


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




NEW WAILUKU ARMORY, WAILUKU, MAUI Construction started January 8, 1937. To be completed about December 1, 1937.



ANNUAL REPORT

of

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL, TERRITORY OF HAWAII July 1, 1936—June 30, 1937

INTRODUCTION

During the past fiscal year, an increase of two Rifle Companies, one Machine Gun Company, one Battalion Headquarters, and one Battalion Headquarters Company was authorized for the Hawaii National Guard. Company K, 299th Infantry, was mustered into service at Hoolehua, Molokai, on April 26, 1937, and is the first new unit organized under a Congressional plan to expand the National Guard of the United States at the rate of 5,000 officers and men annually. This is the first unit ever to be organized on the Island of Molokai. Other units are authorized for organization on the Island of Kauai, where new units of the National Guard have not been organized since 1918, when the then existing units were mustered into Federal Service.

The Military Department, comprising Headquarters of the Hawaii Guard, is organized to carry out duties pertaining to administration, training, supply, construction and transportation normally delegated to a command equivalent to a brigade of infantry. The department is organized into the following sections:

- 1. Personnel
- 2. Intelligence
- 3. Plans and Training
- 4. Supply, Finance, Construction and Transportation
- Territorial Staff Group (Medical, Legal, Administrative, Inspection, Transportation and Supply.)

Due to limited available military personnel and clerical assistance, it is necessary for one person to perform the duties of more than one section.

Office Administration—On February 16, 1937, Captain Joseph I. deVille, Finance Department, H.N.G., succeeded Captain James A. Ryan, USA-Retired, as Administrative Assistant of the department. The volume of routine correspondence handled by this headquarters is heavy, in excess of 7,500 communications being handled yearly.

The strength of the Hawaii National Guard on June 30, 1937, represents a decrease of 2 commissioned officers and an increase of 1 warrant officer and 56 enlisted men over that shown on June 30, 1936.

On the Inactive List are one (1) Lieutenant Colonel, four (4) Captains, one (1) First Lieutenant, two (2) Second Lieutenants and two hundred and sixty-four (264) enlisted men.

Armory Training—In all units of the Hawaii National Guard during the past year the armory training was generally satisfactory. All units were rated "Satisfactory" in the Annual Armory Inspection by the Federal Inspectors. Company G, 298th Infantry, received a general rating of "Unsatisfactory" by the Territorial Inspector General. This rating was due to a combination of circumstances and conditions not the fault of any particular individual. These have now been corrected.

During this period units of the Guard participated in the following community exercises:

Field Training—In 1936 field training was conducted at Fort Shafter, Oahu, for the Territorial Staff; Fort Armstrong, Oahu, for the Territorial Detachment; Kawaihapai, Oahu, for the 298th Infantry; and Paukukalo, Maui, for the 299th Infantry. During the field training period all units were inspected by a Federal Inspection Board and rated "Satisfactory." This rating covers all phases of training and the percentage of readiness to take the field for combat service.

Schools—Armory Schools were conducted for officers, noncommissioned officers and specialists in all organizations during the past year. Every effort is being made to keep these schools on a practical plane to prevent them from degenerating into lectures on pure theory. A number of training films, property of the United States Army, were secured and shown for the benefit of both officers and enlisted men. Chief among the exercises conducted during this past year was a Brigade Command Post Exercise for the staff and communications personnel of the 298th and 299th Infantries at and near Fort Ruger. The 1st Battalion, 299th Infantry, conducted an overnight exercise for units of that battalion on Maui. Exercises of this type provide excellent training for all concerned and demonstrate the high morale of the members of the Guard as these exercises are all conducted without pay, as are all armory schools.

A large number of officers and selected enlisted men have taken advantage of the Army Extension Courses of the Hawaiian Department Extension School to improve their military education and general efficiency. For a number of years we have recognized the value of these courses as a means of building up military knowledge qualifications of officers, and have now inserted a requirement in our local regulations making it mandatory for officers to complete the appropriate course of the next higher grade before they are considered eligible for promotion.

Captain Nohea O. A. Peck, 298th Infantry, and Captain Nash A. Witten, 299th Infantry, attended the National Guard and Reserve Officers' Course at The Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, from March 1 to May 29, 1937. Technical Sergeant Eli D. Panee, Headquarters Company, 298th Infantry, attended the Communications Course at The Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, from February 23 to May 29, 1937. The above-mentioned officers and enlisted man graduated with creditable ratings.

Marksmanship—Marksmanship qualifications throughout the several units of the Guard are, generally speaking, satisfactory. Some units of the 299th Infantry which do not have range facilities at their home stations, and which have to travel several miles for this purpose, have marksmanship ratings not entirely satisfactory. While every effort will be made to improve the marksmanship qualifications of these units, it is anticipated that this problem will not be solved satisfactorily until range facilities are made available at the station of each unit. Experiments are being conducted by the War Department with 1000-inch ranges for .30 caliber work. With the adoption of a 1000-inch range for .30 caliber marksmanship qualifications, a range could be provided at or near each armory of the Guard.

Company E, 299th Infantry, stationed at Papaikou, Hawaii, won the National Trophy among units of the Hawaii National Guard for excellence in rifle marksmanship during the past training year. The War Department issues a certificate for this award, which becomes the permanent property of the unit.

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In the Pershing Trophy contest throughout the National Guard at large the 299th Infantry finished in 34th place, out of 88 teams competing.

Company C, 298th Infantry, won the Chief of the National Guard Bureau's Indoor Company Team Match among company teams of the Hawaii National Guard. It finished in 78th place among all teams competing throughout the National Guard at large, which totaled 225. The 298th Infantry also won the Chief of the National Guard Bureau's Regimental Team Match in the Hawaii National Guard. This team finished in 9th place throughout the United States, in a field of 40 competing teams.

New Units—During this fiscal year the Hawaii National Guard received an additional allotment of twelve officers and two hundred and seventeen enlisted men for the purpose of organizing the 3rd Battalion, 299th Infantry (less Company L). Due to a shortage of funds in the National Guard Bureau, these units were authorized for muster into the service on and after April 1, 1937. Company K, 299th Infantry, was accordingly organized and mustered into service at Hoolehua, Molokai, on April 26, 1937. Lack of adequate armory facilities has prevented the organization and muster of the units assigned to the Island of Kauai to date. It is hoped that the armory situation will be clarified at an early date and that these units will be mustered in. There is an abundance of officer and enlisted personnel on the Island of Kauai with which to form these units if and when armories become available.

3RD SECTION—SUPPLY, FINANCE, CONSTRUCTION AND TRANSPORTATION

Capt. Joseph I. deVille, F.D., HNG, U.S.P. & D.O. and Territorial Quartermaster—Chief of Section

I-General

The condition of property and property accounts in the Hawaii National Guard has improved in the past year and outstanding shortages now amount to approximately \$1,000.00. The past year has been an active one, and more vouchers, both property and fiscal, were handled than in any previous year of existence. A total of 55 shipments was received from mainland supply depots.

Pursuant to instructions from the War Department, a service test was made of fabric helmets, and a board of officers appointed to report on adoption. The board, after study, recommended that the helmets be not adopted.

Field caps were authorized on September 10, 1936, for wear off duty. Trousers have been authorized for wear at armory drills by officers and men, providing the entire unit is so equipped. This authorization was received in a letter from The Adjutant General of the Army dated May 4, 1937.

It is contemplated during the coming year that a clothing fitting room be established in the Honolulu Armory.

A board of officers was convened during the past year for the purpose of determining a definite supply policy and program, and to determine the method whereby units of the Hawaii National Guard would be supplied in time of mobilization. The board recommended that: (1) Units be issued automatically all of the equipment called for in applicable Tables of Equipment at their authorized strength; (2) that property in excess of this amount in the hands of units be recalled for storage; (3) that bins be provided in Territorial storage for units not now at Peace Strength, for the purpose of storing the equipment, if available, for all units at Peace Strength, and which is not already in the hands of units. The recommendations of the board were approved, and property is now issued to units automatically without requisition.

The War Department has authorized the Hawaii National Guard to install, maintain and operate non-tactical fixed radio stations on a frequency of 2764 kilocycles. The call letters authorized are:

WXZA-Net Call, Hawaii National Guard

WXZB-Honolulu

WXZC-Wailuku

WXZD-Hilo

It is contemplated that this net will be used by the 299th Infantry for training purposes. Radio sets have been built and are ready for service.

This department now operates a Salvage and Repair Section. The shop is located in the Honolulu Armory and is equipped with lathes, band saws, planer, jointer, air compressor and a tool grinder. The major portion of repairs to both Federal and Territorial equipment is done in this shop and represents a considerable saving to this department.

Report of Inactive Personnel as of June 30, 1937—The Inactive National Guard consists of 1 Lt. Colonel; 4 Captains; 1 1st Lieutenant; 2 2nd Lieutenants (a total of 8 officers); and 264 enlisted men. Four enlisted men hold commissions as 2nd Lieutenants in the infantry branch of the National Guard of the United States.

Armory Training Year—Administration of the Inactive officers and enlisted men has been performed by this department during this fiscal year.

Annual Field Training—The annual field training was performed at Headquarters Hawaiian Department from July 11 to 25, 1936, incl.

Medical Section—Major F. L. Morong, M.C., Chief of Section

Smallpox and Typhoid Prophylaxis—In the 298th and 299th Infantries smallpox and typhoid prophylaxis is (with a very few exceptions) complete.

Health—Two deaths were reported for the annual encampments. The 298th Infantry had one of accidental drowning and the 299th Infantry one from pneumonia. The 298th Infantry had several cases of a mild type of dysentery which were sent to the hospital at Schofield Barracks.

Sanitation—The location of the campsite of the 298th Infantry was not ideal. Due to close contact with a farm, flies proved a menace and probably were the cause of the several intestinal disorders developed in the command. The campsite of the 299th Infantry was good, with a resultant negative report of infectious conditions.

Equipment—Old-type equipment has been completely replaced by new-type kits and chests and is practically complete at present.

Recommendations—The initial survey of all proposed new campsites by a properly qualified medical officer prior to selection of sites. A report in writing should be rendered by each Camp Surgeon regarding sanitation and health conditions during the training period.

Inspector General's Section—Major H. L. Best, Inf., Chief of Section

- a. Attended the annual encampments at Kawaihapai, Oahu; Paukukalo, Maui; and the State (Territorial) Detachment at Fort Armstrong, Oahu. A report of this field training was made at the close of camp.
- b. Audited the funds and accounts of all units of the Hawaii National Guard semi-annually, as of September 30th and March 31st. All funds are in excellent condition.
- c. Investigated and reported on all applicants for commission in the Hawaii National Guard.
- d. Investigated and reported on all officers of the Hawaii National Guard applying for permission to take the examination for promotion to a higher grade.
- e. Made annual territorial armory inspections of all units of the 298th and 299th Infantries.
- f. A number of special investigations was conducted during the past year and detailed reports rendered.
- g. Checked and supervised training schedules of all units of the Hawaii National Guard during the entire training year. These schedules were found satisfactory and complete.

Ordnance Section—Major Francis Xavier, Ord. Dept., Chief of Section

During the past fiscal year four (4) additional .22 Cal. Machine Guns were received and distributed to each Machine Gun Company. The Machine Gun Companies are now each equipped with two of these guns.

The condition of Ordnance property in the hands of the Hawaii National Guard is very satisfactory, as evidenced by the annual inspection report of the Ordnance Department Inspectors.

Two additional Field Guns, M/1902-3" with carriages, were received and shipped to the campsite at Paukukalo, Maui.

With the exceptions noted, there has been no change in the armament of the Hawaii National Guard during the past year. Ammunition expenditures were normal. No ammunition was declared unserviceable while in storage. There are sufficient quantities of gas, smoke candles, and grenades on hand to meet any minor emergencies.

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Some rifle grenades were received for instructional and emergency use during the past year.

Judge Advocate General's Section—Capt. Earl R. McGhee, J.A.G.D., Chief of Section

There were four summary courts-martial held during the past year, the charges being for failure to attend drills. Conviction was had in each case, and sentences of forfeitures of portions of pay imposed.

While it is believed that the state of discipline throughout the Guard is satisfactory, nevertheless attention should be given to officer personnel in its enforcement by means of court-martial when necessary. And in order to provide and facilitate such training for officers in court-martial procedure, it is recommended that a special court be appointed for the 298th Infantry, and one special court for each of the battalions of the 299th Infantry, while a general court could be appointed for the entire Guard, to sit in Honolulu. The members of these courts could serve for one year and receive instructions from time to time from the Judge Advocate and the Regular Army Instructors.

Considerable progress has been made in the preparation of a correspondence course for officers and selected noncommissioned officers on the subjects of "Rendering Military Aid to Civil Authorities" and in the "Enforcement of Martial Law in Peace Time." This material will be ready for distribution to the command within a short time.

Welfare Section—Major Francis Xavier, Ord. Dept., Chief of Section

On May 1, 1937, the Welfare Section was created for the purpose of:

- 1. Investigating and checking on deserters;
- 2. Contacting men who miss armory drills and who cannot be located by the commanding officers concerned. A form report was provided for this purpose;
- 3. Investigating complaints of enlisted men, including requests for restoration to duty from desertion;
- 4. General supervision and coordination of athletic activities within the Hawaii National Guard.

It is hoped this section will assist in maintaining morale, and assist organization commanding officers to maintain satisfactory drill attendance. During its first two months of operation, practically all work assigned consisted of checking on absentees, 4 of whom were returned to company control, 1 transferred to the inactive list, and 1 dropped as a deserter.

Funds available do not permit an active participation in athletics. No complaints were received from enlisted men.

The following armories are owned by the Military Department, Territory of Hawaii:

Honolulu, Oahu—Three. Honolulu Armory, main construction concrete, in good condition. Erected in 1915. Renovated in 1936. Iolani Barracks, main construction coral rock, in poor condition. This is the oldest armory in the Territory and is in need of alterations in the very near future in order to provide adequate protection to Federal property stored therein. It is believed that the exterior features of the building should be preserved in the original state. The Old Armory housing the Territorial Detachment and Naval Reserve is in very poor condition.

Hilo, Hawaii—One. Main construction concrete and hollow tile. Erected in 1931. The armory is in good condition.

Honomu, Hawaii-One. Main construction frame, in good condition.

Wailuku, Maui—Two. The old Wailuku Armory is of frame construction and will be abandoned when the new armory is completed. The new Wailuku Armory, on which construction was started January 8, 1937, is expected to be completed about December 1, 1937. \$50,000.00 was appropriated by the 1935 Legislature for this building, and Federal W.P.A. funds were allocated to match the Territorial funds in the approximate amount of \$30,000.00. The 1937 Legislature appropriated an additional \$20,000.00, \$12,000.00 of which was for the purpose of completing construction, and \$8,000.00 for equipment. The cornerstone of the new armory was laid on June 14, 1937, with appropriate ceremonies conducted by the Masonic Lodge. The following documents were placed in the cornerstone:

Lahaina, Maui-One. Main construction frame, in good condition. The following armories are loaned to the Military Dept., Territory of Hawaii:

Paia, Maui-Main construction frame, in good condition. Owned by the Maui Agricultural Company. Houses Company C, 299th Infantry.

Hoolehua, Molokai-A portion of Hoolehua Hall. Under control of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. Houses Company K, 299th Infantry.

The following armories are leased to the Territory of Hawaii:

Papaikou, Hawaii-One. Main construction frame, in good condition. Owned by Onomea Sugar Company. Houses Company E, 299th Infantry.

Olaa, Hawaii-One. Main construction frame, in fair condition. Property of Olaa Sugar Company. Houses Company G. 299th Infantry. This armory was the subject of a special report by the Regular Army Inspectors during the past year, and negotiations have been entered into with a view to having the facilities improved, as well as to afford better protection for the storage and preservation of Federal property stored therein.

General Remarks: The armories are all equipped with concrete or iron strong rooms, or vaults, for the safe storage of arms and ammunition. The Honolulu Armory is over-crowded and does not afford adequate training facilities for the troops stationed therein. It is believed that the Honolulu Armory should be extended to Beretania Street and that the property situated on the makai Waikiki corner of Beretania and Miller Streets should be acquired by the Territory of Hawaii for the purpose. In addition the Armory Board feels that the Punchbowl Target Range should be abandoned as a target range and be converted into a motor pool and warehouse. Plans have been drawn under the direction of the Armory Board to accomplish this purpose.

Target Ranges

Target Ranges operating under the control of this department are as follows:

Punchbowl, Island of Oahu—Rifle, 200 and 300 yards, 14 targets. Small bore (.22 Cal.) 50 feet, 24 targets. Pistol, 15-25-50 yards, 9 targets. The Machine Gun range has been abandoned for the reason that the Machine Gun Companies are now firing .22 Cal. Machine Guns indoors.

Kuliouou, Island of Oahu—Rifle, 200 yards, 14 targets. This range was completed in 1934. In fair condition. This range should be improved and enlarged.

Lahaina, Island of Maui—Rifle, 200 yards, 3 targets. This range was completed in 1933 and is in good condition.

Paukukalo, Island of Maui—Rifle, 1 pit, 6 targets, firing line echeloned for 200 and 300 yards. Machine gun, 1000 in. Small bore and pistol, 14 targets.

Waiakea, Island of Hawaii—Rifle, 200 and 300 yards, 6 targets each. A temporary 1000-yard range was constructed by the Civilian Rifle and Pistol Club this year. Pistol and machine gun, 1000-in. course, 4 targets. This range is in good condition.

Olaa, Island of Hawaii—Rifle, 2 targets at 200 yards. This range is in poor condition.

Rifle ranges are needed on the Islands of Molokai and Kauai, where new units of the National Guard are to be located. The War Department and the National Guard Bureau both stress the importance of marksmanship, but it is not possible to maintain ranges in good condition unless funds are provided for their upkeep.

Campsites and Other Reservations

Paukukalo, Island of Maui—This campsite is under the control of this department and now has thirteen (13) buildings erected at Federal

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expense, which consist of messhalls, showers, and latrines; and three (3) buildings constructed from funds other than Territorial or Federal, but which became the property of the Territory. This campsite is ideally located and provides the summer camp for the 299th Infantry. This regiment is now located on five islands. The campsite provides adequate training facilities for the regiment of infantry, except for extensive maneuvers. However, the plantations and other land owners on the Island of Maui have kindly granted the National Guard the use of land areas for maneuver purposes by our troops.

Schofield Barracks, Island of Oahu—Schofield Barracks is a concurrent campsite completed in 1927 by Federal funds and is under the control of the Commanding General, Hawaiian Department. This location is used by the 298th Infantry as a summer training camp, and is maintained through National Guard Bureau funds. Units of the R.O.T.C. use a portion of this camp yearly for their training purposes. The training facilities at the Schofield Barracks camp are excellent, but it is believed that a new site should be found for the 298th Infantry, located on the Island of Oahu, and which would be under Territorial control.

Signal Hill, Island of Oahu—The National Guard has control of a piece of property known as the Old Reservoir on "Signal Hill" in Kaimuki. This property is loaned to Troops 9 and 10 of the Boy Scouts as a drill area, and is valuable to the National Guard as a defense point.

General

On June 16, 1937, The Adjutant General issued a General Order to be effective July 1, 1937, placing all buildings, grounds, campsites, target ranges and reservations, together with custodians, custodians junior grade, janitors, and caretakers in a separate section, to be known as the "Custodial Service," under the direction of the Armory Board. It is believed that this step will result in greater efficiency, coordination, and control over the many varied reservations under the control of this department.

The 1937 Legislature appropriated funds for the construction of armories as follows:

Island of Molokai—At Kaunakakai, \$17,500.00. The land for this site has already been acquired, and it is expected that construction will start in the near future.

Island of Kauai—At Lihue negotiations are pending for the acquisition of land. \$40,000.00 was appropriated for this armory. At Hanapepe \$20,000.00 was appropriated for an armory, to be located on what is now a portion of the County Park at Hanapepe. It is expected that construction will start about January 1, 1938.

CONCLUSION

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on exThe past year has been an active one for the Hawaii National Guard. Changes in commissioned personnel were numerous; a number of changes in plans for training units were undertaken, and I believe the many changes during this past year in all phases of work are preparatory to an excellent year ahead.

Strikes, and the threat of strikes, were constant, and although we are fortunate that all strikes were settled peaceably and without bloodshed or disorder, this may not always be true, and it is imperative that this branch of the Territorial Government be properly prepared for any emergency or disaster. Plans are being evolved to handle any type of emergency that may arise.

I believe the most serious situation facing this Department at present is the construction of the three (3) additional armories authorized for Kaunakakai, Lihue and Hanapepe. These armories should be started in the very near future.

The 3rd Battalion of the 299th Infantry has been authorized for activation, less one company. Undoubtedly this additional company will be authorized shortly after the new units now authorized are mustered in service. Their organization is dependent upon suitable armories being provided.

I believe the two unassigned regiments of Infantry now allotted the Hawaii National Guard should be brigaded, as it is believed an Infantry commander with Infantry staff officers, could better supervise and plan training than the office of The Adjutant General. Ever since the World War, The Adjutant General has had the dual mission of being the administrative head, as well as being entirely responsible for the state of training, command, discipline and supply of the line This is not usual, in fact the reverse is true in most States, senior line officers usually being assigned the command functions, which automatically carry with them responsibility for training. Adjutant General has at his immediate disposal the Territorial Staff, composed mostly of officers commissioned in the technical and supply branches, some of whom have had little Infantry training and experience. In addition, these staff officers are occupied with the duties of their respective branches. Next to the armory situation, I believe that no single item is more important to the efficiency of the Hawaii National Guard than the authorization for a Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company. Numerous requests have been made on the National Guard Bureau for authority to organize a brigade headquarters, but these requests have been repeatedly disapproved.
