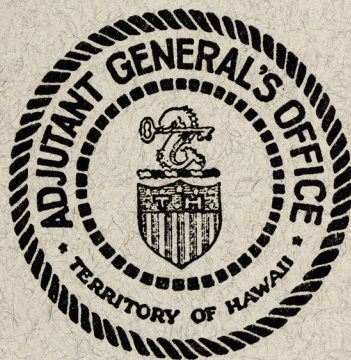

II GENERAL

1. The 8256 Service Unit, Hawaii National Guard Instructor Detachment, distinguished itself by attaining a general rating of SUPERIOR for the Fiscal Year 1949 as attested by Report of Annual General Inspection FY 1949. It is expected that the Fiscal Year 1950 will witness a complete turn-over of Army Officer Instructors.

2. The primary duty of all instructors is to effect a sound organization of the Hawaii National Guard and to develop well trained units that will be self sufficient administratively, and combat efficient if called into the Federal Service in case of a National emergency. To accomplish this mission, it becomes necessary for all instructors to offer advice, to supervise and actively assist in training, supply and administration of all units of the Guard.

III SENIOR ARMY INSTRUCTOR

He is responsible for liaison between the local Army Commander and the Adjutant General of the Territory. He acts as Military Advisor to the Adjutant General of the Territory. He also supervises and coordinates the official work of all Army Instructors in the Territory.

IV ARMY INSTRUCTORS FOR INFANTRY & FIELD ARTILLERY UNITS

1. These instructors further efficiency of National Guard units through assistance and advice to responsible commanders on such matters as attendance records, payrolls, enlistment records, supply records and required reports submitted to higher headquarters. They conduct inspections of arms and equipment. They review, supervise and advise on all instruction and instructional material. They participate in Armory Drill periods and maintain liaison between National Guard units and Senior Army Instructor.

2. In addition to the Army Instructors for Infantry and Field Artillery, there is in the Instructor Detachment two sections, Administrative and Light Aviation and one Ordnance Technical Advisor.

NOTE: * Col. Francis H. Morse completed his tour of foreign service and duty with the Hawaii National Guard on 26 June. His successor, Colonel B. A. Byrne, will arrive to assume command of the Instructor Detachment and duties as Senior Army Instructor about 29 August 1949. Lt. Colonel Donald B. Harriott, Acting Deputy Commander of Civilian Components, USARPAC, assumed the duties of Acting Senior Army Instructor pending the arrival of Colonel Byrne.

** Major James I. Maloney succeeded Captain Adrian M. Richie (reasgd) as Ordnance Technical Advisor.
M Sgt. Seichi Terauchi succeeded M Sgt. James M. Shelton.
Captain James M. Pratt is completing his tour of foreign service and will be succeeded by Major Arthur B. Chun.

**** M Sgt Arthur L. Clawson assigned pending reorganization of the Instructor Detachment. The 487th FA Bn (Hawaii) will be authorized an additional Sgt Instructor.

a. The Administrative Section prepares all official directives of the headquarters, maintains files, processes correspondence, checks and advises on NG strength reports, payrolls and vouchers. Maintains property records and performs personnel administration for the Detachment.

b. The Light Aviation Section advises on matters pertaining to liaison, type aircraft furnished National Guard units. Conducts operational training courses for pilots. Conducts technical inspections and advises National Guard light aviation sections in matters of flight training.

c. Ordnance Technical Advisor assists in the operation of the State Maintenance Plan covering receipt, storage and issue of Ordnance supplies and equipment; location of shops, examination of pool mechanics. Advises on maintenance of records and control of supplies. He also acts as Army instructor of the 613th Ordnance (MM) Company.

PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION AS OF 30 JUNE 1949

I—Status of Strength of the Hawaii National Guard from 1 July 1948 to 30 June 1949:

On 30 June 1949 the Hawaii National Guard had a strength of 299 officers, 14 warrant officers, and 5310 enlisted men. Of these, 48 officers, 1 warrant officer, and 300 enlisted men belonged to air units, and 251 officers, 13 warrant officers, and 5010 enlisted men were in ground, i.e. army, type units. The aggregate of officers, warrant officers and enlisted men, 5623, represents an increase of 809 since 30 June 1948, and is 74.5% of the total troop allotments of 7559. The strengths of individual units and their stations were as follows:

II—Discharges

During the fiscal year there were 966 enlisted men discharged from the Hawaii National Guard. Of the various reasons for discharge, the following were most prominent:

Further attritional losses were incurred due to reconstitution of the Inactive National Guard on 1 January 1949. Inactive National Guard status is provided to allow individuals, who for one reason or another cannot maintain active participation, to revert to an inactive basis but still maintain their connection with the HNG for potential emergency service. There were 144 enlisted men transferred to the Inactive National Guard List in the period 1 January 1949 to 30 June 1949.

III Recruiting Activities

Recruiting during the fiscal year was conducted primarily on a unit level. However, during the period 12 January 1949 to 22 February 1949 the HNG conducted an island-wide recruiting campaign known as "Operation 600," which was designed to secure 600 recruits. The campaign was conducted by unit recruiting teams supported by a Territory-wide publicity and public relations campaign conducted by the Office of the Adjutant General. The campaign resulted in a net gain of 505 recruits.

In general the results of recruiting efforts during the fiscal year were satisfactory, in that attritional losses were successfully overcome and HNG strength increased steadily. The discharge rate during the period August to December 1948 was excessive, due to a program designed to eliminate non-effective individuals from the rolls. HNG strength decreased during that period, but a definite upward tendency became apparent during January and continued throughout the balance of the fiscal year. Considering the net gain in strength and the losses due to discharges and transfers to the Inactive List, the recruiting effort produced a total of 1919 recruits during the fiscal year.

IV Administrative Developments

The fiscal year saw several changes and innovations of importance affecting the military administration of the HNG. Among these were: (1) the passage of the Selective Act of 1948 which required establishment of close and continuing liaison between the HNG and the Selective Service System, and a revision of the requirements for enlistment in the HNG; (2) the passage by Congress of an act providing retirement benefits for personnel of the National Guard requiring the establishment and maintenance of complete records of the retirement credits earned by Hawaii National Guardsmen; (3) the reestablishment of the Inactive National Guard referred to above; and (4) the innovation of a new service record for enlisted men combining the features of two previous records and resulting in a considerable saving of time. Unit administrative work improved considerably during the year, due to increased experience and training of administrative personnel.

ORGANIZATION AND TRAINING

I. Organization, Training, Operations, and Federal Recognition of Units.

A. Status of Organization and Federal Recognition of Units

Company M, 298th Infantry was the last of the allotted 60 Army HNG units to be organized and was federally recognized on 3 August 1948. During the year the Medical Detachment 487th FA Bn was inactivated at Honokaa, Hawaii and reactivated at Hilo, Hawaii with Federal recognition on 5 November 1948, and Battery A, 487th FA Bn was inactivated at Honokaa, Hawaii and reactivated at Kealahou, Hawaii with Federal recognition on 5 November 1948. The 3rd Bn Medical Platoon 298th Infantry was inactivated 30 April 1949 at Lihue, Kauai and the Medical Company 298th Infantry, Honolulu was redesignated to include the platoon. The 3rd Bn Medical Platoon 299th Infantry was inactivated on 30 April 1949 at Kohala, Hawaii and the Medical Company 299th Infantry, Hilo, Hawaii was redesignated to include the platoon. The following units of the 298th and 299th Infantries were redesignated by the Department of the Army, to comply with new Tables of Organization:

During the year all units of the HNG except the State Hq & Hq Detachment and 613th Ordnance (MM) Co were reorganized under new Tables of Organization and Equipment and National Guard Reduction Tables. The Hawaii National Guard stood between 2nd and 3rd place among all states and territories in organization and strength.

B. Training of Army Units.

1. Armory Drill training—consisted of 48 regular weekly drills. The 6 year National Guard Training Program was replaced by a new three-year plan and all HNG Army units commenced training under the new plan on 1 November 1948. This new plan is designed to coincide with the period of enlistment, to allow more progressive training and to eliminate repetitious subjects.
 - a. Guardsmen are now permitted to progress thru basic (1st year) intermediate (2nd year) and advanced (3rd year) subjects as rapidly as they can absorb them. The progress of all units has been excellent.
 - b. The NGB authorized two additional days of training during Calendar year 1949 so that individual weapons practice could be completed at home stations, thus permitting more time for Unit training during the field training period. Approximately 50% of the personnel of the entire HNG fired their individual weapons for record during the period 20 March to 12 June 1949.

II. Field Training

Field Training was held at Schofield Barracks, Oahu, during the period 12-26 June 1949 and included all Army units of the HNG. There were 188 officers, 11 warrant officers, and 3824 enlisted men

present, representing 76.4% of the total Army Units' strength. The Oahu units, consisting of the State Hq & Hq Det., the 613th Ord (MM) Co, and the 298th RCT moved to Camp via their own organic vehicles in regulated military motor convoys. The units on Hawaii (299th RCT) and Maui (1st Bn 299th Inf) moved via Navy and Army Transports, while the units on Kauai (3rd Bn 298th Inf) and Molokai (Co B, 299th Inf) were flown by Military Air Transport Service and the 199th Utility Flight, HANG.

The Master Training Program for Field Training FY 49 included the following subjects:

- Troop Movements
- Tactics, individual
- Crew Served Weapons firing
- Ceremonies and Inspections
- Operations of Squads, Sections, and Platoons
- Marches and Bivouacs

The appearance of the men, the manner in which training was conducted and the military bearing of troops during movements, training, and off duty periods indicated that much had been gained during the Armory training phase. Training progressed rapidly thru individual, squad, and platoon phases to the end that all subjects scheduled were covered completely during the period. The results were gratifying and are reflected in the following letter:

IV. Operations of HNG Army Units

During the period the HNG was called to duty only once. This was during the Waimea flood. Company I, of the 298th Infantry, stationed in Hanapepe, Kauai was called to active duty by Governor Stainback on February 7, 1949 to assist in protecting lives and prop-

erty in the Waimea Flood Area. The unit returned to inactive status February 9 with its mission accomplished.

The Hawaii Air National Guard also assisted in the Waimea disaster. A "Mercy Plane" flew to Kauai on February 10 with relief supplies donated to the Waimea Flood victims by the people of Oahu, through the Red Cross and the Salvation Army. Trucks of the 3rd Battalion, 298th Infantry were utilized to transport the relief supplies from the airport to Waimea.

V. Inspections of Training

The annual armory inspections by the Inspector General, USARPAC started with State Hq & Hq Det 23 November 1948 and ended with F Company, 298th Inf on 9 May 1949. All Army units were inspected except Battery A, and the Medical Detachment, 487th FA Bn. These units were excused due to their recent Federal Recognition. All units were rated "Satisfactory" with only minor deficiencies that were corrected at the time of inspection.

VI. Public Ceremonies

All Oahu units of the HNC paraded on Armistice Day, 11 November 1948. During Army Day, April 6, 1949 units on Oahu and Hawaii had window displays and held open house. Co. B, 299th Inf and the 111th Army Band paraded at Kaunakakai, Molokai on 30 May 1949.

I. Expenditure of Territorial Funds

Territorial funds expended by the Military Department for the support of the Hawaii National Guard for the fiscal year 1 July 1948 to 30 June 1949 were derived from three sources; funds appropriated by the 1947 legislature, special funds derived from the rentals of armories and reservations and expended by the Armory Board, and lastly those funds appropriated from the General Fund to provide pay for enlisted personnel for field training exercises in accordance with Section 13072, Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945.

SUPPLY AND MAINTENANCE (FEDERAL)

OFFICE OF THE U. S. PROPERTY AND DISBURSING OFFICER

I. **General.** The supply and equipping of the Hawaii National Guard is still being maintained at a level far higher than the National Guard of any other state. Logistically speaking, this is the item which has most impressed the several inspectors from Washington, who have visited the Hawaii National Guard units during the past year.

Considerable progress has been made in obtaining more adequate facilities during Fiscal Year 1949. Though no construction of a permanent type has yet been authorized by the Federal Government, all existing storage facilities have been expanded and new facilities have been built, or are under contract at Kealahou, Hawaii; Waialua and Kaneohe, Oahu; and new rifle ranges at Hilo, Hawaii, and Wailua, Kauai. In addition to this construction, the Hawaii National Guard has gained several facilities on the Island of Oahu by transfer from the Navy and Army.

II. **Finance.** The following is a breakdown of expenditures made from Federal funds, in support of the Hawaii National Guard during fiscal year which ended 30 June 1949:

As of June 30, 1949, there were 443 permanent duty employees in the Military Department, 381 of which were paid from Federal funds and 62 from Territorial funds. A complete list by name and position of all Federal and Territorial employees is included as the last paragraph in this section.

iii. **Procurement, Storage and Distribution of Federal Supplies, Army and Air Units.** The Hawaii National Guard is 85% equipped. Though the percentage of completion is less than the 93% reported last year, considerably more equipment has been received, as reflected below. This is brought about by changes in Tables of Organization and Equipment which materially increased equipment requirements. It is interesting to note that the Hawaii National Guard is 20% better equipped than the average National Guard unit of the United States. This may be attributed to the vast stocks of army surpluses accumulated in the Pacific area during the latter part of the war and later concentrated in Hawaii, portions of which were readily made available to the Hawaii National Guard.

At the present rate of procurement it is estimated that Hawaii will be 96% equipped at the close of fiscal year 1950.

Storage facilities for federal property have improved considerably during the past year. However, inadequacies still exist, as reflected in the abnormal number of surveys required for property lost due to inadequate storage facilities.

Distribution of federal supplies and equipment is made as supplies are received from Army and Air Force agencies, by the United States Property and Disbursing Officer. This distribution is based upon allowances, storage facilities and unit requirements. Problems arising were many because of Hawaii's geographic peculiarity, due to the necessity for air and water shipments to 36 units situated on four other islands. However, the effect of these problems would be negligible in the event the Hawaii National Guard were mobilized, since 95% of all equipment received is already in the hands of troops.

Federal logistical support of Hawaii's National Guard has been excellent, as evidenced by the monetary value of equipment and supplies received to date (valued in excess of \$12,000,000) and the large sums expended to effect proper shipping, accounting, maintenance and storage.

IV. **Transportation.**

a. **Individual:** (Transportation of Equipment and Supplies)

V. **Facilities.** Federal funds in the amount of \$228,457.03 were expended during the past year for new construction and expansion of National Guard facilities throughout the Territory of Hawaii. The new construction included the erection of motor sheds, additional storage facilities, a pistol range on the Island of Oahu and a rifle range on the Island of Hawaii.

Additional federal funds in the amount of \$56,929.13 were expended during the past year for the maintenance and repair of National Guard facilities throughout the Territory of Hawaii.

The new construction mentioned above has greatly alleviated the cramped conditions which existed at many of the National Guard installations.

Plans for fiscal year 1950 include lavatory and toilet facilities, additional security and improvements to all installations.

VI. Maintenance Program.

a. Maintenance is divided into three parts: Unit Maintenance, Field Maintenance, Base Maintenance.

(1) Unit Maintenance is divided into two parts:

(a) The Maintenance a driver, user, or wearer performs on the equipment he is using or has in his custody.

(b) Additional maintenance of Army equipment assigned to a unit by the unit caretaker and mechanics.

(2) Field Maintenance is that maintenance requiring special tools, skills, and parts not authorized for Unit Maintenance.

(3) Base Maintenance is the Rebuild of unserviceable items including major items. The Hawaii National Guard performs both Unit and Field Maintenance.

b. To perform Unit Maintenance on the equipment of each unit, the National Guard Bureau has authorized one Unit (Mechanic) Caretaker for each company size unit of the Hawaii National Guard, who is a full-time employee.

c. Total number of Unit Mechanics: 57.

d. To assist the unit mechanic in performing his maintenance, six (6) Service Centers have been authorized and established.

(2) Mission of Service Centers:

(a) The service center is established to provide tools and equipment from the Tables of Organization and Equipment of the parent unit for use by the various unit mechanics and contact team mechanics to receive, inspect and repair items of equipment requiring field maintenance.

(b) The service center is a supply point, inspection point, and the service center mechanics will perform maintenance on all classes of equipment, except liaison aircraft, within capabilities of tools and personnel.

(c) Field Maintenance on all classes of equipment will be performed by Combined Field Maintenance Shop personnel.

(d) Base Maintenance will be performed by Regular Army supporting shops, i.e., Ordnance Service Shop, Signal Depot Repair Shops, etc.

(e) Maintenance of liaison aircraft beyond the capabilities of the Airplane and Engine Mechanic will be performed by the next higher echelon of Aircraft Maintenance through arrangements made by the State Maintenance Officer.

e. Not-Ready-for-Issue Program.

(1) Because the vehicles received from the Army were in an "as is" condition and not ready for issue, the National Guard Bureau authorized 33 temporary mechanics, welders, and

clerks to process this equipment and put it in a ready-for-issue condition.

- (2) During the past year 549 vehicles have been processed and issued, making a total of 1,455 serviceable vehicles on hand and issued in the Hawaii National Guard.
- f. Annual Ordnance Technical Inspection.
- (1) Under the provisions of National Guard Regulations 76, dated 28 May 1947, an inspection of all ordnance material on hand in the Hawaii National Guard is made each year.

VII. The Combined Field Maintenance Shop, Hawaii National Guard.

- a. Purpose.
The purpose of the Combined Field Maintenance Shop and its plan of operation is the Field Maintenance of all Federal (Army) equipment in the possession of the Hawaii National Guard.
- b. Organization and strength.
- (1) Thirty employees are authorized and employed in the Hawaii National Guard Combined Field Maintenance Shop.
 - (2) Three mechanics are employed in Hilo and operate a sub-shop for repairing automotive equipment.
- c. Mission.
- (1) The mission of the Combined Field Maintenance Shop is:
 - (a) To perform field maintenance on all Federal equipment issued to the National Guard, both Army and Air Units, except Air Force equipment.
 - (b) To furnish contact teams for inspections and repair in the field.
 - (c) To furnish technical advice and assistance to unit caretakers when required.
 - (d) To evacuate equipment requiring higher echelon repair.
 - (2) Air Force Equipment issued to Army Units.
 - (a) Maintenance of Air Force equipment which is beyond the capabilities of the using National Guard Unit(Army) will be performed by the closet qualified United States Air Force Base of the Air Materiel Area Depot in which the Army Unit is located.
- d. Location of Shop (or Shops) and parent unit of each shop.

- e. Units supported.
- (1) Combined Field Maintenance Shop—all units supported.
 - (2) Combined Field Maintenance Sub-Shop—limited to automotive equipment on Island of Hawaii only.

f. Contact Teams.

- (1) Composition. Each contact team consists of a sufficient number of qualified personnel of appropriate Military Occupational Specialist from the Combined Field Maintenance Shop to accomplish repairs to the extent of Field Maintenance on equipment being inspected.
- (2) The mission of contact teams is to inspect and repair within the scope of Field Maintenance, all equipment in hands of units and in concentration sites. These teams provide equipment, render technical advice, and other assistance as is required by units visited, in the accomplishment of organizational maintenance. In addition to scheduled visits, contact teams visit units at times when the maintenance situation justifies a special visit.

g. A total of 3,136 repair jobs were completed in the Combined Field Maintenance Shop during the past year.

VIII. Service Contracts.

a. The United States Government is authorized, under existing Department of the Army policies, to reimburse State agencies for certain reasonable expenses incurred both in rendering necessary services and in maintenance of facilities which are made available to the State by the United States Government on revocable permit. Reimbursement is in the amount of 75% for actual expenses incurred pursuant to terms of the contract and not to exceed the sum contracted.

b. Maintenance does not include major and special repair or maintenance projects, but rather such projects will be made the subject of special consideration between the United States Government and the State. Major and special repair or maintenance projects are defined as those projects contemplating an expenditure in excess of \$500 for any one project in the case of the Army Service Contracts and \$200 in the case of the Air Unit Service Contract.

The above contract continues in full force and effect during fiscal year 1950.

IX. Summary. The supply of the Hawaii National Guard is current and adequate. Maintenance will be current in the near future. Facilities provided are adequate for the storage of supplies; however, only one armory

is provided in Honolulu to house one battalion. Honolulu armory now houses one battalion and five special units. (The strength is three times larger than the strength for which the armory was originally built.) The Field Artillery Battalion, 613th Ordnance (Medium Maintenance) Company, Service Company 298th Infantry, and 227th Engineer Combat Company are housed in temporary armories scattered about Honolulu. There is a dire need for outdoor training areas. A great necessity exists for an area which will alleviate the present cramped conditions; will provide for adequate outdoor training areas; and will allow for adequate indoor armory training. This area should be located near the center of population in Honolulu.

THE HAWAII AIR NATIONAL GUARD

I. GENERAL

1. During the FY 1949, the Hawaii Air National Guard made tremendous strides towards becoming one of the most effective of all Air National Guard organizations.

2. During the latter months of the FY 1949, plans were made to move the Hawaii Air National Guard to John Rodgers Airport, which offers better facilities for the housing of organizational equipment and training of personnel. The move has been approved by the National Guard Bureau and the buildings leased from the Navy Department. As soon as funds are available, work will commence on the reconstruction of this building to meet the needs of the Hawaii Air National Guard.

3. During the FY 1949, a number of Hawaii Air National Guard personnel made visits to National Guard Units in the Zone of Interior and findings have supported the claim that the Hawaii Air National Guard is one of the outstanding organizations in the Air National Guard.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Hawaii Air National Guard is composed of four (4) units; the 199th Fighter Squadron SE, 199th Utility Flight, 199th Air Service

Group (Ftr) Detachment C and 199th Weather Station (Type A). Listed below is a roster of commander and keystaff officers.

2. The Hawaii Air National Guard has a full-time, Federally paid, Air Technical Detachment authorized for the maintenance, repair and inspection of equipment issued to the Air Guard Units and the performance of administrative duties. The Air Technical Detachment is composed of sixty-two (62) National Guard personnel paid from Federal funds. The Territory bears the expense of seven (7) full-time personnel.

III. STRENGTH

The total commissioned and enlisted strength at the close of FY 1949 was as follows:

The above organizational strength indicates that the Hawaii Air National Guard has 100% of authorized airmen strength and has vacancies for thirteen (13) rated officers. These vacancies were created by an authorization from the National Guard Bureau to increase the authorized officer personnel to a total of sixty-one (61) officers.

IV. TRAINING

A. Armory Drill Training Program

During the FY 1949, a total of forty-eight (48) two-hour drill periods were accrued. The average percentage attendance for these drills were; Officers 86.75%, Airmen 73.75%.

During the FY 1949, the six (6) year training program was revised and a three (3) year training program was initiated. The success of the 1949 training program is due to the outstanding initiative of unit commanders and the excellent dissemination of instructions by the various section leaders.

To put into effect an accelerated training program, the Hawaii Air National Guard is stressing a more thorough screening of individuals upon enlistment. This screening is carried through the individual's training assignment so that a maximum amount of instruction could be absorbed in the group on-the-job training.

The purpose of the National Guard training program is to train personnel to effectively take their place on a combat team which may, in time of emergency, be used in the defense of the Hawaiian Islands. The

personnel of the Hawaii Air National Guard are being trained in the various administrative and technical positions which are required to support and put into the air an effective combat team.

B. Field Training

The field training period for FY 1949 was held from 14 June to 28 June 1949, inclusive. During this field training period, officers and airmen received an extensive course on basic military subjects and were given an idea of what would be expected of them when they participate in their respective technical and tactical duties during an emergency.

The attendance strength during field training was 83.5% of aggregate strength.

Program

The training program utilized by all units of the Hawaii Air National Guard was based upon the three-year **master** training program. All officers and airmen were trained in squadron tactical operations. All basic recruits completed their basic training during the first week of field training and during the second week these graduates from basic training actually participated in squadron tactical operations. The outstanding performance of the routine assigned duties indicated that these former basic recruits could perform their squadron duties in such a manner that the over-all tactical operations of the Fighter Squadron were accomplished in accordance with the highest standards of tactical efficiency.

Operations Readiness Test

During the last four (4) days of field training, the Hawaii Air National Guard received the regular Air Force Operational Readiness Test. This test was made to determine the over-all combat efficiency of the Fighter Squadron and attached units. This operational Readiness Test lasted for ninety-six (96) hours of continuous operation. The total score awarded to the Hawaii Air National Guard is believed to be one of the highest if not the highest Operational Readiness Test score received by any air National Guard organization. Final Operational Readiness Test scores for all air units are not available at this time. The local Air Force Commanders (Pacific Division, Military Air Transport Service) in charge of supervising the Hawaii Air National Guard progress, has commended the entire organization on their splendid achievements during the past fiscal year and the outstanding Operational Readiness Test results. It may be assumed from the above test that the Hawaii Air National Guard is considered a combat ready tactical organization, an organization which could, if called upon, perform its assigned mission.

C. Military Education

Attendance at Air Force Service Schools in the States showed a definite rise in interest by both the officer and airmen personnel. Most noticeable were the courses completed by the rated officers, courses which greatly improved the proficiency of his organization.

D. Flight Operations and Training

The fiscal year of 1949 has been an extremely busy year for the pilots of the Hawaii Air National Guard. They have followed a vigorous training schedule in both the classroom and in the air. Many pilots have only recently joined the organization and these men have had to meet additional training requirements to conform with regulations on transition in the F-47. Individual proficiency is the keynote of teamwork in a Fighter Squadron. It was to the attainment of a high level of individual proficiency, as well as the first real introduction of teamwork, towards which the Hawaii Air National Guard marched in 1949.

During the year, the squadron has made tremendous strides towards learning to fly and operate as a team. The Fighter Squadron constitutes a definite defending and striking force. The excellent showing during summer camp substantiates the claim that the Hawaii Air National Guard units are a team, capable of waging war against any aggressor force. In 1949, the Hawaii Air National Guard met the planned Master Training Schedule in its entirety for the first year. A complete listing of the subjects given are as follows:

Flying training requirements as outlined by the Hawaii Air National Guard conform to Air Force Regulation 60-2 which requires each pilot to log 100 hours throughout the year of First Pilot, Instructor Pilot, and/or Co-Pilot flying time of which 20 hours will be Instrument Flight Time, 15 hours will be Night Time, and 35 hours will be flown in each six month period. In the fiscal year of 1949 all pilots met the above requirements.

Strong emphasis has been placed on Individual Pilot's Uroficiency. Closely supervised flying training is being conducted to aid each man in reaching his attainment of skill in Aerial Gunnery, Strafing, Rocket Firing, Dive Bombing, Formation Flying, Instrument Flying, Navigation, Long Range Control and the many other phases of flying that the Fighter Pilot must be proficient in, whether he flies alone or as a member of a large striking force

Many National Guard Squadrons have difficulty in getting sufficient members together at one time to fly as a unit. The Hawaii Air National Guard solved this major problem by devising the "Dawn Patrol". Four (4) mornings each week a flight reports to the Guard area for flying at 0515. With take-off scheduled at 0550 and landing at 0715 the Hawaii Air National Guard is able to train each flight separately and in a regular sequenced schedule. At frequent intervals the entire Squadron is called out for a maximum effort mission with all four (4) of the flight flying as a Squadron. On one (1) day each week the pilots, when reporting to their civilian positions, have already undergone an intensified period of aerial training.

During field training exercises, emphasis was again stressed upon unit training. Actual operations performed by the Squadron proved the training for the year to have been even more successful than planned. During the exercises, all pilots who had not as yet qualified for an instrument rating were flight tested and they were all given instrument ratings. Instrument flying is a special subject for the coming year. The Air Force gave this Squadron its Operational Readiness Test during summer camp. The test assumed the proportion of a large scale operation. Maximum effort was demanded by the Air Force of sixteen (16) fighters in the air during all maneuvers. The pilots flew a total of 4,462 hours during 1949. Total time flown during summer camp was 832 hours.

In support of Hawaii National Guard Installations throughout the Island Chain, the Air Guard flew seventy-six (76) freight runs in the cargo aircraft. The Utility Flight carried 180,758 pounds of freight and transported 1,452 passengers in 1949.

The Red Cross requested aid in transporting medical and emergency supplies to Waimea, Kauai, in February 1949 as a result of the flash flood there. Other special flights included participation in "Air Force Day" at Hickam Field and in several air shows on Oahu.

V. MAJOR ACCIDENTS

The Hawaii Air National Guard suffered five (5) major accidents during the period 1 July 1948 to 30 June 1949. A listing of these mishaps with circumstances leading up to them and their probable causes are as follows:

1st LT FRANK J. SMITH—Lt Frank J. Smith, flying a F-47 on a routine training flight and approximately 10,000 feet, engine of his aircraft stopped and caught fire. With his cockpit engulfed in flames and smoke, Lt Smith bailed out. Lt Smith although suffered from 2nd and 3rd degree burns landed safely. The aircraft was a total loss.

CAPT FRANK R. HARLOCKER—In running his aircraft engine for a preflight, used an excessive amount of power, causing the tail to arise and allowing the propeller tips strike the ground. The propeller and engine of the aircraft suffered major damage.

1st LT GEORGE T. HARRIS—Lt Harris was unable to lower his right landing gear. The other gear operated in a normal manner. He executed a belly landing with minimum damage to the aircraft and no injury to himself. Causes of the accident was of a mechanical nature.

CAPT FRANK R. HARLOCKER—Capt Harlocker was attempting a normal take-off when his engine cut-out due to some malfunction in the ignition or carburetion system or from some form of internal failure. The pilot crashed landed on the last 1,000 feet of the runway safely and slid to a stop with major damage to the engine and propeller and also major damage to the bottom panel of the fuselock with no injury to the pilot.

1st LT RAYMOND D. GLADDING—Lt Gladding was landing his aircraft as No. 3 man in a four ship flight. He landed long. In attempting to avoid collision with the aircraft ahead on the runway he used excessive brakes, causing his aircraft to nose-up. Major damage to the engine and propeller with no injury to the pilot.

VI. MAINTENANCE

At the close of the fiscal year 1949, the figures compiled by operations and maintenance showed an increase of 50% in routine maintenance. The increase was due largely to the acquisition of nine (9) additional F-47N aircraft and the accelerated flying training program.

At the end of the fiscal year 1949, the 199th Fighter Squadron (SE) possessed twenty-eight (28) aircraft of which eight (8) were at the Hickam Depot, one (1) undergoing repair of damage caused by a nose-up, one (1) for corrosion control, one (1) gas tank change and five (5) for an inspection in accordance with Technical Order 00-25-8 (Transfer Inspection). The Utility Flight possessed ten (10) aircraft all of which were on hand.

On May 2, 1949, the Hawaii Air National Guard became responsible for the reclamation of seventy-nine (79) F-47N aircraft. The aircraft, formerly possessed by the 81st Fighter Group, were ordered reclaimed by the National Guard Bureau to increase the Hawaii Air National Guard supply stock level from a forty-five day to a two-year stock level, and to replenish the National Guard supply of F-47N aircraft parts in the various Air Force Depots in the Zone of Interior. F-47N parts are no longer procurable, therefore, the need of the Hawaii Air National Guard reclamation project. As of 30 June 1949, ten (10) aircraft had been completely reclaimed and an additional ten (10) started.

To support the reclamation program the National Guard Bureau allotted twenty(20) additional personnel to be used solely for reclaiming F-47N aircraft.

During the fiscal year 1949, the Hawaii Air National Guard Maintenance Section reached a greater degree of efficiency than ever before and is making great strides towards increasing its efficiency to where it can claim to be second to none in all the Air Force and National Guard.

VII. FACILITIES

The existing facilities located in the Hawaii Air National Guard Area at Hickam Air Force Base are considered inadequate. Numerous requests for funds have been submitted to higher Headquarters to construct additional buildings for classrooms, supply storage and office space.

All requests for funds have been disapproved due to the fact that all proposed construction in the Hawaii Air National Guard Area has been prohibited due to regular Air Force master construction program. The Hawaii Air National Guard had obtained temporary buildings which have

been added to the buildings in the original area. These temporary buildings are being used for classrooms, but are inadequate.

The Hawaii Air National Guard has planned to move the air units at Hickam Air Force Base to the Honolulu Municipal Airport. Necessary facilities are available as stated in Section I. The acquisition of these buildings will alleviate the critical situation which now exist insofar as pertains to adequate classrooms and storage facilities. The National Guard Bureau has approved the rehabilitation of existing facilities at the Honolulu Municipal Airport and a rough estimate of contemplated construction approximates \$300,000.00. Funds for this construction to be furnished from Federal Funds. This rehabilitation project will be initiated during fiscal year 1950 with contemplated completion dates during fiscal year 1951. The Air National Guard units will not be moved until all rehabilitation has been completed.

VIII. REGULAR AIR FORCE INSTRUCTOR DETACHMENT

The Senior Air Instructor's Office is organized under the directly responsible to Pacific Division, Military Air Transport Service.

The mission of the Senior Air Instructor's Office is to advise, coordinate and supervise the activities of the Hawaii Air National Guard, in accordance with existing directions, in attaining and maintaining the highest possible combat effectiveness.

The Senior Air Instructors' Office personnel are as follows:

Duties of the Senior Air Instructor:

Advise and assist responsible National Guard Commander in the attainment and maintenance of a state of efficiency prescribed by Air Force Directives.

Supervise and coordinate the official work of all Air Instructors in the Territory.

Be responsible for liaison between the appropriate Air Force Command and the Territory Adjutant General.

Act as military advisor to the Territory Adjutant General.

Perform such other duties pertaining to National Guard activities as the Air Force Commander may direct.

Attend regularly, authorized assemblies for air base training and verify attendance of all Federally recognized National Guard personnel.

Make frequent informal inspections to determine that Government property is being used in accordance with existing directives.

Submit reports to the appropriate Air Force Commander on any matter that is beyond his ability to correct.

Supervise and direct the duties of the sergeant-instructors assigned as his assistants.

Maintain suitable files of all orders, bulletins, regulations and similar official matters pertinent to the operation of the units under his jurisdiction.

Duties of Sergeant Instructors:

1. Maintenance Instructor.

Assist in the theoretical and practical instruction on maintenance matters. (Forms and equipment)

Assist and advise in the following of Air Force Directives and policies.

Make impromptu inspections of all engineering activities including, engineering, supply, armament, communications, motor pool and all associated shops.

Suggest any corrective adjustments to be made to Engineering Officer and organizational inspectors.

Keep Senior Air Instructor informed on conditions in general.
Report to Senior Air Instructor all unsatisfactory conditions he is unable to correct.

Act as direct liaison between Senior Air Instructor and Air Force and Engineering Officer (presenting the problems of aircraft maintenance officer for corrective action).

Assume any further responsibilities the Senior Air Instructor requires.

2. Administrative Instructor.

Maintains all administrative and clerical details incident to the operations of the Senior Air Instructors' Office.

Verifies the attendance of all National Guard personnel at assemblies and in case of a disagreement will recheck the attendance together with the responsible commanding officer in order to arrive at the proper figure.

Supervise and advise the work of one or more administrative organizations involving control and coordination of clerical or technical personnel.

Supervise and advise in the preparation of reports, correspondence, records, and forms such as payrolls (army drill and field training), special orders, courts martial proceedings, morning reports, sick reports, rosters and discharges.

Supervise and advise in the preparation of enlistment applications, applications for commission (officers), school applications, and officers applications for promotion.

Performs informal inspections of administrative activities.

The activities of the Senior Air Instructors' Office during the fiscal year 1949 generally include day by day advice, coordination, and supervision of many small problems that arise. However, many projects have been initiated and emphasized in the training toward more efficient and effective Air National Guard Units.

IX. SUMMARY

During the fiscal year 1949, the Hawaii Air National Guard progressed from a small cadre of experienced air guardsmen with a pool of basic recruits to a potentially combat ready tactical organization with trained and qualified personnel.

During the past fiscal year, the Hawaii Air National Guard received approximately 90% of authorized TO&E equipment, and in addition, has received necessary special equipment for accomplishing field and depot maintenance. The allocation of this field and depot maintenance equipment is a departure from the normal equipment allocated to the Air National Guard Units. Special consideration was given the Hawaii Air National Guard in the allocation of this highly specialized equipment. With the equipment now on hand the Hawaii Air National Guard can be considered practically a self-supporting organization.

It is believed that the over-all plans formulated during fiscal year 1949 to be carried out during fiscal year 1950 will ensure the continuous advancement towards the goal of the Hawaii Air National Guard. The goal of the Hawaii Air National Guard is: To be the outstanding Air National Guard unit with a combat effectiveness rating second to none.

STAFF JUDGE ADVOCATE GENERAL'S REPORT

I—The Twenty-Fifth Legislature in its regular 1949 session enacted Act 116, appropriating moneys from the territorial insurance fund for the payment of workmen's compensation claims of national guardsmen. It also passed Act 152, which amends section 13091, R.L.H. 1945, pertaining to organization of the Hawaii Territorial Guard. Present federal law (Sec. 194, Title 32 U.S.C.) prohibits maintenance of state troops except in time of war. Several states are sponsoring repeal of this provision. The territorial law as amended, will permit prompt organization of the Hawaii Territorial Guard when the federal legal obstacle is removed.

II—Breaches of military discipline requiring courts martial action were exceedingly few in number. None were of sufficient severity to require general or special courts, but were disposed of by summary court martial, and fines imposed.

III—Federal legislation of importance to the Hawaii National Guard was enacted. Public Law 810 of the 80th Congress, approved June 29, 1948, provides for federal retirement benefits at age 60 to national guardsmen having war service and twenty years guard service. By Public Law 108, 81st Congress, approved June 20, 1949, national guardsmen are granted the same pay, medical and retirement benefits for line of duty injuries during armory and field training as that given regular army personnel.

TERRITORIAL DISASTER RELIEF

I—**Organization:** The Coordinator, with one assistant, coordinates all plans and activities and maintains liaison with federal and territorial agencies. He is advised by the Territorial Disaster Relief Council, composed of the deputies for Honolulu, Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai counties, committee chairmen, and certain key sub-committee chairmen. Each deputy has organized his own plan and committees for initial functioning under the county. When the territory assumes control this organization continues to operate under the Coordinator.

II—**Committee Responsibilities:** Territorial and City County agencies operate in their respective spheres and assist other committees as may be required. All committees maintain current estimates of their capabilities, arrange for protection of their facilities against sabotage, conduct training programs where appropriate, and maintain standard operating procedures to meet all contingencies. They request or give aid as required under direction of the Coordinator. Non-governmental committees embrace (1) Relief Agencies, headed by the Red Cross and assisted by the Salvation Army and volunteer groups, in the primary relief effort; (2) the Medical group, in close cooperation with Health Departments and Red Cross, charged with direction of all medical activities, including supply and radiological matters; (3) Communications Committee, including all telephone, pigeons, and radio (except commercial broadcasting stations and military and police nets); (4) personnel, including supply and allocation; (5) transportation—motor, rail, sea, and air, including servicing and maintenance

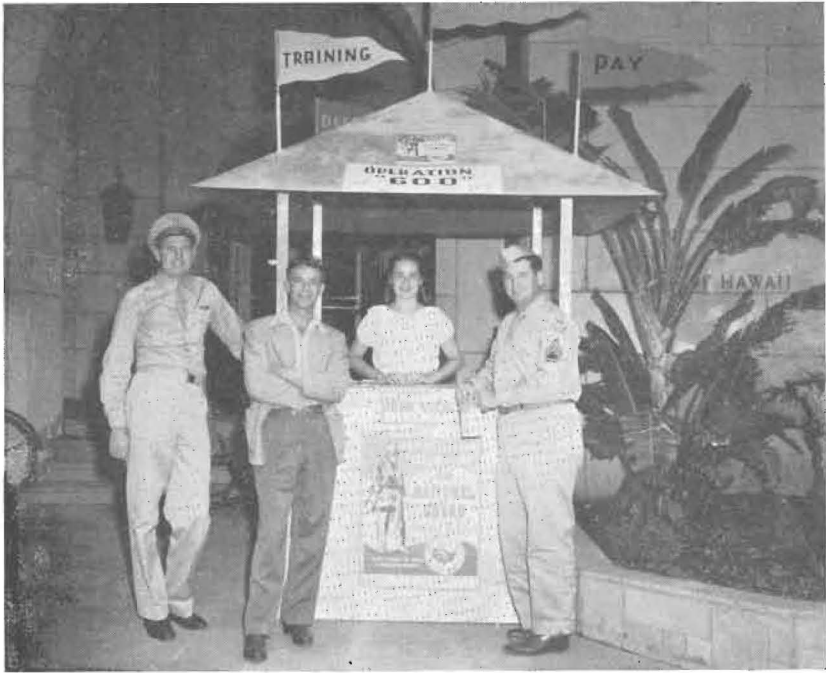
and liaison with Civil Air Patrol; (6) power, light, and fuels; (7) construction, including roads and heavy equipment; and (8) messenger service, including runners and motorcycles.

While the scope of responsibilities indicated above is obvious, several specific missions are worthy of note. The police constitute the sole agency for dissemination of warnings and alarms, for ordering compulsory evacuation and requesting transportation and facilities therefor. The Department of Public Instruction is charged with making readily available schools for hospitals, aid stations, ambulance relay stations, evacuation and feeding centers, and administrative headquarters. It also provides for first aid and similar training by Red Cross in its curriculum.

III—Activities during the year: These were highlighted by the following developments.

- a. Marked improvement in the alarm and alert system to provide prompt notification where indicated and to prevent undue panic. Briefly this provides for initial information to be telephoned to Honolulu Police Department by the obtaining agency, i.e., USARPAC G-2, U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, U. S. Weather Bureau, U. S. Coast Guard, etc. Honolulu Police Department relays this information to the Coordinator, Deputy for Honolulu, and Chief of Police on each island. No general alarm is given until it appears likely that the Hawaiian Islands will be affected. At that time warnings are given via commercial radio and airplane sirens installed on Civil Air Patrol planes (at present two planes so equipped; five are planned for Oahu when the strike bound sirens arrive). If subsequent tests are satisfactory, as they promise to be, similar action will be taken for other islands.
- b. The initiation of training programs by Red Cross, medical, police, health, fire, and utilities authorities, with notable assistance from the Armed Services.
- c. Practice problems involving the Army, Red Cross, Hawaii National Guard, community associations, medical groups, and Civil Air Patrol. Outstanding in this category was the Waialua Exercise in June 1949, wherein the Hawaii National Guard participated with the Waialua Community Association and Red Cross in a disaster problem.
- d. The expansion of the program to include two aspects of civil defense, i.e., medical care and health precautions (with emphasis on atomic bomb features) and self protection of utilities against sabotage.
- e. Flash floods of relatively minor nature occurred on Kauai and Hawaii, and at Waialua, Kailua, and Palolo and Manoa Valleys on Oahu.
- f. A serious flood occurred in January 1949 at Waimea, Kauai, doing millions of dollars worth of damage and necessitating the mobilization of one company Hawaii National Guard and the air shipment of emergency supplies from Oahu. County authorities and the population, aided by Red Cross and Salvation Army, did excellent work. No lives were lost.

IV—Legislative action: Act 320, SL 1949, setting up a Disaster Relief Agency and providing for subsidiary agencies became a law May 19, 1949. This closely follows the national pattern for states as recommended by the various governors in convention last year, and when implemented by the appointment of a Director will shift the responsibility from the Coordinator and the Hawaii National Guard. Until that time the latter will maintain authority under the Executive Order of April 14, 1948.

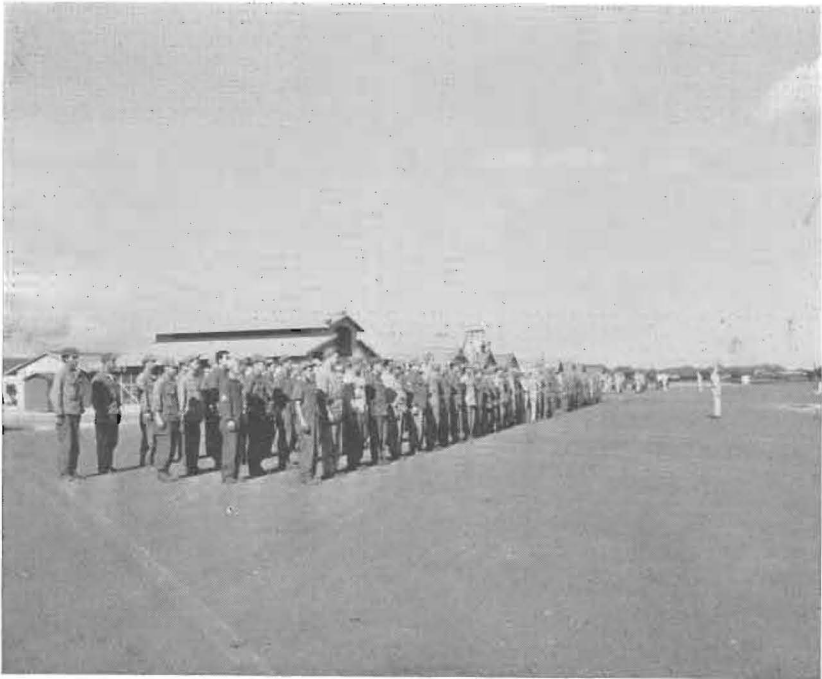

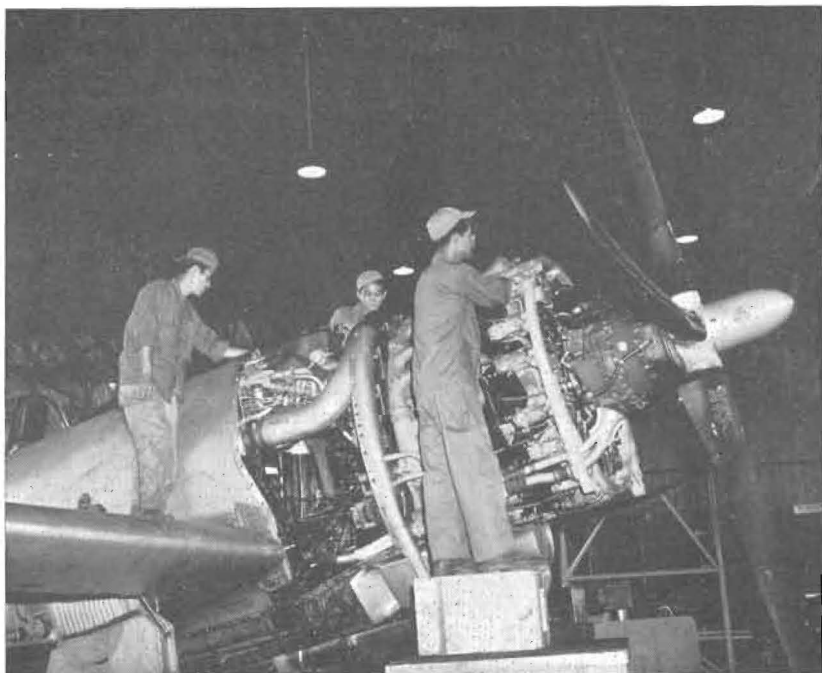

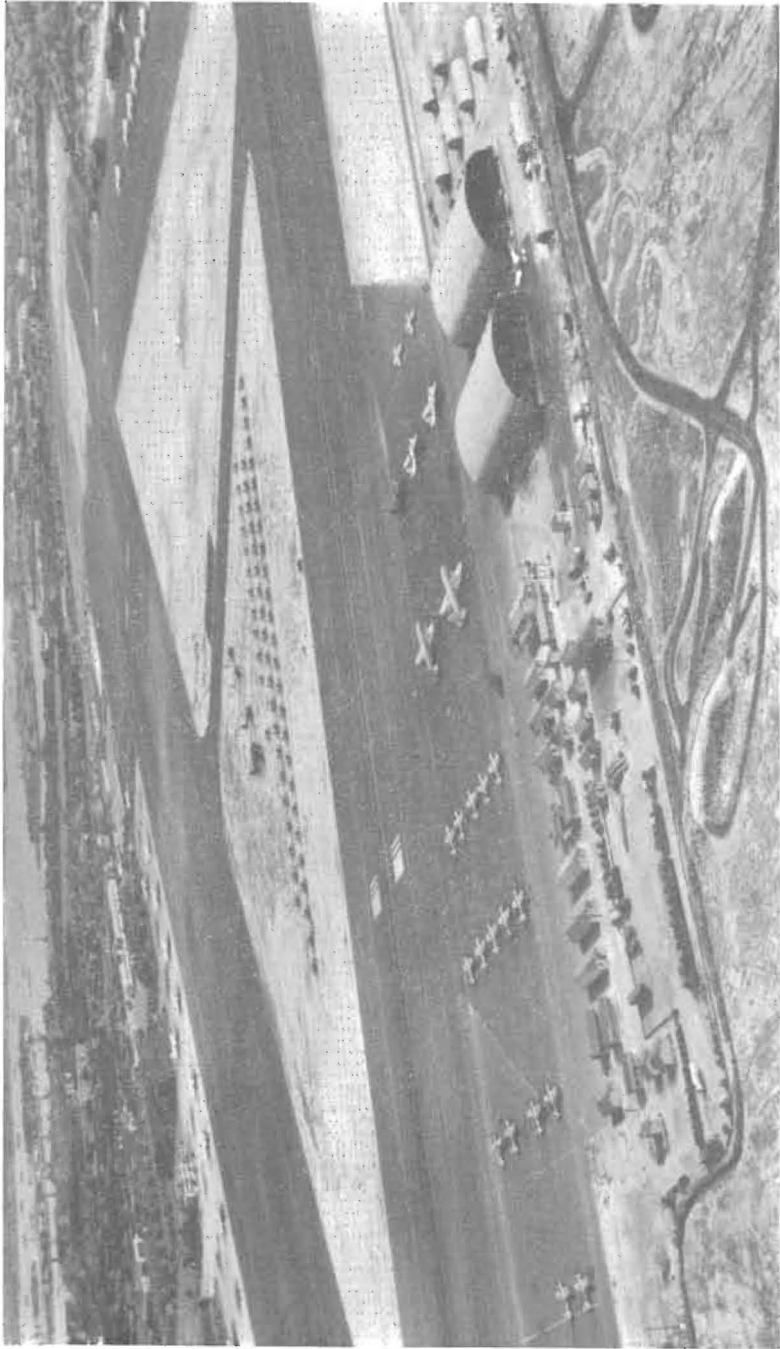

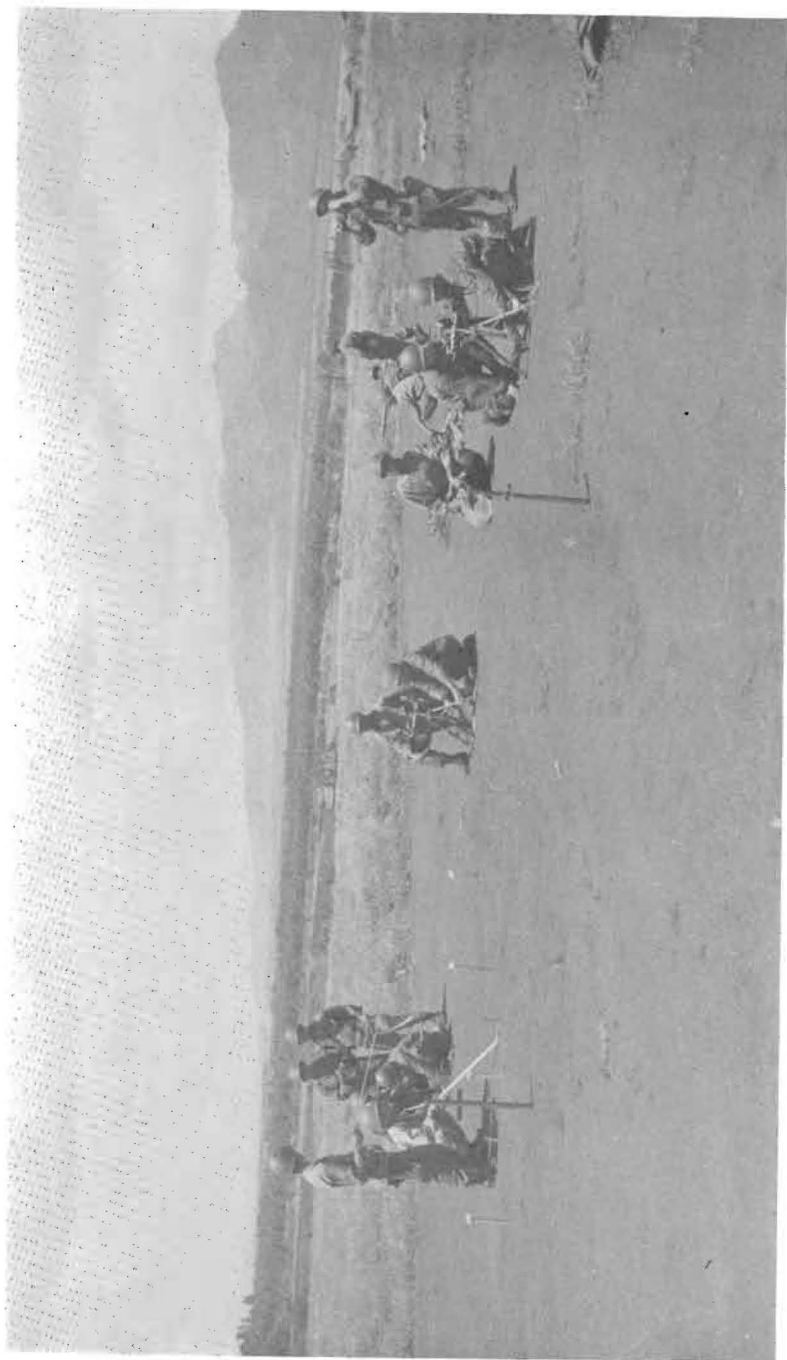

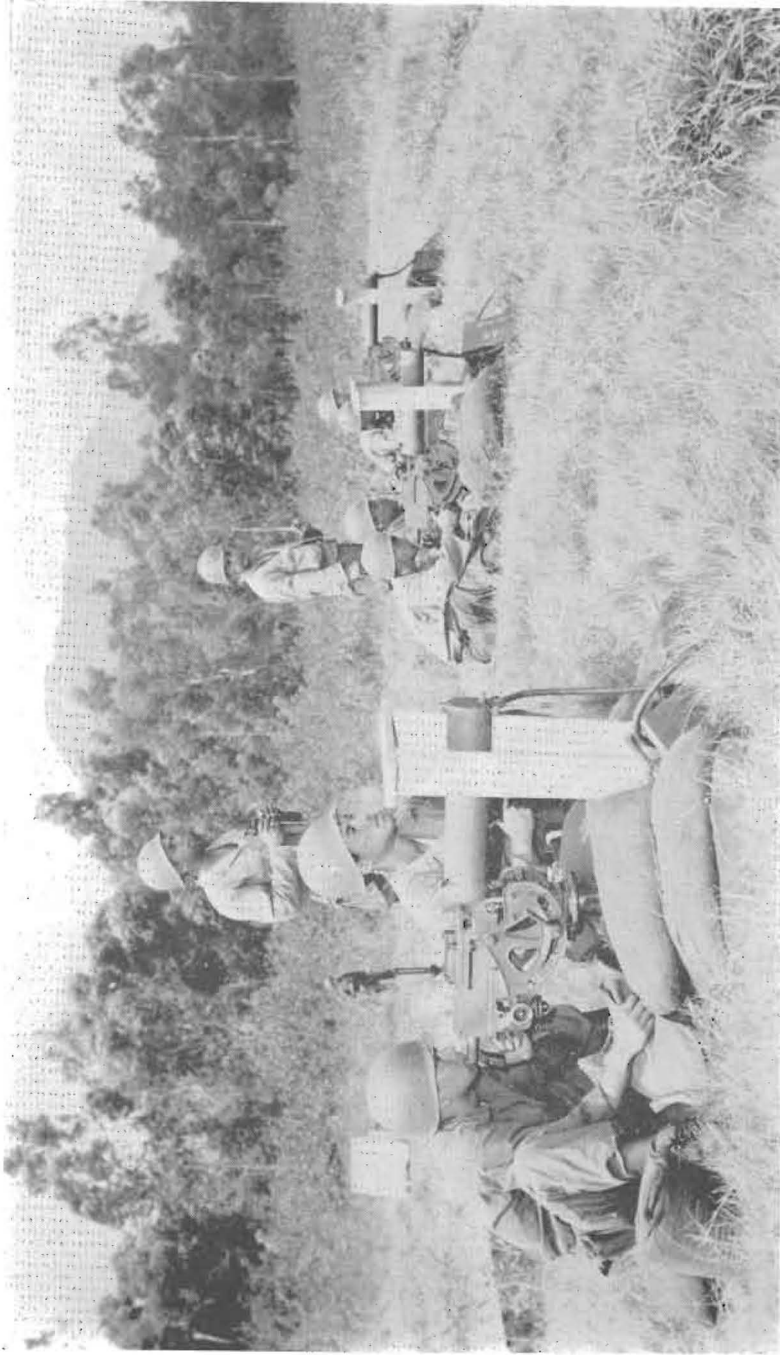

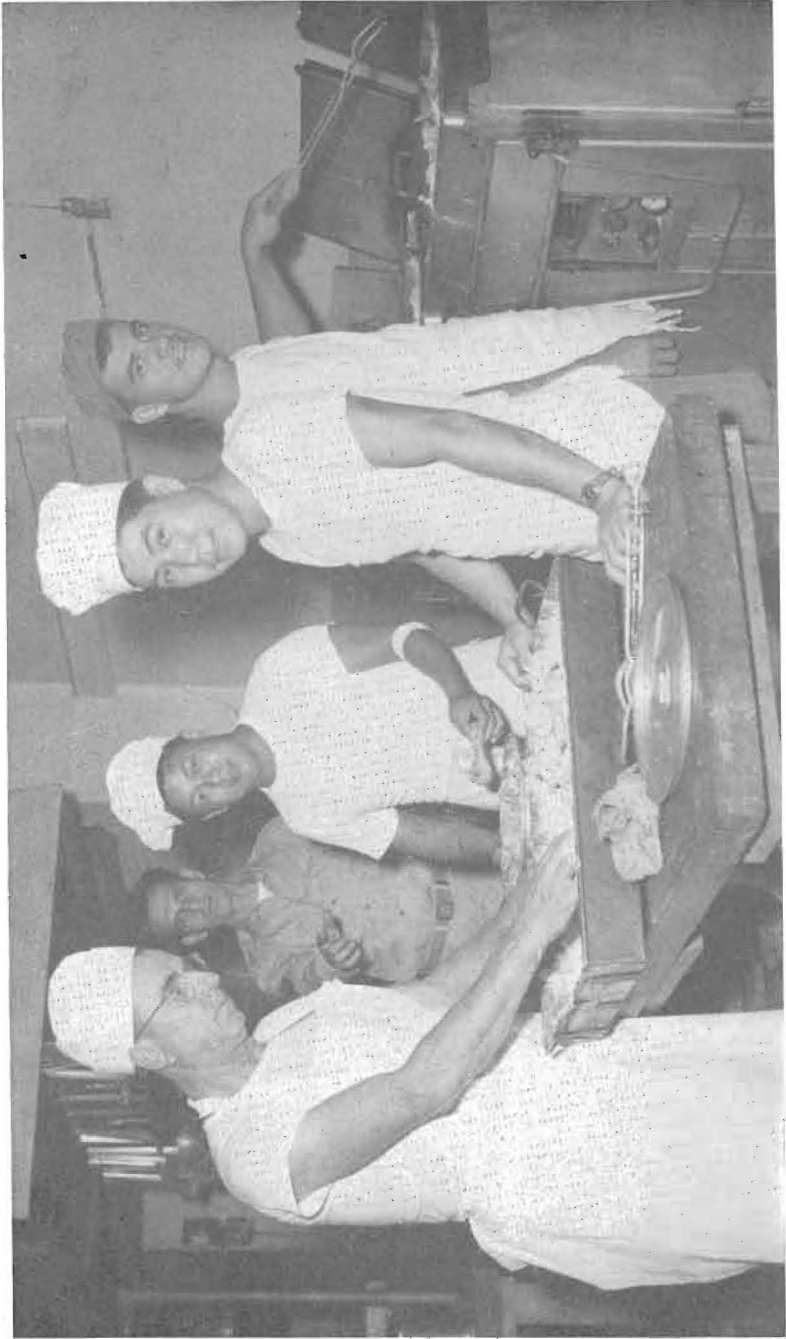

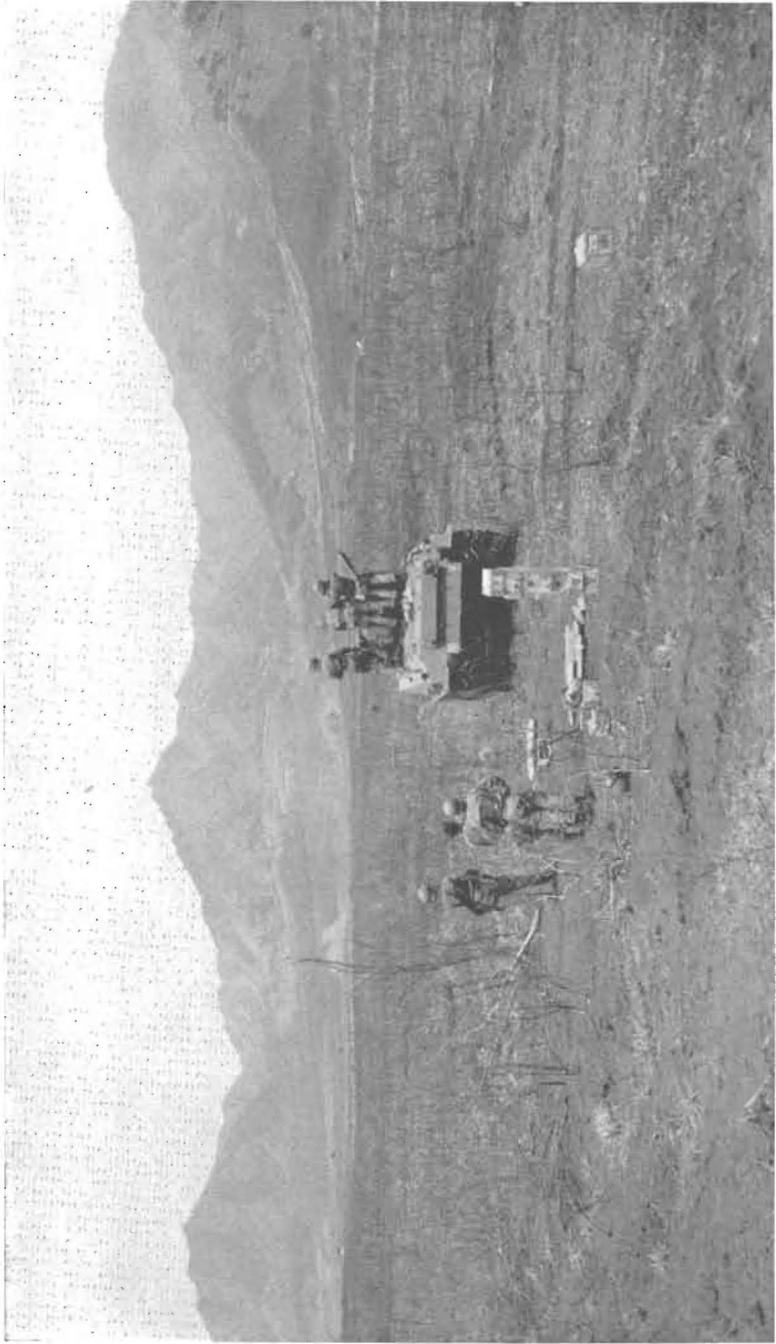
