 2011, and 50% percent of the next \$4,725 in Medicare cost sharing expenses incurred by the beneficiary. These dollar limits would be indexed to growth in average Medicare costs for later years. CBO also recommends that TLF beneficiaries reimburse DOD for treatment and pharmaceutical services received at military treatment facilities.

NGAUS and other military support organizations have fought hard to expand TRICARE benefits for our retirees who currently must wait until age 60 to qualify for TRICARE benefits. TRICARE for Life also provides welcomed relief to the financial pressures many of our members must bear while they await military retirement pay or medical benefits

For the TRICARE for Life benefit to remain meaningful to military retirees, Congress must not burden TLF beneficiaries with the out-of-pocket costs as is being proposed as an option by CBO.

Contact your congressional delegation and urge them to oppose any effort to introduce the cost sharing option recommended by the Congressional Budget Office.

• <u>Verification of Military Experience and Training (VMET) Website</u>. Department of Defense sponsors the Verification of Military Experience and Training (VMET) website. It provides eligible service members a VMET document (DD Form 2586) on demand.

The VMET data is a portion of a member's career history, which comes from a large database built over the years - with data received from the four service's official personnel and training systems. The site matches VMET occupational and training history data to time-appropriate narrative descriptions to generate the VMET document.

The VMET document was established effective 1 October 1990 as a tool to assist service members who were leaving the military. Therefore, all military members, except coast guard, who were serving on 1 October 1990, were included in the VMET database, and those members who had already left were not included.

This site was down for security reasons after 9/11, but it just came back on line. Information contained in VMET documents is current as of October 1, 2008.

• <u>Update on Department of Defense (DoD) Identification (ID) Card Initiatives</u>. In late December 2008, the DoD's Human Resources Activity, Defense Manpower Data Center issued a memorandum to update DoD ID card initiatives. The memorandum follows.

During the past several months, the Defense Manpower Data Center (DMDC) developed three initiatives that impact ID card production and usage: Social Security Number (SSN) Reduction, the Civilian Retiree Card, and a pilot program for the Logical Access Card for Volunteers otherwise known as the Volunteer Card Pilot. The SSN Reduction initiative involves the phased removal of SSNs from DoD ID cards in an effort to reduce the risk of identity theft to the DoD ID card population. The Civilian Retiree card initiative will provide a standardized DoD identification card for civilian employees who are retired from the DoD. The Volunteer Card Pilot applies to certain DoD volunteers, who in support of their duties, require a credential for DoD network access. These initiatives result in either change to an existing DoD ID card or the addition of new DoD ID card types. Implementation for all of these initiatives will begin in the near future.

Reducing the use of the SSN on DoD ID cards will occur in three phases. In Phase One, beginning December 2008, dependent SSNs will be removed from the printed surface of the ID card (sponsor SSNs will remain visible). In Phase Two, anticipated to begin by the end of calendar year 2009, all SSNs will be removed from the printed surface of all ID cards, with the exception of Geneva Conventions ID cards. The Geneva Conventions ID cards will retain the last four digits of the SSN. Phase Three will be implemented during calendar year 2012. In this phase, SSNs embedded in barcodes will be removed from all DoD ID cards. This means that any applications that read the SSN from the barcode will have to be modified prior to 2012. To

reduce workload at the ID card issuance sites, cardholders will be encouraged to wait until their current card expires prior to getting a new card that will include the changes identified above.

Issuance of a new DoD Civilian Retiree card will began in late December 2008. This chipless card can be used to establish identity and affiliation with DoD. It will provide retired DoD civilians with a uniform photo ID card that may be used to authorize use of local installation facilities. Possession and presentation of this card does not guarantee civilian retirees access to DoD bases or facilities. Installation Commanders establish the user population for their MWR facilities for reasons such as local demand, facility capacity, and security concerns. DMDC is working, in conjunction with Civilian Personnel Management Service (CPMS), to manage customer expectations regarding the card usage, and to minimize ID card facility impact. Issuance of this card will be by request of the retiree only – its issuance is not mandatory with the retirement of a Civil Servant.

Implementation of the Volunteer Card Pilot program will begin in late Winter/early Spring 2009. This card will have DoD Public Key Infrastructure (PKI) certificates and may be used by DoD volunteers who require logical access to a DoD network. This card will not have a photograph and will be used for network access only. Recipients of this card must be vetted with a National Agency Check (NAC) and sponsored by a DoD organization prior to issuance.

- <u>Guard/Reserve Welcomed at Exchanges</u>. The Army & Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) is reaching out to National Guard and Reservist personnel to remind them that, active duty or not, they are always able to use their exchange benefit. AAFES is sending direct mail as well as placing ads for <a href="www.aafes.com">www.aafes.com</a> in National Guard and Reserve publications in an effort to better inform and educate National Guard and Reserve Families about their exchange benefit. With 60 percent of Guard and Reserve Soldiers living more than 21 miles from their nearest exchange, AAFES is emphasizing its website at <a href="www.aafes.com">www.aafes.com</a> as a way for long-distance sponsors to take advantage of their exchange benefit.
- <u>New Veterans Affairs Website Debuts</u>. Returning Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom servicemembers have a newly enhanced Veterans Affairs website just for them. The Returning Servicemember's (OEF/OIF) website offers tailored information on Veterans Affairs services and programs, as well as video features and a blog.

- TRICARE Management Activity and the Military Health System. TRICARE Management Activity, the Defense Department activity that administers the health care plan for the uniformed services, retirees and their families, serves more than 9.2 million eligible beneficiaries worldwide in the Military Health System (MHS). The mission of the MHS is to enhance Department of Defense and national security by providing health support for the full range of military operations.
