## 2. Business.

- Editor's Comments: After I sent out the last two issues of **Retiree News**, all AOL addresses returned with a failure message. When I resent the issues out a few days later, the e-mail did go through. - The New 154<sup>th</sup> Wing Commander. As this issue of **Retiree News** is sent out, the command has not named the new 154<sup>th</sup> Wing commander. **Col Joseph Kim** continues doing an outstanding job leading the wing until the commander announcement is made. I will get announcement news out to you as soon as it is made by the command.
- <u>Secretary Shinseki Orders Emergency Checks to Students Awaiting Education Benefits</u>. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) issued the following press release about emergency GI Bill payments on September 27, 2009. However, there are procedures for outer island veterans to pick up their checks. More to come.

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE September 27, 2009

WASHINGTON – Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki announced the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has authorized checks for up to \$3,000 to be given to students who have applied for educational benefits and who have not yet received their government payment. The checks will be distributed to eligible students at VA regional benefits offices across the country starting Oct. 2, 2009.

"Students should be focusing on their studies, not worrying about financial difficulties," Secretary Shinseki said. "Education creates life-expanding opportunities for our Veterans."

Starting Friday, Oct. 2, 2009, students can go to one of VA's 57 regional benefit offices with a photo ID, a course schedule and an eligibility certificate to request advance payment of their housing and book allowance. Because not all these offices are located near students, VA expects to send representatives to schools with large Veteran-student bodies and work with Veteran Service Organizations to help students with transportation needs.

A list of those VA regional offices is available at www.vba.va.gov/VBA/benefits/offices.asp.

"I'm asking our people to get out their road maps and determine how we can reach the largest number of college students who can't reach us," VA's Under Secretary for Benefits Patrick Dunne said. "Not everyone has a car. Not everyone can walk to a VA benefits office."

Although VA does not know how many students will request emergency funds, it has approximately 25,000 claims pending that may result in payments to students.

The funds VA will give to students now are advance payments of the earned benefits for housing and books. This money will be deducted from future education payments.

VA officials said students should know that after this special payment, they can expect to receive education payments on the normal schedule -- the beginning of the month following the period for which they are reimbursed.

"This is an extraordinary action we're taking," said Shinseki. "But it's necessary because we recognize the hardships some of our Veterans face."

More than 27,500 students have already received benefits for housing or books under the new Post-9/11 GI Bill, or their schools received their tuition payments.

• Government Pension Offset (GPO)/Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP). Significant changes to Social Security in 1977 and 1983 cut Social Security benefits of many federal (Civil Service Retirement System) retirees and state/local government retirees who did not participate in Social Security during their state/federal government work years, but who qualify for Social Security based on other periods of employment.

In 1977, Congress passed a law change to prevent retirees who had been employed but didn't participate in Social Security from collecting both a government annuity based on their own work and social security benefits based on their spouse's work record. The so-called Government Pension Offset (GPO) rule applies to Civil Service Retirement system workers, many state education employees and others who were first eligible to retire in December 1982 and later, and whose employment wasn't covered by Social Security. The law makes such workers forfeit part or all of any social security benefits otherwise payable to the retired worker as the spouse or survivor of someone entitled to Social Security benefits. Lost Social Security benefits can amount to two-thirds of the person's government retired pay. For example, a surviving spouse who receives a civil service retirement of \$900 a month in his/her own right might become eligible for a Social Security survivor's benefit based on the spouse's Social Security-covered earnings. Two-thirds of his/her retirement annuity (\$600) exceeds the Social Security benefit, so the person would lose the entire Social Security survivor annuity.

The GPO currently affects over 401,000 beneficiaries.

Similarly, the Social Security Amendments of 1983 greatly reduced the Social Security benefit for similar groups of retirees who didn't participate in Social Security while working for the government, but who also worked in another Social-Security covered job at some point. The Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) applies to anyone in this category attaining age 62 after 1985 and becoming eligible for his/her government annuity after 1985 (both must occur after 1985). Congress provided for a five-year phase-in so that the maximum reduction would not occur until 1990. Those who became 62 in 1990 or reached that age after 1990 (and were not eligible for a federal annuity until after 1985) may face Social Security benefit reductions equaling up to60% of their non-Social-Security-covered retired pay.

Legislation to repeal the WEP and GPO penalties has been introduced in every Congress since these provisions were enacted. Despite having gained large cosponsor lists, leadership resistance to the estimated \$60 billion cost of repeal has inhibited passage of the legislation.

The WEP affects approximately 970,000 beneficiaries.

Several organizations like Military Officers Association of America (MOAA), the National Association of Retired Federal Employees (NARFE) and the Coalition to Assure Retirement Equity (CARE) to seek passage of remedial legislation. These organizations believe that both GPO and WEP provisions impose undue financial penalties

Representative Howard Berman has reintroduced repeal legislation as <u>H.R. 235</u>, and Senator Dianne Feinstein has introduced <u>S. 484</u>, in the 111th Congress.

• <u>New Address? Make Sure to Update DEERS</u>. FALLS CHURCH, Va. – Important life events like moving or having a child go off to college are milestones in military families' lives. No matter where their journeys take them, it's important for families to keep their DEERS records up to date whenever they hit these and many other milestones.

For TRICARE beneficiaries, keeping Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) records up-to-date means uninterrupted access to TRICARE's world-class health care. DEERS is the worldwide computer database of uniformed services members (sponsors), their family members and others eligible for military benefits, including TRICARE.

Mistakes or outdated information in DEERS can cause problems with a TRICARE beneficiary's claims. For example, retail network pharmacies check TRICARE eligibility through DEERS, and prescriptions are filled only for beneficiaries listed in DEERS as eligible. Outdated addresses can also mean important direct mail is misdirected.

Along with changes of address, other life events that can affect DEERS records include additions to the family, either through births or adoptions; changes in a sponsor's status such as retirement; marriage or divorce; becoming entitled to Medicare; or the death of a sponsor or family member.

Sponsors are automatically registered in DEERS, but it is critical they register their eligible family members as well. To register family members in DEERS and receive an ID card, the family member and sponsor must bring documentation, such as a marriage or birth certificate, to a military ID card issuing facility. Locate ID card offices by ZIP code, city or state using the ID card office locator at <a href="http://www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl">http://www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl</a>. Sponsors should call the ID card office first to confirm what documentation is needed and the hours of operation.

Contact information on DEERS can be updated in several different ways including in person at a military ID card issuing facility, online, and by phone, fax or mail. The photos will become a centerpiece in The Education Center at The Wall, a new facility to be built underground near the Vietnam and Lincoln memorials. FedEx Office centers around the country will collect and scan the photos. Jan Scruggs, founder and president of the memorial fund, said in a statement (<a href="http://www.vvmf.org/index.cfm?SectionID=808">http://www.vvmf.org/index.cfm?SectionID=808</a>) announcing the National Call for Photos, "It is vital we remember the individuals who made the ultimate sacrifice in Vietnam. ... The education center will allow us to put faces with the names on The Wall and learn some of their stories."
