

PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

AS OF 30 JUNE 1948

I—Status of Strength of the Hawaii National Guard from 1 July 1947 to 30 June 1948:

The Hawaii National Guard had an aggregate strength, officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men of 4814 as compared to an aggregate strength of 1297 on 30 June 1947, representing an increase of 271% during Fiscal Year 1948. The following table indicates the strength, at the end of FY 1948, of the various major echelons of the Hawaii National Guard, and the percentage increase of strength in each of those echelons:

The very sizeable increase in HNG strength during FY 1948 was due to the constant recruiting efforts of all personnel at all echelons. Two events during the year added considerably to the increase as shown. The first of these events was HNG participation in "Operation \$8,888," a nation-wide National Guard recruiting drive, launched by President Truman on 16 September 1947, and supported by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau of the War Department. This drive netted an increase of 1181 officers and men, as a result of intensive recruiting activities from 16 September 1947 to 16 November 1947. This represented an increase of approximately 63% of HNG strength in a two-month period. M/Sgt Joseph K. Camacho, Service Co 298th Inf. was declared the Champion Recruiter of the HNG with 309 recruits to his credit, and was sent to Washington, D. C. at the expense of the National Guard Bureau to receive the congratulations of President Truman. While there Sgt. Camacho was named Champion National Guard Recruiter for the nation. Btry C 487th FA Bn stationed at Kealakekua, Hawaii, was awarded a plaque by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau in recognition of its feat of

being the first HNG unit to attain 100% of its authorized strength

during Operation 88,888.

The second event which contributed greatly to the increase in strength was the enactment into law of the Selective Service Act of 1948, accomplished by the Congress of the United States in the latter part of June. During the period 21 June 48 to 24 June 48, approximately 700 young men enlisted in the HNG in order to take advantage of the exemption from draft provided for members of National Guard

It should be noted that while the actual increase in strength of the HNG during FY 1948 was 3517 officers and men, there were during the period 30 June 1947 to 30 June 1948, 843 separations of officers and enlisted men, for such reasons as occupation incompatible with National Guard duties, removal of residence from the Territory, continuous absence from military duties, enlistment in the Regular Army, Navy, and Air Force, and miscellaneous other reasons. Thus, the actual effect of HNG recruiting was a gross increase of 4360 during the fiscal year.

The rush of enlistments in the National Guard throughout the country in the latter part of June indicated that in the absence of a check of some nature, the National Guard would rapidly outgrow the strength provided for in budgetary appropriations of Federal Funds for FY 1949. The ceiling set by Chief, NGB for the Hawaii National Guard was 4760 enlisted men, with no limit on officer and warrant officer strength. This gave the Hawaii National Guard only 236 enlisted vacancies to be filled. The Adjutant General of Hawaii accordingly established ceiling strengths for the various major HNG echelons as follows:

II—Evaluation of the Re-organization Program With Respect to Personnel and Administration:

As evidenced by the strength summary furnished in the above paragraphs, the Hawaii National Guard, during FY 1948, more than met all requirements demanded of it with respect to strength. The majority of the enlisted men recruited during the year were young men in the 17 to 20 year age bracket, with no prior military service. There were, however, a sufficient number of veterans recruited to provide each organization with a cadre of experienced personnel for the key positions. All of the officers and warrant officers appointed during the year, with the exception of a few medical officers, are veterans of World War II.

The training of individual officers and enlisted men charged with responsibility for personnel and administrative work in the HNG units progressed steadily within each unit during the year. This training reached a climax, and was subjected to a thorough test, during the Field Training period held in June, 1948. HNG personnel, from the State Staff of Hq Det down through the units to the level of companies, handled the personnel administrative problems involved in assembling the units and conducting the two-week Field Training in a very satisfactory manner.

DUTIES

The primary duty of all instructors is to effect a sound organization of the Hawaii National Guard and to develop well trained units that will be self sufficient administratively, and combat efficient if called up in a national emergency.

To accomplish this mission it becomes necessary for all instructors to offer advice, supervise and actively assist in training, supply and administration of all units of the Guard. In addition they are required to verify weekly drill attendance (Form 107), monthly report of National Guard duty performed (Form 100), and quarterly payrolls.

ORGANIZATION AND TRAINING

V ORGANIZATION

The end of Fiscal Year 1948 found the Hawaii National Guard with 98.6% of its allotted units organized. Only one company remained without Federal Recognition, and this unit, Company M, 298th Infantry,

was nearing readiness for its Inspection early in August 1948.

During the past year, 29 units were extended Federal Recognition. The 299th Regimental Combat Team, HNG, was one of the first RCTs in the United States to complete its organization.

The Hawaii National Guard, for the past year, has stood among the top 10 states and territories in organization of units and percentages of authorized strength.

TRAINING

Thirty-four army units of the Hawaii National Guard, having met the strength prerequisite, entered upon the prescribed six-year training program during the year. The National Guard Bureau has presented an outline of a proposed three-year program scheduled to become effective during November 1948.

Hawaii Hawaii VHawaii's first postwar field training was held at Ft. Ruger during the period 17-31 August 1947. Due to limited funds only the State Staff & Hq Det.; 613th Ordnance (MM) Co.; and the 111th Army Band attended with a total of 10 officers and 102 enlisted men. During the period 1-12 December 1947 a special school for selected officers and enlisted men was held at Schofield Barracks. Personnel attending this school were selected from Guardsmen who had not attended the previous camp. Courses in Administration, Communication, Tank Maintenance, and Small Arm Tactics were given to 24 officers and 134 enlisted men.

The second postwar field training period (FY 1948) was authorized and held during 12 to 27 June 1948 and included the entire Guard. Army units encamped at Schofield Barracks while Air Units trained at Hickam Air Base. The movement of this large number of personnel and equipment (191 officers and 2753 enlisted men representing 74% of actual strength) was accomplished by an Army Transport, a Navy LST, a destroyer escort, a commercial ship, and several flights of the 19th Troop Carrier Squadron, and 199th Utility Flight HANG, as well as by unit trucks. The Master Training Programs (Shown below) required 92 hours and were carried out in detail, covering basic instructions, small unit tactical problems, and marksmanship.

Official reports, based on findings of the Inspector General, Hq United States Army, Pacific, as well as comments received from observers and personnel attending the encampments, all attest to the success of the training program and the conduct of the camps. INSPECTIONS

Annual Ordnance Technical Inspections and Annual Armory Inspections were conducted early in the year by teams from the Hawaiian Ordnance Depot and Headquarters, United States Army, Pacific. The ordnance inspection included vehicles, instruments, and weapons issued by the Federal government to the various HNG units. Armory inspections included administrative procedures, supply, and training.

The inspection of Army units of the Hawaii National Guard during Field Training was conducted by a team from the office of the Inspector General, Headquarters, United States Army, Pacific. After the inspection, the Inspector General made his official report, which included in

part, the following comment:

"In general the training of all units was excellent and in many cases superior. The inspection team was impressed by the rapid development of units to a more than satisfactory state of military efficiency.

* * * * The state of efficiency of units upon leaving camp was indicative not only of the high quality of instruction given during the encampment but also of the very careful, thorough, and complete planning for training that was carried out prior to arrival at camp."

THE HAWAII AIR NATIONAL GUARD

✓Í—General:

1. The FY 1948 can actually be designated as the organization period for units that heretofore were unknown in the history of the Hawaii National Guard, Hawaii Air National Guard Units (199th Fighter Squadron (SE), 199th Utility Flight, 199th Air Service Group (Ftr) Det C and 199th Weather Station (Type A).

2. The total commissioned and enlisted strength at the close of FY 1948 was as follows:

From the above, it can be seen that the Hawaii Air National Guard needed 5 officers and 7 enlisted men to complete its force to the strength as authorized by the Department of the Army.

3. In the beginning of the FY 1948, the Hawaii Air National Guard was stationed at Bellows Field, Waimanalo, Oaliu, T. H. On 28 October 1948, the air units officially completed their move to Hickam Field, where they are presently stationed.

II-Training:

1. At the beginning of the FY 1948 the four (4) air units initiated an intensive six year training program for the citizen soldiers of the Hawaii Air National Guard. The purpose of this training program is to train the personnel to take their place on a combat team, which may in

the time of emergency, be used in the defense of the Hawaiian Islands. The officers and men are receiving a minimum of two hours per week instruction and on-the-job training in military and technical subjects. During the FY 1948 great progress was made toward the end of developing a highly efficient combat team.

- 2. The total two hour armory drill periods for the FY 1948 was 48. The percentage of attendance at these drills was very good, clearly demonstrating the interest taken in a citizen soldier's duties by the local guardsmen. The total flying time for the year was 3,078 flying hours—average time per month was 256.5 flying hours—average time per pilot was 90.5 flying hours.
- 3. Benefits derived for the entire organization from guardsmen graduating from the various army service schools are quite manifest, and it is hoped that more of our troops will take advantage of the opportunities offered in the future. The following number of men did complete or are attending service schools in the states:

The entire expense of pay and transportation for attendance at these service schools is paid by the Federal Government and no part of it is borne by the Territory of Hawaii.

/III—Field Training Period:

- 1. The field training period for the FY 1948 was held from 12 June to 26 June 1948 incl. During the field training period, officers and enlisted men received an intensive course on basic military subjects and were given an idea of what would be expected of them when they take over their respective technical duties in the organization during an emergency.
- 2. Total flying time for the period of field training was 664 hours. The flight training program during summer encampment was a definite success. The pilot training revolved around the development of an air combat team.
- 3. The amount of flying time and the morale of the troops during summer camp indicates that a great problem of organization was accomplished to enable a supporting team of 25% skilled personnel and 75% unskilled personnel to support day and night flying, to a total of 664 flying hours in a period of two weeks. There were no aircraft accidents during this period of intensive flight training. The FY 1948 field training did much toward welding the units, officers and men more closely into a team capable of accomplishing its mission.

IV-Air Technical Detachment:

- 1. The Hawaii Air National Guard has an Air Technical Detachment authorized by law for the maintenance, repair and inspection of equipment issued to the units. In addition, they take care of the everyday correspondence and administrative duties.
- 2. The Air Technical Detachment is composed of 44 National Guard personnel, paid from Federal funds. The Territory bears the expense of the following full time personnel: 1 Clerk, 1 Janitor, 1 Motor Pool Attendant and 4 guards. In June 1948, the National Guard Bureau authorized an increase of 21 personnel for the Air Technical Detach-

ment, effective 1 August 1948, bringing the total up to 65 Air Technicians.

V—Problems Encountered During FY 48:

- 1. The greatest problem during the beginning of the FY 48 was the failure of a few pilots to meet the requirements of AF Regulation 60-2. The following is quoted from Indorsement by the Senior Air Instructor to the Pacific Air Command:
- "1. The lack of flying time logged by the Hawaii Air National Guard flying pilots was influenced by the following:
 - a. During the first third of the year the squadron was stationed at Bellows Field. The latter part of this period was occupied with the move from Bellows to Hickam. Bellows Field was inaccessible to those pilots who lacked private means of transportation. able to fly an hour at Bellows required most of the pilots to devote an entire half day to the job. This many of them were unable to do.
 - b. Immediately following the move to Hickam came the trouble with the selector valve seals, caused by the change in the type of gasoline being used. This caused all of the P-47th's to be grounded during the month of October and part of November. This reacted unfavorable in two ways:
 - (1) It cut down on the airplanes available.
 - (2) It caused a lack of confidence in the aircraft and apprehension on the part of the pilots.
 - c. A third, and more nebulous cause of the lack of flying during the first part of the period concerns the private lives of the pilots. All of the pilots are ex-service pilots more or less recently separated from active duty. They are engaged in trying to establish themselves in civilian life, both at home and in their business pursuits. Most of them had not worked out a schedule which included a certain amount of time devoted to maintaining their flying proficiency.

d. The majority of the pilots in the Hawaii Air National Guard were not fighter pilots by background or training when they joined the organization. Being trained on multi-engined alreaft, they had a natural apprehension for flying high performance single engine fighters. This feeling has been overcome but it took time and caused a poor showing in the amount of fighter time logged.

- e. The final and very pertinent factor hindering the completion of the AF Regulation 60-2 requirements was the lack of facilities for completing the instrument and night flying requirements. National completing the instrument and night flying requirements. National Guard Bureau policy requires all pilots participating in night flying to hold an instrument card. These cards could not be obtained because of lack of proper material to make instrument flying hoods for the aircraft. The material was requisitioned in ample time but was not delivered until the middle of June 1948. All of the difficulties enumerated above have been eliminated during the past year. It is firmly believed that in the fiscal year 1949 all of the requirements of AF Regulation 60-2 will be met."
- The second problem that arose was the lack of proper and sufficient strage space for the air units supplies. Funds have been allotted by the National Guard Bureau to construct the necessary buildings. Project will be completed during the first quarter FY 1949.
- 3. The third problem and the greatest to cause Fiscal worries was the publishing of M & S Directive 65-25. This regulation establishes a National Guard supply account with the Pacific Air Depot. During the process of setting up this account, it will be difficult to draw supplies except through the use of the AOCP and emergency requisitions, which will hinder the Hawaii Air National Guard supply in keeping up its stock level. All supplies that are drawn through AOCP and emergency requisitions plus a large amount of the normal requisitions are on a reimbursable basis, in that, only items excess to the Pacific Air Depot's needs can be turned over without reimbursement. Approximately 90% of normal requisitions, which are many thousands, are back ordered 90 to 120 days in the states. In estimating the maintenance and repair fund of FY 1949, this organization did not take into consideration the cost of setting up the supply account under M & S Directive 65-25.

SUPPLY AND MAINTENANCE

1. General. Since submission of the last annual report, the Hawaii National Guard has graduated into a going concern and, logistically speaking, may now be considered as a major industry in the Territory of Hawaii. The troops of the Hawaii National Guard are now 93% equipped. This figure is 30% higher than for any State on the Mainland and 50% higher than the average for the United States. The effect of the few shortages which exist would be nil in the event of national emergency or local disaster. The only inadequacies which still exist are in facilities, and it is expected that minimum essential facilities of a temporary nature will be provided from Federal Funds in the ensuing year.

✓2. Finance. The following is a breakdown of the expenditure of Federal funds in support of the Hawaii National Guard during the fiscal · year which ended 30 June 1948:

This equipment is of the latest types developed and, with the excep-

tion of the Motor Vehicles which were serviced by our own Maintenance Pool, is all new. Included in the 60 Artillery pieces listed above are 36 recoilless weapons. These weapons were developed just prior to the end of the war, being employed only in the battle of Okinawa. They are of a design so light that two men can pick up a 75mm gun. Yet the gun still has the fire power of the old 75 which had to be moved by a 2½-ton truck. Our Air unit is equipped with P-47 fighter planes which will eventually be replaced by jet-propelled fighter planes when suitable facilities are available.

To accomplish this favorable state of readiness, the office of the USP&DO processed:

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The total value of equipment now in the hands of the HNG is in excess of \$10,000,000. This does not include the value of cleaning and preserving supplies and items of an expendable nature.

4. Transportation. During the period covered by this report:

- a. 1,744 ship tons of equipment were shipped by commercial carriers to the outer islands at a cost of \$22,515.60.
- 76 ship tons and approximately 3,500 passengers were transported to the outer islands by NG aircraft and;
- c. \$37,908.35 was expended by the Federal Government to send members of the HNG to the Mainland to service schools.
- 5. Facilities. The Federal Government expended \$172,793.00 for the construction of temporary storage facilities throughout the Territory of Hawaii during the past year. This amount provided a bare minimum for storage of supplies only. Some monies had to be turned back to the Government because land was not available on which the facilities could be erected. One of the requirements was that facilities could be built with Federal funds only when the site belonged to the Federal Government or the Territory of Hawaii. It is expected that by 30 June 1949, temporary facilities will have been provided for all units; present facilities will have been expanded to include locker rooms and showers for all troops; sheds for motor vehicle and tank shelter will have been provided on all islands; nine temporary maintenance and service centers will be employed and in operation and that two new rifle ranges will be in operation on the Islands of Hawaii and Molokai.
- 6. Maintenance Service. a. Air: Air maintenance service employed-two officers and forty-three enlisted men on full time duty as of 30 June 1948. It is expected that this will be increased to four officers and fifty-six enlisted men. This will give a well balanced Air Maintenance service and it is not believed that there will be any appreciable change in this personnel ceiling with our present troop strength.
- b. Army: Army maintenance is of necessity more dispersed than Air and includes the maintenance performed by 53 unit caretakers on the several islands in addition to the technical maintenance performed at the State Maintenance Pool in Honolulu, the State Maintenance Sub Pool at Hilo, and the Service Centers.

The purpose of the Service Centers is to receive, inspect, and repair items of equipment requiring field maintenance. The State Maintenance Shop contact team personnel will operate at these centers on schedule or on call, thereby eliminating transportation of equipment to and from State Shops.

The Service Center is a supply point, inspection point, and the service center mechanic will perform maintenance on all classes of equipment, except liaison aircraft, within capabilities of tools and personnel.

Service Centers 3, 4, 6, and 7 will be activated during the month of July.

The total of personnel employed at these facilities as of 30 June 1948 was three officers and twenty-six enlisted men. Additionally there are nineteen temporary mechanics employed in servicing vehicles, received in an unserviceable condition for issue to the units. These mechanics have already serviced and issued 906 vehicles and have about 500 more, which should be ready for issue by I November 1948.

7. Personnel. The number of persons employed by the HNG from Federal funds during the Fiscal Year 1948 was 353. This figure includes Air and Army maintenance personnel as indicated above, custodial and accounting personnel employed in the office of the USP&DO, and temporary employees working on construction projects. Of the 353 employed, 176 permanent employees were on the active pay roll as of 30 June 1948, 89 temporary employees were on the active pay roll as of 30 June 1948, and 88 employees were employed and their personal services terminated during the Fiscal Year 1948. Of the 176 permanent employees, 16 are employees in the office of the USP&DO. This figure is not considered adequate for efficient organization. Since 1 July, there has been an increase of four clerks on a permanent status. Adequate supervisory personnel are not provided to receive, store and issue the myriad supplies consumed by the HNG and to properly supervise the contracting and construction program of the USP&DO in the Territory of Hawaii. There is a dire need for the following supervisory personnel:

- 8. Service Contracts. a. The United States Government is authorized under existing War Department policies to reimburse State agencies for certain reasonable expenses incurred both in rendering necessary services and in maintenance of facilities which are made available to the State by the United States Government on revocable permit. Reimbursement is in the amount of 75% for actual expenses incurred pursuant to terms of the Contract and not to exceed the sum for which contracted.
- b. Maintenance does not include major and special repair or maintenance projects, but rather such projects will be made the subject of special consideration between the United States Government and the State. Major and special repair or maintenance projects are defined as those projects contemplating an expenditure in excess of \$500 for any one project in the case of the Ground Service Contracts and \$200 in the case of the Air Unit Service Contract.

The above contract continues in full force and effect during the fiscal year 1949. Supplement No. 1 to the original contract has been approved.

- e. Two (2) additional areas are now being utilized by the Military Department and Service Contracts covering these areas will be prepared as soon as approved revocable permits are received from the Department of the Army. The areas are Sand Island and Black Point, both on Oahu.
- 9. Summary. The supply of the Hawaii National Guard is current and adequate. There is no appreciable deficiency in the Maintenance Service, and maintenance should be current in the near future. Facilities provided are adequate for storage for supplies, but do not provide sufficient necessary installations to adequately meet the needs of the expanded troop strength. Permanent personnel employed by the Hawaii National Guard are paid approximately \$50,000 per month from Federal funds. Expenditure of Federal funds has tripled in the last year, and sufficient supervisory personnel have not been provided to handle this rapid expansion.

Bartlett.

The Selective Service Act of 1948 was signed by the President of the United States on 24 June 1948. Immediately upon receipt of this information, the personnel in the Selective Service Section was alerted and the nucleus of the Territorial system was organized and started to function.

- DISASTER RELIEF

Pursuant to Executive Order, April 14, 1948, designating the Adjutant General of Hawaii, as the Coordinator for Disaster Relief and prescribing his duties in this connection, implementing action was initiated without delay. A study was made of the National Red Cross Disaster plan and disaster plans now in force in several of the states as well as those contemplated by the armed forces in the territory and on the west coast. Consideration was also given to measures taken locally prior to and during the past war, it being realized that any organization designed to cope with natural catastrophies should be capable of continued usefulness in the event of a national emergency.

Close liaison was instituted with the federal services and the Red Cross; various territorial and city and county officials and business leaders were consulted; and the outline of a territorial disaster relief plan drawn up. Based on this a tentative organization was established

and responsibilities apportioned to agencies and individuals.

It speedily became apparent that the far flung duties, the numerous conferences, the wide range of activities, and the necessity of early elimination of overlapping and duplicating effort required the services of a full time thoroughly qualified assistant for the Coordinator. The Acting Governor concurred in this need and approved the appointment of a retired regular army colonel, long a local resident, to this post, effective July 1, 1948.

As of June 30, 1948, then, although most work has been preliminary, it can be reported that:

- 1. A definite plan and organization have been established.
- Close and continuous liaison with the federal forces, relief agencies, governmental officials, and business and civic leaders is being maintained in a spirit of harmony and enthusiasm.
- 3. Definite progress is being made in appropriate surveys and by numerous committees.
- Oahu has had most initial attention, but other islands are not being ignored, and increasing supervision and assistance will be given all.
- 5. A full time assistant to the Coordinator will add great impetus to all endeavors.
- 6. Pending further information and instructions, no initial effort is being placed on the Civil Defense aspect, save to insure that existing plans and organization will be capable of expansion to cover such contingencies.
- The plan is flexible to permit instant, efficient, and uninterrupted action regardless of the nature or scope of the disaster or changes of responsible authorities, city-county, territorial, or federal.

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1947 TERRITORIAL LEGISLATION Affecting the Hawaii National Guard

In line with the modernizing of the National Guard and the bringing up to date of the Territorial Laws pertaining to the Hawaii National Guard, the Territorial Legislature of 1947 amended Chapter 320, Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945. This chapter as amended is quoted herewith:

Chapter 320. NATIONAL GUARD.

Series E-189: Act 123

An Act to Amend Chapter 320 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945 Relating to the National Guard and the Unorganized Militia of the Territory of Hawaii

Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii:

Section 1. Chapter 320 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945 is hereby amended in the following respects:

1. By Amending section 13030 to read as follows:

"Sec. 13030. Who subject to duty. The Militia shall consist of every able-bodied male citizen of the Territory, and every able-bodied male of foreign birth who has declared his intention and is eligible to become a citizen of the United States, who is more than eighteen and less than forty-five years of age, and shall be divided into two classes, the organized militia to be known as the Hawaii National Guard, and the remainder to be known as the unorganized militia." (L. 1903, c. 59, s. 1; am. L. 1925, c. 52, s. 1; R. L. 1945, s. 13030; am. L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1)

2. By adding thereto three new sections to be numbered, and to read, as follows:

"Sec. 13030.01. Military department. The military department of the territory shall be composed of the military forces as provided in this chapter. (L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1.)

Sec. 13030.02. The national guard. The national guard shall consist of the regularly commissioned, enlisted, organized and uniformed military forces in the Territory, who have heretofore participated in or who shall hereafter participate in apportionment of the annual appropriation provided by the Congress of the United States for the support of the national guard. (L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s 1)

Sec. 13030.03. The unorganized militia. The unorganized militia shall be composed of all male persons subject to military duty but who are not members of the national guard. The unorganized militia shall be subject to active military duty only when called into service of the Territory or of the United States. That portion of the unorganized militia called into service shall be mustered in for such period as may be required. The governor may assign them to existing organizations of the national guard or organize them as the exigencies of the occasion may require." (L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1)

By amending section 13032 thereof to read as follows:

"Sec. 13032. Government employees. In case of war, insurrection or rebellion, or of resistance to the execution of the laws of the Territory, all employees of the government who are not members of the national guard and who are not physically disabled, shall report for duty in the unorganized militia and be subject to military service." (L. 1895, c. 20, s. 21; R. L. 1945, s. 13032; am. L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1.)

4. By amending sections 13034 to 13037, inclusive, thereof to read respectively, as follows:

"Sec. 13034. Same as United States Armies. The organization,

6. By adding thereto a new section to be numbered, and read, as follows:

"Sec. 13041.01. Adjutant general; rank, compensation. The adjutant general shall have a rank not lower than that of brigadier general. There shall be paid monthly by the Territory to the adjutant general the pay and allowances of his grade as fixed by the tables of the regular army of the United States." (L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1.)

7. By amending sections 13042 to 13046, inclusive, thereof to read, respectively, as follows:

Administration. The adjutant general shall from "Sec. 13042. time to time make and publish such orders and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as, in his opinion, are necessary to bring the organization, armament, equipment and discipline of the organized militia to a state of efficiency as nearly as possible approaching that of the United States Army. He shall attest all commissions issued to military officers, appointments issued to warrant officers, maintain personnel records, superintend preparation of all letters and reports required by the United States from the Territory. He shall have charge of the territorial military reservations, armories and all other property of the Territory kept or used for military purposes. It shall be the duty of the adjutant general to cause an inventory to be taken at least once each year of all military stores, property and funds under his jurisdiction. The adjutant general shall be the official custodian of the military records of all persons from the Territory who served in the armed forces of the United States during times of war or grave national emergency, including those records which are turned over to the territory by the federal agency of selective service. Such records will be preserved perpetually.

Sec. 13043. Officers, qualifications, appointment, tenure. Commissioned officers must be citizens of the United States and must not be less than twenty-one years of age. Officers shall be appointed upon the order of the governor, subject to federal recognition as officers in the National Guard of the United States except as to those officers appointed as aides de camp to the governor and staff positions not requiring federal recognition. Officers, selected for commission subject to federal recognition must meet the qualifications prescribed in War Department policies relating to the National Defense Act. The commissions of all officers shall continue in force until they are regularly relieved from duty, responsibility and accountability in accordance with law or failure on the part of officers in meeting federal recognition requirements. (L. 1895, c. 20, s. 3; am. L. 1896, c. 49, s. 1; am. L. 1909, c. 46, pt. of s. 1; am. L. 1917, c. 86, s. 3 and c. 209, s. 2; am. L. 1925, c. 69, s. 1; R. L. 1945, s. 13043; am. 9. By amending sections 13050 and 13051 thereof to read, respectively, as follows:

"Sec. 13050. Armory board; appointment, duties, etc. It shall be the duty of the adjutant general to appoint an armory board to consist of three members who shall be commissioned officers of the national guard. Such board may, subject to such rules and regulations as may be issued by the governor, make rules and regulations governing the care and custody of armories, rifle ranges, reservations, installations on license from War and Navy Departments and may permit the use of, or may temporarily rent, such portions of armories, rifle ranges, reservations, installations on license from the War and Navy Departments as will not interfere with the military use thereof. All moneys received from rentals shall be paid into the territorial treasury and such moneys may be expended by the board on warrants issued by the auditor on vouchers approved by the board, for the purpose of equipping, purchasing furniture, repairs to, or betterment of the armory, and other facilities from which received. The board shall cause to be kept suitable books of account, and shall annually submit to the governor to be by him submitted to the legislature, a statement showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes. Sec. 13051. Enlistment. Enlistment in the national guard shall be in manner and form for the period of time as may be provided by the laws of the United States, and regulations issued from time to time, relating to the National Guard of the United States. No soldier shall be reenlisted in the national guard of this Territory whose services during his preceding term of enlistment has not been honest and faithful." (L. 1903, c. 59, s. 7; am. L. 1917, c. 86, s. 6; R. L. 1945, s. 13051, am. L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1.)

10. By amending section 13059 thereof to read as follows:

"Sec. 13059. Practice marches, drills, etc. Every member of the national guard not excused by the commander in chief shall participate in practice marches or go into camp of instruction at least ten consecutive days, and assemble for drill and instruction at any company, battalion, or regimental armories or rendezvous, or for target practice, to the extent prescribed by War Department Regulations." (L. 1903, c. 59, s. 9; am. L. 1927, c. 61, s. 1; R. L. 1945, s. 13059; am. L. 1947, c. 123, pt. of s. 1.)

11. By amending section 13071 thereof to read as follows:

"Sec. 13071. Pay of enlisted men while on active duty. Enlisted men while on active duty in the service of the Territory, except during periods of encampments, maneuvers and other exercises, including outdoor target practice, shall receive pay at the rate per day as follows:

In order to give more protection to the Guardsman in the event of injury or death, while engaged in performing his duty in the Guard, an amendment was enacted to provide compensation benefits to officers and enlisted men of the Hawaii National Guard. This amendment includes the Guardsmen in the Workmen's Compensation Act, and is quoted herewith:

Series A-67: Act 169

An Act to Amend Section 4464 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945, to Repeal Section 4467 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945 and to Provide Compensation Benefits for Members of the Hawaii National Guard.

Be is Enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii:

Section 1. Section 4464 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945 is hereby amended to read:

"Section 4464. Who entitled to compensation. If an officer or enlisted person in the Hawaii National Guard shall suffer injury or death arising out of and in the performance of his duty in the Hawaii National Guard, compensation shall be paid and medical services and supplies shall be furnished to him or his dependents, as the case may be, by the Territory for such injury or death in the manner and in the amounts provided for in this chapter for workmen's compensation." (L. 1943, c. 131, s. 1; R. L. 1945, s. 4464; am. L. 1947, c. 169, s. 1.)

Section 2. Section 4467 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945, as amended by Act 160 of the Session Laws of Hawaii 1945, is hereby repealed.




















