### 13t Bn. trains in Washington

More than 600 Hawaii Army National Guard soldiers from Oahu, Maui, Kauai, and Molokai are still talking about an experience they'll long remember

simulator equipment and to participate in advanced urban warfare training using an authentic-looking Bavarian village," Maj. Edward Cruickshank, 1st Battalion commander, said.

The soldiers ranked training and live-fire exercise at Regenburg right up there with their weekend trip into Canada.

Regenburg is a mock village complete with two story buildings, a town square, a church, and a courtyard. Hawaii Guard soldiers were taught how to secure buildings using hand grenades and smoke bombs.

A special building at Regenburg, called "the Tire House," gave the men even more authenticity—a chance to secure the structure using live ammunition with weapons on

automatic fire. For most of the men, it was a first experience.

"I love the training," said Sgt. Silas Webster Keanini, Co. C., 2nd Platoon from Molokai. "There's nothing in Hawaii like the excitement and realism of "the Tire House" at Fort Lewis."

A river crossing exercise was also an unforgettable experience, particularly for those who got themselves wet from the 32 degree water of the Nisqually River. The Hawaii soldiers were taught to traverse a rope tied to trees on each side of the river.

While on guard duty, Pvt. 2 Benny Pacheco, of Waihee, Maui, saw a black bear "smelling around the fence" at the ammunition point. Pacheco verbally chased it off with shouts and threats.

The weather, however, was somewhat of an adjustment. Hawaii's guard soldiers are accustomed to tropical temperatures ranging from 75-90 degrees year round and, though it rains, it is sunny there at least part of the day. So, their first wet morning at 40 degrees in unheated barracks was a real shocker

But, as Sgt. Gordon K. Doo from Company B told a radio station calling him from his home island of Kauai, "While it is soooo cold here, the training is good and as long as we get our rice and the local food we brought, we're happy."

### **HANG dedicates HIROCC**

The Hawaii Air National Guard (HANG) dedicated a new building September 17, that will house state-of-the art computers, upgrading Hawaii's air defense system at Wheeler Air Force Base. The building will be the future home of the Hawaii Region Operations Control Center (HIROCC).

Lt. Col. Donald M. O'Day, 169th Aircraft Control and Warning (AC&W) Squadron commander, Hawaii Congressman Daniel K. Akaka, Maj. Gen. Alexis Lum, state adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Fred A. Haeffner, vice commander in chief, Pacific Air Forces, and other top military and local civilian dignitaries untied the traditional Maile lei during the ceremony. Music for the ceremony was provided by the Hawaii Army National Guard's 111th Army Band.

HIROCC will computerize many of the radar tracking and plotting functions now done manually and will process large amounts of data gained from HANG radar sites at Kokee AFS, Kauai, and Kaala AFS, Oahu. The system will also provide symbolic displays of aircraft showing their location, altitude and movement along with other information. The facility and equipment, valued at more than \$15 million, is expected to be fully operational by June 1984.

The center will be maintained by HANG's 169th AC&W Squadron, and jointly used by the Pacific Air Forces' 326th Air Division.
Other distinguished guests include Rev.


David K. Kaupu of Kamehameha Schools who blessed the facility; Brig. Gen. Michael H. Alexander, deputy for Strategic Systems, Electronic Systems Division; Brig. Gen. Edward V. Richardson, HANG commander; Col. B. V. Johnson, 326th Air Division commander and Col. John S. W. Lee, 154th Composite Group commander.

During a reception following the untying of the Maile lei, Congressman Akaka joined the HANG Ohana musical troupe to play the ukulele and sing to the more than 200 attendees.

The \$3.4 million building was designed by R. G. Wood and Associates, Ltd., of Honolulu, to meet the operational and environmental requirements of the HIROCC. A massive air conditioning system runs under the floor of the building to cool the computer and display equipment. Backup electrical systems ensure no data is lost due to electrical surges or outages.

To make the building look less conspicuous to the adjacent base housing area, the designers placed earthen berms along the sides and at the corners of the building to reduce the "blockhouse" look.

Kenneth Shioi and Company, Ltd., constructed the 29,000 square foot building using modern techniques such as pre-cast walls and roof panels. In spite of torrential rain in October 1982 and Hurricane Iwa one month later, the building was finished ahead of the 364 days allowed by contract.

# Wearing uniforms properly

"The Army's image in large measure depends on how our soldiers look to Americans. This is the reason we need to develop greater pride in how our soldiers look and to enforce high standards of appearance everywhere." That's how one Army official put it; and with that the class A uniform is changing.

Because the Hawaii Army National Guard is located in tropical, Zone I, the class A uniform for the male is the green shade 415 shirt (short sleeve), straight legged trousers, brass buckle, black oxford shoes, and the garrison cap.

With the green shade shirt, officers will wear green rank insignia shoulder marks. Corporals and above will wear the black shoulder marks. Specialists four and below wear the pin-on brass rank insignia on the collar one-inch up and centered. The shoulder marks are required for officers; authorized enlisted shoulder marks are not required until Oct. 1, 1983. The name plate is to be worn as well, centered on the right pocket flap. Hawaii Army National Guard soldiers are authorized to wear any ribbons or awards over the left pocket. A plastic backing may be worn on the inside of the shirt to provide additional support if necessary. The flat garrison cap is to be worn by all male personnel.

#### Simple design

Unit crests are not to be worn on the shoulder loops, this replaces the directive issued June 15, 1983. An Army uniform policy review board said that the original intent of the Army green shirt is a combination of simplicity of design and adornment along with versatility and comfort.

Male trousers are straight legged without cuffs and with side and hip pockets. Officers will have a braid sewn on each outside seam of the trouser leg from the bottom of the waistband to the trouser leg. All male personnel must wear black socks and oxford-style shoes. Patent leather is not authorized. The black oxford, chukka or similar commercial design shoes are authorized so long as ornate or large buckles are not worn and the shoes must have plain toes with non-contrasting heels and soles.

#### Women's uniform

For women in the Hawaii Army Guard, the rules and uniforms are not so simple. Women wear the fatigue and BDU uniforms the same way as men with the same hats and hoots.

Primarily the class A uniform for women in Hawaii is the black beret, short sleeve green shade shirt, slacks, or the knee length skirt.

The skirt is a knee-length, slightly flared skirt with a waistband and zipper closure on the left. All skirts will not be more than one inch above nor two inches below the mid-knee. Mid-knee is the point established by the crease in the back of the knee.

#### Slacks with flair

The slacks will have slightly flared legs and a zipper closure in the center front. Female slacks for officers will have a braid sewn on each outside seam of the pant leg from the bottom of the waistband to the bottom pant leg. The braids are identical in size as male officers.

The green shade shirt is worn as an outer

garment, and no necktab is needed with the short-sleeve shirt but is required wear with the long-sleeve shirt. The shirts may be worn outside or tucked inside the skirt or slacks.

The Army black beret is authorized for wear with the Army classic uniform as well as all other female service uniforms.

#### **Black berets**

A special note will be made on how to wear the black beret, because it is often incorrectly worn by females. The black beret will be worn tilted slightly to the back of the head but not forward of the natural hairline. The beret will be worn so as to retain its original hand-blocked contour.

#### **Authorized earrings**

There is a new policy on earrings. Female soldiers are authorized to wear earrings (screw-on or post-type) on an optional basis with service, dress and mess uniforms only. Earrings will be small (not to exceed 6mm or ¼ inch in diameter) gold, silver, of pearl; unadorned, spherical type. When worn, earrings will fit snugly against the ear and will be worn as a matched pair with only one earring per ear lobe.

# Kimura receives presidential award

Maj. Arthur Kimura, a drill status officer assigned to the 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron was presented a Presidential Award for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching Oct. 19, at the White House by President Reagan.

Nominated earlier and selected by a committee of peers to represent Hawaii in the national competition for one of 104 Presidential awards, Kimura also received a \$5,000 grant from the National Science Foundation for use in his school to supplement the school's support of science education.

Kimura, a biology teacher at McKinley High School, was nominated and selected based on his development of an innovative career-exploration program in science which utilizes community learning centers and other resources as a means of obtaining practical experience in dealing with animal management, environmental education, and medical services.

His students spend six hours per week at the Honolulu Zoo, the Hawaiian Humane Society, and Straub Clinic and Hospital as zoo keeper aides, guides in the education programs, volunteers in the hospital wards and pharmacy, and other programs at the facilities

As a member of the Hawaii Air National Guard, Kimura is an air weapons controller. He has participated in the last two Team Spirit exercises in Korea and has received letters of commendation from the commanders of the units he worked with for his outstanding performance. He has also augmented the Pacific Air Forces Inspection General team or an Operational Readiness

Inspections of regular Air Force units in Western Pacific. He was selected as the Outstanding Air Weapons Controller in HANG in 1980. As an additional duty, he is also a Liaison Officer for the U.S. Air Force Academy.

Kimura has also contributed time and expertise as a youth soccer, baseball, and basketball coach in the scouting and other student programs. He has annually taken groups of students on inter-island field trips and has been active in other community groups.

He credits the students of McKinley High School, the supportive faculty, the valuable involvement of the many community resources, and his non-teaching activities as major contributors in allowing him to have the opportunity of competing for the award. He credits his service with the Air National Guard with providing him with the opportunity of involvement with many outstanding individuals, of having many unique experiences, and of providing the basis for a valuable alternative work situation aside from his fulltime teaching career; he feels that his involvement with the Air Guard over the last 11 years, has allowed him maintain his enthusiasm for teaching and to avoid teacher burnout.

Kimura was earlier recognized by Governor George Ariyoshi and by the Honolulu City Council for his nomination for the Presidential Award. Besides the reception at the White House, he attended receptions at the Air and Space Museum and the National Science Foundation, visited with Hawaii's congressional delegation, and attended workshops at NASA and the National Science Teachers Association.

# 1154th Trans Co. distributes 157,500 lbs of surplus cheese

Hawaii Army National Guard personnel again lent a helping hand recently in distributing 157,500 pounds of federal surplus cheese to 31,500 disadvantaged families on Oahu.

Members of the Hawaii Army National Guard's 1154th Transportation Company were responsible in moving the cheese to 28 distribution points throughout the island.

Five transportation containers, holding a total of 6,200 cases of cheese, were unloaded beginning at 7 a.m. at the Department of Defense Headquarters on Diamond Head Road and the cheese taken to distribution

sites chosen by the State Department of Social Services and Housing.

The surplus cheese was then given to holders of special coupons. Each coupon holder received a five pound block of pasteurized, processed American cheese. Project officer was Maj. Emerick Kaneshi, state Department of Defense maintenance officer.

This was the second time this year that the Army Guard has helped to distribute surplus federal cheese. In April, Army and Air Guard personnel helped in the dispersal of 409,200 pounds.
