


## ORGANIZATION AND MISSION

Dual Status. The Hawaii National Guard is a military organization which constitutes a portion of the reserve components of the Departments of the Army and of the Air Force. In normal circumstances the personnel of the Hawaii National Guard occupy a dual status; i.e., they are members of the organized militia of the Territory of Hawaii and as such are under the command of the Governor of Hawaii; and at the same time they are members of a reserve component of either the Army or the Air Force, and in that capacity they can be ordered into active Federal service by the President of the United States in time of national emergency. The term "Hawaii National Guard" refers to units of the organized militia while in the service of the Territory, and the term "National Guard of the United States" refers to the Federal reserve component status of those units.

Mission. The mission of the Hawaii National Guard remained unchanged during Fiscal Year 1958. As in past years, that mission consisted of two parts, the Territorial and the Federal. The Territorial mission is to provide organizations trained and equipped to function when necessary in the protection of life and property and in the preservation of peace, order, and the public safety as directed by competent Territorial authority. The Federal mission is to provide reserve components of the Army of the United States and of the United States Air Force able to furnish units trained and equipped to:

- (1) Defend critical areas of the United States against land, seaborne or airborne invasion.
- (2) Assist in covering the mobilization and concentration of the remainder of the reserve forces.
- (3) Participate by units in all types of operations, including the offensive, in either the United States or overseas.

**Organization.** The Military Department is the agency of the Territorial government responsible for the organization and supervision of the Hawaii National Guard and Territorial military affairs in general. The Military Department is headed by the Adjutant General of Hawaii, who is a member of the Governor's Cabinet. Components of the Military Department are the staff of the Adjutant General, the units of the Hawaii National Guard which include both air and army forces, and the unorganized militia when called into the active service of the Territory. The staff of the Adjutant General includes full-time officers and employees furnished at Territorial expense, the United States Property and Fiscal Officer (USP&FO) who is an officer of the Army on active duty, full-time employees furnished at Federal expense, and certain officers and enlisted men of the Hawaii National Guard on drill status. The units of the Hawaii National Guard include the officers and enlisted men on drill status, and a nucleus of full-time officers and employees furnished by both the Federal and Territorial governments.



# \* ARMY NATIONAL GUARD

Strength: On 30 June 1958 there were 4025 officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men in the active Army National Guard—a decrease of 706 individuals from the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. This decrease in strength is chiefly attributed to the mandatory elimination of enlisted personnel to meet the year-end ceiling strength of 4082 individuals imposed upon the Hawaii Army National Guard by the National Guard Bureau. The strength of 4025 on 30 June 1958 represents 61.2% of the authorized strength for all active army units and 98.6% of the ceiling strength for the Army National Guard. See Plate I and II for the Station List and Unit Strengths, and the Roster of Principal Commanders and Staff Officers, respectively.

Officer Personnel: There were 284 officers in the Army Guard as of 30 June 1958—a decrease of 10 officers from the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. During the fiscal year there was a total gain of 17 officers and a total loss of 27 officers from the active Army National Guard. During this period 15 new appointments were effected and 2 officers were transferred to the active National Guard from the inactive National Guard. Of the 15 appointments, 8 appointments were made from enlisted personnel of the Hawaii National Guard. See Plate III, IV, and V for officer Gains and Losses, Source of Officer Appointments, and Officer Separations, respectively.

Warrant Officer Personnel: There were 49 warrant officers in the Army Guard as of 30 June 1958—an increase of 4 individuals over the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. There was a total gain of 6 individuals and a total loss of 2 individuals during the fiscal year. See Plate VI for Warrant Officer Gains and Losses.

Enlisted Personnel: There were 3692 enlisted men in the active Army National Guard as of 30 June 1958-a decrease of 700 men from the strength at the end of the previous year. During the fiscal year, there were 593 new enlistments and reenlistments with break in National Guard service and 13 individuals transferred to the active National Guard from the inactive National Guard. During this same period, 1001 individuals were discharged and 305 individuals transferred to the inactive Guard. Of the total number discharged, 311 individuals or 31% were discharged to enlist or were inducted in the regular services. Of the 942 individuals discharged for expirations of term of enlistment, 745 were immediately reenlisted without break in service for an over-all reenlistment rate of 79%. See Plate VIII, IX, X and XI for Enlisted Personnel Gains and Losses, Source of Enlistments, Separations, and Reenlistments, respectively.

**Organization:** During the fiscal year there were no changes in the troop allotment of the HARNG.

- a. A request for authority to organize a RCAT Detachment submitted to the NGB was disapproved as there are no AAA Detachments (RCAT) available in the current NG troop basis.
- b. The following units were reorganized under new TOE's effective date 15 Feb 58. The only significant change was the inactivation of the separate AAA Bn Medi-

cal Det and the augmentation of a Medical Section within the Hq & Hq Btry of the AAA Bn.

**Training:** Continued under the Army Training Programs with emphasis being placed on the completion of Basic Combat and Advanced Individual Subjects. Basic Unit Training will be initiated by all units on 1 Oct 58. Basic Combat and Advanced Individual Subjects will be integrated into Basic Unit Training.

Inactive Duty Training: Forty-eight (48) two-hour armory drills were held by each unit. However, to take advantage of additional training hours for tactical and technical training, all units except the 111th Army Band and Hq & Hq Det scheduled a minimum of six (6) Sunday outdoor or multiple drills. The 298th AAA Group scheduled eighteen (18) such drills.

During December the 158th and 298th AAA Bns conducted service practice at Dillingham AFB. In February the 297th AAA Bn held their service practice. Service for the .50 caliber machine gun sections was held during May. The conduct of this practice requires much planning and coordination on the part of the various staffs. The support rendered by USARHAW in furnishing an RCAT Det, Ordnance technical representative and the use of the range was excellent.

The 299th RCT, 227th Engr Combat Bn and Special Troop Units completed individual qualification firing and conducted various phases of individual and basic unit training during Sunday drills.

The dates for the 298th AAA Group was extended over a four week period due to the lack of adequate ranges and the availability of only one (1) RCAT Det.

The training mission was achieved with the major efforts directed towards small unit tactical exercises and combat firing. Headquarters, 298th AAA Group qualified under Army Training Test 44-5. All AAA Battalions passed the firing phase of Army Training Test 44-1. As a project, the 227th Engr Bn (C) (A) and the 230th Engr Co constructed gun emplacements at the on-site positions of the 158th AAA Bn. The Special Troops units conducted normal support operations. The cooperation and support rendered by the Regular Service was excellent. A five (5) man advisor team and an eight (8) man umpire team from the Air Defense School, Ft. Bliss, Texas, assisted the 298th AAA Group throughout the encampment.

Inspections: The annual General Inspections were conducted during the period of September-November 1957. The purpose of these inspections is to determine the degree of compliance by the National Guard with requirements established by the Federal Government and covers administration, supply, training, personnel qualification, morale, appearance and facilities.

Field training inspections were conducted by the Army to determine the proficiency of units in the field. Each unit was rated on its military discipline and courtesy, appearance and personnel hygiene, food service, supply, economy, transportation, maintenance, and weapons, communications, individual tactical and functional team training as well as methods of instruction, unit tactical training, command supervision and planning of training and staff performance.

#### **EXERCISES**

Civil Defense Activities: The Hawaii National Guard participated in one (1) Civil Defense Exercise (Operation Alert 1958) which was conducted during the period 5-7 May 1958. Although participation was limited to the State Staff and the Ft Ruger HNG Internal Security Detachment the operation proved very beneficial in developing techniques in the employment of Guardsmen in their territorial mission.

Kona Drought Disaster: The HNG supported the Civil Defense Agency during the period 6 Feb · 8 Mar 58 by furnishing truck drivers, six (6) 750 gal water tankers, six (6) 450 gal water trailers and five (5) gal water cans.

The Guardsmen assisted by hauling water from the primary water points at Honakuhau, Holualoa, Konawaena and Honaunau in the drought area to local distribution points. From the points water was issued in five gallou cans to the population.

During the operation a total of 3,968,700 gallons of water was hauled to the drought area from Kohala-Waimea districts by HNG and commercial tankers and from Oahu by barge.

Operation "Slow Down & Live": The 120th MP Co supported by selected personnel from the 120th Sig Spt Co, 121st Sig Det and 613th Ord Co were called to active duty in the service of the Territory during the period 30 May · 1 Jun 58 to assist the Honolulu Police Department in accident prevention. The duties consisted of patrolling highways and congested areas on Oahu and reporting traffic violations to the Honolulu Police Department for necessary action. MP vehicles carried signs bearing the National Slogan "Slow Down and Live."

Schools: During FY 58, 133 officers and enlisted men attended Mainland and USARHAW/25th Inf Div Schools at a cost to the Federal Government of \$189,034.64. Plate XIII gives a breakdown of attendance by school and classes.

Army Extension Schools: These correspondence courses offered by the various service schools are an important source of military education and a means for the individual to qualify for promotions or to retire a waiver of professional knowledge. A total of 248 officers and enlisted men actively pursued these courses during the year. (See Plate XIII.)

6 Months Active Duty for Training Program: 303 individuals entered this training during the year. This program has proven very beneficial to both the unit and individual. However, due to quotas imposed by the Department of the Army many individuals were not able to attend.

Marksmanship: A 7-man pistol team and a 10-man rifle team represented the Hawaii National Guard at the National Matches. The pistol team won the "General Hugh Mellon Trophy" in the National Trophy Team Match and two (2) of the other three (3) team matches in the NG Class. The rifle team placed third in the National Trophy team match and was High NG in the Enlisted Men Team Match. In the Individual Matches each team won nine (9) individual awards.

The Hawaii National Guard conducted the All Service Cal .30 Rifle Tournament in July and the Territorial Law Enforcement Pistol Tournament in September. Both tournaments were highly successful. In the All Service Tournament the HNG team captured 1st and 2d place honors in the individual and team matches over teams from all other services.

The 121st Sig Det won the Sixth Army Area "Pershing Trophy" and was declared the National winner and awarded the "National Guard Association Trophy" in the National Guard Association Rifle competition (Sec II, NGR 44) with a Figure of Merit of 97.5%.

The annual NRA Indoor Smallbore Rifle Match was conducted during the period November 57 through February 58. The 613th Ord Co (DS) successfully defended their title in the Hawaii National Guard Territorial Championships with a score of 1374, a new HNG record. Second place honors went to Hq, Hq & Svc Co, 227th Engr Bn. The winning team score has been entered in the Sixth Army and National competition against all other State Champions.

The Hawaii National Guard entered teams in the Hawaii Pacific Smallbore, Pistol and High Power Rifle Regional Tournaments. The Smallbore Team captured the Individual and Team Championships and won approximately 70% of the awards against a field of the best

civilian and regular service smallbore shooters in the Territory. Sgt Thomas Ortegero, 298th AAA Bn and SP3 Myles Brown, 613th Ord Co set a new Regional record in the Iron Sight Team Match with a score of 796-55X.

The Hawaii Pacific Pistol Regionals, conducted by the HNG, was the largest attended pistol tournament in the Territory to date with 243 individuals and 48 teams competing. In addition to local military and civilian shooters there were service teams from the West Coast, Okinawa and Japan. The HNG team placed 3d in the .22 Caliber and 2d in the Center Fire and .45 Caliber team matches.

In the Rifle Regionals the HNG team placed 2d in a field of 50 teams and SP3 Myles Brown, 613th Ord Co (DS) won the individual aggregate match with a 495-64V over 250 competitors. The Guardsmen also won many other individual awards.

Sports: To maintain the high Esprit de Corps an aggressive sports program was conducted under the guidance of the HNG Athletic Committee. A softball, volleyball, basketball and baseball program was vigorously pursued. The major organizations or Island Commands conducted elimination tournaments in each sport. The winners from each island—Oahu, Hawaii, Maui, Kauai and Molokai—were then assembled to determine the Territorial Champions.

Co L, 299th Inf (Hawaii) defeated Btry D, 297th AAA Bn (Oahu) in the finals (1-0) and was crowned the Softball Champions.

The 613th Ord Co (Oahu) was dethroned after holding the volleyball title for five (5) consecutive years by Co K, 299th Inf (Hawaii).


The 613th Ord Co won the basketball championship by defeating the Tank Co, 299th Inf (Hawaii) in the finals 70-46.

Mobilization Assignment: The announced mobilization assignments of the 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, 109th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, and 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron to Pacific Air Forces and of the 199th Weather Flight (Forecasting) to Military Air Transport Service, remained unchanged.

**Inspections:** The Hawaii Air National Guard was rated "satisfactory" in all inspections conducted during Fiscal Year 1958.

Air Force Advisers: The USAF Adviser Unit assigned to the Hawaii Air National Guard is based at Hickam Air Force Base, T. H. The unit is headed by Lt. Colonel John C. Giraudo, assisted by Major William Kral and four technical advisers.

## **ORGANIZATION**

Headquarters, Hawaii Air National Guard: The structure and manning of the federally recognized Headquarters, Hawaii Air National Guard remained unchanged.

169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron: The 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron on 15 December 1957 was relocated to Koko Head Radar Station, T.H., to enhance the effective training of the organization with better utilization of equipment at the site.

#### OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

Training: Training during All-Day assemblies and Field Training was based on the needs of each section and training directives published by National Guard Bureau, Continental Air Command, Pacific Air Forces and Headquarters, Hawaii Air National Guard. The requirements from these sources were incorporated into unit training programs. All-Day Assemblies held on two Sundays a month by all units remained unchanged. The average drill attendance of HAFNG Units for the year ended 30 June 1958 was 95%. Winners of HAFNG Attendance Trophy are as follows: 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron for quarter ended 30 September 1957; 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron for quarter ended 31 December 1957; 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron for quarters ended 31 March 1958 and 30 June 1958. The annual field training attendance averaged 98% for the entire Hawaii Air National Guard. Headquarters, Hawaii Air National Guard and the 199th Weather Flight (Forecasting) had 100% attendance.

# **ACTIVITIES**

Fighter: The 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadrou converted from F-86E day fighters to F-86L all weather fighters with the first "L" being received on 5 February 1958. The new aircraft is a lethal weapon which is not restricted to visual contact during daytime; it can perform its mission day or night and in any type of weather. Instead of machine guns, the F-86L carries the "Mighty Mouse" air-to-air rockets.

On 1 May 1958 the "L" replaced the "E" on the Air Defense Augmentation program and the Hawaii Air National Guard received a wire of congratulations from the Chief, National Guard Bureau on the rapid conversion"The Best Yet." By the end of June 1958 all tactical pilots of the Hawaii Air National Guard units had been transitioned into the new aircraft.

During conversion, the unit received big assists from the local Air Force. Personnel had to be retrained for the more complex aircraft and supplies and support equipment procured. First, the F-86-6 Mobile Training Detachment instructed all personnel concerned with the ground training requirements; secondly, the assignment of three well qualified all weather jet pilots to the 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron was accomplished to assist in the flying training of tactical pilots. Without the assistance of these pilots, transition would not have progressed smoothly or rapidly. They have been of tremendous value to the squadron.

During the fiscal period, 6,854 jet hours were flown by HAFNG pilots, an increase of 153 hours over the previous year's 6,701 jet hours. The tactical pilots averaged 201 hours of flying time. Considering the fact that each hour flown is tactical flying—gunnery, tactics, radar intercepts, etc.—this is a notable achievement even for an active duty outfit.

Field Training: Units of the Hawaii Air National Guard reported on 21 June 1958 for 15 days of active duty for training. For the first time, Pacific Air Forces conducted a Practice Mobilization Test of all units on the first day of camp, commencing at 0300 hours, resulting in an overall percentage of 72.5% of the available personnel reporting for duty within two hours. Also, for the first time, PACAF conducted their annual general air inspection during field training. All units were given a Satisfactory Rating. During this inspection, an Operational Readiness Evaluation (ORE) was conducted to provide a status report of the progress made by the tactical units in developing an all-weather air defense capability. Considering the fact that the 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron had just been converted to all-weather aircraft and that new tactics had to be learned by all personnel, all units performed in an excellent manner during the ORE.

Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons: During November, the 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron commenced installation of new radar equipment at the Koko Head Radar Station, officially inaugurating the 24-hour operation on 1 February 1958. This operation is comparable to the 24-hour operation of the 109th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron at Punamano Radar Station. Implementation of the Koko Head Radar Station into the Air Defense System of Hawaii gave the Pacific Air Forces a 360-degree coverage for the first time.

In addition, 205 applications for enrollment in the USAF Extension Course Institute were submitted.

#### PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

Strength: On 30 June 1958 there were 870 officers, warrant officers, and enlisted personnel in the Hawaii Air National Guard—a decrease of 23 individuals from the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. This fiscal year-end total represents 96.6% of the authorized strength for HAFNG. Plates I and II reflect Station List and Unit Strengths, and the Roster of Principal Commanders and Staff Officers, respectively.

Officer Personnel: There were 104 officers in the Hawaii Air National Guard as of 30 June 1958—an increase of 25 officers from the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. During the fiscal year there was a total gain of 44 officers and a total loss of 19 officers. During this period 25 new appointments were effected, of the 25 appointments, 2 were made from enlisted personnel of the HAFNG and 9 from the Aviation Cadet Training program. Plates III, IV and V reflect Officer Gains and Losses, Source of Officer Appointments and Officer Separations, respectively.

Warrant Officer Personnel: The five warrant officers assigned in the Hawaii Air National Guard remained unchanged from the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. Plate VI reflects Warrant Officer Gains and Losses.

Enlisted Personnel: There were 761 airmen in the Hawaii Air National Guard as of 30 June 1958—an increase of 32 airmen from the strength at the end of the previous fiscal year. During the fiscal year there was a total gain of 292 airmen and a total loss of 260 airmen. During this period 189 enlistments and reenlistments were effected and 225 airmen were discharged. Of the total number discharged, 17 were discharged to enlist or were inducted into the regular services. Of the 169 airmen discharged for expirations of term of enlistment, 148 were reenlisted without a break in service for an over-all reenlistment rate of 87.6% Plates VIII, X and XI reflect Enlisted Personnel Gains and Losses, Enlisted Personnel Discharges and Reenlistment Rate, respectively.

## **MATERIEL**

Supply: The logistical support furnished by Hawaii Air National Guard Base Supply Supervisor/Assistant USP&FO for Air (Property) to units of the Hawaii Air National Guard remained unchanged. During the fiscal year vouchers were processed for the receipt, issue and shipment of supplies and equipment. The 30 June 1958

monetary value of warehouse stocks was \$3,120,566.21. Due to the mission aircraft change of the 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, there were many transfers and adjustments of property.

Aircraft Maintenance: The mission aircraft change from F-86E to F-86L required retraining of aircraft maintenance personnel so that they could effectively inspect and repair the new aircraft and its numerous electronic systems. Many of the conversion problems confronting the section were appreciably reduced when all personnel attended the phased classes conducted by personnel of the F-86-6 Mobile Training Detachment. With the arrival of the aircraft in February 1958, a new maintenance concept became evident, when compared to the old J-47 engine. The "L" has an afterburner, creating an extensive amount of additional maintenance. Then too, numerous fuel electronic problems will be created with engine intergrating and the electronic and fuel control systems, in addition to the line items of equipment urgently required to support this aircraft in a flyable condition.

On May 1, 1958, the F-86E aircraft was removed from the Air Defense Augmentation Program, to be replaced by the F-86L, but with a NAFAR sight capability only. The "E's" were then phased out on the 30th of May 1953 and placed into storage to be salvaged by the Air Force. As the squadron gains experience, the aircraft maintenance section will be able to accomplish the operational capability with the "L" aircraft as it did with the "E".

Facilities: \$69,417.41 of federal funds were expended in support of Hawaii Air National Guard repairs, construction and rehabilitation. Construction of additional classrooms, a larger engine shop and operations building and minor building modifications were performed at the Hawaii Air National Guard area, Hickam Air Force Base. An operations building is now under construction at the Punamano Radar Station, with an estimated date of completion of 15 September 1958.


#### COMPTROLLER

The Hawaii Air National Guard Base Accounting Office effected the responsibility of the integrated accounting system for the Hawaii Air National Guard. This accounting system consisted of appropriation accounting, cost accounting, inventory accounting monetary system, equipment in use by units, aircraft accounting, real property and civilian payroll.



## SUPPORT - LOGISTICS - CONSTRUCTION

#### Territorial Support

Total expenditure out of Territorial funds in support of the Military Department and the Hawaii National Guard during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958 was as follows:

This amount compared with the \$8,803,320.72 expended out of Federal funds during the same period represents a 14.93 to 1 ratio of Territorial and Federal expenditures in support of departmental requirements.

Appropriated Funds: These funds which are made available by legislative appropriations on a biennual basis. The allocation for fiscal year 1958 amounted to \$535,-113.55 and was expended as follows:

Special Funds: These funds accrue to the Military Department from revenues out of rentals of armories and leases of reservations and facilities as authorized by Sec 353-25 Revised Laws of Hawaii 1955. Special Fund revenues supplement Appropriated Funds to finance the maintenance and upkeep of grounds and facilities under the jurisdiction of the Military Department. The following reflects the financial status of this fund for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958 and a recapitulation of Special Fund receipts and expenditures for the same period.

Continuous Appropriation: The Military Department is supplemented biennually with Continuous Appropriation Funds which are made available as needed to finance pay of enlisted Guardsmen attending annual field training and active duty pay and allowance of officers

and enlisted personnel ordered to active duty in the service of the Territory of Hawaii.

The field training pay to Guardsmen serves as an incentive to enlisted personnel to attend annual encampment and further subsidizes and makes up pay which is lost from civilian employment to Guardsmen attending field training.

During the fiscal year, Guardsmen were ordered into active service of the Territory on two occasions. The first was during the months of February and March when Guardsmen assisted with the Kona Drought Project and the second during the Memorial Day weekend when they were ordered to assist in the Safety on the Highway program conducted May 30th through June 1, 1958.

Service Contract: The Military Department is provided Federal support under the Service Contract Program wherein certain expenditures for personal services and operational costs are subsidized out of Federal funds. These contracts negotiated annually between the Territory of Hawaii and the Federal Government provide for reimbursement of 75% of certain maintenance and operational costs to the Territory for installations which are Federally owned or licensed to the Territory of Hawaii. During the fiscal year the 6 Army Service Contracts realized a total of \$72,671.87 in reimbursements while the 3 Air Service Contracts provided for a total reimbursement of \$15,965.32. **Personnel:** The Military Department was authorized a total of 96.5 positions for the fiscal year. Of these, 95.0 positions were filled at the end of the fiscal year.

#### CONSTRUCTION

Armory: Two armory construction projects were completed in Fiscal Year 1958 under the provisions of Public Law 783, 81st Congress, which provides for Federal support of essential armory construction. A single-unit armory at Kahului, Maui, was completed and accepted on 5 November 1957. Total cost of the project was \$139,292.00 of which amount the Federal Government paid \$92,193.00 and the Territory of Hawaii \$47,099.00. This armory furnishes facilities for Company C of the 299th Regimental Combat Team. A three-unit armory at Wahiawa, Oahu, to house three units of the 297th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battalion was completed and accepted on 20 June 1958. Total cost of this project was \$251,656.24 of which the Federal Government furnished \$173,129.79 and the Territory of Hawaii share was \$78,526.45.

Site engineering and preparation of preliminary drawings are now in progress for a four-unit armory to be located at Fort Ruger which will cost in the neighborhood of \$420,000.00. It is expected that this project will be under contract early in calendar year 1959. Also planned for construction in FY 1959 are extensions to the existing armories located at Lihue, Kauai, and Hilo, Hawaii, each of which is estimated to cost approximately \$60,000.00.

Non-Armory: Only two non-armory construction projects were awarded during Fiscal Year 1958, both of which were for the Hawaii Air National Guard. The first was for the construction of an operations building and other facilities at the upper base camp of the 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, Koko Head, Oahu, amounting to \$39,960.00, and the second for construction of an operations building for the 109th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron at Punamano Radar Station, Kahuku, Oahu, in the amount of \$31,330.00. Funds for both of these projects were furnished 100% by the Federal Government.

Maintenance and Repairs: Major repair and rehabilitation projects accomplished during Fiscal Year 1958 utilizing Territorial funds available to this office are shown in Plate XII.

## LOGISTICS

General: The United States Property and Fiscal Officer for Hawaii is the accountable officer for all Federal property loaned to the Territory of Hawaii for the use of the Hawaii Army and Air Force National Guard, and is responsible for the administration of all Federal funds allocated to the Territory of Hawaii for the support of the Hawaii National Guard.

Federal funds support the procurement, storage, and issue of supplies and equipment; maintenance of equipment; transportation of personnel, supplies, and equipment; and the accounting system necessary to disburse and record these funds. The Office of the USP&FO is organized with four divisions: Administrative, Fiscal, Supply, and Maintenance. A rating of Superior was received from the USARPAC Inspector General for the 1958 inspection.

Administrative: This division maintains the central filing system which includes policy correspondence, Army Regulations, National Guard Regulations, and other publications. Secretarial and clerical duties are accomplished according to work load requirements. The publishing of

bulletins, circulars, and procedures is accomplished utilizing a new Model 750 Multigraph machine. The Field Audit program is managed by this division and conducted 103 audits of memorandum receipt accounts, 6 cycle inventories of the PFO warehouses, as well as internal audits of the stock record account of the Supply Division.

Fiscal: The Army National Guard is supported by three Federal appropriations—"Army National Guard," "Maintenance and Operations," and "Military Construction, Army Reserve Forces." The fiscal support is defined in an annual Funding Program issued to each state by the National Guard Bureau. The Air National Guard is supported under the appropriation "Air National Guard." The National Guard Bureau issues quarterly allotments at the appropriation level, together with authority for distributing funding support to various fiscal projects to meet programmed objectives. This method allows the Territory maximum flexibility in utilization of allotted funds. Federal funds expended in support of the Army and Air National Guard during fiscal year 1958 are shown in Plate XIV. Certain other Federal funds are allotted to depots, both Army and Air, in support of the National Guard and are not reflected in Plate XIV. This support includes non-stock fund equipment and supplies, and depot repair costs.

The Budget & Fiscal Officer (O/USP&FO) is responsible for the effective management, utilization, and accounting for all Federal funds allotted to the Territory. Funds for the Air National Guard are sub-allotted to the assistant USP&FO for Air (Fiscal) located at Hickam Air Force Base.

The mission of the Fiscal Accounting Section is the accounting, obligating, processing for payment, and reporting of all transactions involving Federal funds. Such transactions include civilian and military payrolls, requisitions, purchase documents, bills of lading, construction and service contracts, and transportation requests.

The Purchasing and Contracting Section is responsible for the negotiation and purchase of all operating supplies, equipment, and services not available at Army and Air Force supply installations. Purchases and contracts initiated during the fiscal year are as follows:

The Transportation Section arranges for and routes all passenger and cargo traffic requirements. Passenger travel is arranged with Military Air Transport Service and commercial air, rail, and highway carriers for travel to service schools, field training, and other National Guard activities. Cargo shipments are contracted for with local carriers through the Military Sea Transport Service or with local airline carriers. The Civilian Payroll Section is responsible for the computation and preparation of technician payrolls, maintenance of time and leave records, and the compilation of tax records and reports. Total monthly payrolls for FY 1958 for the Army and Air Force National Guard technicians were:

All National Guard technicians were integrated into the Territorial Employees Retirement System as Class A members on 1 January 1958.

Supply: The implementation of the Financial Inventory Accounting System has reduced, within eighteen months, the number of stock record cards maintained from 20,000 to 9,486. The division is operating on the "demand basis" of requisitioning and stocking. Only those items having three demands in 180 days are stocked. This system generated many excesses which must be turned into Army technical service depots. The adaption of the single line item issue slip and turn-in slip resulted in a total of 31,717 vouchers in FY 1958.

Continuous screening of equipment authorizations is resulting in our excess program and standardizing items within our supply system. There are no great problem areas in procurement of equipment, other than certain critical fire control items for the AAA program.

To expedite operations and to increase efficiency, the Financial Inventory Accounting Division was moved into the Supply Division and became an operating section in November 1957. As of 31 December 1957, cycle inventories and reconciliation of all technical services categories were completed and our first official Supply Management Report submitted to the National Guard Bureau. As was expected, many changes and new regulations affected FIA

operations. For example: 1 January 1958 about 700 costing categories were utilized, these were reduced to 350 by 30 June, however, beginning 1 July will be increased to 650 due to change made by the Ordnance Corps. Almost all forms have had one revision and more changes are expected as more efficient methods are devised.

Warehouse personnel received, stored, issued, maintained or delivered 32,196 line items of supplies in FY 1958. The largest project for the warehouse section is the excess property program. Supplies totaling \$3,265,799.28 were reported as excess and of this amount, supplies totaling \$2,602,025.86 were turned in to the Disposal Officer or Army Depots.

To further reduce paper transactions and to provide faster, better support to units, an Exchange Store has been established at Fort Ruger. This store exchanges new equipment for equipment worn out in service or exchanges sizes of same equipment. Only items of individual equipment are handled presently. Plans for expansion of this facility will be implemented in FY 1959.

Maintenance: The State Maintenance Division is charged with the responsibility of providing maintenance support to all elements of the Hawaii Army National Guard. Within this division and under the general supervision of the State Maintenance Officer are the following facilities to provide the necessary maintenance support:

In addition to the above facilities, there are eleven (11) Battalion Organizational Maintenance Shops strategically located throughout the islands. These shops are organized and controlled at organizational level and are designed to provide commanders with direct organizational maintenance support. The State Maintenance Officer, however, is responsible for providing technical assistance and operational support to these Battalion Organizational Maintenance Shops.

Performance of field or depot type maintenance of equipment (except Army aircraft) not within the capabilities of the using organizations are accomplished at the two Combined Field Maintenance Shops, or are further evacuated to the appropriate technical service division of USARHAW/25th Infantry Division. Throughout the year, considerable field maintenance on vehicles, engineer equipment, signal equipment, weapons, and other miscellaneous items, including inspections, are performed by the personnel of the two Combined Field Maintenance Shops. The bar graphs below summarize the operational data of the two shops during Fiscal Year 1958 and provide comparative figures for similar operations during the previous fiscal year:

Army aircraft issued to the Hawaii Army National Guard are maintained and operated from three Army aircraft maintenance shops. The maintenance performed at the Army Aircraft Organizational Maintenance Shops located at Lyman Field, Hilo, and Kahului Airport, Maur, are limited to first and second echelon (organizational) maintenance. The higher third and fourth echelon (field) maintenance are performed at the Army Aircraft Maintenance Shop located at the Honolulu International Airport. During Fiscal Year 1958, the seven Army aircraft were based and operated from the shops indicated below:

**Technician Programs:** During the fiscal year a total of 346 full-time civilian technicians, under the Army program, were employed. This was an increase of 27 technicians from the FY 1957.

The Army technician program operated under five separate projects during the year:

Project 7512 (National Guard Operating Forces Technicians) had 121 technicians employed.

Project 7513 (USP&FO Technicians) had 52 technicians employed.

Project 7514 (Field Maintenance Technicians) had 99 technicians employed.

Project 7522 (Ranges) had 7 rangekeepers employed. Project 7621 (Antiaircraft On-Site Technicians) had 67 technicians employed.

These technicians were employed to operate the various activities of Administrative and Supply Maintenance of the Army units, Battalion Organizational Maintenance Shops, Office of the United States Property & Fiscal Officer, Field Maintenance Shops, and Concentration Sites.

A new section added to our full-time employment during the year was the activation of the Integrated Fire Control Team, under the On-Site program. This team gave us an initial additional employment quota of 5 technicians.

During the fiscal year there were 652 personnel changes: appointments 66, terminations 35, salary increases 379, step changes only 42, reassignments with increase 30, reassignments without increase 24, and position title changes without increase 76.
